The increasing number of patients was referred to in the last Annual Report, as one that caused much anxiety to the

в

Visitors in providing the means for their accommodation; though it was not anticipated at that time, that any immediate enlargement of the Asylum was necessary.

But the increase latterly has been far beyond the average, being no less than 36 upon the last year, instead of 8, as in the preceding year, and 16 in the year 1858, while the number in the house on the 31st December, 1860, was no less than 388.

In this view of the case, the Visitors could no longer delay the consideration of the enlargement of the building; and after due consideration, it has been resolved that the present constitution of the Asylum should be maintained, and the increased accommodation required, be provided for by adding to the present buildings.

The Visitors have had before them plans for this enlargement to the extent of 200 additional patients, and have laid such plans before the Commissioners in Lunacy for their consideration.

During the last year an Act of Parliament has been obtained for amending the Leicester Cemetery Act, and enabling the Corporation of Leicester to provide an additional Cemetery. This Act which received the Royal Assent on the 15th May, 1860, will prevent the land on the southwest side of the Asylum being appropriated for interments, and the land which by the former Act was devoted for that purpose, has by the sale thereof from the Corporation of Leicester, become the property of the Lunatic Asylum. The Visitors feel that they have reason to congratulate themselves and the Friends of the Institution on this result, as notwithstanding the high price necessarily paid for the land, the advantages to the Asylum are very great. The freehold land now belonging to the Institution exceeds 36 acres, and a free access is thereby secured to the hired land, comprising 27 acres more. By these means, abundance

of occupation is provided for the patients, and that of a kind both healthy and remunerative; as the Reports of the Medical Officers and the Balance Sheet of the farm sufficiently prove.

The Visitors have had to contend this year with a great increase in the price of provisions, and with other extraordinary expenses not likely to occur again; but they are happy to find that it has not been necessary to raise the rate of maintenance of the pauper patients, which, if the scale of dietary be taken into account, it is believed, is lower than that of any Asylum in the kingdom.

The Visitors append as heretofore the Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy. It contains a recommendation to the Committee to separate the private and pauper establishments.

The public are aware that the private patients consist of two classes; the one, *independent*, admitted at a higher rate of charge; the other, one of *charity*, mainly dependent upon voluntary contributions. With regard to the first, the Visitors feel most strongly that a mutual benefit is obtained on the one hand by curative advantage to opulent patients, and on the other to the Institution in a financial point of view. In reference to the class supported by subscription, the Visitors do not consider it expedient to set aside an agreement, made binding by the 9 Geo. IV, c. 40, on which the constitution of the Asylum is based, and on the faith of which, donations have been granted, legacies have been bequeathed, and annual subscriptions are raised.

The funds of the charity have been increased this year by a donation of £50. from P. J. Wale, Esq., and by a legacy of £200. from the late John Hays, Esq., of Leicester, for which the Visitors desire to record their thanks. The state of the charity account is shown in the tables annexed to this Report, and the Visitors have agreed that one-fifth of the cost of the purchase of the new land shall be borne out of this fund,—this, amounting to £2000., will materially diminish the Capital Stock, but the advantages of the land are so great that it is believed that the expediency of the contribution will meet with the approval of every Subscriber.

The Reports of the Chaplain, the Medical Officers, and the Matron, are laid before the Meeting; they are important, as shewing that the internal condition of the Asylum is satisfactory, and the Report of the Commissioners bears testimony to this also.

In conclusion, the Visitors while deploring in common with others, the apparent increase of insanity, would fain hope that this increase of patients in Asylums arises greatly from the attention paid to the early stage of the malady, and they feel that if ever it is to be permanently arrested, it must be by providing means for placing the patient under proper care in the outset of the disease, and thus doing all that human skill and care can do to prevent its becoming chronic.

With these remarks the Visitors conclude their Report, feeling sure that if the enlargement of the Asylum be a necessity, it will be received as a duty to be done, and be met accordingly.

REPORT

OF

THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,

AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,

August 7th, 1860.

THERE are now 381 patients in this Asylum of whom 25 males and 33 females are private, and 153 males and 176 females are pauper patients. We have seen them all today and have inspected all the wards.

The present state of the patients is healthy and only seven men and five women are under medical treatment. Since the last visit 1 private and 36 pauper patients have died, and 7 private and 48 pauper patients have been discharged, of whom 40 were cured.

The admissions have amounted to 129, of whom 16 were private patients.

We found the patients in a very satisfactory state as regards their personal condition and clothing, and they were generally tranquil and orderly. No person was secluded, and we learn with satisfaction that the cases of seclusion have been gradually reduced in number and duration.

The number of padded rooms has been diminished, and those which remain are not used for the purpose of seclusion. The system of night watching continues to act very beneficially, and the number of wet and dirty cases is now very small.

The returns of the patients who are habitually employed, shew that nearly a hundred men and more than a hundred women are regularly and usefully occupied, the average of men who work on the land appears to be about 40, and these, with the assistance of only one paid gardener, cultivate 37 acres of land, which are cultivated entirely by spade labor. The appearance of the farm is very satisfactory and the crops are all in a most luxuriant condition. A large number of the men were occupied in the gardens to-day, and we noticed with satisfaction that the front garden is now freely used by the inmates of both sexes and of all classes.

We saw the inmates at dinner, their food consisting of Irish stew, was well cooked, and placed before them in a clean and orderly manner. We heard no complaints on the score of defective food, and only one woman made any complaints of the nurses or attendants.

The wards are throughout clean and well ventilated, most of them have recently been painted, and washed in colour, and they present a cheerful and comfortable appearance. The furniture has been increased and some new bedsteads and bedding have been supplied.

Although there are at present, in the opinion of Mr. Buck, vacancies for 28 male and 3 female patients, some of the dormitories even now contain too many beds, and it is evident that ere long the necessity of providing increased accommodation for pauper patients will have to be considered by the Committee of Visitors. In these circumstances we beg to direct their attention to the observations made by our colleagues at their last visit, relative to the separation of the private and pauper establishments. We entirely concur in their recommendation and we can ourselves bear testimony to the success which has attended the change in other counties. In the present instance such a separation becomes the more worthy of consideration because the existing building has now reached the limit to which it can be properly enlarged.

We notice with pleasure a great and manifest improvement throughout the establishment, and a corresponding improvement in the demeanour of the worst class of patients.

Amongst other things the dietary has been increased and meat now forms a portion of every day's dinner.

We have derived satisfaction from our visit, and are of opinion that the present state of the Asylum is creditable to the Superintendent and the several officers under him.
