IT will be seen that the average number in the House is nearly the same as last year. The increase in the County Patients, being balanced by a gradual decrease of the Borough Patients, of whom there are now 64 in the Asylum.

By the Local Act of Parliament, under the provisions of which the Borough Patients are received into the Asylum, the number which the Counties are bound to receive from the Borough is limited to 40; there is then still an excess of 24 above the prescribed number.

But as it is understood that the Borough of Leicester is about to provide a Lunatic Asylum for its own Pauper Patients, it is probable that in a short time the arrangement between the Counties and the Borough will be terminated; in which case all the Borough Patients will be removed from the Asylum, and there is therefore no prospect of any further building being necessary for the accommodation of Patients entitled to admission for some years to come.

The number in the House on the 1st January, 1864, was 393, as against 386 in the preceding year.

The Visitors have the pleasure to report that the condition of the Asylum continues to be in every way satisfactory.

The past year has been remarkable for the health of the Patients, the average rate of mortality being far below the general average, while in a financial point of view, the Institution was never more prosperous; a reference to the several tables annexed to this Report will be sufficient proof of this.

The cultivation of the land by spade husbandry continues to supply salutary and healthy employment. In table No. 4 is shown the number employed on the farm and garden, and in the garden and farm account at the end of the report will be shown the Superintendent's balance sheet of farming operations, and the actual cash carried over to the household account as realized profit.

During the past year, it was resolved by the Visitors that

Mr. Buck, who had then completed 10 years of official residence in the Asylum, should be allowed three months leave of absence, during which time the Asylum was placed under the care of Dr. Davies, of Leamington. The Visitors in their journal, and the Commissioners in Lunacy, in their official report, alike bore testimony to the efficient services rendered by that gentleman, and which testimony the Visitors now desire to place on record. Mr. Buck returned from a Continental tour in the month of October with renewed health, and resumed his post at the Asylum, to the gratification of the Visitors, who witness the well-doing of the Asylum under his able management.

There is little to remark as to the Charity; the funds have been increased this year by a legacy of $\pounds 50$. from the late Miss Burnaby, and the subscription list is well maintained. The accumulated fund arising from legacies and donations of former years, is invested in good security, as will be seen by the accounts annexed hereto.

The Visitors have received satisfactory accounts from the Chaplain, the Visiting Physician, Medical Superintendent, and Matron, of the state and condition of the Patients. The Visitors have during the past year increased the stipend of the Chaplain, at the same time arranging for ministerial visitations during the week, as well as the accustomed services on the Sunday.

The report of the Commissioners in Lunacy is appended hereto, which will be read with interest, as confirming the Visitors report of the general prosperity of the Asylum, and the Visitors fully concur with the Commissioners in their opinion of the efficient management of the Institution, by the Medical Superintendent and the several Officers under him.

OF

THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,

AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,

July 27th, 1863.

THERE are to-day 401 patients in this Asylum, who are classed as follows :---

Males-Private .			27
" Pauper .			166
Females-Private			29
" Pauper			179
Total .			401

One female patient is absent on trial.

We have this day examined all the patients, and found them generally quiet, and on the whole, in good bodily health. Nineteen patients are reported to be under medical treatment.

Since our visit a year ago, 23 pauper and 5 private patients have died, generally from ordinary causes. No fatal accident has occurred, and no inquest has been held on any patient who has died during the past year. Eleven private patients and 23 paupers have been discharged. Of the privates, 5, and of the paupers, 16, are reported to have been recovered.

The admissions have amounted to 79-65 being of pauper, and 14 of private patients.

There has been no case of restraint, and but few instances of seclusion.

We found the patients personally clean and well dressed, and they were very orderly and well-behaved to-day. We saw them at dinner, and the food, which consisted of boiled beef and potatoes, was good and well cooked.

We have nothing new to report as to the occupations and amusements of the patients.

Forty-five of the men work regularly on the farm, and there are a few others who are employed in the gardens. The farm continues to be a source of considerable profit to the Institution.

The Chapel is generally well filled on Sunday, and on Wednesday a considerable number of patients are in the habit of attending.

We are informed that the patients of both sexes are assembled on Tuesday evenings in the recreation room, where they amuse themselves with dancing and music, and some of them play at cards, drafts, &c.

All the wards were quite clean, and the air in them was pure. We think, however, that the means for ventilating the padded rooms are not sufficient, and if some of the windows in the galleries were made to open at the bottom, it would be an improvement to the general ventilation.

From enquiries we have made, it appears to us that although some of the patients have a great amount of liberty allowed them, there is a class who are very much restricted for exercise to their airing courts, and more frequent walks beyond them should, we think, be encouraged. A good road round the boundary of the estate would afford facilities for this purpose.

A swing has been put up in one of the women's airing courts, but sun shades are much wanted, and we recommend that trees be planted in all the courts on the female side; some flowers might also be introduced into these courts with advantage.

It would be well if the sunk fence at the end of the women's large airing court were planted, and a light railing placed at the edge of the bank to prevent the patients from conjugating there. The wall of one of the smaller airing courts has been lowered, as recommended at the last visit, but not sufficiently to give the patients a view of the country. It might, we think, be still further lowered with advantage.

There seems to be a very liberal supply of books and newspapers in all the wards.

Dr. Buck is at present away from the Asylum, and we are glad to hear that he will enjoy a period of relaxation for three months. Dr. Davies is at present performing the duties of Superintendent, and the state of the Asylum is creditable to him.
