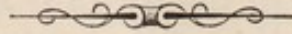

OF

THE UNITED COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF

The Leicestershire & Rutland Lunatic Asylum,

TO THE

THIRTY-FOURTH GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING,

HELD AT THE JUDGES' LODGINGS,

On Tuesday, the 31st day of January, 1871.

THE Report now presented will contain a recital of events affecting the interest and welfare of the Institution in no ordinary degree—in fact involving a complete change in the constitution of the Asylum.

In the Report presented to the Annual Meeting for the year 1869 it was stated that a Committee of Magistrates appointed by the counties of Leicester and Rutland, and of five Visitors appointed at a General Meeting of the Subscribers, had been formed to consider the then value of the interests of the Charity in the Asylum, and that such Committee had appointed Mr. Colin Macaulay as their assessor to make a valuation of the Asylum Estate.

Mr. Macaulay having presented his estimate of the value of the Asylum Estate, the United Committee presented their

Report, in which they recommended that the interest of the Charity in the whole Asylum Estate, including buildings, land, stores, and property of every kind, be computed at the sum of £10,500; and they recommended that in any alteration of the existing agreement between the Counties and the Charity, the sum of £10,500 be reckoned as the value of the interest of the Charity in the Asylum Estate, and as the sum to be paid by the counties of Leicester and Rutland for the purchase thereof.

This Report was received and adopted in the several Courts of Quarter Sessions for the respective counties of Leicester and Rutland; and at a General Meeting of the Subscribers it was unanimously agreed that the sum of £10,500 should be taken as the interest of the Charity in the Asylum Estate, and form the basis of any future negotiations between the Counties and the Charity.

It will be seen, by reference to the Report of the year 1869, that the following Resolution had been agreed to at a Special General Meeting of Visitors and Subscribers assembled on the 2nd October in that year:—

“That after January 1st, 1871, no more private independent patients be received into the Asylum, excepting only such Charity patients as may be in the Asylum at that date, who shall be permitted to have the option of remaining in the Asylum as independent patients.”

The Visitors, therefore, in any arrangement for the future management of the Asylum, had to bear in mind this resolution, and much negotiation and many conferences have taken place on the subject during the past year; eventually, however, an agreement has been entered into, which is set out at length in the Appendix to this Report, and which, having received the sanction of the Secretary of State for the Home Department, and the signature of the majority of the Visitors, is now binding at law, and is the basis of the new Constitution of the Asylum.

By this agreement, the patients in the Asylum will be henceforth divided into two classes only—Pauper and Private; and the latter, who are restricted to the number of 50, can only be admitted on the nomination of a Subscriber, and in such manner as the Committee of Visitors appointed by the Subscribers shall determine on.

For the admission of these patients the Charity leaves in the Asylum the sum of £5,500; that is to say, it receives

only £5,000 out of the £10,500, the computed value of its interest in the Asylum Estate, and this £5,000 will be paid out of the general balance standing to the credit of the Asylum, without calling upon any rate for the purpose from the ratepayers of either Leicestershire or Rutland.

The capital of the Charity now consists of the said sum of £5,000, of £4,000 India £5 per cent. Stock (the present value of which is £4,400), and of a cash balance which may be computed at £1,600—in all £11,000, or thereabouts, besides the £5,500 still remaining on the Asylum Estate.

In order to deal with this sum in the best manner for the interests of the Charity, a scheme for the future management of the Charity has been prepared, and has been under the consideration of the Committee of Visitors; but inasmuch as it will require the sanction of the Court of Chancery to become binding, the Committee do not set it forth in their present Report, assuring the general body of Subscribers that no scheme for the management of the Charity shall be laid before the Lord Chancellor as that sanctioned by the approval of the Subscribers until the same has been laid before a General Meeting, and the opinion of the Subscribers invited thereon.

The borough patients having now been entirely removed from the Asylum, the average number of patients has been less than that of any preceding year; the numbers are set forth in the following tabular statement:—

The Asylum has been visited during the year by the Commissioners in Lunacy, whose Report is also set forth in the Appendix. It will be seen on reference thereto, that they conclude their Report by declaring the condition of the

Asylum to be most satisfactory and creditable to Mr. Buck, as Superintendent, in which opinion the Visitors fully concur.

During the past year the Rules of the Asylum have been entirely revised and remodelled, and having received the approval of the Secretary of State, are now in force. Copies of these rules can be had by any Subscriber on application at the office of the Clerk of the Peace.

The invested capital of the Charity remains as it was last year: that is to say, £4,000 £5 per cent. India Stock; but as the same at present remains invested in the name of the late Col. King, as surviving Trustee thereof, no dividends have been received during the current year, the same remaining in abeyance until the transfer of the fund itself to the new Trustees of the Charity is made, under the direction of the Court of Chancery; no inconvenience, however, will result from this, as the cash balance in hand belonging to the income of the Charity is amply sufficient to meet all current demands upon it.

The death of Lord Howe, so universally regretted in this county, has deprived the Asylum of a Visitor who had been a most valued member on the Board of Management from the foundation of the Asylum.

The Report of the Superintendent and of the Commissioners in Lunacy on their last visit, as already referred to, are annexed to this Report, and will be read with interest; and these, with the Tables forming part of the usual Appendix, and shewing the several balance sheets of the Asylum, have been prepared, and, when duly examined and audited, will be printed and circulated as heretofore.

Dr. Compson still remains in the Asylum as the Assistant Medical Officer; and in concluding their report, the Visitors have pleasure in recording their appreciation of the services rendered by him, and by the Officers of the Institution generally, throughout the year.

To the Visitors of the Leicestershire and Rutland Asylum.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you the following Report:—

On the 1st January, 1870, there remained in the Asylum 407 patients: viz. 196 men and 211 women. The number admitted during the year amounts to 90 (44 males and 46 females); making a total of 497 under care and treatment during that period. Of these

32 have been discharged Recovered,
 9 ditto Relieved,
 and 39 have died, leaving 417 in the Asylum
 on the 1st January, 1871.

Of the 90 patients admitted, 5 were transferred from other Asylums and 11 have been in Asylums previously.

Of the 497 patients under treatment during the year, the average number has been 411.

The Statistical Tables now presented differ materially from those which have hitherto accompanied the Annual Report of your Medical Superintendent.

These Tables, as far as No. 10, are similar to those in use in nearly all the English County Asylums. This system of medical registration has been strongly recommended by the Commissioners in Lunacy, who, in their 24th Annual Report, page 71, say: "That for the purpose of obtaining correct records of Insanity, and of facilitating comparisons, it is most important that a uniform system of registration should be employed."

In addition to these new Tables, some of the older ones, which have long been in use at this Asylum, have been continued.

The health of the patients has been generally good throughout the year, and there has been a very remarkable absence of diarrhœa and other epidemical disorders.

Two coroner's inquests have taken place: in one instance

upon the body of a male patient from the Barrow-upon-Soar Union, who died very suddenly from disease of the heart.

In the second case the Coroner's inquisition was held upon the body of a male patient, 80 years of age, who died two days after his admission into this Asylum from the effects of burns, which he had received before his removal from his home near Ashby-de-la-Zouch.

The mortality of the year amounts to 9.48 per cent. upon the average numbers resident. By reference to Table No. 5, it will be seen that the principal causes of death have been paralysis, epilepsy, phthisis, and old age. Post mortem examinations were made in all but ten cases.

Several very distressing cases of patients having strongly developed suicidal propensities have occurred; and these have entailed continual care and anxiety on the part of all concerned in their welfare.

I am thankful at being able to record the fact that ten years have elapsed since a death from suicide occurred in your Asylum.

By the erection of a bakehouse and oven I fully anticipate that some very useful and economical changes in the dietary of the Asylum may be rendered practicable.

The commodious and excellent workshops which have been built on the male side will, I am sure, enable many of the patients to be usefully employed in the manufacture and repair of articles in use at the Asylum.

The removal of the old mortuary chamber from the centre of the buildings, and the erection of new and appropriate buildings in the front grounds, have been of great service, and have materially promoted the proper and respectful treatment of the dead.

Considerable improvements in the smaller airing courts are being made, mainly by the work of the patients and servants.

I have nothing fresh to record of the amusements and the occupations of the patients; but I desire that it should be understood that they have been zealously cared for by your resident officers and servants.

The farming operations of the year have been carried out under considerable difficulties, owing to the long-continued Midsummer drought; the grass crops and the turnip and cabbage cropping were almost failures; and it was only when the land was fertilized by sewage irrigation that we had good roots and vegetables.

The Farm and Garden Account shews a balance of £525 10s. 3d. in favour of the Asylum.

By the retention and occupation of the wooden building very excellent accommodation is afforded to many of the chronic and harmless patients, and the Asylum is thereby enabled to afford ample accommodation to the pauper lunatics of the two counties.

I am indebted to Dr. Compson, the Assistant Medical Officer, for his unremitting attention to the welfare of the patients, particularly to the sick.

THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY

THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM
 AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,
9th February, 1870.

UPON our visit this day we have inspected the Asylum in its several departments, seen all the patients, and made the Statutory enquiries as to its visitation, management, and otherwise.

The changes in the patients since the visit of our colleagues, 15th May last, and their present numbers, are set forth in the following tabular statement:—

An inquest was held in the case of one female patient, who was found dead, and the verdict was “Died of Epilepsy.”

The sanitary state of the Asylum is good. The patients registered as under medical treatment are in number 20, viz., 14 in the male division, and 6 in the female. There has not since the last visit been in the Asylum any disorder of an epidemic character.

We found 9 male and 4 female patients in bed. With two exceptions the cases of the patients referred to call for no special observation.

Two of the male patients, both of the private class, were confined to bed in consequence of personal injuries recently sustained.

One, E. R., a powerful man, had made a violent and unprovoked attack upon Mr. Buck in the grounds, and upon being removed with much difficulty into his ward assaulted an Attendant with a fire guard, and afterwards struck the other patient referred to, W. M., and fractured one of his ribs. E. R. had a violent struggle with the Attendants, during which he sustained some severe bruises and the fracture of a rib, which he stated to us to have been caused by kicks inflicted by W. M.

The patients attending divine service on the Sunday prior to our visit were 109 on the male side, and 102 on the female.

The Returns relative to employment are much the same as heretofore, the only material change being an increase in the number of men engaged in agricultural labour.

Since the last visit three patients only appear to have been secluded on account of violent excitement, viz., two men once each, and a woman on two occasions.

The arrangements for exercise and recreation continue as previously reported.

The personal condition and demeanour of the patients of both sexes at the time of our visit was, upon the whole, satisfactory. They were generally tranquil and orderly, and none made any complaints on the score of treatment.

The several corridors, day rooms, and dormitories were clean and in the best order. We notice, however, many beds without under blankets, and in a large number of instances the upper blankets were thin and worn, and insufficient for the present inclement weather.

Notwithstanding the removal of the Borough patients and the continued occupation of the detached wooden buildings, some of the dormitories still contain too many beds.

The removal to a separate establishment of the Independent and Charity patients has been resolved upon; but no determination has as yet been come to as respects the details or the future connection between the two Institutions.

The Rev. Mr. Alloway has recently succeeded to the appointment of Chaplain, to the duties of which he will exclusively devote himself. Two services are given on Sundays, and prayers read daily.

A Head Attendant and Housekeeper has been substituted for a Matron.

The General Committee of Justices and Subscribers consists of 24 members; about one half, indifferently selected, constitute the House Committee, who visit the Asylum, inspect the wards, and see the patients regularly once a month; and there are also Farm and Building Sub-Committees.

In addition to the Head Attendant in each division, there are 11 male and 15 female Ward Attendants. There are also on each side two Attendants who take day and night duty alternate weeks.

The present weekly charge for Pauper patients is 9s.

The condition of the Institution, and the arrangements generally, continue most satisfactory and creditable to Mr. Buck, as Superintendent, who is now aided by Dr. Compson, who has succeeded Dr. Finch as Assistant Medical Officer.
