# THE REPORT

#### OF THE

# UNITED COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF

The Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asylum, TO THE

NINETEENTH GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING,

HELD IN THE BOARD ROOM OF THE ASYLUM,

On Monday the 28th day of January, 1856.

THE United Committee of Visitors, for the management of the Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asylum, present their Annual Report to the several constituencies by which they have been elected.

The Report for the year 1854, alluded to the additions made to the Building by the erection of New Wash-houses and Laundry, and to the beneficial effects which such additions might be expected to produce; the Visitors are happy to say, that this anticipation has been fully realized, the Buildings have been completed, and the expense has not exceeded the estimate; the cost, amounting in all to £2,000 has been borne by the Counties of Leicester and Rutland, and the Funds of the Charity in their accustomed proportions, Leicestershire  $\frac{7}{10}$ , Rutland  $\frac{1}{10}$ , and the Charity  $\frac{2}{10}$ .

The Buildings formerly occupied as Wash-house and Laundry, have been devoted by the Visitors to other purposes, such as Work-rooms for the Male and Female Patients, Storekeeper's Office and Residence; these alterations which have received the sanction of the Commissioners in Lunacy, are at present only partially carried out; a further Grant has, however, been made for that purpose by the County of Leicester, and it is fully expected that the County of Rutland, and the Subscribers to the Charity will readily contribute their respective proportions.

These further alterations, although not of an extensive character, are essential to the well-being of the Institution; indeed, the Visitors are compelled to avail themselves of every means of accommodating the Patients, the increase of whom, especially in the County of Leicester, has presented a marked feature in the occurrences of the past year. The increase in the County Patients has been greater, both in number and proportion, than that of the Borough, an unusual occurrence, and one which will require attention, when the Report of the Clerk of the Peace, as to the Insane Paupers, within the County and Borough of Leicester, is laid before the next Easter Sessions.

The greatest number of Patients in any one day was 299, the number in the House on the 31st December, 1855, was 295, being an addition of 24 to the number since the commencement of the year, a large proportion of whom are incurable.

During the past year 105 Patients were admitted, the number under treatment during the year has been 376; of these 56 have been discharged, cured or relieved; and 25 have died, being 8.86 per cent., a rate of mortality far below the usual average, as will be seen by reference to Table No. 2, annexed to this Report.

It will be satisfactory to the friends and supporters of the Institution, to learn that the Ministrations of the Chaplain have produced benefits to those Patients who have been able to profit by them, corresponding to his anxious endeavours in the performance of his duty; the average number of Male Patients who have attended Divine Service in the past year has been 53, of Female Patients 58.

The Visitors referred in the Report of last year to the high price of provisions, and the consequent necessity of raising the Weekly Rate of Maintenance, from 7s. 3d. to 8s. They are gratified in having ascertained that the latter rate is very low in comparison with the rates of other Asylums, and the Visitors have the pleasure of stating that it has proved to be amply sufficient for the maintenance of the household, as will be seen by reference to the Balance Sheet of the Household Account, annexed to this Report.

The annexed Tables will also give full particulars as to the Receipt and Expenditure of the past year in every department, the work done in the Asylum by the Patients, the consumption of provisions, and contract prices.

The value of the Asylum, as a Charitable Institution, is now too well known to need any further comment.

The Asylum has been inspected during the past year by two of Her Majesty's Commissioners in Lunacy, whose Report on the state and condition of the Asylum is printed herewith.

The Visitors feel that their Report would not do justice to the merits of the Officers of the Establishment, were they to omit congratulating the County upon the efficiency with which the Visiting Physician, the Medical Superintendent, the Chaplain, and the Matron, severally contribute to the "very creditable condition" of the Institution, to which the Commissioners in Lunacy bear witness, and they have every reason to hope, that under Providence, by the continued support and approbation of the public, it will maintain the excellence to which it has attained.

# REPORT

# OF

# THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,

### AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,

June 1st, 1855.

THERE are 279 Patients in this Asylum, of whom 19 males and 29 females are Private Patients, and 107 males and 124 females are Paupers. Eleven of these are registered as being under Medical treatment, and 4 females as having been secluded during the last week.

Since the last visit of the Commissioners on the 22nd September last, 59 Patients have been admitted, 32 have been discharged, and 17 have died; 5 dying from exhaustion and decay, 3 from epilepsy, 3 from diseases of the lungs and chest, and the rest from various other causes.

About 56 males and 84 females (altogether 140 Patients) are employed in various ways, and about 122 attend the prayers, which are read regularly by the Chaplain. 'The Prayers, however, are read in one of the female wards, there being no Chapel.

We are glad to observe that the New Wash-house and Laundry are completed, and the dormitories over them occupied by female Patients. Several very convenient Cupboards have also been formed.

We have to-day seen all the Patients, who were generally tranquil during our visit, and have inspected their wards, which are clean and free from any offensive smells.

We noticed, however, a great want of ordinary domestic furniture and ornamental articles, which, if supplied, would, we think, add greatly to the comfort and cheerfulness of the Establishment.

We beg to suggest to the Visitors, that they should, in the first instance, furnish one ward on each side of the Asylum with small tables (including work-tables for the females), chairs, easy settles, prints, and flowering plants, and other articles for the use and amusement of the Patients.

We are glad to learn that some of the Patients take exercise beyond the limits of the Asylum, and we recommend that this mode of benefiting the patients be extended as far as practicable.

The Male attendants are dressed in a very neat uniform, which, as well as all the Clothing, we understand, is made in the House.

The cleanliness and general good order of the Establishment are referable evidently to the careful superintendence of the Resident Medical Officer, and (on the female side) to that of the Matron. The condition of the Institution is altogether very creditable.
