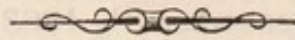

It will be seen that the average number of Patients of all classes is somewhat less than that of last year, or indeed of any year since 1860.

This decrease is occasioned by various causes, and mainly by the gradual removal of the Borough Patients, the number of such during the last year being 63 as against 87 in the year 1861.

This class of Patients will soon disappear altogether, as during the past year the negotiations which have been so long pending as to the dissolution of the arrangement between the Counties and the Borough for the reception of Borough Patients, have been completed, and a Bill has been prepared, for the approaching session of parliament, by which such dissolution will be effected.

The principal clauses in the intended Act, as relating to the Asylum, may be shortly stated as providing that the dissolution shall take place on the 25th March, 1868, and that the Asylum shall pay to the Borough the sum of £4250. as the purchase money of the existing interests of the Borough in the land adjacent to the Asylum.

This arrangement has been the subject of much consideration on the part of the Visitors, and in its results will it is believed prove advantageous to the Asylum. The period of payment being postponed for three years, will, it is hoped, enable the Visitors to provide the money required without any difficulty.

In the meantime the financial condition of the Institution is in every respect satisfactory, and there is no prospect of any further buildings being required for the Patients for some years to come.

The farm continues to supply healthy and profitable employment, as will be seen by reference to the tables and accounts annexed to this Report.

The Capital Stock of the Charity has not been increased during the past year, and it is a matter of regret that the loss by death of several valued friends to that portion of the Institution supported by voluntary contributions, is seriously impairing that great blessing to the County which

is derived by this foundation. Leicestershire stands second to no other county in its support of charity, and the Visitors thoroughly believe that it is only from not fully understanding the advantage of that connected with the Lunatic Asylum, that its funds are on the decrease, the amount of Subscription to them in 1864 was £148. 15s., against £173. 8s. in 1863. The public can scarcely be aware of the extent of benefit to the indigent Insane this Charity confers; *the law provides only for ACTUAL PAUPERS*: but the numerous class of the population who are poor, and many of them of the poorest, whose families have struggled not to be upon the parish, would in cases of insanity be totally without assistance, if the Institution did not open its doors to afford it to them. As this branch of the establishment can only exist by voluntary aid, the Visitors trust these remarks will not be deemed intrusive, in thus appealing to the friends of our charities to assist them in relieving the poor insane, who have no other means of providing against this greatest of all human afflictions.

The accounts of the Chaplain, Visiting Physician, and Medical Superintendent will be laid before the Meeting, they will be seen to be satisfactory, and will be confirmed in their main features by the Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy at their last annual visit, a copy of which is appended.

The several recommendations appearing in such last mentioned Report have been duly considered, and some of them are in process of being carried into effect. In conclusion, the Visitors would express their general satisfaction as to the state and condition of the Asylum, and indeed they cannot do better than express their opinion of its general management in the words of the Commissioners themselves as appears in their Report. "We have satisfaction in recording our opinion, that the Asylum in all its departments, is under creditable management, and that the Patients are treated with great kindness and good judgment.

REPORT
 OF
THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY
ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,
AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,
July 19th, 1864.

THE following tabular statement shews the changes in the Patients since the 27th July, 1863, the date of the last visit of the Commissioners, and their present numbers:—

Of the pauper patients about 60 belong to the Borough of Leicester, for which an Asylum is about shortly to be erected.

The Asylum may now be considered quite full, indeed, some of the dormitories contain an excessive number of beds.

The sanitary condition of the Asylum appears now to be good. The numbers last registered as under medical treatment were 5 in the male and 8 in the female division. During the spring Erysipelas prevailed in the town, and 18 cases occurred in the Asylum of which one proved fatal. The patients attacked were most of them in female ward No. 3, on the upper floor.

According to the medical journal the patients at any time placed in seclusion since the last visit, have been only 7 on the male side and 6 on the female.

Mechanical restraint has not been employed, excepting once for surgical reasons, for upwards of ten years.

The system of night attendance, as we were informed, continues to work very satisfactorily. There are two night attendants in each division, who are respectively on special duty during alternate weeks.

We have nothing new to report in reference to religious worship, occupations, and amusements. Walks have been recently formed over the greater portion of the estate, and the patients of both sexes frequently and regularly walk in parties in the surrounding country.

We have satisfaction in recording our opinions that the Asylum in all its departments is under creditable management, and that the patients, whom we found quiet and orderly, are treated with great kindness and good judgment. We did not hear from any one a single complaint on the score of their treatment or otherwise.

The personal condition of the patients of both sexes was very satisfactory, and the attendants appeared to be attentive and efficient. The female wards especially presented a cheerful comfortable aspect, all the day rooms being papered. Two of the male day rooms are in an equally satisfactory state, and we trust that in that respect the male division will be assimilated to the female.

We desire to draw attention to the expediency of proceeding without unnecessary delay, to the substitution of boarded floors for flags in the remaining corridors and

rooms on the ground floor, more especially in the older or north western part of the building. All in the female division should be thus improved.

We trust that in connection with this improvement the existing circular windows will be replaced by windows of an ordinary construction.

The laundry department with steam power and Manlove and Alliott's apparatus is now very complete.

Much remains to be done in planting and properly keeping the airing grounds, in which also sunshades or summer-houses are much required.

We recommend that arrangements be made for changing the water in the baths for every patient.

We desire to repeat the suggestion offered by previous Visiting Commissioners, that the Medical Superintendent should have an efficient assistant. In an Asylum of this magnitude the duties of Superintendent, including those connected with medical records, are, in our opinion, too onerous for one person.

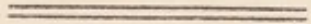
