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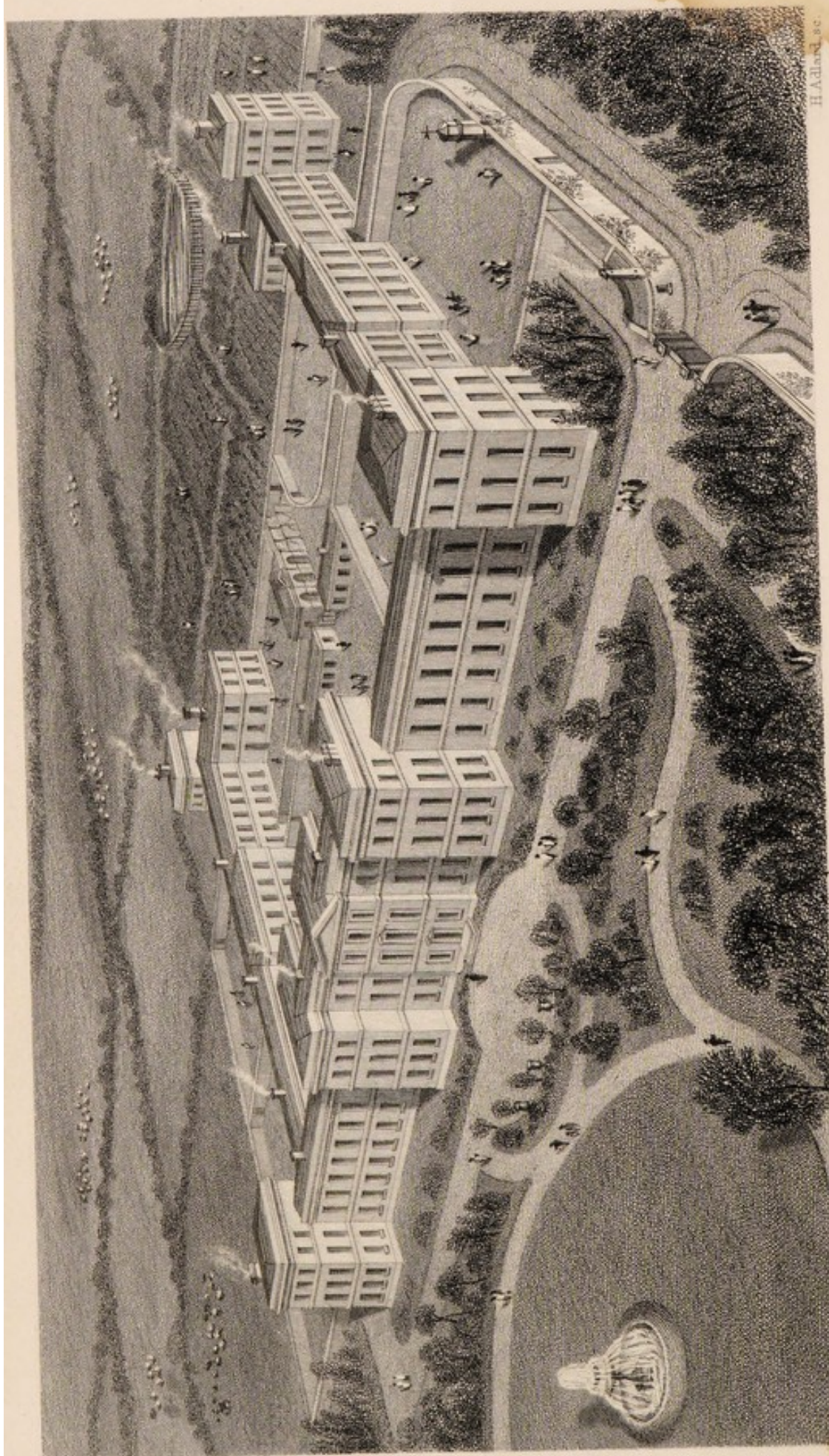

TO THE

TWENTIETH GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING,

HELD IN THE COUNTY PUBLIC OFFICE,

*On Saturday the 31st day of January, 1857.*

THE United Committee of Visitors present their Annual Report as to the present state and condition of the Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asylum.

The average number of Patients during the years 1854, 1855, and 1856, have been as follows:

It will thus be seen that a gradual but certain increase is taking place in the numbers of those necessary to be detained under medical treatment in Lunatic Asylums.

To provide for this increasing number has been the care of the Visitors, and sundry alterations and additions have been made from time to time in the main building. In the



Report of last year, reference was made to the intended conversion of the old Wash-house and Laundry into Work-rooms for the Male and Female Patients, and Storekeeper's Office and Residence,—these alterations have been completed during the past year, with great benefit to the internal management and economy of the Institution; the cost of these alterations was £650., which has been defrayed as follows:—£455. or  $\frac{7}{10}$  thereof has been paid by the County of Leicester, and £65. or  $\frac{1}{10}$  by the County of Rutland; and the Visitors now ask a grant of the remaining  $\frac{2}{10}$  or £130. from the funds of the Charity, according to the arrangement that has been established for the division of the building expenses in the above proportions.

The greatest number of Patients in any one day was 310, the number in the House on the 31st December 1856, was 304, being an increase of 9 on the number present on the 31st December, 1855.

During the past year 107 Patients were admitted; the number under treatment during the year was 402, of these 53 have been discharged cured, viz. 23 males and 30 females, and 11 have been discharged relieved, viz. 7 males and 4 females, making a total of 64 who have left the Asylum.

The number of deaths during the year has been 29, and the rate of mortality on the average number of Patients has been 9.60 per cent. as will be seen by reference to Table No. 2,—a rate of mortality which, though slightly above that of last year, is still below the average rate, during the existence of the Asylum.

The average cost of the Patients this year has been 8s. 10d. per week as against 9s. 5d. last year, and the income of the Asylum during the past year has considerably exceeded the expenditure, and the Visitors had, at the commencement of the year, a sum of £1527. 13s. 3d. as a balance in favor of the Household Account, as will be seen on reference thereto.

This state of things will enable the Visitors to reduce the balance standing in the Bank to the credit of the Subscribers' Account, and which has, for some years past, formed the working capital of the Asylum, and by which in fact the



Visitors have been enabled to carry on the Institution without overdrawing their Banker's Account. It was an arrangement that the Subscription Account should have a floating balance of not less than £500. to its credit, and for which certain advantages were secured in the appropriation of beds to the Charity Patients, but during the past year the average Cash Balance belonging to the Subscription Account, and of which the Asylum has had the benefit, has considerably exceeded the sum of £1,600.

The diminution in the cost of maintenance will now enable the Visitors to resume that arrangement which was described in the Annual Report for the year 1852, and then partially carried out, viz. the appropriation of the income derived from the Second Class Patients to the purposes of the Building. This arrangement was at that time submitted to and received the sanction of the Secretary of State, and the equity and fairness thereof are self evident. The profits of the Second Class (and in this is included the amount received from the Borough for lodging money) are at present carried entirely to the Maintenance Account, and contribute nothing towards the Building or to the Repairs and Furniture, the support of which falls entirely on the Counties of Leicester and Rutland and on the Subscription Fund, to the exclusion of the Borough of Leicester, while the rate of maintenance paid by the Parishes which send Pauper Lunatics is equal to that paid by the Borough Patients.

It has been long obvious that this arrangement pressed severely on the Counties of Leicester and Rutland, but, as considerable advantages to the Asylum in general have accrued by the admission of the Borough Pauper Lunatics, the Visitors were unwilling to increase the rate of maintenance, which must have been the case had an appropriation of the income to any other than the Maintenance Account been made during the late high price of provisions.

Now, however, that the income of the Asylum is again in excess of the expenditure, the Visitors proposed to take the subject into consideration, and although it is not intended to alter the Account for the past year, it will be for the Visitors during the current year to make such appropriations



towards the Building Fund and towards the Repairs and Furniture, from the income received from the Treasurer of the Borough of Leicester, as may appear to be just and expedient.

The usual Annual Tables are annexed to this Report, giving ample information on the several points connected with the working of the Asylum, and its general state, medical, statistical, and financial: the result is in every way satisfactory, and the Visitors have also appended to this their Report, a copy of the remarks made by the Commissioners in Lunacy on their visit to the Asylum during the past year.

The Capital Fund of the Charity has been augmented during the past year by the following Legacies, which are, with the Subscriptions and Donations, gratefully acknowledged.

During the past year the want of a proper place for the performance of Divine Service within the Asylum has been greatly felt, the gallery hitherto appropriated for that purpose being quite insufficient for the increased number of Patients. During the summer, however, the use of one of the Chapels of the Leicester Cemetery was kindly granted by the Town Council of Leicester, and the relief thus afforded during the hot weather was considerable. The distance, however, short as it was, reduced the usual number of the congregation from 141 to 118, thus rendering it apparent that a Chapel connected with the main building of the Asylum must be regarded as essential to its well being, and which, with the proposed new application of a portion of its income, the Visitors hope will not be long wanting.

In conclusion, the Visitors beg to repeat their congratulations of last year as to the general state and condition of the Asylum, and the efficiency of the several officers employed therein.

REPORT  
OF  
THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY  
ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,  
AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,  
MAY 27TH, 1856.

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SINCE the Commissioners' last visit in June there have been 120 admissions, 63 discharges, and 29 deaths. The Asylum at present contains 303 Patients, of whom 23 males and 32 females are Private, and 119 males and 129 females are Pauper Patients. We have this day personally examined the whole of them, and have inspected all the Wards. The Patients were generally quiet and comfortable, and clean in their persons and dress. A very large proportion of them were taking exercise in the Airing Courts, and several of the men were working on the land.

We found no patient under instrumental restraint, which as a rule indeed is never employed: it was however found necessary a short time ago to fasten the hands of a female patient, who had been operated upon for cataract, to prevent her from picking off the dressing.

Seclusion is not used among the men, but some of the females appear to be secluded from time to time. Last week



two of the female patients are reported to have been secluded, and we found three of them in seclusion to-day.

On an average from 40 to 50 males, and from 80 to 90 females, are regularly employed in various ways.

Prayers are read as usual in the Wards, no proper Chapel being yet provided.

The various Wards and Offices were clean and in excellent order. On the female side considerable additions have been made to the furniture, as suggested by the Commissioners at their last visit, and we understand that these improvements are intended to be gradually introduced on the male side.

The alterations and additions recently commenced are now nearly completed.

The Male Airing Court is much improved.

The New Laundry is found to answer its purpose very well, and 22 female patients are permanently lodged and employed therein.

On the whole we have reason to be well satisfied with the condition of the Institution, which is in a very creditable state.
