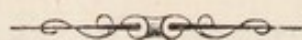

TO THE

TWENTY-NINTH GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING,

HELD AT THE JUDGES' LODGINGS,

*On Wednesday, the 31st day of January, 1866.*

THE Report commences as usual with the statement of the average annual number of all classes of Patients in the Asylum for the last ten years, and the consideration of this table will give rise to serious considerations. The table is as follows:—

It will be seen that the total number of Patients of all classes for the past year has been 397, a number greater than at any former year since the Asylum was built, and an increase of 31 per cent. on the number of Patients in 1856, but the result of this increase (large as it is) will not be fully apparent, until the average increase of each class of Patients is examined and understood.

The County of Leicester Patients are, in 1865, 252, as against 151 in 1856, being an increase of 40 per cent., and this it must be recollected in a population which has very little, if at all, increased in number during that period. Large as this increase is, however, it is greatly surpassed by the Patients of the County of Rutland, whose number in 1865 is 38, as against 22 in 1856, or an increase of no less than 63 per cent.

The out county Patients have, as a Class, ceased to exist, and the Borough Patients have, by removal from the Asylum, been reduced from 69 in 1856, to 58 in 1865, and in the course of two years will probably be taken away altogether.

It is in fact this gradual removal of the Borough Patients which enables the Visitors to make room for the Patients from Leicestershire and Rutland; but if these continue to increase in the same ratio as in the last ten years, considerable difficulty will be found in providing the required accommodation for them.

It must not be supposed, however, that this increase in the number of Patients sent to the Asylum necessarily exhibits a similar increase in the number of persons of unsound mind; it may rather be attributed to the alteration of the law by which the maintenance of the insane poor is cast upon the common fund of the Union rather than upon the parishes to which such insane poor belong; and the burden of such maintenance being thus lightened, the Parish Officers have now no motive for keeping a disagreeable resident in a parish, or a troublesome inmate in a Workhouse, when he can be easily got rid of by being sent to an Asylum. No one can suppose that the insane persons in the County of Rutland have increased from 27 to 38 (being an increase of 29 per cent.) in one year, and yet this is the difference in number of the Rutland Patients in the Asylum between the years 1864 and 1865.

The intended Act of Parliament referred to in the last



Annual Report for the dissolution of the Union between the Counties of Leicester and Rutland and the Borough of Leicester, has now become law, and such dissolution is to take effect from the 25th March, 1868, the Counties paying the Borough of Leicester the sum of £4250. for the interest of the latter in the land adjoining the Asylum. This sum the Visitors will be enabled to pay out of the funds of the Asylum, without the necessity of raising any loan or applying for aid to the County rate. This is the best proof that the Visitors can offer of the satisfactory state of the finances of the Institution, while the removal of the Borough Patients will avoid the necessity for any further enlargement of the Asylum for some time to come.

The capital stock of the Charity remains the same as at the close of 1864, and the Visitors have again to lament the decease of several subscribers to the Charity during the past year. Amongst these they would especially refer to the death of Thomas Clayton Turner, Esq., of the Bank of England, under whose care the funds of the Asylum were placed, and whose services were always willingly and zealously rendered in any way which could promote the interests of the Asylum. The Visitors have also to announce that Dr. Shaw has resigned the office of Visiting Physician to the Asylum, an office which he has held with such great advantage to the Patients from the commencement of the Institution; but the Visitors are happy to believe that the cause which has led to Dr. Shaw's retirement as Visiting Physician, will not operate to deprive the Institution of his valuable services altogether. On the contrary, being now one of the magistrates of the County of Leicester, they may hope eventually to see him forming one of the Board of Visitors, and as such continuing and increasing those services which he has rendered to the Asylum from its very commencement.

The Accounts of the Chaplain, Visiting Physician, Medical Superintendent, and Matron, will be laid before the meeting, and these with the Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, at their last visit, will show that the Asylum still maintains its high position amongst similar institutions in the kingdom.

OF  
THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY  
ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,  
AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,  
*August 16th, 1865.*

---

WE yesterday inspected the Asylum in all its departments, and saw the Patients, who were without exception quiet and orderly in demeanour, and personally as to dress and otherwise, in a state most creditable to the Institution, and the Officers and Attendants, who are evidently kind and attentive, and well qualified for the discharge of their responsible duties.

The changes in the Patients since the 19th July, 1864 (the date of the last visit of the Commissioners), and their present numbers, are shown by the following tabular statement:—

The satisfactory sanitary condition of the Asylum appears by the fact that the Patients registered as under medical treatment are only 11 in number, viz.: 4 in the male division and 7 in the female.

There has not since the last visit been any instance of seclusion.

The latest returns relative to chapel attendance show the following results:—

The employments and numbers employed continue as previously reported.

The cultivation of the land and the utilization of the sewage are carried out with marked success.

In reference to the recommendations and suggestions submitted in the last report, and the recent improvements generally, we have satisfaction in stating as follows:—

1. Boarded floors have been substituted for stone or slate in the day rooms, associated dormitories, and single rooms referred to in No. 1 ward of each division.

2. The unsightly circular windows in wards 1 and 4 on each side have been removed, and windows of the ordinary size and character inserted, one of the good effects of which has been materially to improve the single rooms (14 in number) in each division which the circular windows disfigured. These rooms are now cheerful, comfortable apartments, papered and well furnished.

3. Of the eight wards of the Asylum, seven, as respects the corridors and day rooms, are papered, the eighth, on the male side, is for the present well coloured, and has a pleasing aspect.

4. The question of sun-shades, or summer-houses, or some equivalent arrangement, is under consideration.

5. Two out of three padded rooms in No. 3 male ward have been converted into ordinary single rooms.

We have to report most favourably as heretofore of the cleanliness and excellent order of the several wards, rooms, and beds. The interior of the Asylum throughout, including the wards occupied by Patients of the worst class, presents an aspect of cheerfulness and domestic comfort which cannot but have the best moral effect upon the inmates.



In reply to our inquiries upon the subject of accommodation, we ascertained that whilst several of the dormitories are overcrowded, there are at present only three vacant beds, two in the male and one in the female division.

In reference to this question, we were informed that of the present Patients 48 are of the private class, viz.: 2 males and 6 females independently maintained, and 20 of each on the charity fund, and that 60 pauper Patients, viz.: 27 of the male and 33 of the female sex, belong to the Borough of Leicester.

Of the pauper Patients last referred to, the Visitors are under an obligation to retain as many as 40 until the 25th March, 1868, before which time it is expected that the proposed Borough Asylum will be ready for their reception.

The only other subject to which we desire on this occasion to advert, is the urgent want of an Assistant Medical Officer. In repeating the recommendation of the appointment of such an officer so essential in an Asylum of this magnitude and importance, we have not, as supposed by the Committee, overlooked the fact of there being a salaried Visiting Physician. We are strongly of opinion that the assistance of such an officer, however active and judicious, is in no degree an equivalent for the constant presence and services always directly available of a resident Assistant Medical Officer.

It only remains to say that we have been much gratified by our visit, and the abundant evidence offered of the best and most kind and judicious management on the part of Mr. Buck and the Officers acting under his directions.
