THE UNITED COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF

The Leicestershire and Kutland Lunatic Asylum,

TO THE

TWENTY-FIRST GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING

HELD IN THE COUNTY PUBLIC OFFICE, On Saturday the 30th day of January, 1858.

THE following Report of the state of the Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asylum is presented by the Committee of Visitors; and it will be seen that the several matters therein referred to require more than usual attention.

In the first place, the Visitors would call special attenntion to the gradual but certain increase in the number of Insane Patients; and to the necessity that has arisen of magain enlarging the Asylum.

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The average number of Patients for the last four years has been as follows :----

It will be thus seen that the average increase of Patients is about 20 yearly, and there is too much reason to fear that this progressive rate of increase will not be diminished.

The Building is constructed for the reception of 262 Patients,—the number within its walls on the day of this meeting is 327; the beds available for fresh Patients are becoming very few in number; and it is feared will hardly suffice for the wants of the Institution during the current year.

It is impossible to make these observations without deep regret; for the Visitors had hoped that by attending promptly to the first symptoms of disease, its progress might be arrested; and the Visitors in their Annual Reports have been urgent in calling the attention of the Medical and Parochial Officers to the importance of dealing with Insanity in its first development, rather than in a later, and possibly an incurable stage of the disease.

But although these recommendations have been so well attended to, that of the Insane Paupers in the County more than one half are placed in the Asylum; and the result has been important in securing a recovery in many cases where the disease has received immediate medical treatment; the cases where it appears to be chronic and incurable seem to be gradually increasing; and it is to be observed, that these are not confined to the County and Borough of Leicester; the returns appended to the last Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, and ordered by Parliament to be printed, shew that the number of Insane Paupers has increased from 21,158 in the year 1852, to 27,693 in the year 1857, the proportion being in the first year 1 in 847, and in the last year 1 in 701; and the Visitors regret to observe that the proportion of the County of Leicester, inclusive of the Borough, is still higher, being 1 in 511.*

The Committee feel that they should weaken the effect of this statement by any comment thereon; it is a matter which is worthy of the most serious attention of all interested in the welfare of the country; and it will be for the Visitors to consider in what manner these evils can be most efficiently met.

Another subject to which the attention of the Visitors has been called in the Quarterly Meetings, is to the proposed extension of the LEICESTER CEMETERY. This extension, unless prevented, will take place in the year 1860; it will occupy all the ground on the south-west side of the Asylum, between its boundary and the Welford Turnpike Road; and it is to be feared will occasion the most serious consequences to the health of the Patients; indeed it is evident that if the vicinity of a Cemetery be prejudicial to the health of a community, where the average number of deaths is little more

than 2 per cent. per annum, it must be still more so to a community where, as in the Leicester Asylum, the Annual deaths average more than 11 per cent. of the number detained there. The testimony of the Medical Officers of the Asylum is confirmatory of the fears entertained by the Visitors, and it is confidently hoped and believed that the Authorities of the Borough will hesitate before they adopt measures which cannot afterwards be recalled, and which may have the result of inflicting permanent, and it may be fatal injury, on an Institution in which both County and Borough are alike so deeply interested.

In the Annual Report of last year reference was made to the want of a proper place for the performance of Divine Service within the walls of the Asylum, and during the past year the attention of the Visitors has been directed to the removal of this evil; more than one plan has been prepared, and brought under the consideration of the Visitors, and the Commissioners in Lunacy; as yet, however, none has been adopted, although the Visitors are fully impressed with the urgent necessity of the case; it will form a prominent feature in the consideration of any future addition to the buildings.

The greatest number of Patients within the house on any one day was 327,—being the number in the house on this day.

The rate of mortality during the past year will be seen in the annexed table, the proportion is rather above 11 per cent.; a higher rate than has obtained for several years past, it is known, however, that a higher rate of mortality, both in the Town of Leicester and in the Kingdom in general, has been the rule during the past year.

The average cost of the Patients in the Asylum during the past year has been 8s. 11d. a week as against 8s. 10d. last year; and the Income from the Patients being now sufficient to cover all the expenses of their maintenance; the Visitors have been enabled to carry out the arrangement referred to in the last Report as under their consideration, with reference to the money received from the Borough of Leicester, by way of Lodging money; the resolution adopted by the Visitors is, to carry so much of this amount to the credit of the Repairs and Furniture Account, as is in proportion to the number which Borough Patients bear to the whole number in the Asylum. Of the balance, to carry onefifth to the Charity Account, the remainder, if any, to the credit of the Building Account. This arrangement is so obviously just to all parties, that it has only been delayed by the late high price of food, and the unwillingness of the Visitors to increase the present weekly rate of maintenance.

The usual tables have been prepared, and are appended to this Report; they will give complete and ample information of the general working of the Institution, both with reference to medical statistics, the employment of the Patients and the general economy of the Asylum. The Visitors are satisfied with its present condition, and the Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy on their last annual visit, will shew the opinion they also entertain on the same subject.

The Capital Fund of the Charity has been increased by the receipt of the balance of a Legacy, left many years ago by the late Mr. Heycock; the payment has been delayed by a variety of causes, over which the Executors had no control, and the Visitors gratefully acknowledge its receipt, the amount is $\pounds 33$. Is. 10d.

During the past year the Visitors, acting under the powers given to them by the Statute 16 and 17 Victoria, c. 97, section 33, have agreed to rent an additional quantity of land, for the purpose of employing the Inmates; and this quantity, amounting in all to about 27 acres, is now being cultivated by the spade, by such of the Patients as are fit for the work; it will be for the Visitors to give an account of the results in a future Report; but they have reason to hope that without any great pecuniary loss being sustained, the advantage to the health of the Patients, and thus the promotion of their recovery, will be very great.

The Committee have pleasure in observing from the Report presented to them by the Chaplain, that his ministrations have been productive of increased beneficial effect on those who have been able to receive them,—the want of more suitable accommodation for the Services is strongly confirmed by his urgent appeals for its early removal.

In conclusion, the Visitors would express their hope that the united Counties, the Borough, and other well wishers of the Institution, will have reason for congratulation in the belief that there is no Institution of the kind which is under more careful management; or, in its general results, more successful than the LEICESTERSHIRE AND RUTLAND LUNATIC ASYLUM.

REPORT

OF

THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,

AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,

MARCH 13TH, 1857.

THERE are now 309 Patients in this Asylum, of whom 24 males and 29 females are private, and 123 males and 133 females are Pauper Patients. We have personally examined the whole of them. Three of the women were in seclusion, but no instance of mechanical restraint has occurred on either side of the house since our last visit, except in the case of a private female patient, who was admitted with her throat cut, and whom it was found necessary to fasten by means of a strait waistcoat.

It appears by the Medical Visitation Book that a considerable amount of seclusion has been employed in the female side, especially in the case of one of the ladies. From inquiries we have made, we are inclined to attribute much of the necessity for this seclusion to the fact that the female Patients have fewer opportunities of taking exercise in the open air than the men; and it would no doubt be found advantageous if a walk were made round the outward boundary of the property, in order to afford the means for more extended exercise of those Patients who cannot be taken beyond the precincts of the Institution.

The general condition of the Asylum is healthy, several Patients, however, were in bed; and we learn that erysipelas has prevailed lately to some extent, and has proved fatal in one case. The attention of the Superintendent has been directed to the subject, and we are informed that it is intended to carry away the whole of the sewage to the deep drains of the Town; and remove the fourteen cesspools which are now distributed in various parts of the building. We recommend that the proposed improvements should be made, with as little delay as possible.*

Twenty-three deaths have occurred since the last visit in May, 1856. The causes of death have been various, and present no points for special remark. Within the same period there have been 121 admissions and 54 discharges.

The Patients were all clean and well dressed. A number of the men (55 on the average) are employed in various ways, and all the clothes and shoes are made on the premises. The whole of the matting is also made by the Patients. Of the men, from 18 to 20 are employed on the land; and we have no doubt that this number might be increased with advantage to the Patients, were more land attached to the Institution. We beg most strongly to direct the attention of the Visitors to this subject, in the hope that it may be found practicable to purchase or rent some additional ground.

The Patients are evidently under very careful and judicious management; and receive every attention from the Medical Superintendent; considering, however, the large number of Patients who are placed under his charge, it appears to us desirable that an Assistant Medical Officer should be appointed.

The Chapel has not yet been provided, but we hope that ere long some plan will be prepared for the erection of this most important portion of the Establishment.
