The Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asglum,

TWENTY-SECOND GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING

HELD AT THE LUNATIC ASYLUM,

On Monday, the 31st day of January, 1859.

THE Committee of Visitors present their Annual Report of the state and condition of the Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asylum, to the several constituent bodies by whom they are elected, and the matters therein referred to will be found to require serious attention.

The Visitors would commence their Report by setting forth the average number of Patients during the past year and the four preceding years, by which it will be seen that the total number has increased from 257 in 1854, to 329 in 1859.

The inadequacy of the Building to provide for the increasing claimants for admission was referred to in the Report for the year 1857, and the Visitors have been compelled during the last year to enlarge the Asylum, by adding a third story to the centres of the wings, which it is calculated will afford accommodation for 40 additional Patients on each side of the House, or 80 in all.

The increase of the Patients within the Asylum rendered it also absolutely necessary to provide some other place for the performance of Divine Worship than the Gallery which had hitherto been appropriated for that purpose; and the Visitors, in considering the Plans for the enlargement of the main Building, had also to consider how this want could best be supplied; after much discussion and correspondence with the Commissioners in Lunacy a Plan was agreed to, by which a spacious and commodious Chapel has been provided, easily accessible to all parts of the House. At the same time, a Recreation Room or Hall, for the assembly of the Patients at times when the weather or other causes prevent out-door exercise, has been provided; a want hitherto severely felt; and it is believed that the benefit of these additions to the Asylum will be found to be very great, while the cost has been moderate.

During the progress of these works the Visitors were very reluctantly compelled to discontinue receiving Patients from the Borough of Leicester, a step which became inevi-

table in consequence of a part of the building being rendered for a time uninhabitable; owing to this circumstance the number of Borough Patients in the house became much diminished during the last two quarters of the year, and the Institution has had to sustain a corresponding loss in its receipts. The average cost of the Patients, however, during the year, has not exceeded that of the preceding year, namely, 8s. 11d. a week, and it is fully expected that with the increased number of Patients, a material diminution in the cost of maintenance will be found during the current year.

The rate of mortality has been lower than that of last year, as will be seen on reference to the Table number 2 appended to this Report.

The other Tables, also appended to this Report, will shew the general working of the Institution as it regards the Medical Statistics, the employment of the Patients, and other matters connected with its administration. A Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy is also added, by which it will be seen that the high character that the Asylum has borne for so many years is still maintained.

The additional quantity of land rented by the Visitors for the purpose of affording more general out-door employment has been productive of most beneficial effects to the Patients themselves, and it will be seen by reference to the Farm Account, that although the Superintendent has had many difficulties to contend with in the outset, the result has not been unprofitable in a pecuniary point of view to the Asylum.

The Visitors deeply regret that the question of the extension of the *Leicester Cemetery* on the south side of the Asylum, still remains unsettled; but as both parties interested have made efforts to arrive at some satisfactory conclusion, they are not without hope that a beneficial settlement of this vitally important question will not long be delayed. To shew the urgent necessity of such a settlement, the Visitors quote an extract from the report to them of the Medical Officers.

"As the question of the South Western extension of the Leicester Cemetery has occupied your attention during the past year, it only remains for us to reiterate our opinion that every practicable means should be used to avert what in our judgment would be a serious calamity."

From this Report they are sorry to see recorded the frightful increase of Chronic cases, 138 Patients having been in the Institution upwards of five years, and 86 upwards of two years; that these cases are on the increase is proved by the number of Patients in the Establishment being larger in 1858 than in 1857, while the admissions in the former year are ten less.

The Capital Fund of the Charity has been increased by a second donation of £10. from Miss Moore, for which the Visitors desire to express their best thanks, and in making this acknowledgment they are anxious to draw the attention of all well-wishers to it in explanation of the *permanent* benefit such acts of benevolence produce. The blessing of this class in the Institution to those indigent Patients in a position just above Pauperism is inestimable. The Charity steps in to relieve, where the Law does not provide for the Poor. By reference to the Subscription Account (Capital) it will be seen that every farthing which has ever been bequeathed, or presented, to the Charity, is now in the hands of the Treasurer, and the interest derived from it is an Annual and lasting memorial of gratitude to all who have granted aid to its Funds.

The Income during the past year has been more than sufficient to meet its expenditure, but the Funds of the Charity will be called upon to contribute one-fifth of the estimated outlay in the new buildings, and which is computed at eight hundred pounds, — the Charity, however, derives considerable advantage from this outlay in various ways; and it will be for the Visitors to determine whether any enlargement of its sphere of usefulness can be made by adding to the number of its Patients in consequence thereof.

During the past year the services of an Assistant Medical Officer (Mr. Bayley,) were temporarily engaged, in consequence of the state of the Buildings, and other events, occasioning greater anxiety than usual to the Medical Superintendent. The Commissioners (as will be seen by their Report,) consider it advisable that an Assistant Medical Officer should be permanently engaged, but as the Medical Superintendent does not at present wish for such assistance, the Visitors consider that that question may be postponed for a time. Mr. Bayley left the Asylum at the close of the year, and the value of his services was recognized in a resolution passed by the House Committee, and entered in the Records of the Asylum.

The Visitors conclude their Report by expressing their belief that the Asylum is in a satisfactory condition, both in a medical and financial point of view, and by bearing their testimony to the efficient services rendered by the Visiting Physician, Medical Superintendent, and other officers during the past year; expressing their hope, that the good which this Institution has, under Divine Providence, been the means of effecting may be increased, with the increased accommodation provided for the unhappy inmates, whose maladies are thereby sought to be relieved, and whose sufferings mitigated even if they cannot be wholly removed.

REPORT

THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY ON THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,

AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,

OCTOBER 27TH, 1858.

SINCE the visit of the Commissioners on the 13th March, 1857, 187 Patients have been admitted, 109 have been discharged, and 50 have died; the main deaths having arisen from paralysis, diseases of the chest and lungs, and from decay and old age.

There are now 321 Patients in the Asylum, of whom 24 males and 30 females, are private Patients, and 134 males and 133 females, are Paupers. Eighteen Patients appear to to be under medical treatment. Seclusion is very rare on the male side of the Asylum, but the cases of excitement on the female side are more frequent, the more especially in reference to one Female Patient. We are informed by the Assistant Medical Officer that it is impossible to avoid frequent seclusion in the case of this female. In reference to the points adverted to in the Commissioners' last entry, we find on enquiry,—1st. That there has been no recent epidemic in the Asylum. 2nd. That the sewerage has been carried into the deep drains of the Town, and is now in a good state. 3rd. That 31 acres of Land have been purchased,* and that these are under spade husbandry, the effect being of great benefit to the Patients. 4th. That a turf walk has been formed round the boundaries, and is intended to be shortly gravelled.

About 80 Males and 140 Females are employed in various ways, 40 Males being employed out of doors, and 29 Females being employed in the Washhouse and Laundry, and 54 in the Workrooms and in sewing and mending.

Prayers are read daily in the wards, and the Chaplain performs the Church Service on Sundays, when 165 patients on an average attend.

In addition to Mr. Buck the Medical Superintendent, we are glad to find that an Assistant Medical Officer has been engaged; we trust that he will be permanently retained in his office, the Medical duties of this large and now increasing Asylum being very onerous.

We have to-day seen the Patients, who, with the exception of two females, were tranquil at the time of our visit, and have inspected the wards, which are clean and well ventilated; some confusion necessarily prevails owing to the additions to the Building now going on.

There are no straw Beds in the Asylum; there are some horsehair Beds, but the majority consists of Flock. Washstands are in the course of being placed in the Bedrooms occupied by the more tranquil Patients.

The supply of hot water is insufficient and renders it necessary to bathe several Persons in the same water. We hope that this objectionable practice will be remedied by

erecting a new apparatus for supplying hot water in sufficient quantities.

The Asylum altogether is in a very satisfactory state, and reflects great credit on the Medical Superintendent and Matron.
