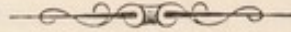

THE REPORT

OF

THE UNITED COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF

The Leicestershire and Rutland Lunatic Asylum,

TO THE

THIRTY-FIRST GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING,

HELD AT THE JUDGES' LODGINGS,

On Friday, the 31st day of January, 1868.

THE Report presented last year commenced with an expression of the Visitors' deep regret, that the state of Mr. Packe's health prevented his presence at the Annual Meeting; and a hope was therein expressed, that his services, so beneficial to the Asylum might long be continued. It was not, however, so to be; Mr. Packe died on the 27th of October last, and the Asylum thereby lost the services of a gentleman who had been President of the Institution from its commencement.

It is impossible to overrate the services of Mr. Packe in this capacity, difficult even rightly to appreciate them, for to do so would require a knowledge of the internal life of the Asylum which few can possess. Mr. Packe laboured with other Magistrates in establishing the Asylum as a County Institution at a time when its necessity was not understood;

and he had to contend against an able and pertinacious opposition, conducted by those who deemed the establishment of an Asylum to be an unnecessary burden on the ratepayers of the County. But how rightly they had judged who advocated the establishment of a County Lunatic Asylum in Leicestershire was soon made evident, and within a few years those measures for the relief of the Insane Poor, which the foresight and wisdom of Mr. Packe and his coadjutors had secured for their own County, were made compulsory over the whole kingdom, and the establishment of County Lunatic Asylums became the law of the land. But it was not only to the Insane Poor that the benefits of the Leicestershire Asylum were directed. From the foundation of the Institution, a portion of the building was set apart for persons who were not the recipients of parish relief, and while a few sets of apartments were provided for those whose means enabled them to command special attention, another portion of the building was devoted to a third class of more limited means, and the cost of whose maintenance in the Asylum was defrayed in part by grants from a charitable fund, which originated by Mr. Packe, was augmented from time to time by his personal exertions, as well as by legacies and donations from other friends. How carefully the late Chairman watched over this fund may be understood when it is stated that the capital stock of the Charity commencing in 1839 with the sum of £1515. 11s. 0d., as the net produce of a Bazaar, held in that year, now exceeds the sum of £6000.; a portion of this has been from time to time invested in the purchase of land adjoining the Asylum, while the interest arising from the remainder has gone in aid of the Annual Subscriptions to the Charity Fund. Mr. Packe's services were continued to the Asylum for upwards of three-and-thirty years, and during this period, the Asylum, which at its opening in 1837 was built for the reception of 104 patients, has increased four-fold, and will, it is probable, before the close of 1868 contain upwards of 500 patients.

This great increase of numbers renders the reorganization of its internal condition a matter of urgent necessity, and the Visitors observe with satisfaction that a notice has been given for the appointment of a Committee for the consideration of this important question.

But amongst the events of the last year it is not only the death of the Chairman of the Committee that the Visitors have to lament; four other Visitors during that period have

been taken from them ; of these, two were appointed by the County of Rutland, Lord Aveland and Colonel Lowther ; the distance of Leicester from his own residence, combined with his other and arduous duties prevented the frequent attendance of the first named Visitor, but Colonel Lowther has been an active Member of their Committees for very many years, and one of the last acts of his official life was to attend a Special General Meeting of the Visitors held in Leicester in November last.

The Asylum has also lost two Leicestershire Visitors, Mr. Stokes and Mr. Whetstone, both of them for many years active and valuable Members of the Committee, and to each of whom the Asylum was indeed most deeply indebted. Both Mr. Stokes and Mr. Whetstone had served upon the House Committee for many years, and each had taken under his special care important departments of the Institution. The management of the Farm and the Audit of the Accounts was for many years the care of Mr. Stokes, while Mr. Whetstone brought his extensive practical knowledge to bear on the Buildings and internal economy of the Institution ; how zealously he watched over the Asylum, how truly and earnestly he endeavoured to promote its interest, the whole Committee of Visitors will testify. His last labour in behalf of the Institution was attending in London before the Commissioners in Lunacy with reference to the Temporary Building, of which mention will presently be made, and in the success of which he was deeply interested.

The Rutland Magistrates have supplied the place of Lord Aveland and Colonel Lowther by the appointment of Mr. John H. Lee Wingfield and Mr. G. H. Finch. The Leicestershire Magistrates have appointed Captain Aikman and the Rev. G. E. Bruxner to be Visitors in the place of Mr. Packe and Mr. Stokes ; the place of Mr. Whetstone has to be filled up by the Subscribers at the present Meeting, and the Committee of Visitors have unanimously chosen Sir Arthur Grey Hazlerigg, Bart., to be Chairman and Treasurer of the Asylum in the place of the deceased President.

The Visitors now place before the Meeting the tabular statement of the average number of Patients within the Asylum for the past ten years, which is as follows :—

It will be seen that the number of the Leicester County Pauper Patients has risen from 173 in 1858, to 282 in 1867, an increase of 109 Patients, equal to an increase of about 64 per cent. during that period, or an average annual increase during the past ten years of about 6 per cent. If this rate of increase be continued, and there is no reason to expect otherwise, the Insane Paupers in the Asylum from the County of Leicester alone will in ten years time amount to 450 persons.

The increase in the Rutland Patients during the same period has been from 26 to 33, and the number of Rutland Patients in 10 years will probably be about 40. This state of things calls for serious attention, the Asylum as at present existing was designed for 342 Patients, and although the zeal and care of the Superintendent, his watchfulness over the interests of the Asylum, and his economy of space have enabled him to receive during the past year an average number exceeding 400, while at times the number in the house has been 411, it has only been accomplished with great anxiety on his part, and at great inconvenience to the household. The Visitors, it is true, looked for some relief in the anticipated removal of 40 Borough Patients in the coming March, but early in the autumn it was found that the Borough Asylum, now in the course of erection, could not possibly be ready at the time expected, and some extra provision for the temporary reception of Borough Patients became an absolute necessity; in this state of things the County arranged with the Borough authorities for the erection of a temporary wooden building, in the Asylum grounds, for the reception of Patients, until the Borough Asylum can

be finished, and this temporary building (now completed) will enable the Superintendent to receive from 60 to 80 additional Patients; but it is believed that this number will be presently supplied by the Borough alone, and it is feared that even with this additional temporary building the Asylum must continue to be inconveniently crowded.

It is for the Visitors of the Asylum and the supporters of the Charitable part of the Institution to consider in the exigency of the case what is to be done; and the Visitors would call the attention of the Annual Meeting to the subject as one of the most important for their consideration. As the Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy at their last visit is appended hereto, it will be seen that they still strongly urged upon the Visitors the importance of appointing an Assistant Medical Officer, and the Visitors feeling that the additional building would largely increase the number of Patients, and thereby the labours of the Superintendent, have appointed Mr. Montague Finch to be such Assistant Medical Officer, during such period as the temporary building remains.

The length of this Report precludes many remarks on the usual Statistical Tables which are appended hereto; the continued high price of provisions during the past year has compelled the Visitors to raise the weekly rate of maintenance for the Pauper Patients, and the rate is now fixed at 9s. per week for Pauper Patients of the Counties of Leicester and Rutland.

During the current year the arrangement between the Counties and the Borough of Leicester for the dissolution of the agreement now existing between them, will be completed, and the Borough will, at Lady Day, 1868, be entitled to receive from the Asylum the sum of £4,200. as the purchase money of twelve acres of land adjoining the Asylum, and which will then become the sole property of the Institution; towards this amount the funds of the Charity, by previous arrangement, will contribute one-fifth, or £840., the remainder being raised by the Counties of Leicester and Rutland in the proportion of seven-tenths and one-tenth. It is, however, with great satisfaction that the Visitors are now enabled to state, that no call whatever will be made for this purpose upon the Treasurer of either County, inasmuch as a special fund has been for some years accumulating, during the joint occupation of the Asylum by the Counties and Borough, arising from the lodging

money paid by the Borough to the County, and which lodging money now enables the Visitors to complete the purchase of the land in the vicinity of the Asylum, without calling upon the ratepayers of either County, or diminishing in any degree the current balance of the Household Account.

The Capital Stock of the Charity has been increased during the past year by a legacy of £50. from the late Mr. William Hardy of Leicester, for which the Visitors desire to express their thanks. The funds of the Asylum, both as to its public and private character, are in a satisfactory state, a considerable sum of money is available for the extension of the Asylum, if it be the will of the Visitors that such extension should take place.

The Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, which is appended hereto, will be read with interest, and in all that mentions with commendation the general working of the Asylum, or the conduct of the Officers of the Institution, the Visitors fully concur, arrangements are in progress with the Borough for a further addition to the territory of the Asylum, which it is believed will materially promote its interests; and to these, as well as the state of the Asylum generally, and to the absolute necessity of speedily providing for further accommodation, the attention of the general meeting and other friends of the Asylum is now specially called.

In conclusion, the Visitors, looking back at the period of thirty-one years which has elapsed since the Asylum was opened, desire to express their humble but earnest thanks to Almighty God, for the benefits which He has permitted to be thereby accomplished, and to express their hope that if it be determined to make permanent additions to the Asylum when the temporary building is removed, the enlarged capacity of the Institution may be the means of securing enlarged benefits to the community amongst whom it is placed, and for whose welfare it is designed.

THE STATE OF THE ASYLUM,
AT THEIR LAST ANNUAL VISIT,
APRIL 23rd, 1867.

UPON our visit this day we have inspected the Asylum in its several departments, seen all the Patients now resident, and made the statutory enquiries.

The following tabular statement shews the changes in the Patients since the visit of our Colleagues, 27th of November last, and their present numbers:—

Of the Pauper Patients, 39 belong to the Borough of Leicester. The vacant beds are only 4 in the Male division and 6 in the Female.

The Patients registered as under Medical Treatment are

19 in number—viz., 9 men and 10 women. We found 8 men and 4 women in bed.

The attendance in Chapel on the Sunday prior to our visit was 120 on the male side and 115 on the female, and at the previous Wednesday's Service 106 men and 81 women.

There has not since the last visit been any instance of seclusion; mechanical restraint is never used.

The Staff of Attendants is as follows:—

Male Division.—One head, ten ordinary, and two night attendants.

Female Division.—Thirteen ordinary and two night attendants, and three laundry maids.

The night attendants in the respective divisions are on night duty during alternate weeks, and when not so engaged are available as supernumeraries. The ordinary weekly rate for maintenance is at present 9s., and that for the Borough Patients 12s. 6d. The arrangements for exercise and amusements continue the same as previously reported. The Patients frequently enjoy visits to their friends, and several expressed themselves as very thankful for the indulgence. At the time of our visit the Patients of both sexes were free from excitement and orderly in demeanour, and their personal condition upon the whole was satisfactory. The beds are all of woollen flock on paliasses. There are no straw beds in the Asylum. The Dietary is upon a liberal scale. The dinner this day consisted of very good stew, bread and cheese, and beer. We have to report very favourably, as heretofore, of the cleauliness and proper order of the several corridors, day rooms, and dormitories. In some of the wards the numbers of Patients congregated together appeared to be excessive. In Male Ward No. 3 there were as many as 64 Patients. The new baths are of a good construction.

The older baths are of very inferior description, and should be replaced by some of a better kind. From 4 to 6 Patients at present bathe in the same water. We recommend that arrangements be made by distribution of the bathing over more days of the week; for allowing fresh water for every patient; also that regulations be hung up in the several bath rooms for the guidance of the attendants. The case books are most imperfectly entered up as respects the old Patients. As to many now in the Asylum there has been nothing recorded for many years in reference to their progress, nor do any entries appear of the discharge or deaths of many who left the Asylum or died years ago. For these omissions to comply with the requisition of the statute it would be unreasonable to attribute blame to Mr. Buck in his present overtaxed position. For this and other reasons urged in previous reports and communications from our Board, more especially for the strong opinion we entertain that the Asylum should never, even for the shortest period, be left without the presence of a Medical Officer, we trust that the Committee of Visitors will reconsider the question of the early appointment of an Assistant Medical Officer.
