THIRTIETH REPORT.

Extracts from Proceedings of Boards in 1853.

January 12th.—Resolved, that G. F. Heneage, Esq., M.P., be requested to accept the office of Vice-President of this Institution, vacant by the death of Sir W. E. Welby, Bart.

April 13th. Annual Board.—Resolved, that the Right Hon. the Earl of Winchilsea, and Sir Charles H. J. Anderson, Bart., be requested to accept the office of Vice-Presidents, vacant by the much lamented deaths of the Right Rev. John Kaye, D.D., late Lord Bishop of Lincoln, and Edward Parker Charlesworth, M.D., for thirty-three years the able and indefatigable Physician of this Institution.

April 13th.—Resolved, that the following alterations in the Rules, of which due notice has been given, be made.

Rule III. s. 1. For "Three Guineas," read "Two Guineas."

Rule IV. s. 3. To add at the end, "Three or more other Governors being present."

Rule IV. s. 6. For "five at least," read "three at least."

Rule IV. s. 7. Instead of the words, "of Governors consisting of three at least," read "two or more Governors being present."

This Board taking into consideration the lamented death of the late Edward Parker Charlesworth, M.D., Vice-President and Senior Physician of this Establishment:

Resolved, that the Rev. W. M. Pierce be requested, on behalf of the Governors of the Lincoln Lunatic Asylum, to express to Mrs. Charlesworth the deep sense entertained by them of the long and invaluable services, and the persevering and enlightened zeal of the late E. P. Charlesworth, M.D., to whom this Institution is so eminently indebted for its high standing and character throughout Europe, and even in the United States.

April 13th.—Resolved, that J. C. Torry, M.D., be appointed Physician of this House, and that this Board fully confides in his endeavours to maintain the principles upon which it has hitherto been conducted—

1st. The gratuitous services of the Physicians—this House being a charitable foundation, intended to afford to families of limited incomes, or reduced means, the best remedial accommodation at the lowest possible rate which the countenance of a benevolent public can enable the Board to offer.

2nd. The total disuse of instrumental restraint and violence in every shape.

3rd. The abstinence from the use of fermented drinks, as an article of diet, in any cases whatsoever, except such as shall peculiarly and specially demand their use, and not be likely to lead to any habitual or loose return to that practice in this Institution; and

4th. A liberal and confiding admission of the public eye, to inspect the House and the state of the Patients, under those restrictions which have been hitherto found amply sufficient to guard against abuse.

April 13th.—It having been intimated to this Board, from many quarters, that a strong public feeling exists for some opportunity of testifying respect to the public and private character of the late Edward Parker Charlesworth, M.D.,

Resolved unanimously, that it is the duty and will be most gratifying to this Board, to offer every facility for that object, by allowing a site for a Statue in the grounds, or a suitable situation for a Bust or Portrait in the House, or such other like means as may be found best adapted to the purpose; and that the Governors present at this Board be a Committee, to co-operate with the Subscribers, on behalf of this Institution, for carrying the same into effect.

October 12th.—Resolved, that Christopher Turnor, Esq., of Stoke Rochford, in this County, be requested to accept the office of a Vice-President of this Institution, vacant by the death of the late much lamented Earl Brownlow.

October 12th.—That the present front entrance be entirely and permanently stopped up from this date, and that the Weekly Board do take the necessary steps for accomplishing the same.

The Committee of Governors appointed by the Board in April, to co-operate with the Subscribers, for a Memorial to the late Dr. Charlesworth, reported to this Board,

"That at a Meeting held by them this day, Dr. Barton in the Chair, the following resolution was adopted, and which the Committee submit to this Board for approbation:"

"Certain resolutions of the Committee of Subscribers for a Memorial, to be erected in the Asylum Grounds, in honour of the late E. P. Charlesworth, M.D., having been laid before the meeting"—as follows—

"Resolved, that this Committee of Subscribers highly approves of the suggestion offered by the Rev. the Precentor, and Mr. Hartley, that the Statue proposed to be erected in honour of the late Dr. Charlesworth, should be fixed in some situation within

"the grounds of the Asylum, so that it may be seen by the public outside the Asylum, as well as by the inmates thereof."

"Resolved, that this Committee recommends to the Committee of Governors, that the Statue be erected at the South-east corner of the grounds, according to a plan produced by Mr. Hartley, where it may be seen by the public, as well as by the inmates of the Asylum, and where it will be at all times under the care of the family resident at the South Lodge, the present entrance there into the grounds being closed."

"Resolved unanimously, that the same are approved and confirmed by the said Committee of Governors; and that the Surveyor and Mr. Hartley be empowered to take preliminary measures for carrying the same into effect, the expense being borne by the Committee of Subscribers."

October 12th.—Resolved unanimously, that this Board highly approves of the resolution adopted by the Committee of Governors, in reference to the site for a Statue of the late E. P. Charlesworth, M.D., and confirms the same.

Resolved, that the following be the rate of payment for all Patients admitted into this House, from this date.

1st Rank, per week, One Pound Ten Shillings.

2nd Rank, " One Pound.

3rd Rank, ,, Twelve Shillings.

The increased rate of payment of the Patients already in the House, to commence from the 1st of January, 1854.



Any Governor may at all times inspect, extract, or copy any Bills, Accounts, Journals, Registers, Minute Books, or Documents whatsoever, provided that the names of the Patients shall not be copied; and all documents kept by order of the Rules or of any Board, shall be the property of the Institution.—Rule viii—12.

A Key to the Books of Accounts is left always in the house, so that they may be at all times accessible to the Governors.—Reg. viii—1.

EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS.

PROPERTY, WORKS, PURCHASES.

The "Daily Store-book," (a copy of which lies always on the Board-room table), shall be balanced, and stock taken, on Thursday morning at ten o'clock, so that the Weekly Visitor or other Governors may, if convenient be present.

The Matron shall make her principal issues of Stock for the day, at half-past nine in the morning.

The articles issued to the Cook or other person, shall be weighed in their presence, and entered at the time in their respective "Pass Books."

SUBSCRIPTIONS, GENERAL ACCOUNTS, BOOK-KEEPING, CORRESPONDENCE.

All letters received by the House Surgeon, Secretary, or Matron, on the business of the house or of the patients, since the sitting of the previous board, shall be laid before the succeeding board.

The House Surgeon's "Journal," "Daily Return of the State of the Patients,"
"Register of Control," "Register of persons daily maintained," and "Board-room
copy of the Matron's Store-book," shall be made up not later than ten o'clock in
the forenoon, for the day and night preceding.

A Key to the "Books of Accounts" shall be always left at the house, so that they may be at all times accessible to the Governors.

HOUSEHOLD.

No Attendant, Servant, Assistant, or Charwoman shall be allowed to pass through the Lodge-gate, without leaving a ticket on each occasion, bearing his or her name, subscribed by the House Surgeon.

No Attendant, Servant, or Porter of this Establishment shall introduce Spirituous Liquors; and notice hereof shall be fixed at the Lodges, and in the Attendants' apartments.

The House Surgeon shall not pay the wages of any attendant or servant going away, without a regular discharge from the Board.

That, on every occasion of drunkenness upon the premises, the House Surgeon do suspend the party until the following board.

The House Surgeon shall leave word with the Matron where he may be likely to be found, when absent from the House.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

The introduction into the House of the "Whirling Chair," the "Bath of Surprise," and the "Douche," is interdicted.

OFFICIAL VISITING.

A circular shall be sent to all Governors residing in or near Lincoln, to ascertain those who are willing to act as Visitors, and a roll submitted to the Board accordingly.

At each Quarterly Board, before the commencement of the ordinary business, the Governors present shall be requested to inspect the Building, and see every Patient.

OCCASIONAL VISITING.

Whenever any Patient may keep his bed in the day time, a ticket noting the circumstance shall be hung up over the door.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

A "Deposit of six weeks' payment," and a "Payment in advance up to the next Quarter day," are required with each Patient on admission. The Friends may advance for any additional Quarters if more convenient. The Quarter days fall on the first day of January, April, July, and October, respectively. On the removal or death of any Patient, the amount due to the Institution is deducted, and the surplus returned.

Of the Medical Certificates required for the admission of Patients into this Asylum, one, and where two are required, both if possible, shall be from Practitioners residing near to the place from whence the Patient is sent; and that notice to this effect be inserted in the County papers.

No Patients shall be received beyond the Lodges, until their admission papers have been inspected by the House Surgeon, and approved.

No Patients shall be admitted on any terms however liberal, where the friends show a disposition to impede the inspection necessary for the prevention of abuses.

CLEANLINESS, VENTILATION, TEMPERATURE.

No system of warming the house, by which the Patients shall breathe a heated atmosphere, shall be introduced.

Fires for the Patients shall not be given up, until such time as they are given up by the Officers; and shall be again commenced, when commenced by the Officers.

The feet of every Patient sleeping on straw, shall be examined night and morning, and shall always be covered with woollen socks in cold weather; and the feet of all Patients shall, when needful, be gently rubbed, or artificially warmed; and the bedstead or pillows shall be sufficiently raised at the head.

The windows in the Galleries, shall be lowered to their full extent during the Patients' dinner-time; it being understood that they are also lowered during the whole night, and in warm weather during the day.

Bed-ridden Patients shall be placed in rooms having fire-places.

CLOTHING, BEDDING.

The clothing provided for the third rank Patients shall be of woollen.

Three or more upper blankets, weighing not less than $9\frac{1}{2}$ pounds, and each measuring not less than 7 feet by 5, shall be provided for each bed; and cotton bed-quilts shall not be procured.

The beds shall be thrown open at rising, and not made up until after breakfast.

HOURS.

The House Surgeon and Matron shall on some one day at least in each week, rise at the hour appointed for the household, and personally observe that the routine directed under the Rules is strictly complied with.

DIET.

When Patients refuse to eat their meals at the regular time, the food of such Patient shall be removed and kept warm in the kitchen, to be returned when called for, and the fact reported to the House Surgeon by the Attendant.

No fermented liquors for the Patients of this Institution shall be allowed, except under special medical order.

The Board of Governors disapproves and disallows the use of fermented drink, as part of the ordinary diet of the Patients, or under the plea of supporting strength during any employment; leaving, as heretofore, the widest discretion to the medical officer, in the use of wine and porter, for cases seeming specially to require the use thereof; and the Board is fully determined to maintain the nutritious and substantial diet, substituted some years ago for the use of fermented drink.

All the sleeping rooms (except for patients irretentive of their urine) shall be supplied with water for drinking.

AIR, EXERCISE, EMPLOYMENT.

The House Surgeon, under control of the Physician, may occasionally allow the Patients to take their exercise beyond the bounds of the Asylum, accompanied by an Officer, or Attendant of the establishment.

The House Surgeon is empowered to permit to reside in the House, among the Female patients, not more than two Children of Patients or otherwise; such children being healthy, good tempered, and between four and nine years of age; and Patients so disposed shall be enabled to instruct them.

The House Surgeon shall specify in his Journal daily, the names of the Patients whom he may select to take walks into the country or town, giving preference to the country in fine weather; and similar entry shall be made of the names of the Patients selected to go to church on Sundays.

The Patients shall not be confined to Needlework, or other sedentary employment, when they can be employed in the open air.

ATTENDANCE, SECURITY.

The Attendants shall, as much as possible, be present with the Patients under their respective care.

No Patient who resists shall be removed from one place to another, without the aid of two attendants.

No Patient shall be forced to bathe, if he offers determined resistance, without an order of the Physician.

Strong Dresses of Barragon or Sacking shall be provided for Patients who would tear their clothes: and Blanket Cases, containing the full complement of Blankets, for Patients who would tear their Bedding.

List Shoes shall be provided for Patients, whom the House Surgeon has reason to suspect would do injury with their feet.

The Attendants shall be required to be good-tempered, sober, able-bodied persons: Females not under five feet five inches high, Males not under five feet nine inches.

The Attendants shall report to the House Surgeon, whenever any Patient is held by the hands as much as ten minutes; and the House Surgeon shall enter in the "Register of Control" each manual detention which he may direct to be further continued above the said ten minutes.

The person of every Patient shall be especially and carefully examined weekly by the House Surgeon and Matron respectively, while bathing, or otherwise while changing their linen; and marks (if any) found upon their persons, shall be reported in the "Daily Return of the State of the Patients" forthwith to the Board.

Copies of clause 56, 8 & 9 V., c. 100, be printed and appended to the Instructions of the Attendants and Nurses.

CONTROL.

No Officer or Servant shall keep in his possession on the premises, any instrument of Restraint.

All instruments of Restraint used by the friends of Patients for bringing them to the Asylum, shall be always returned at the same time.

Not fewer than two Attendants shall be sent in search of Patients who may have escaped.

The House Surgeon shall be empowered to engage, temporarily, any number of extra Attendants necessary for the care of any Patient persevering in acts of extraordinary violence.

Whenever it may become absolutely necessary to overpower a refractory Patient, two Attendants shall be employed for that purpose, to prevent as much as possible the risk of resistance and struggle.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCES.

The House Surgeon shall be empowered to have Evening Prayers for the Establishment, and such of the Patients as he may think proper, at such time and in such manner as not to interfere with the distinctive duties of the Lord's Day.

Testaments and Common Prayer Books shall be supplied in the Patients' Sitting-rooms, at the discretion of the Physician and House Surgeon.

The Servants of this Establishment shall be each supplied with the use of a Testament and Prayer Book.

VISITS AND COMMUNICATIONS OF FRIENDS.

The Rules affecting the admission of the Patients' friends, are appended to each Quarterly Account.

DISCHARGE, REMOVAL, DECEASE.

Each Patient discharged Recovered shall be questioned by a Deputation from the Board, not only with respect to the treatment of himself or herself, but also as to the treatment of the other Patients.

The Chairman of the first Weekly Board after the removal of any Patient, shall address a letter to the friends of the Patient, requesting, as a favor, the communication of any complaint against the House in regard to the treatment of such Patient, or in regard to the property, accounts, or any other matter whatsoever; and requesting a statement of their satisfaction, if satisfied.
