Fifteenth Annual Report

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS,

FOR THE YEAR 1867.

THE Committee of Visitors beg to report to the several Courts of Quarter Sessions that, notwithstanding the high price of several articles of consumption, the average weekly cost of the Patients has not exceeded 8s. $10\frac{1}{4}$ d., being only $1\frac{7}{8}$ d. above that of last year.

The number of Patients in the Asylum continues to increase, and at the present time is—

> Males..... 264 Females 298

The above increase will render it necessary to place twenty more Bedsteads in the women's side of the Asylum, and again to occupy one of the Galleries as a Dormitory. The Courts of Quarter Sessions having authorised the expenditure of £2000 for the purpose of carrying into effect the recommendation of the Committee to erect a new Chapel, and to convert the present chapel into a Recreation-hall, the Visitors have pleasure in reporting that they have entered into a contract with Messrs. Otter & Binns, of Lincoln, for the execution of the whole of the works according to plans and specifications approved by the Commissioners in Lunacy, at a cost not exceeding the estimated amount.

With the sum of £1000 granted by the Courts of Quarter Sessions, the Visitors will be able to effect the increased accommodation in the Laundry and Washhouse, the necessity for which has been apparent for some time.

The Committee refer with pleasure to the Reports of the Commissioners in Lunacy as attesting the very satisfactory condition of the Asylum, and the high estimation in which it is held by them, and beg to draw the particular attention of the Courts of Quarter Sessions to the clause relating to Dr. Palmer and his subordinate officers, in which the Committee heartily concur.

Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy.

Lincoln County Asylum, 14th Feb., 1868.

ON the occasion of our official visit this day, we have inspected all the Wards, and personally examined every Patient now resident. They are 546 in number, of whom 254 are men, and 292 are women. Besides these, there are on the books, the names of one man and two women, who were away on probation.

Since our Colleagues' visit on the 22nd of last August, 32 males and 36 females have been admitted, 13 males and 20 females have been discharged, and 12 men and 12 women have died.

Of the Patients who were discharged, 27 were recovered.

The deaths were all from ordinary causes, but an inquest was held in one case, the patient, who was epileptic, having been found dead in bed.

The utmost quiet and order prevailed in all the Wards, and no patient was secluded. There has been no instrumental restraint, and four men only have been secluded since the last visit, each on one occasion. Personally, the Patients were very clean and well clothed, and their bedding, which we examined, good and sufficient.

The present condition of the Patients is healthy, and only six women and one man were in bed.

All the arrangements for exercise and recreation are the same as before reported, and Divine Service is performed as usual. Weekly meetings of the Patients are held in one of

the Day-rooms, but the numbers are necessarily restricted, owing to the want of a proper Recreation-hall. We are glad to learn that this want will shortly be remedied, the Courts of Quarter Sessions having voted a sum of £1500 for the erection of a new detached Chapel, upon the completion of which the present Chapel will be fitted up and used for purposes of recreation.

With reference to the employment of the patients, we find that, on an average, 141 men, and 193 women, are occupied in various ways. Of the men, 62 work on the land, the whole of which is under spade cultivation. Very few appear to work as artizans, there being only three in the shoemaker's, and three in the tailor's shops. It seems worth consideration whether a larger number of the male patients might not be instructed in various trades, so as to dispense to some extent with paid artizans.

About 150 women are engaged in needlework, or assisting in the Wards, and 30 are regularly employed in the Laundry. This department is defective in arrangement, and totally inadequate in size for an Asylum capable of containing nearly 600 inmates; but we are sorry to learn that the question of enlargement, although considered urgent, has not been favourably entertained by all the Courts of Quarter Sessions. We trust, however, that this important matter will ere long be again brought before them.

Additions to the stock of furniture and decorations would, no doubt, still be desirable in some of the Galleries, but the general appearance of the Wards, and their perfect cleanliness and good ventilation, is most satisfactory. Workmen are engaged in re-papering some of the rooms.

We saw the patients at dinner, and examined the food, which was good and abundant. The attendants seem to be of a respectable class, and in number are in the proportion of about one to twelve Patients, a fact, which, as we believe, largely contributes to produce the very satisfactory state of things we have described above.

We have made the usual statutory enquiries, and signed and examined the various Registers.

The condition and management of this Asylum continues to reflect the utmost credit upon Dr. Palmer, and the other officers under him.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

THE Medical Superintendent has the honour to submit to the Committee of Visitors his fifteenth Annual Report, together with the usual Statistical Tables. shewing the state and progress of the institution for the year 1867.

There were in the Asylum in the beginning of the Tables I. and II. year 527 patients, consisting of 245 men and 282 women.

During the year, 70 men and 71 women were admitted, making the whole number under treatment 668, viz. :--315 men and 353 women.

Twenty-four men and 32 women were discharged, Discharges and Deaths. of whom 20 men and 30 women were recovered, and 4 men and 2 women not recovered; and 34 men and 28 women died; thus leaving in the Asylum at the end of the year 257 men and 293 women, in all 550 patients.

Of the patients who left the Asylum not recovered, the men were removed, mostly in an improved

condition, by their relatives, who signed the Statutory undertaking that they should be no longer chargeable to any Union, and should be properly taken care of; one of the women died suddenly while at home on a month's probation; and the other woman, an outcounty patient, was discharged to the care of the authorities of the Union in which her place of settlement was adjudged to be.

AverageResident Numbers.

Highest Resident Numbers.

The largest number of men resident at any one time was 256; of women 297.

Recoveries.

The recoveries were 35.5 per cent. of the number of cases admitted. On the men's side 28.6 per cent., and on the women's side 42.2 per cent.

Mean Mortality.

The mean annual mortality amongst the men was 13.9 per cent.; amongst the women 9.8 per cent.; in all, 11.7 per cent.

Admission of Chronic and

The number admitted exceeded that of the pre-Incurable cases, ceding year by seven, and included an unusual proportion of the chronic and incurable class. Twenty-two were imbecile from advanced age or long continued brain-disease, two were idiots, eight congenital imbeciles, and seventeen were cases of old standing insanity. In none of these could there be the least probability of recovery. Thirteen were paralyzed, and some, exhausted in body as well as mind, were brought to the Asylum to die. The reception and care of these pitiable cases, which from want of proper appliances, do not seem to do well in workhouses, of course, renders the Asylum all the more valuable; but it at the same time depresses the proportion of recoveries and enhances the deathrate. They should, indeed, be deducted from the admissions in order to show properly the results of curative treatment and the sanitary condition of the institution.

Five "Criminal Lunatics" were admitted—one from the prison at Spilsby and four from that at Louth. Three of the cases from Louth, whose offences were vagrancy in two instances and wilful damage to property in the third, were found on admission to be clearly suffering from chronic forms of insanity, and were, no doubt, irresponsible at the time of committing the offences for which they were imprisoned.

A short Act of Parliament passed last Session (30 Vict., cap. 12), entitled, "An Act to amend the Law relating to Criminal Lunatics," had the effect of reducing the number of that class in the Asylum from twelve to four, in consequence of eight of them becoming ordinary pauper lunatics under the provisions of its Sixth Section, which enacts that, "where the Term of Punishment awarded to any Criminal Lunatic confined in any Asylum" "expires before such Evidence of his Sanity has been given as justifies his being discharged," "he shall henceforth be deemed a Pauper Lunatic, and shall be in the same Position in all respects as if he were a Lunatic who immediately previous to the Expiration of his Term of Punishment had been found wandering at large within the Parish or Place where the Offence was committed in respect of which he became a

Criminal Lunatics.

Criminal Lunatics' Act, 1867. Criminal Lunatic, and had been directed by a Justice, in pursuance of the Sixty-eighth Section of the Lunatic Asylums Act, 1853, to be received into the said Asylum as a Lunatic wandering at large, and a Proper Person to be taken charge of and detained under Care and Treatment." The remaining four having been "Found Insane," are still detained under the Warrant of the Secretary of State.

The Asylum was free from epidemic disease, and the bodily health of the patients generally was very good throughout the year.

Inquests.

Inquests were held during the year in the cases of four male epileptic patients, who were found dead in their beds by the night-attendant. In three of these death resulted from asphyxia produced by their rolling over on their faces during epileptic paroxysms, and verdicts were returned by the Juries to that effect. In the fourth case there appeared to have been an epileptic fit immediately before death, but no asphyxia, the breathing-passages being free and the features pallid. Syncope, arising from a feeble heart overcome by the disturbance of the circulation during a fit, was the probable cause of death. The verdict of the Jury was "Death from natural causes."

Causes of Death. Table XVI. The remaining causes of death were all of an ordinary character. The following is summarized from the Obituary Table :—

A partially demented male patient burnt his hand severely by endeavouring to thrust himself through a very open fireguard. The attempt was thought at the time to be suicidal, but his general mental condition, and the fact that he could have reached the fire much more readily than by forcing himself through the guard, left it open to doubt. A female patient sustained a fracture of one of the bones of the forearm by falling on the edge of a slate rinsingtank in the wash-house. The fracture was simple, and union took place in the usual time without any unfavourable symptom. A male patient escaped through the window of his bed-room by breaking the sash with a part of his bedstead, and in doing so lacerated one of his legs. He got as far as a neighbouring farm-house, where he was kindly detained until the attendants arrived to take charge

Casualties.

of him. His wounds healed readily. As a similar means of escape had once before been successfully employed, bedsteads of stronger construction are being made for rooms appropriated to such patients. No other casualty of any import occurred.

Excess of Female Patients.

The number of patients on the women's side was twelve in excess of that for which cubic sleepingspace was calculated. Extra bedsteads had to be placed in some of the associated bed-rooms, and it will shortly be further necessary to occupy one of the Galleries as a dormitory, as was done on a former similar occasion. On the men's side the room continues to be ample.

New Buildings.

The erection of a new Chapel and the conversion of the present chapel into a Recreation-hall, together with the extension of the Laundry and Wash-house —all of which have been sanctioned by the Courts of Quarter Sessions—will effectually relieve the institution from difficulties which it will be very agreeable to be enabled to contemplate as things of the past. The works, it is expected, will be completed before Christmas.

Papering.

All the new wards were papered and a considerable amount of repapering was done in the old wards, where, after six years' wear, it was found that this mode of covering the walls is at least as economical as white-washing, which during that period would have needed repeating a great many times.

Employment and Recreation. There is nothing new to report either in the principles or details of the management of the institution, the results of which are fully set forth in the tables and abstract of accounts which are appended. The arrangements for outdoor exercise and walks beyond the Asylum-grounds, the amusements and pastimes, singing-practice, and industrial employment of the patients were steadily maintained, and contributed largely, as they always have done, to the promotion of quietude and comfort amongst them. In carrying out these details the Superintendent continued to receive valuable aid from Dr. Douglas; and, indeed, his acknowledgments are due to the whole staff for the willingness and efficiency of their co-operation with him. He has also much pleasure in acknowledging his obligations to the chaplain for the recreation he afforded to the patients by his periodical readings, and for the judicious and genial tone of his intercourse with them.

The Superintendent again tenders his earnest thanks to the Committee of Visitors for the support and confidence with which they have favoured him, and has the honour to subscribe himself,
