REPORT

OF THE

GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1865.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee have to report that the Benefactions during the past year amounted to £393. 10s. 0d., against £333. 3s. 9d. in 1864, and that the Annual Subscriptions have been the same in both years.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, paying one guinea per week towards their maintenance, was £387. 9s. 0d. for Curable cases, against £393. 15s. 0d. in 1864, and £1,161. 12s. 0d. for chronic cases, against £1,117. 4s. 0d. in 1864.

The amount received from the friends of Patients deemed incurable was $\pounds 1,586.18s.$, against $\pounds 1,817.4s.$ in 1864.

The Legacies of £900. 0s. 0d. from the late H. Sikes, Esq.

£2,000. 0s. 0d. ,, ,, R. Thornton, Esq. £379.10s. 0d. ,, ,, W. Cole, Esq.

have been paid and invested.

On the other hand, more than £2,000. Stock has been sold; to provide for the expenditure of the last two years, viz. :--on 10th March, 1865, £1,034. 9s. 8d. Reduced 3 per Ct. Annuities. and on 1st February, 1866, £1,183. 9s. 10d. Consols.

The Expenditure in 1865 has been £9,174. 13s. 6d., against £9,361. 6s. 1d. in 1864

Your Committee record with most sincere regret the death of their late Colleague, Mr. Richard Martineau, whose great abilities and sound judgment they highly appreciated.

Four other Governors have died since the last Meeting of the Court, and eight new Governors have been nominated.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 3rd October last, and reported as follows :---

- "We found the Patients generally quiet and orderly, and no one in seclusion."
- "The Bedding throughout was in excellent order, and all the rooms well ventilated and quite clean, and we were pleased to observe how much had been done to render the Wards more cheerful and comfortable."



REPORT

OF THE

PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1865.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

MY LORDS, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN,

In presenting to you our Report, for the past year, on the state of the Hospital and condition of the Patients, we have again much pleasure in informing you that both are satisfactory.

On the First of January there were in the Hospital 146 Patients of both sexes, and during the year 114 Patients have been admitted, 103 discharged and 15 have died, a number above the usual average, the explanation of this being that a large proportion were admitted in a feeble and shattered state of bodily health.

Among the Male Patients was one who after residing in the Hospital some few weeks, had manifested no symptoms of insanity, was discharged accordingly.

The most frequent cause of death among the curable Patients was exhaustion, and among the Boarders old age, one Patient having been in the Hospital thirty-three years.

An Inquest was held in the case of a Male Patient who died in a fit during the night; the facts were as follows :—The nightwatch left the Patient alive at five o'clock in the morning and found him dead at six o'clock; as there was no one present at the moment of death, the Coroner deemed it necessary to hold an Inquest, to comply with the Act of Parliament, when the Jury returned a verdict of death from Apoplexy. In October last the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Visitation, and again recorded in the Visitors' Book their entire satisfaction as regards the state of the Hospital and condition of the Patients; we may here mention that we have received from their Board several Circulars, which have been laid before the Committee, and which have received from us that attention which we considered they required.

We continue to avail ourselves of a recent Act of Parliament, to send out on trial Patients who we believe would be benefitted by a change of scene and association, and whom we consider convalescent, but whom (owing to some peculiar circumstances in their individual cases), we could not with prudence recommend for immediate discharge; and we take this opportunity of reporting favourably on the final result.

One Female Patient who had been in the Hospital, as a Boarder for some time, was taken by her friends to the sea-side, on trial, but having relapsed, she was brought back to the Hospital and shortly afterwards symptoms of Variola were developed, she was placed apart from the other Patients, was soon restored to sound bodily health and in a few weeks after was discharged as recovered in her mind, and has continued well. No other case of this disease has occurred since.

The orderly and devotional appearance of the Patients at Chapel, and the regularity with which some attend, lead us to hope that the ministrations of the Chaplain are not without good effect. The daily average number of Patients attending Chapel is 92.

All the Patients in the Hospital, their bodily health admitting, are encouraged to occupy and amuse themselves in the way most agreeable to their own feelings, several of the men occupying themselves in the various workshops, and a good many of the women in the laundry and at needlework. The men amuse themselves with billiards, skittles, and bowls, and the women with bagatelle and music; all have free access to the library of standard and useful books, and any can review the current literature by means of the Subscription to the Circulating Library of Messrs. W. H. Smith and Son.


The principal event in the amusements of the year was the Annual Ball and Christmas Tree, which took place in January. The Tree this year was unusually large, being nearly 14 feet in height, and on its twigs and branches were hung a great many handsome, useful, and appropriate articles, the work of the inmates of the Establishment. This Ball is always anticipated with feelings of pleasure and remembered with those of delight, and the thanks of all present are due to the Steward and Matron, for their unwearied exertion and hospitality on the occasion.

From among those Patients who are in pretty good bodily health, we select all who are harmless and send them for walks into the Parks, and sometimes to the Zoological Gardens or Crystal Palace, whilst others who are aged and feeble we can now send in a carriage for a drive into the Country, and we venture to express the hope that we shall always be able to continue this very beneficial practice.

The Attendants and Servants have discharged their several duties to our entire satisfaction, and we lastly desire to express our acknowledgments to the Committee for their great consideration to ourselves.
