REPORT
OF THE
GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS
OF
ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,
FOR THE YEAR, 1859.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

IN presenting their Annual Report for the year 1859, your Committee have the pleasure to inform the Court of Governors, that the Expenditure during the past year was much less than that of the preceding year, being £4,758. 0s. 2d., against £5,805. 9s. 1d., in 1858; whilst the Income arising from Benefactions was a trifle more, being £893. 16s. 3d., against £838. 8s., in 1858.

In order to increase their Income, your Committee, at the suggestion of their Secretary, have memorialised the Courts of several of the City Companies, and your Committee are happy to report a liberal response to their appeal has been made by the Worshipful Company of Grocers, in a donation of £100.; as well as by the Worshipful Company of Cloth-Workers, in a donation of £21.; and your Committee have every reason to expect that other public bodies will follow an example so well worthy of imitation.

Your Committee also hope that they may obtain liberal Contributions from other quarters, now that the public are becoming acquainted with the true position of this valuable Institution.

Your Committee take this opportunity of acknowledging the kindness and consideration of the Executors of the late BARONESS DE STERNBERG, in paying to the Treasurer £375. (on account of a Legacy of £500.) at once, rather than delay the payment of the full amount until all her property may be realised.

Your Committee have to express their regret, that notwithstanding their endeavors to make known by Advertisement, and otherwise, the

advantages offered to the public by the Resolution of the Annual General Court of 1858, which sanctioned the admission of Curable Patients at 21s. per week, the number of that class of Patients has diminished during the past year. The number of the ordinary applications for the admission of Patients has also been less; these circumstances have induced your Committee to recommend to this Court the adoption of the following Resolution, viz :

“ That the applications for the reception of Curable Cases having long continued to decrease, it be recommended to the next General Court to empower the Committee to extend the benefits of the Hospital to Patients who have been afflicted more than 12 calendar months, or who have been discharged from other Establishments, under such restrictions and regulations as may be deemed advisable by the Committee.”

It is with feelings of the greatest regret that your Committee have to announce the termination of their connection with two of their oldest Officers. Dr. A. J. SUTHERLAND, who for nineteen years has held the office of Physician with so much advantage to the Patients and to the general interests of the Hospital, now retires, from ill health.

Dr. A. R. SUTHERLAND also resigns his office of Honorary Consulting Physician.

Taking into consideration the present reduced number of Patients in the Hospital, and other circumstances, Your Committee recommend as an experiment that the office of Physician now vacant, should not at present be filled up.

They further recommend that Dr. A. J. SUTHERLAND should be appointed Honorary Consulting Physician, vacant by the resignation of Dr. A. R. SUTHERLAND.

Your Committee announce with regret the following resignations :—

Members of the Committee of Governors; and the retirement of A. F. HOFFMAN, Esq. from the Committee of Audit.

With respect to supplies for the past year, Your Committee contracted from 1st April last to 31st March next, for the best Wheaten Bread at 5½d. for a 4 lb. loaf, and for Flour at 8s. per bushel.

Your Committee also contracted for the usual kinds of Butcher's Meat, from 1st April to 30th September last, at 4s. 7d. per stone of

8 lbs.; and further, from the 1st October last to 31st March next, for the same, at 4s. 6d. per stone of 8 lbs.

As regards the patients admitted to the benefits of this Charity, Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital since the 31st December, 1858, and up to the 31st December, 1859, 116 patients deemed curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 83; uncured 34; as unfit 8; at the request of their friends 10; and there have died 4. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1859 inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital 19,579 patients, **DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION**; of whom there have been discharged,

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st of December, 1859, there have been re-admitted 770 patients **DEEMED**

INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged *uncured, exclusive* of those patients, (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1858, and up to the 31st December, 1859—two patients, *deemed incurable on re-admission*, have been discharged at the request of friends; 8, upon trial; 3, friends not complying with Rules; and 1 has been re-admitted.

Of the said 770 patients (re-admitted as Boarders) *exclusive* of the Whitbread patients,—

109 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

41 have been discharged cured.

14 upon trial.

19 uncured.

9 by order of the Committee, being Paupers.

32 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

5 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects for the Charity.

464 have died, and

77 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last, *exclusive* of Mr. Whitbread's patient.

Total 770

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year has been as follows, viz.: 51 males and 90 females, total 141.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1859, was 121, namely, 44 Patients deemed curable, and 77 boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that the Right Honourable Lord OVERSTONE be requested to continue the honour to this Charity by being its President.

That the Right Honorable the Earl of ABINGDON, the Right Honorable Lord AVELAND; the Right Honorable Viscount EVERSLEY; Sir EDMUND ANTROBUS, Baronet; JAMES BENTLEY, Esq.; and WILLIAM HENRY WHITBREAD, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That HENRY FRANCIS SHAW LEFEVRE, Esq. be re-elected Treasurer.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, Your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected, pursuant to the regulations.

All of which is nevertheless submitted.

REPORT
OF THE
PHYSICIAN AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,
FOR THE YEAR 1859.

*To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors
of St. Luke's Hospital.*

MY LORDS, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN,

WE have the pleasure of again laying before you our Report for the past year.

On the first of January, 1859, there were in the Hospital 150 Patients—57 Males and 93 Females; and during the year 30 Males and 87 Female Patients have been admitted—a total of 117. Of the number whose treatment has been completed during the year, we find that 68.59 per cent. have been restored to their homes cured; that 28.09 per cent. have baffled all our endeavors to do more than ameliorate their condition; and that 3.30 per cent. have died. This result of the year's labor must be considered very satisfactory, the percentage of cures being in excess of the average of the last five years, and that of the deaths below that of any year since the foundation of the Hospital, the total number of deaths having been but four.

The Governors will not fail to notice again the gradual falling off in the numbers admitted—117 as against 146 in the preceding year. This gradual declension cannot be matter for surprise when considered in connection with the fact that at the period of the foundation of St. Luke's Hospital there was in England accommodation for less than 500 Patients of the class with which we deal, whereas now the county Asylums alone contain upwards of 15,000.

The resolution so promptly come to by the Governors of receiving Patients of a somewhat higher class has been taken advantage of, and we have received 36 such Patients into the Hospital; and the Governors

will doubtless be interested to learn that of the Patients of this class whose treatment has been completed, 80 per cent. have been discharged cured, and but one has died. We feel sure that this statement will be an encouragement to you still further to relax the rules disqualifying Patients from admission to your noble Charity. We have reason to believe that your Committee have it in contemplation to recommend some such measure to your consideration. This will, if sanctioned by you, have the effect of bringing under your hospitable roof very many sufferers from a class but very badly provided with suitable accommodation and treatment for its insane members.

Fully to realise the benefits just alluded to, however, we cannot help repeating a suggestion made when we had last the honor of addressing you on a similar occasion, namely, that some means be taken of bringing these extensions of your benevolent designs to the knowledge of those for whose benefit they are intended. The public generally and the medical profession, even those engaged in the treatment of the Insane specially, are so entirely unaware of the nature and objects of St. Luke's Hospital, that some notification of these in a proper quarter would seem to be absolutely essential for the insurance of success to the new scheme.

Probably, in these days of general advertising, the columns of the public journals are hardly the best vehicles for the conveyance of the information we wish to give to the classes for whom we intend it. It has occurred to us that as the members of the medical profession become most early aware of cases of Insanity occurring in the class to which we allude, that it would be an excellent plan to send circulars to them, stating shortly the objects of the Charity. We can hardly express the surprise we have felt at the want of knowledge on this subject that seems to prevail. We can state without fear of cavil, that very few medical men are aware that Patients of the middle classes who are in indigent circumstances are received into St. Luke's Hospital without payment of any kind, that a still smaller number are aware of your recent resolutions to receive at a small weekly payment, patients whose friends wish to place them in a public Institution, and yet are desirous that they should not be considered as recipients of charity. There is the greater necessity for this distribution of information, inasmuch as enquiries as to the admission of paying Patients have been very numerous, and they have, of course, been replied to in consonance with the rules existing when those enquiries have been made.

We still have to lament the non-possession of the piece of waste land contiguous to the Male Airing Court, and also that the condition of the Hospital funds forbids your undertaking the improvement of the front of the building and the alteration of the Male Wing Wards. We hope that the public will second the great efforts you are making to place the Hospital finances in a healthier condition, and to extend the usefulness of one of the noblest Charities in the world.

We have much pleasure in acknowledging with thanks the thoughtfulness of your Committee in the fitting up of some additional Lavatories in the Female Wing Wards. Nothing can be of greater importance in a public Institution for the Insane than the means of personal cleanliness.

The greatest harmony has prevailed throughout the Hospital during the year, and the Attendants continue to deserve the high praise we, in common with every visitor to the Institution, have been so ready to accord to them. In connection with this subject, we cannot help suggesting that old and faithful service among the Attendants should be specially noticed in some way by the Governors—they really deserve it. An Attendant is now hired at the usual rate of wages—the wages are raised according to a fixed rule, up to a certain fixed sum,—no great advance on the original hiring. This goal is generally arrived at in about two years; after this there is no prospect of increase, although it may be fair to state that this is the very period at which the Attendant's services become valuable. Perhaps you will kindly consider whether or not a small sum could not be annually set apart for the purpose of rewarding instances of conspicuously good service; or whether you would feel justified in allowing the present maximum of wages to be somewhat increased.

The subject of Attendants, their qualifications and remuneration, occupied the attention of the recent Parliamentary Committee; and it is a subject on which the Commissioners in Lunacy have made frequent suggestions. Lord Shaftesbury, in his evidence before Mr. Walpole's Committee deplores the general character and absence of all proper qualification so constantly met with in Attendants on the Insane. This is a subject of very great moment to the community at large. Lord Shaftesbury says, in answer to question 383, " * * * * * in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred you will find that the happiness or the unhappiness, the comfort or the discomfort, the cure or the perpetuation

of the malady, depends upon the character and conduct of the Attendants."

The remedy alluded to by the noble Chairman of the Lunacy Commission (viz.: an increase of pay) strikes us as hardly sufficient of itself to improve this important class of Society. What is wanted very much more is a proper Institution for the education of Attendants. Undoubtedly Attendants are made good or bad by the education or training they have received, and by the examples that have been set them by those who like themselves have lived with the Insane. In this position they learn to be kind or brutal, forbearing or captious, brotherly and sisterly, or masterly and domineering.

Before concluding, we must express our sorrow, we are sure in common with yourselves, on account of the lengthened absence of our colleague, Dr. Sutherland, the senior Physician to your Hospital, and the more so that this absence is caused by severe illness, which has confined him to his room for many weeks, and materially restricted his sphere of usefulness for several months—we hope that his speedy convalescence and return are at hand.

Pray accept our warmest thanks for the past kindnesses we have received at your hands, and believe in our anxious sympathy in your efforts for extending the usefulness of your Charity, and thereby so materially contributing to the welfare of the middle class Insane.
