REPORT

OF THE

GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1866.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

In presenting their Annual Report, your Committee have to express their regret, that they cannot announce any improvement in the financial position of the Hospital, the Sale of a further sum of £2,000. Stock being required to pay the Christmas Bills.

The Benefactions during the past year amounted to £343. 5s. against £393. 10s. in 1865, and the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £45. 15s.

The amount received from the friends of Patients paying One Guinea per week towards their maintenance, was £237. 6s. for Curable cases, against £387. 9s. in 1865, and £1,317. 15s. for Chronic cases, against £1,161. 12s. in 1865.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, deemed incurable, was £1,376. 4s., against £1,586. 18s. in 1865.

The Legacies of

£100. from the late THOMAS HENRY WHITE, Esq.,

£100. from the late Miss Ann White have been paid.

The Expenditure has been £9,981. Is. 8d., against £9,174. 13s. 6d. in 1865.

The Master of the Rolls having decided against the admission of this Hospital to participate in the Bequest under the will of the late Lord Henry Seymour, your Committee have authorized their Solicitors to take such proceedings as may be necessary to enable them to take advantage of any new construction which may, on appeal, be put on the language of the said Will.

In common with other Charitable Institutions, this Hospital

has been assessed to the Poor Rate, at a rental of £2,000.

Your Committee having authorized their Solicitors to appeal against this assessment, they have taken the opinion of Mr. Charles Lee, the eminent Surveyor, who advises that the amount is very much in excess of the proper rateable value of the Hospital; your Committee have, therefore, given instructions to appeal against the assessment.

Your Committee record with sincere regret the loss, by death, of two of their Colleagues, Thomas Pickard Warren, Esq., who, for 20 years, had most regularly attended the House Committee in his rotation; and Dr. A. J. Sutherland, the Consulting Physician of the Hospital. George Smith Thornton, Esq., has resigned; from the long connection of his family with the Hospital, and the warm interest taken in it by his late father, it would have been gratifying to your Committee to have retained him as a Colleague.

There is also a vacancy in the Committee of Audit, by the

death of WILLIAM COTTON, Esq.

Four other Governors have died since the last meeting of the Court, viz., W. S. Lewis, Esq., C. G. Thornton, Esq., Miss Ann White, and T. H. White, Esq.; and five new Governors have been nominated, namely,

Mrs. Bishop,
F. Du Cane Godman, Esq.,
J. Luke, Esq.,
H. S. Pownall, Esq.,
H. N. White, Esq.

Your late Surgeon J. Luke, Esq., having ceased to reside in London, resigned his appointment. Your Committee desire to record their high sense of his valuable services during the long

period of 34 years. They have elected in his place Charles Hewitt Moore, Esq., Surgeon of the Middlesex Hospital, a

gentleman, of very high standing in his profession.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 5th July last, and their report concluded as follows:—

"We think the state of the Hospital, on the whole, to be extremely praiseworthy, making allowance for the very great drawbacks, incident to its position and construction."

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,-

For the 4lbs. Loaf.

From 1st April... to 30th September, at 61/4d., , 1st October to 31st March, , 62/4d.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,

Per Stone of 8lbs.

From 1st April... to 30th September, at 5s. 10d., 1st October to 31st March, ,, 5s. 8d.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital, between 1st January and 31st December, 1866, 106 Patients deemed curable.

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to 31st December, 1866, there have been admitted 897 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who have been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (9 in number) who have from time to time been re-admitted, by Virtue of an Annuity Deed, (dated 11th June, 1788,) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq., and since 31st December, 1865, and up to 31st December, 1866, 4 Patients deemed uncurable have been discharged cured; 5 at the request of friends, 1 died, and 2 unfit.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected pursuant to the regulations.

REPORT

OF THE

PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT,

FOR THE YEAR 1866.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

It is with pleasure we have to report to you that during the past year the health of the Patients, and the condition of the Hospital, has been satisfactory.

The average number of Patients daily resident was 134.

On the Curable List there have been admitted 34 males and 72 females; and there have been discharged as recovered, 15 males and 52 females, giving a percentage of 63.20, calculated on the admissions.

On the Boarders List there have been admitted one male, and seven females; and there have been discharged, as recovered, four females.

From the Curable List, 5 males and 13 females have been sent out on trial, and from this number two males and seven females were discharged recovered, and are included in the list of recoveries, the others were discharged as relieved; one male and one female are still absent on trial.

The deaths during the year have been ten in number, five males and five females; they have been from ordinary causes,

and are less in number than in 1865; as usual several of these were in almost a dying state on admission.

On the first of January of the present year there were on the Hospital books on the Curable List 19 males and 34 females, inclusive of one male and one female absent on trial; and on the Boarders List, 30 males and 44 females.

In the month of July the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Statutory visit, and have recorded at length in the Visitors' Book, the satisfactory state in which they found the Hospital. They suggest that more furniture be placed in the Wings, a suggestion which we hope the Committee will carry out.

There have been no Statutory additions to, or alterations made in the Lunacy Laws affecting this Hospital.

To the Governors it will be especially gratifying to learn that five-sixths of the Patients are more or less usefully occupied in various employments, not so much with the view of making such employment remunerative to the Hospital, as with the object of engaging the Patients' attention, and improving their general health, by moderate bodily and mental exercise. We cannot but be aware that the employment of Patients in out of door occupations, such as gardening, is not so practicable in the metropolis as in the country, but we feel certain that the Committee must regard with satisfaction any successful means used for the recovery of the Patients. We are, therefore, glad to be able to inform them that some of the Patients are engaged in gardening in the Hospital grounds, and we would venture to call attention to the circumstance, that a better green-house would materially increase their interest in such occupation, as well as adorn, by its produce, the grounds and the Hospital.

The Senate of the University of London has been pleased to signify its willingness to receive the certificates granted by us for attendance on the medical practice of this Hospital, for the purposes of graduation in Medicine in the University.

Your Physicians and Medical Superintendent cannot conclude their Report, without remarking on the loss the Hospital has sustained by the resignation of their colleague, Mr. Luke, F.R.S., who had held the office of Surgeon for thirty-four years. We believe we may state that the only cause of Mr. Luke's resignation was his retirement into the country, and his desire to relinquish the more active duties of his profession. The Committee, as well as ourselves, know how truly he carries with him the gratitude of his many Patients, and our sincerest wish that he may long live to enjoy the honorable repose his distinguished career so justly deserves.
