REPORT

OF THE

GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS

OF

ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,

FOR THE YEAR 1861.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

Your Committee have the pleasure to report, that during the past year the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £43., and the Benefactions to £976. 4s. 3d., among which are a Second Donation of £10 10s. from the Worshipful Company of Cutlers, and £52. 10s. 0d. from the Worshipful Company of Drapers; £105. from William Robert Mitchell, Esq., and an additional Donation of £100. from Alexander John Sutherland, Esq., M.D., a most gratifying proof of his continued interest in the Hospital, the inmates of which have in former years received so much benefit from his professional skill.

Your Committee gladly take this opportunity of acknowledging a most useful present of Twenty-five Iron Bedsteads, of an improved manufacture, from their much respected colleague, Charles Woodward, Esq., F.R.S. Your Committee have also to announce the receipt of the following Legacies, viz.:—

From the Executors of the late Edwin Cuthbert, Esq. £100.

From the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, being one-fourth part of the residue of the personal Estate of the late General Strode, who died 1766,—

In Stock, £1,183. 9s. 10d. 3 per cent. Consols, And in Cash, £1,634. 4s. 7d.

which has enabled your Committee to meet the current expenses without a further sale of the Funded property of the Hospital.

Your Committee regret to record the Deaths of Five Governors during the past year: William Lee Jortin, Esq., a descendant of one of the original Founders of this Hospital; Richard Hollond, Esq.; Isaac Onslow Secker, Esq.; their old colleague, Alexander Robert Sutherland, Esq., M.D., F.R.S., whose retirement they announced with great regret in their Report for the year 1859; and the Rev. Samuel Wix, M.A., F.R.S., who had been a Governor for upwards of twenty-three years.

Your Committee have however the gratification of announcing that they have enrolled the names of Eleven New Governors

during the past year.

Although the public do not yet sufficiently appreciate the advantages offered by the Resolutions of the General Courts of 1858 and 1859, admitting Patients at £1. Is. per week, your Committee are glad to be able to state, that the number of those Patients is increasing: the amount received for their maintenance having been £240. 9s. in 1861 against £357. in 1860 for Curable cases, and £1,141. 17s. for Chronic cases against £694. 12s. in the year 1860.

Your Committee are renewing their endeavours to increase the Airing Court on the Male side of the building, and are in communication with the Parish authorities on the subject.

The amount of House Expenses in 1860 was £4,896. 6s. 7d., and in the past year, £5,512. 12s. 6d.: this excess may be

accounted for in part by the increased price of provisions, and the increase in the average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital.

Since the last Annual Court, the Commissioners in Lunacy have made their usual official visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 and 9 Vict. cap. 100. Their observations, dated 18th February, 1861, are recorded in the "Visitors' Book" kept for the purpose. Your Committee have endeavoured to carry out the suggestions of the Commissioners as far as practicable.

Your Committee report that they have renewed the Lease of their Premises for another forty years, on payment of the usual fine of £200. to the Governors of St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December, 1861, 150 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 89, uncured 37; as unfit 13; at the request of their friends 7; and there have died 7. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December, 1861, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital 19,872 Patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged,—

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st of December, 1861, there have been admitted 820 Patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, exclusive of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788,) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1860, and up to the 31st December, 1861, 6 Patients, deemed incurable, have been discharged at the request of friends; 3 upon trial; 4 died; 6 unfit; 4 cured; 1 pauper.

Of the said 820 Patients (re-admitted as Boarders) exclusive of the Whitbread Patients,—

128 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

47 have been discharged cured.

18 upon trial.

19 uncured.

11 by order of the Committee, being Paupers.

33 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

11 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects for the Charity.

471 have died, and

82 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last,

exclusive of Mr. Whitbread's patient.

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year has been 153.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1861, was 149; namely, 66 Patients deemed curable, and 83 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend that The Right Honorable the Lord Overstone be re-elected President of this Corporation.

That The Right Honorable the Earl of Abingdon, the Right Honorable the Lord Aveland; the Right Honorable the Viscount Eversley; Sir Edmund Antrobus, Baronet; James Bentley, Esq.; and William Henry Whitbread, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That Henry Francis Shaw Lefevre, Esq. be re-elected Treasurer.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected, pursuant to the regulations.

REPORT

OF THE

PHYSICIAN AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

FOR THE YEAR 1861.

To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

WE have the honour of laying before you our Report for the past year.

The number of those whose treatment has been completed, and who at the time of admission were deemed curable, is 133, being an increase of 36 over the preceding year. Of this number, 34 males and 55 females have been discharged cured, and 12 males and 25 females uncured, making a per centage of 66.91 cured. Of those insane for a longer period than 12 months before admission, 1 male and 4 females have been discharged cured, and one of the Boarders who had been six years in the Hospital was also discharged cured; eleven have died during the year, of these seven were deemed curable, one had been insane upwards of twelve months before admission, and three were old residents, of the respective duration of 33 years, 10 years, and 9 years.

In many of the cases presented for admission the stated time of previous existing attack has been of considerable duration, a fact which is always considered to render the probability of a cure being effected much less than if the Patient was brought to the Hospital at a more early period of the disease. Of those whose treatment has been completed in the past year this duration exceeded by one-fourth that of the preceding year. It is a source of gratification, however, to know that an average per centage of cures has been effected, and that

the time of residence in the Hospital of those discharged cured has been only one day more for each Patient, than those so discharged in 1860, when the average was 14 weeks 4 days.

We alluded in our report last year to the debilitated condition of the Patients at the time of admission; during the past year patients suffering thus have even increased in number, it having been found necessary to place nearly one-fourth of those admitted in bed as soon as received; two indeed, of these Patients were received in an almost hopeless condition, and died in a few days after admission.

Notwithstanding the above facts, we are happy to state that the proportionate number of deaths is not larger than that during the last 10 years.

Great attention has been paid to preserve the general condition of the Hospital in a clean and healthy state.

In the autumn a severe form of diarrhea obtained a great degree of prevalence in the immediate neighbourhood, and a few cases occurred in the Hospital. One of the boarders at the same time died from an attack of English cholera. We are thankful in being able to state that this was the only case of that disease.

We regret to state that during the last year there has been more than the average of acute bodily disease, calling for a considerable amount of increased attention on the part of your Medical Officers, but happily with a generally successful termination.

There has been one casualty by the falling of one of the heavy trough beds, this received prompt attention, and terminated favourably. Since this casualty occurred, one of the Governors, who for years has taken the greatest interest in the Hospital, has liberally presented 25 Iron Bedsteads to replace the old ones in some of the single rooms. This gift proves to be a great benefit to the Patients, and we hope to see very shortly all the trough bedsteads removed, and substituted by similar bedsteads to those recently given.

Two escapes have been effected during the year, both males, one was brought back to the Hospital in three days, the other, who escaped from the attendant while walking in the streets, went to his wife and did not return to the Hospital, his wife had previously to his escape expressed her wish for him to remain at home.

During the year there have been 3 males and 13 females under seclusion, the average total duration of each seclusion being 6½ hours.

We have witnessed with great pleasure the improvements carried out

by the Governors in the structural alterations of the building, and also in the supply of means for increased domestic comfort.

The Bath Rooms have been newly adapted for the purposes of bathing and ablution. In these rooms, in each male and female wing, New Baths have been fixed, the windows enlarged, gas laid on, and in every bath-room kamptulicon has been laid down.

The walls of the staircase at the western end of the building have been covered with new wainscot, and kamptulicon has been laid down in the male wings.

The experimental enlargement of the windows, and the alterations in the doors of the two sleeping apartments recently effected, has been attended with great advantage to the comforts of the patients, and the lighting of the corresponding extremities of the galleries.

Four dozen additional chairs have been supplied, and these have been placed in the male and female wings in substitution of the forms formerly in use. A few more are still required for completing the furnishing of the single rooms.

Two dozen neat and durable washstands have also been procured.

Hair beds have been obtained for the use of a few dirty patients. These are found fully to answer the purpose for which they were intended, viz. to promote comfort and cleanliness.

The blinds for the large windows in the male and female wings, we regret to say, are not yet supplied. We think it particularly necessary that they should be provided to prevent the public gaze on the Bathstreet side of the building.

We beg to thank the Governors for their kind accession to our request for two Bagatelle Boards, which prove a source of amusement to the Patients, and add to the pleasing appearance of the wards. We think it very important that the aspect of the wards should present a cheerful appearance. The Governors and others who have visited the Hospital have concurred in this feeling, and kindly presented us with many objects of great interest to the Patients. Such donations will in future be thankfully received.

In further enumerating the benefits accruing from the interest which the Governors and others have taken in the Patients, it is with much pleasure that we acknowledge the kindness of those who gratuitously assisted in carrying out a series of Winter evening Entertainments, consisting of Lectures, Concerts, Balls, Illustrations, &c., all of which have proved beneficial to the Patients. During the summer months several of the Patients were sent short distances out of town for excursions. Seventy visited the Zoological Gardens, the tickets for admission being given by friends of the Charity.

The numbers walking beyond the limits of the Hospital have been larger than formerly. We find this mode of exercise especially beneficial to the convalescent patients.

We look forward with hope to the probability of a successful termination to the negociations at present going on with reference to an increased Airing Ground for the use of the Patients.

We are happy to report that the attendants have performed their duties with zeal and cheerfulness as heretofore. One of the female attendants, who had been very faithful to her work and who had been in the service of the Hospital for five years, left in the early part of the year to fill a superior situation.

We beg, in conclusion, to express our earnest hope that the great and good work of your Hospital may continue to flourish and progress.
