REPORT
OF THE
GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS
OF
ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,
FOR THE YEAR 1868.

To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.

The Court will be gratified to know that the following letter has been addressed to the Secretary by Sir WILLIAM JENNER :—

“ 18, Harley Street, W.

“ 1st March, 1868.

“ Dear Sir,

“ I am commanded by the Queen to forward the accompanying copy of “ Leaves from the Journal of Our Life in the Highlands ” to the Library of St. Luke's Hospital, for the use of the Patients.

“ Yours faithfully,

“ WILLIAM JENNER.”

At the last meeting of the Court, your Committee reported that they had addressed a letter to the Editor of the “ Times,” inviting the attention of the public to the advantages afforded by this Hospital as an Asylum for the Middle Classes. Your Committee regret that they have to repeat what they stated on that occasion, that the letter has produced no appreciable result.

Your Committee have pleasure in informing the Court that they have at length succeeded in obtaining possession of the Burial ground, which is now being laid out as an extension of the original Airing Court. The expense of this alteration, together with that of setting back the Wall in Bath Street will exceed £1,000.

The Benefactions during the past year amounted to £709. 6s. against £208. 1s., in 1867; and the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £61. 4s., against £74. 6s. in 1867.

The amount received from the friends of Patients paying One Guinea per week towards their maintenance was £399. for Curable cases, against £472. 10s. in 1867; and £1,481. 11s. for Chronic cases, against £1,315. 13s. in 1867.

The amount received from the friends of Patients deemed Incurable was £1,416. 9s., against £1,389. 10s. in 1867.

The Legacy of £10. from the late John White, Esq., has been paid.

The Expenditure has been £10,763. 14s. 2d., against £9,479. 19s. 1d. in 1867.

Your Committee regret to add that a further sum of £3,000., Consolidated 3 per Cent. Annuities, has been sold for the payment of the Tradesmen's Bills.

Your Committee contracted for the Best Wheaten Bread,—

For the 4lbs. Loaf.

From 1st April ...to 30th September, at 8½d.

„ 1st October to 31st March, „ 7¼d.

And for the usual kinds of Butchers' Meat,—

Per Stone of 8lbs.

From 1st April... to 30th September, at 4s. 10d.

„ 1st October to 31st March, „ 5s. 0d.

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital, between the 1st January and 31st December, 1868, 136 Patients deemed Curable.

During the same period there have been discharged Cured, 65; Uncured, 20; as unfit, 28; at the request of friends, 16; and there have died, 10. Since 30th July, 1751, the day on which

REPORT
OF THE
PHYSICIANS & MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.
FOR THE YEAR 1868.

*To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors
of St. Luke's Hospital.*

MY LORDS, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN,

It is with pleasure we have to report to you that during the past year the health of the Patients has been satisfactory.

The average daily number of Patients resident has been 147.

On the Curable List there have been admitted 46 males and 90 females, and there have been discharged as recovered 25 males and 40 females, giving a per centage of recoveries of 68.42 calculated on the admissions.

On the Boarders' List there have been admitted 6 males and 9 females, and there have been discharged as recovered 2 females

From the Curables' List 15 males and 12 females have been sent out on trial, and out of this number 11 males and 8 females were discharged recovered, and are included in the List of Recoveries, the other Patients were discharged as relieved, 2 male Patients are still absent on trial.

The deaths have been 11 in number, 2 male and 9 female, and have been from the ordinary causes.

On the 1st of January of the present year there were on the Hospital books, on the Curable List, 20 males and 40 females, and on the Boarders' List 34 males and 43 females, including 2 males absent on trial.

In the month of December last, the Commissioners in Lunacy made their Annual Statutory Visit, and have recorded at length in the Visitors' Book the State in which they found the Hospital. As regards the Patients they say—"With few exceptions we found these Patients in a favorable state, not one was suffering from any degree of excitement in either side of the Hospital, and their appearance as to dress and tidiness, and generally as to bodily health and condition, was throughout very satisfactory."

In the month of June last, the Committee appointed a male night attendant, and thus relieved the ordinary male attendants from night duty; and we have much pleasure in recording our opinion as to the very satisfactory way in which this arrangement works, and we beg leave to suggest for the consideration of the Committee the expediency of adopting the same practice on the female side.

The considerable addition that has recently been made to the male airing grounds, goes very far to remove the objections which have been urged as to our means for out-door recreation. It has afforded the opportunity of removing a boundary wall, and of substituting a light ornamental iron fence as a division between

the airing grounds. The open space thus acquired, with its broad gravel walks and large grass plot, adds greatly to the cheerful aspect of this part of the establishment.

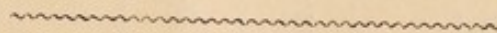
