GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS  
OF ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,  
FOR THE YEAR 1857.

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*To the Court of Governors of  
St. Luke's Hospital.*

YOUR Committee in making their Annual Report for 1857, desire to inform the Court of Governors that, in consequence of the further alterations and improvements effected in the Hospital, and the increased cost of the establishment, your Committee have been compelled to direct the sale of £5,000. Stock of the Invested Capital Fund of the Hospital to meet the current expenditure, making a total of £15,025. Stock sold since the Centenary in 1851.

During the past year the attention of your Committee has been painfully directed to the insufficiency of the Annual Income, as compared with the expenditure required to maintain the Charity in its present position of efficiency and usefulness,—the excess of expenditure over income now amounting to upwards of £2,000. per annum.

A short appeal has been advertized from time to time, but in consequence of the numerous and pressing claims of other kindred institutions, the engrossing sympathy of the public with the sufferers by the Indian Mutiny, and the critical condition of commercial affairs, the result has not been satisfactory.

Your Committee, with a desire to extend, as far as possible, the benefits of this Institution to the middle classes of society, and acting upon the recommendation contained in the Report of the Medical Officers about to be submitted to the Court, have agreed to a Resolution as follows:—

“That it be recommended to the Court, that under the direction  
 “ of the Committee, such alterations in the Regulations be  
 “ made, as may be found on examination to be necessary,  
 “ in order that Patients whose friends are able and willing  
 “ to pay for their care and maintenance, may be received  
 “ into the Hospital, upon such terms and under such re-  
 “ strictions and regulations as the Committee may deem  
 “ expedient.”

Since the last Annual Court, the Commissioners in Lunacy have made their usual official visit to the Hospital, pursuant to Sec. 61 of the Act 8 and 9 Vic., c. 100. Their observations, dated 13th March, 1857, are recorded in the “Visitors’ Book,” kept for the purpose. After referring to the improvements and alterations effected since their former visit, the Commissioners conclude their Report in the following words: “We were, upon  
 “ the whole, well satisfied with the improved state and arrange-  
 “ ment of the Hospital. The Nurses especially, appeared to us  
 “ of a superior order; and the management of the Institution  
 “ generally, in our opinion, reflects much credit upon the Super-  
 “ intendent, Matron, and other officers.”

Your Committee report that in July last, an offer was made on the part of your Committee, to rent from the parish authorities of Saint Luke’s the vacant ground belonging to the parish, situate

at the rear of the Hospital, and formerly used as a Pauper Burial Ground, at an Annual Rental of £30., so as to afford increased space for the amusement and occupation of the patients. This offer was, however, declined by the Parish Authorities, on the ground that the amount proposed was "wholly inadequate." It was further stated to your Committee, that the sum of £100. a year had been mentioned as the amount at which the Authorities would be willing to let the ground in question. Your Committee being of opinion that the amount originally offered, namely, £30. a year, was a sufficient sum, have not felt justified in making any further proposition on the subject.

Your Committee announce with regret the decease, on the 16th September, 1857, of HENRY DENTON, Esq., late a Member of the Committee, and one of the most active and useful Governors of this Corporation. By his will, dated 25th August, 1857, he has bequeathed to the Charity a Legacy of £500., free of duty.

With respect to supplies for the past year, Your Committee contracted from the 1st April, until the 30th September last, for the usual kinds of Butcher's Meat at 4s. 11d. per stone of 8 lbs.; and have further contracted from the 1st October last until the 31st March next, for the same, at the rate of 4s. 7d. per stone of 8 lbs. Your Committee contracted from the 1st April until the 30th September last, for the best wheaten bread at 7½d. for a 4 lb. loaf; for flour at 11s. per bushel; and for oatmeal at 2s. 4d. per peck; and have further contracted from the 1st October last to the 31st March next, for the best wheaten bread at 7¼d. for a 4 lb. loaf; for flour at 10s. 3d. per bushel; and for oatmeal at 2s. 4d. per peck.

As regards the Patients admitted to the benefits of this Charity, your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital since the 31st December, 1856, and up to the 31st December, 1857, 150 patients deemed curable.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 95; uncured 41; as unfit 14; at the request of their friends 4; and there have died 13. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on

which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and up to the 31st December 1857 inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital 19,328 patients, DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION; of whom there have been discharged,

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st of December, 1857, there have been re-admitted 749 patients DEEMED INCURABLE, who had been previously discharged uncured, *exclusive* of those patients (eight in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq., deceased; and since the 31st December, 1856, and up to the 31st December, 1857,—five patients, *deemed incurable on re-admission*, have been discharged at the request of friends; 3 friends not complying

with rules; 8 upon trial; 3 have died; and 26 have been re-admitted.

Of the said 749 patients (re-admitted as Boarders) *exclusive* of the Whitbread patients,—

103 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

40 have been discharged cured.

8 upon trial.

11 uncured.

9 by order of the Committee, being Paupers.

27 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

5 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects for the Charity.

460 have died, and

86 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last, *exclusive* of Mr. Whitbread's patient.

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Total 749.

The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year has been as follows, viz.; 60 males and 107 females, total 167.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1857, was 155, namely, 68 Patients deemed curable, and 87 boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's patient.

Your Committee recommend that the Right Honorable Lord OVERSTONE be requested to continue the honor to this Charity by being its President.

That the Right Honourable the Earl of ABINGDON, the Right Honourable Lord AVELAND; the Right Honourable Lord Viscount EVERSLEY; Sir EDMUND ANTROBUS, Baronet; JAMES BENTLEY, Esq.; and WILLIAM HENRY WHITBREAD, Esq., be re-elected Vice-Presidents of this Corporation.

That HENRY FRANCIS SHAW LEFEVRE, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.



Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, Your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected, pursuant to the regulations.

All of which is nevertheless submitted.

Of the said 748 patients 40 have been discharged, 8 upon trial, 11 recovered, 9 by order of the Committee, being 68 patients, 87 in consequence of the funds not complying with the Rules of the Hospital, 5 being deceased, in total of discharges, improper objects for the Charity, 400 have died, and 88 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last, exclusive of Mr. Withers's patient.

Total 748. The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year has been as follows, viz: 60 males and 107 females, total 167.

The total number of Patients remaining on the beds on the 31st December, 1851, was 153, namely, 68 Patients (males, couples, and 87 bedwards, including Mr. Withers's patient.

Your Committee recommend that the Right Honourable Lord Overstone be requested to continue the honor to this party by being its President.

# REPORT

OF THE

Physicians and Medical Superintendent,

FOR THE YEAR 1857.

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*To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors,  
of St. Luke's Hospital.*

MY LORDS, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN,

Another year having expired since we last had the honor of laying before you our Report on the condition of the Hospital, it becomes our duty again to address you.

In reviewing the Hospital economy during the past year, we are pleased to find that we can record nothing but what must be satisfactory and gratifying to all. We have had an unusually small amount of sickness, a fair per centage of cures, though this last has not been quite so large as it was in the year immediately preceding; no suicide, or even accident deserving the name of serious, and an increased and increasing general comfort and harmony in the various Wards.

We feel that we are enabled to make so favorable a Report, owing in great measure to the many improvements that have been carried out in the Wards during the past year, through your liberality and kindness. We especially refer to the adoption of swing glazed sashes over some of the bedroom doors, in the place of the old open wire grating; this alteration has enabled the Attendants to keep up a fair amount of ventilation, and at the same time to materially diminish, if not entirely to control the draughts, at one time so common throughout the Hospital.

We should be pleased to find that your Committee felt justified in incurring the necessary expense for placing similar contrivances over all the remaining bedroom doors in the Hospital.

We also feel that not a little additional comfort and enjoyment has resulted to the Patients, from the fact of almost all the Walls within the Hospital having been papered with good and cheerful patterned paper during the past year: though not of so great importance to the general health of the inmates as the improvements just alluded to, nevertheless we cannot help expressing our belief that not one of the numerous and large outlays made by the Governors for the improvement of St. Luke's Hospital, has effected so much towards altering the former dismal aspect and character of the house, as the last: and none has been so thoroughly appreciated by the Patients.

The Wing Wards, on the Male side, still remain unaltered and unimproved; and they form, with their inmates, a very unhappy contrast with the Wing Wards on the other side of the Hospital.

We know that in the present condition of the Funds of the Charity, it would be unreasonable, if not hopeless, to suggest further costly alteration, though we hope the day is not far distant which shall see the Male Refractory Wards made as comfortable, and cheerful, and suitable to their objects, as those for the Females. Here we should remark, that since the alteration of the Wing Wards on the Female side of the Hospital, we not only find the Patients much more tidy and well behaved, but seclusion is hardly ever used or called for; and the accidents, formerly so frequent, owing to violence of one Patient to another, are now never met with, as the Patients in the altered Wards are always under the eye of the Attendant.

On the Male side, the Wards still consist of two apartments, and it results naturally that when the Ward is left in charge of but one Attendant, one apartment alone can be properly watched, and hence a cause of occasional disorder. It can hardly be supposed that we too highly prize this alteration of the Wards, which enables us to keep all the Patients under constant obser-

vation, when we state that of the unfortunate creatures last year entrusted to our care, one-half were reported to have meditated, or had actually attempted, self-destruction before admission.

While advocating further improvements, and acknowledging those that have been made, we cannot help admitting that we feel a certain amount of disappointment that the Hospital, so greatly changed—so much improved, in fact with every means at its disposal for the accomplishment of the Governors' object—the treatment of the Insane, and this, gratuitously, should experience, year by year, a gradual, and certain, though slow diminution in the number of admissions. This is of course in a great measure, and perhaps mainly owing to the construction of numerous County Asylums, which afford a ready refuge to that class that was for many years almost entirely dependent on the endowed Hospitals for the Insane; but we think that the falling off in the number resident in the Hospital is owing, to a considerable extent, to the fact, that the Charity and its Rules are but very imperfectly known throughout the country. We wish to call your attention particularly to this diminution in the number of admissions, feeling sure that contemplating the reception of other classes than those heretofore received, you will adopt some plan which shall enable the largest possible number of the indigent Insane to reap the benefit of your liberal benevolence.

If, as we hope, you consider this matter of sufficient importance to arrest your attention, and to call for your further consideration, we would remind you that there is a very large class of suffering humanity—a class whose troubles and privations are but little heard of out of their own immediate circles—whose wants, in respect of care of their insane, you might materially relieve in your Institution: we allude to the tolerably well-to-do professional man and tradesman. People in this class would shrink from becoming actually objects of charity, but would willingly pay a small—to us remunerative—sum for the care and treatment of an afflicted member of their family, and yet be quite unable, as our disqualifying Rule has it, to provide for their “decent support in a Private Asylum.” A relaxation of the Rules of

the Hospital, or a sufficiently liberal interpretation of them to enable people of this class to be received, might be the means of somewhat augmenting the annual income of the Charity.

We cannot help regretting that in spite of the praiseworthy and strenuous efforts made by your Committee during the year, no progress has been made towards obtaining possession of the adjacent piece of ground belonging to the Parish; and the acquisition of which, together with the removal of a few of the remaining walls, and some re-arrangement of the out buildings, would so materially enlarge and improve the airing courts. We hope that this important matter will still continue to occupy the attention of the Governors. In making these remarks, we must again express our gratification and thanks for the great change that has been brought about inside the Hospital. With the exception of the two items referred to above, viz., the alteration of the Male Wing Wards, and the general adoption of swing sashes over the Bed Room doors, we believe that all has been done within the building that could be reasonably required.

There is one matter to which we would, in conclusion, beg to call your attention. It has always been a great desideratum in the treatment of insanity, to associate the Patients as much as possible with healthy and vigorous minds, and we have never lost sight of this aim in the selection of the Attendants, both Male and Female; but as we have observed from time to time, the increased order and general decorum that pervades the Wards, it has occurred to us, that we might venture to ask you to consider how far it would be advisable to admit to the Wards, under regulations to be framed by your Committee, a certain number of Ladies and Gentlemen, who would take an interest in the work, to act as Visitors to the Patients. We feel that this might be carried out at any rate by a Committee of Ladies on the Female side of the House; such visitors would call at the Hospital in rotation, on two or three days in the week, and acting under the guidance of our excellent Matron, would associate with and endeavour to soothe and amuse the Patients: they would prove a great comfort to the poor inmates at the time, and we are sure



would materially assist in our united labors for the amelioration of their condition.

The Attendants, to whom we cannot award too great praise for their kindness, forbearance, and general good conduct, cannot be supposed to have such freshness or versatility of mind and spirits as we should have placed at our disposal by some such arrangement as the one proposed for your consideration; and we feel sure that recent events have shown what the women of England will undertake when the objects in view are the relief of misery, and the succour of the distressed.
