R E P O R T  
OF THE  
GENERAL COMMITTEE OF GOVERNORS  
OF  
ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL,  
FOR THE YEAR 1864.

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*To the Court of Governors of St. Luke's Hospital.*

Your Committee have to report that the Benefactions during the past year amounted to £333. 3s. 9d., against £363. 7s. 8d. in 1863, and that the Annual Subscriptions amounted to £66. 8s., against £48. 11d. in 1863.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, paying one guinea per week towards their maintenance, was £393. 15s. for Curable cases, against £331. 16s. in 1863, and £1,117. 4s. for chronic cases, against £984. 18s. 0d. in 1863.

The amount received from the friends of Patients, deemed Incurable, was £1,817. 4s. 0d., against £1,959. 8s. 0d. in 1863.

The Legacy of £31. 10s. 0d., from the late Beriah Botfield, Esq., M.P., has been paid.

The Expenditure has been £9,391. 6s. 1d., against £8,791. 18s. 9d. in 1863; this increase is accounted for by your Committee having taken advantage of the low price of coals to lay in a large supply at 18s. 6d. a ton, also by the necessary outlay in white-washing the whole of the interior of the building, as well as by some additions to the furniture of the Wards.

Your Committee are sorry to add that more than £1,000. is required to be raised by the sale of Stock, to provide for the payment of the Christmas bills.

The names of seven New Governors have been added to the List during the past year.

Your Committee have on former occasions mentioned the various difficulties which they had experienced in endeavouring to procure the Bath Street Burial Ground as an addition to the Male Airing Court: they have now the pleasure to report, that they have at length succeeded in obtaining the Faculty from the Diocesan Registrar, authorising the use of this consecrated piece of land for the purposes intended by your Committee.

To render this ground available for the additional Airing Court, an immediate outlay of several hundred pounds will be required, which will cause a further reduction in the amount of Stock held by this Corporation, unless there be a liberal response on the part of the Public to the appeals made for its support.

Dr. Octavius Jepson having resigned the office of Resident Medical Superintendent, your Committee elected in his place Mr. James Ellis, who has had considerable experience in the treatment of Lunacy at the Northampton and Hanwell County Asylums.

Your Committee are preparing to substitute Iron Window Frames for the present heavy Wooden Frames, in the Wings; and they hope that the Wings will be made much more cheerful, and that the external appearance of the Hospital will be improved by the alteration.

At the request of the Resident Medical Superintendent, your Committee have altered Rule 122, so as to give additional leave of absence to the Attendants.

Your Committee have also raised the rate of Wages of the Attendants after five years' service.

The Commissioners in Lunacy made their usual Official Visit to the Hospital, pursuant to sec. 61 of the Act 8 & 9 Vict., cap. 100, on the 22nd July last, and reported as follows:—

“ We found the Patients on the whole in a very quiet state, and no one was secluded or restrained.”

“ Restraint has not been employed for a very long period, and the instances of seclusion have been very rare.”

“ The Wards were all clean, and the Bedding in good order.”

“ We saw the Patients at Dinner, and tasted the food, which was good, and neatly served.”

“ The Patients seem to be carefully attended to by the Medical Superintendent and other Officers, and their comforts are evidently cared for.”

Your Committee report that there have been received into the Hospital between the 1st January and 31st December, 1864, 126 Patients deemed Curable, being 8 in excess of the year 1863.

During the same period, there have been discharged cured 77, uncured 25, as unfit 9, at the request of their friends 8, and, there have died 7. Since the 30th July, 1751, the day on which the Hospital was first opened for the reception of Patients, and



up to the 31st December, 1864, inclusive, there have been admitted into the Hospital, 20,253 Patients, **DEEMED CURABLE ON THEIR ADMISSION**; of whom there have been discharged--

Since the opening of the Hospital in 1751, and up to the 31st December, 1864, there have been admitted 878 Patients **DEEMED INCURABLE**, who had been previously discharged *uncured, exclusive* of those Patients (nine in number) who have, from time to time, been re-admitted, by virtue of an Annuity Deed, (dated 11th June, 1788) of the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq.; and since the 31st December, 1863, and up to the 31st December, 1864, 8 Patients, *deemed incurable*, have been discharged at the request of friends; 4 upon trial; 1 died; and 6 unfit.



Of the said 878 Patients (admitted as Boarders) *exclusive* of the Whitbread Patients,—

144 have been discharged by the desire of friends.

49 have been discharged cured.

35 upon trial.

19 uncured.

11 by order of the Committee, being paupers.

33 in consequence of the friends not complying with the Rules of the Hospital.

26 being deemed, in point of circumstances, improper objects of the Charity.

476 have died, and

85 were in the Hospital on the 31st December last

— *exclusive* of Mr. Whitbread's patient.

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The average weekly number of Patients in the Hospital during the year, has been 163, being 5 in excess of last year.

The total number of Patients remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1864, was 146 namely, 60 Patients deemed curable and 86 Boarders, including Mr. Whitbread's Patient.

Your Committee recommend The Lord OVERSTONE be re-elected President of this Corporation.

That the Right Honorable the Earl of ABINGDON, the Lord AVELAND; the Right Honorable the Viscount EVERSLEY; Sir EDMUND WILLIAM ANTROBUS, Baronet; JAMES BENTLEY, Esq.; and WILLIAM HENRY WHITBREAD, Esq., be re-elected Vice-President of this Corporation.

That HENRY FRANCIS SHAW LEFEVRE, Esq., be re-elected Treasurer.

That Messrs. FULLER & Co. be re-elected Bankers of this Hospital.

Your Committee have prepared a List of Governors, whom they submit to the Court as fit and proper persons to act as the General Committee for the year ensuing.

And finally, your Committee recommend that the remaining Honorary Officers of this Corporation be severally re-elected pursuant to the regulations.

REPORT  
OF THE  
PHYSICIANS AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT  
FOR THE YEAR 1864.

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*To the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors  
of St. Luke's Hospital.*

MY LORDS, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN,

IN laying before the Court of Governors our Annual Retrospect for the year just past, it is very gratifying to us to be enabled to state, that with few exceptions, the health of the Patients, and the condition of the Hospital, has been satisfactory.

On the 31st of December, 1863, there were in the Hospital, including both sexes, 60 Patients presumed to be curable, and during the year there were admitted 126 similar cases; of these, 77 have been discharged cured, and there remains under treatment, 21 male, and 39 female Patients, exclusive of the Boarders.

From the above it will be seen that the Admissions during the year 1864, of Patients presumed to be curable, have slightly exceeded the Admissions of similar cases during the year 1863, whilst, as would be expected, the Discharges of the past year have exceeded those of the previous one, there being a total, including both sexes, of 70·64 per cent. of Patients restored to their homes as cured.

The average number of Patients daily resident during the year, was 163, a number slightly in excess of the previous year, and which is due to the Admissions of the year 1864 exceeding those of 1863, and must not be regarded as showing a permanent increase in the numbers resident; a circumstance which is not to be expected from the fact, that as some of the old Boarders yearly die off, their places are not filled up by similar cases, this class, now doubtless finding their way into County Asylums, a home for them which formerly did not exist.



The previous residences of those admitted, appear to be equally divided between the metropolis and the provinces.

During the year, seven deaths have occurred, giving a percentage on the numbers resident of 4.29, a small number, considering the very shattered condition of many of the cases which have been admitted.

The Chapel Services continue to be performed as usual, a lady Patient kindly presiding at the harmonium.

The substitution of eighteen iron window frames, ordered by the Committee, for the present decayed wooden ones, will, when completed, form a great advantage to the Hospital by giving additional light and ventilation.

One among the many advantages of the alteration of Rule 122, is the opportunity the Patients will have of exercising in the Airing Grounds on Sunday afternoon and evenings, a practice which we could not till now carry out.

During the summer months, the usual excursions into the country, and visits to the Crystal Palace and other places of amusement, have been resorted to with benefit; and in the winter months, the Balls have been looked forward to with great pleasure.

We must congratulate the Committee on the success of their endeavours to obtain additional Airing Grounds for the men's side.

To the Steward and Matron our thanks are due for their very valuable assistance.

The Attendants and Servants have, we believe, without exception, discharged their duties with care, kindness, and attention, and we, in conclusion, have to acknowledge the confidence the Committee continue to repose in us.

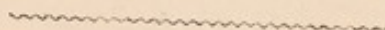

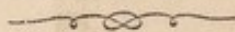
