REPORT
OF THE
COMMITTEE OF VISITORS
OF THE
LUNATIC ASYLUM AT SNENTON NEAR NOTTINGHAM.

To the Court of Quarter Sessions for the County of Nottingham.

In compliance with the Lunatic Asylums Act 1853, the Committee of Visitors report:—

That the Asylum and offices are in a fair state of repair.

The land in Walker Street has been enclosed by a substantial brick wall, at a cost of £200. There is no necessity to ask the Court for a grant on account of this expenditure, as there is a surplus in hand sufficient to meet it arising out of extra payments received from out-county and non-contributing Unions.

Improved portable pumps and buckets against risk from fire, were purchased in June last, for use at the detached blocks, in addition to the hydrants, and similar apparatus previously provided in the main building.

There has been no deficiency of room in the men's side of the Asylum, but owing to a preponderance of female patients from the Borough of Nottingham, there being as many as twenty-five in excess of the males, about ten women from County Unions could not be admitted.

This inconvenience will not be felt after the close of the year 1877, when the agreement to accommodate the Borough patients ceases. It would have been still greater but for the discharge of eleven harmless incurable lunatics to the Unions, and of five others to the care of their friends.

The number of persons admitted whose disorder was occasioned by habits of intemperance in drink is on the increase. During the present year 26 per cent. are reported as due to this vice. Several women were amongst the number.

The cost to the Unions for maintenance, legal and medical expenses, conveyance, and to other incidents of each case sent to the Asylum, is at the rate of about £24 a year; and the loss incurred by the County in providing buildings, land, and repairs is estimated at £7 a year additional.

As one-fourth of the expenditure and of the interest of capital invested in the Institution amounts to upwards of £3,000 a year, it is evident that a sum not less than this may be taken as the probable future charge upon the rates in respect of this class of lunatics, for the same number as now resident, and for so long as this avoidable cause, drunkenness, operates in the same proportion of cases.

The numbers remaining under care in the Asylum on the 31st December, 1876, were 190 Males, 208 Females, Total 398.

During the year 124 were admitted, 47 were discharged recovered, 22 were removed, and 47 died.

The house has been remarkably healthy, and there is no suicide, fatal accident, or permanent escape to record.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you the annual report of the admissions, removals, and discharges of patients at the County Lunatic Asylum at Snenton, for the year 1876, and of other particulars relating to its state and management. The following is a summary of the various changes that have taken place:—

Of the 398 remaining 133 belong to Nottingham, 6 to Newark, and 259 to the County proper. The total number under treatment 514, and 392 the daily average, are the highest that have been reached. The Asylum will hold 400 patients, namely, 182 men and 208 women; all the beds for the latter have been occupied at once on more than one occasion during the year, but 124 patients under fresh orders were received out of 135 applications made. The accommodation at present on the female side is below the demand for it, and until the new Borough Asylum is ready for occupation, female patients can only be admitted as vacancies are occasioned by deaths or discharges.

The removal of patients to the care of friends or to the Union has been permitted for several years past when it could be safely done, in order to make room for urgent cases; but there has been a larger number than usual returned as unfit to be at large, so that but little relief can be expected again under this head. It has moreover had the effect of leaving a residuum of dangerous and suicidal cases.

The youngest lunatic admitted was a girl of eleven years of age; the oldest resident is a woman of 95.

The chief causes of insanity sole or combined with others, in those admitted including relapses, are as follows in the order of frequency:—Intemperance in drink, hereditary, epilepsy, and physical injuries. The first furnished 26 men and 6 women, or 32 cases, being at the rate of 26 per cent. for both sexes, after deducting two admitted for the second time, during the year. Of all causes of disease this is one of the most avoidable. Chronic narcotic poisoning by strong drinks is entirely a voluntary act. Many of the sufferers are not aware that mischief to the constitution is not limited to the morbid results of occasional drunkenness, but follows as surely the habitual consumption of quantities that fall short of producing this state. One favourable circumstance in the history of this wide spread evil may be noted, that the intelligent classes are becoming daily more alive to these

facts and observe greater moderation. It may be expected that their example will in time exert a salutary influence over the less enlightened.

The recoveries during the year were 47 or 37·9 per cent. on the admissions. The average for similar institutions in England and Wales for the preceding year was 34·1. The deaths were 47 or 9·1 on the total number under treatment, being a fraction over 8·7 the corresponding average elsewhere. Insanity as usual was more fatal to men than to women. This is explained by the former being more intemperate in their habits and more liable to physical injuries.

The Asylum has been free from epidemic diseases. According to published reports erysipelas has been a prevalent and fatal disease during the last two or three years in several Asylums of modern construction, but it has shewn no tendency to spread in this institution. This circumstance and the fact of its being the oldest County Asylum in the kingdom militate against the notion that old hospitals are necessarily the foci of disease. It would be unwise to presage any immunity from an outbreak of this character, but there are some arrangements here which appear to have sanitary advantages. 1. The buildings are protected against the east wind by the terraced land at the back. 2. The wards occupied by the patients have recreation grounds turfed and planted front and back, and currents of fresh air pass freely from one side to the other as the wind changes. 3. Eight out of ten of the wards open directly into the grounds, causing movements of air on ingress and egress. They are furnished with double sashed windows and heated by open fireplaces. 4. The chimneys have tops of improved construction for facilitating the draught. These, with the systematic scraping and whitewashing of the premises have so far rendered the use of deodorizers and disinfectants almost unnecessary.

There has been no suicide or other fatal emergency. The latest official report, that for 1874, shows that 68 persons per million living died by their own hands in England and Wales in that year. The following is the return for the registration County of Nottingham:—

Timely care might probably have saved some of these.

The accounts which are produced to-day for audit show an increase in the balance with the Treasurer after the payment of the December bills.

With the exception of one case dealt with at the beginning of the year, the conduct of the attendants, artizans, nurses, and domestic servants has been in general satisfactory.

I have also pleasure in stating that I have met with the cordial co-operation of all the officers in their respective departments.

REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

NOTTINGHAM COUNTY ASYLUM,
21st July, 1876.

Our last official visit to this Asylum was on the 2nd of April, 1875, when the total number on the books was 388—viz., 185 patients of the male, and 203 of the female sex. In the interval up to this day, 68 males and 80 females have been admitted, making the total number of patients under treatment 536.

The other changes comprise the discharge of 34 men and 56 women, and the deaths of 33 men and 25 women; leaving in the Asylum this day a total of 393 patients, of whom 188 are of the male, and 205 of the female sex. We learn, however, that at a meeting of the Visitors held yesterday, 2 men and 3 women were discharged, and they will be removed very shortly. Of the discharged patients, 55 were recovered. The recorded causes of death are such as are usual in Asylums, and no inquests have been held. We are surprised to learn that *post-mortem* examinations have not been held in any case.

During our inspection this day we have seen every patient, including those ordered for discharge yesterday, and we have made the usual statutory enquiries relative to their care and treatment. We have a good report to make of them as regards their personal condition, and they were all remarkably free from excitement or violence. There were a few marks of blows about the faces of some of the men, but they were all traceable to falls during epilepsy or scuffles amongst

the patients themselves, none being attributed to roughness on the part of the attendants. It should be observed that about one-third of the patients have bruises and marks of injury upon them when admitted. A case occurred about six months ago when a male patient's jaw was broken, which gave rise to grave suspicion regarding the conduct of an attendant. Actual violence could not be proved against him, but he was brought before a magistrate on a charge of neglect, and fined £2, being of course at the same time dismissed from the service of the Asylum.

The bodily health of the patients is at present satisfactory. There are some old and very feeble cases in the Infirmarys, but only 2 men and 4 women were in bed. 16 men and 24 women are under medical treatment. 26 of the inmates are over 70 years of age.

The general arrangements of the establishment have not been altered, and as yet no provision has been made for the constant observation and watching of suicidal and epileptic cases during the night. By slight alterations the large dormitories on the upper floors of the back buildings might be easily made suitable for the purpose. It is stated that when the Borough patients are removed this matter will be taken into consideration; but as the tenders for the erection of the New Borough Asylum have not yet been accepted, it will probably be more than two years ere this removal can take place.

There has been a change in the staff, Dr. Weir having left, and been succeeded by Mr. Aplin. The office of Head Nurse has been taken from the Housekeeper, and the duties are now performed by Jane Henson, who has been promoted to the post. The staff of ordinary attendants continues to be smaller than we usually find in County Asylums; the proportions being one to fourteen patients for men and one to seventeen in the female division.

The returns of employment show an average of 82 men and 79 women usefully occupied. At Divine Service, on Sunday, 195 of both sexes are usually present, and 135 on Wednesday. No patients go to churches in the town, but last month 84 men and 28 women were taken beyond the premises for exercise. Except that the stone floors are gradually being replaced by wood, there have been few structural alterations beyond an improvement in the ventilation of the single rooms in Ward 2 and 3 on the female, and 5 and 3 on the male side

We have examined the books. It appears from the entries in the Medical Journal that no mechanical restraint has been employed since our last visit, but seclusion has been resorted to in the cases of 22 men and 32 women; with the former for a total duration of 499 hours, and the latter for 517 hours.

The various wards were clean, and the bedding throughout well attended to; and we have pleasure in reporting that the Asylum continues to be in a very satisfactory state, and that the inmates give every indication of kind treatment.
