REPORT, 1898.

18th JANUARY, 1898.

The Committee of Visitors of the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Lunatic Asylum have, in pursuance of the provisions of the "Lunacy Act, 1890," to make the Thirty-fourth Annual Report (and the Tenth Annual Report under the "Local Government Act, 1888") to the City Council of the condition and management of the Institution.

On the 31st day of December, 1897, the number of patients on the books was 503 (viz., 224 males and 279 females) and with 28 male patients boarded out in another asylum, make a total of 531. The admissions during 1898 were 138 (viz., 77 males and 61 females).

The admissions were chargeable in the following manner:

The discharges were 58 (viz., 24 males and 34 females), and the deaths were 67 (viz., 35 males and 32 females).

The average number daily resident was 515 (viz., 236 males and 279 females).

The number of discharges recovered was 43, or at the rate of 31'1 per cent. of the admissions.

The percentage of deaths of the average numbers daily resident was 13'0, and of the total number under treatment 10'4.

The number remaining on the books on the 31st December, 1898, was 516 (viz., 242 males and 274 females), and, with the 26 male patients boarded out in another asylum, make a total of 542. Of this number 5 are chargeable as private patients, 2 are chargeable to "out counties," and 535 are chargeable to the Union of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, as against 524 last year, being an increase of 11.

The Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 5th day of February, 1898.

The progress of the extension buildings during the last year has been fairly satisfactory, although not quite so rapid as desirable. It has been very difficult obtaining materials and labour. The whole of the wards are in the finishing stage, and the walls are now being distempered. The cooking apparatus for kitchens is almost completed. The whole of the structure of the Asylum buildings proper is now erected, and the internal finishing is in progress. The workshops have been occupied some months. The laundry is roofed, and preparations are being made for fitting up the machinery. The isolation hospital has been ready for occupation some time. The electric generating plant is in process of erection and fitting. The attendants' cottages are com-

pleted, and the new lodge is in progress. The storage reservoirs are completed. The steam boilers have been working for some weeks, and heat applied to the buildings for drying them.

The Committee have much pleasure in again expressing their entire satisfaction with Dr. Callcott and his Staff in the general discharge of their duties; and they regret to hear of the death of Dr. Whickham, their late Medical Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

NEWCASTLE CITY ASYLUM, FEBRUARY 5th, 1898.

Our colleagues were here about seven months ago, at that time there were 490 patients in residence, and much notice was taken of the overcrowding then existing; this day there are in residence 506, and on the books and entitled to asylum accommodation here are 511 patients, or an increase of 21 in the short period which has elapsed between the two visits.

This overcrowding has been referred to for years past, and now we find that it is hoped, unless more strikes occur, the Asylum may be completed by the end of the year. The block for the sick and infirm, which is greatly needed, has not yet been finished with regard to internal plastering and painting, though the internal fittings are being constructed.

As reported at the last visit the engine and dynamos are not yet erected. The detached hospital is ready for occupation, but the furniture is not yet in position. The chapel is only in such a state that labourers are working at the foundations.

The patients on the books this day are 230 men and 281 women, 511 in all. The overcrowding on the male side is most marked, there are 230 patients sleeping where there is only proper sleeping space for 201 patients, that is to say the Asylum is overcrowded by 29 beds, notwithstanding the fact

that 28 more Newcastle patients are boarded out at Durham. Of the 281 women, 7 belong to the private class, and 5 women are out on trial without any allowance however. We again urge the granting of this allowance on the practical ground of economy alone.

There are, according to the returns, beds still vacant for 18 women, but this is caused by the conversion of the old farmhouse into an asylum for 42 quiet, harmless patients, who however are not protected as they should be in the event of fire. Our colleagues advised external staircases, we learn that doors of inter-communication between the dormitories are preferred by the Committee, but absolutely nothing has been done. This danger to life so easily remedied should not be allowed to continue longer.

There is no clinical assistant for this Asylum with 511 patients, many of whom are ill and bed-ridden, only two Medical Officers are appointed. We have no hesitation in saying, that not a clinical clerk, but a properly qualified second Assistant Medical Officer is needed. Proper accommodation suitable to the gentleman's position must of course be found.

We might here mention that the walls at the farm are damp and need attention. Some of the passages, lobbies, &c., were very cold, and the chilly passage used by the male patients, as we saw to-day, when coming from their hot baths must be necessarily dangerous to health. Yesterday and to-day snow has been falling, and the temperature in the dormitories on an average was 40. We were told in cold weather fires were lighted in the dormitories, it appeared to us as if the thermometer standing at 40 at noon indicated the necessity for fires.

The following changes have occurred since the last visit:-

Out of the 511 patients on the books, there are no patients belonging to any out-county; if the farm-house be included there is vacant accommodation for 18 women, but as before mentioned there are 29 in excess of the proper number.

The percentage of recoveries and deaths, calculated in the usual way, have been 21.5 and 9.6 respectively. Nothing in the causes of death calls for special notice, except over 30 per cent. were due to general paralysis. *Post-mortem* examinations were made in over 60 per cent. of the deaths, and we were told in all other cases permission had been refused. The Coroner held no inquest.

No mechanical restraint has been needed, but seclusion has been employed in the case of 3 men and 4 women, on 143 and 43 occasions, and for a total of 239 and 1263/4 hours respectively. Two patients have received serious injury, but none-fatal, owing to falls. Only one case of epidemic or zymotic disease has appeared in the Asylum. A woman was attacked by measles; she recovered, and the malady did not spread.

We found 26 men and 15 women in bed during our visit. The behaviour of the patients was quiet. No complaint, except of undue detention were made to us. The dress of both sexes was neat, and the rooms and dormitories in general were in good order.

The dinner consisted of soup, jam pudding, and bread and cheese. The beverage lemonade. The fare provided was certainly liked.

The staff of attendants is not too strong considering the old feeble cases as well as the number of general paralytics. The figures show I to 10½ males, and I to 12½ females. It is a singular fact here that out of the 32 general paralytics no less than 20 are females.* Whilst another matter worthy of note is that on neither side is there a patient who is actively suicidal.

The duration of the service of the attendants it not very satisfactory, though 8 of the males have lived here for a period of five years and upwards; only 3 nurses can count a like period of service.

About 50 per cent. of the patients attend either the Church of England or some other form of religious service on Sundays, whilst rather a smaller proportion are present at the associated gatherings.

155 male and 158 female patients are usefully employed, but 93 of the former and 66 of the latter are ward cleaners only. The proportion of ward cleaners in the male division seems to us to be unduly large. The rest of the occupations in which the patients are engaged call for no remark.

The case books respecting the recent cases are well noted up, and indeed the entries in the chronic case books are careful, but not so frequently made as we should expect if the medical staff were numerically sufficient to do the clinical work of the Asylum.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

22nd FEBRUARY, 1899.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Thirty-fourth Annual Report, with the Statistical Tables for the year 1898.

On the 1st January, 1898, there were 503 patients (viz., 224 men and 279 women) on the books of the Asylum; and on the 31st December there were 516 patients (viz., 242 men and 274 women) residing in the Asylum, and 26 male patients were boarded out in the Durham County Asylum, the total number being 542 patients (viz., 268 men and 274 women.

The average daily number resident in 1898 was 515 (viz., 236 men and 279 women), and the total number under treatment was 639 (viz., 301 men and 338 women).

The admissions were 138 (viz., 77 men and 61 women).

The discharges were 58, of which number 43 were "recovered" and 15 "relieved."

The percentage of recoveries, as calculated on the admissions, was 31.16 (viz., 19.48 men and 45.9 women). The "relieved" comprise cases which were transferred to other asylums in an improved condition, and such other cases as were sufficiently restored, or considered fit to be sent to the care of their relatives.

The deaths were 67 (35 men and 32 women), and represent a percentage of 130 (viz., 14.83 men and 11.46 women)

of the average daily number resident, and 10:48 (viz., 11:62 men and 9:46 women) of the total number under treatment.

The General Statistics of the Asylum are as follows:— Since it was opened in June, 1865, there have been 3,261 admissions (viz., 1,734 men and 1,527 women), of whom 430 (viz., 167 men and 263 women) were re-admissions, having been certified as insane at least once previously, and sent to this Asylum. Of the 3,261 admissions, 1,052 (viz., 471 men and 581 women), or a percentage of 32'3 (viz., 27'2 men and 38'1 women) have heen discharged "recovered;" 699 (viz., 389 men and 310 women) have been discharged "relieved" or "not improved;" and 994 (viz., 632 men and 362 women) have died, leaving, as has been stated, 516 patients on the books of the Asylum on the 31st December, 1898.

Although last year's admissions were higher than during any previous year, our increase by accumulation was less than during the immediately preceding years, this being due to a greater number of discharges and a higher death-rate than usual.

By reference to Table XI., it will be observed that of the 138 admissions there were 36 cases (28 men and 8 women) of general paralysis, 4 males and 2 females were epileptic, and the majority of the rest of the cases were of an unfavourable character as regards ultimate recovery.

Table X. sets forth the ascertained causes of the insanity in the admissions, discharges, and deaths. In the admissions, domestic trouble, adverse circumstances and privation, mental anxiety and worry have contributed as causes in 29 instances, intemperance in drink in 61 instances, hereditary predisposition in 37 instances, and there were also 13 cases in which congenital mental defect was ascertained.

The death-rate has been much higher than for several past years, more especially among the female patients. Out of 67 deaths 22 (15 men and 7 women) were due to general paralysis, 9 (4 men and 5 women) to consumption and other tubercular diseases, and the average age at death was 53 years.

The general health of the patients has not been good. There have been a larger number confined to bed with serious maladies, and there has been an increase of tubercular diseases, and minor ailments have also been more prevalent, but we have had no zymotic diseases, and there has been no fatal or serious casualty during the year.

In addition to the usual Statistical Tables, which refer only to one year, that is the year 1898, I have added to this Report several additional Tables, two of which are compiled from the Statistics of the Asylum since it was opened in 1865, and the rest extend over a period of ten years, ending with the year 1898 inclusive.

Table XII. shews the admissions during each month in each year.

Table XIII. shews the age period, marriage state, total admissions, proportion of general paralytics to total admissions, total deaths and proportion of deaths from general paralysis for every year since the opening of the Asylum.

Table XIV. shews the age periods and marriage state in the cases of general paralysis.

Table XV. shews the duration of the disease in the cases of general paralysis where *reliable* information on this point was obtainable.

Table XVI. shews the ascertained causes of the insanity in all cases admitted during the past ten years, and Table XVII. the ascertained causes in the cases of general paralysis admitted during the same period.

During the past year the conduct of the attendants and nurses has been good, with one exception. A male attendant, Peter Reilly, was discharged for striking a patient with a key strap. He was prosecuted for the assault by the Commissioners in Lunacy and fined £2 and costs.

In May Dr. Shortt resigned his post as Assistant Medical Officer in order to engage in general practice, and when he left us he carried with him the good wishes of myself and the whole staff. He was succeeded by Dr. David Hunter, the Pathologist from the Lancashire County Asylum at Whittingham, and who had previously held the post of Assistant Medical Officer in the West Riding Asylum at Wakefield.

In June Dr. Penfold, from the West Riding Asylum at Menston, was appointed to fill the post of second Assistant Medical Officer, and entered on his duties on July 18th. He left us to occupy a similar post in the Northumberland County Asylum at Morpeth, on January 7th, and the vacancy was filled by the appointment of Dr. Rattray. I am much indebted to these my medical colleagues, and also to all the other officers for their continued help and aid in the management of your Asylum, and I beg to express again my sincere thanks to the Committee for their kindness and courtesy to me at all times.
