Medical Superintendent's Annual Report

FOR THE YEAR, 1869.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

In compliance with the rules, I beg to lay before you the Annual Report of the Asylum, together with the usual statistical tables. At the beginning of the year there were 191 men and 227 women resident in the Asylum, and during this period 55 men and 103 women were admitted. Of this number, 11 men and 22 women had on previous occasions been inmates here; 32 men and 39 women were dismissed as cured and 1 man and 7 women relieved. The deaths included 24 men and 31 women, leaving in the Asylum, on Decr. 31st, 1869, 189 men and 253 women, total 442. The whole number under treatment during the year was 576. The average daily number of inmates in the Asylum was 424,—186 being men and 238 women.

The recoveries were 58.10 per cent. of the men, and 37.89 per cent. of the women, both of which are taken on the annual admissions.

The per centage of deaths is calculated on the whole number under treatment during the year, and is, as follows:—men, 12.90, and women, 13.2.

On comparing the numbers with those of the previous year, it will be seen that there is a total increase of 24. The admissions this year far exceeded those of any previous one, being 25 in excess of 1868! It is somewhat curious to observe the fluctuation; there having been a falling off to the extent of two in the men, and an excess of 31 in the women, as compared with last year. Of the 31 females, 22 were chargeable to the Boroughs of Norwich and Ipswich, and were admitted under agreement; our new wards offering an increase of accommodation, of which the respective authorities were glad to avail themselves. It was considered desirable to utilize both the new wards, so that, being inhabited, they could be kept clean, aired, and in order.

The staff will require no further augmentation when these extraneous patients are replaced by others belonging to the County. In the meantime, the extra payment for the inmates belonging to these Boroughs will be remunerative.

The causes of insanity were, with few exceptions, those ordinarily met with in County Asylums, viz.—hereditary predisposition, and congenital deficiency, together with poverty, intemperance, impaired health, &c. We continue to receive several cases annually, of old people, who becoming childish, are often designated dangerous because they threaten to take away life, although the probability of their carrying these threats into execution is quite ridiculous.

The deaths, 55 in number, (24 men and 31 women,) show as nearly as possible the usual average, the only noteworthy feature being the excess of female over male mortality, in opposition to the prevailing rule. An inquest was held in September, on a male patient, who committed suicide by drowning himself whilst carrying some oars with an attendant, to the boat-house. This unfortunate occurrence, was the result of carelessness, the attendant being

aware of the patient's proclivity, ought not to have taken him without permission, or having done so, should have been more careful and vigilant. Such accidents are always to be deplored, but, considering the large number of patients in whom there is a strong suicidal tendency, and the proximity of the railroad and river, it is not surprising that such accidents occasionally happen. It is, however, satisfactory that our deaths from suicide have not exceeded one in seven years!

There have been several unimportant cases of fracture. One patient succeeded in inflicting a severe wound in his throat; he was for a time a source of much anxiety to us, owing to his restlessness and great distress of mind; the wound has healed very satisfactorily, and the mental symptoms have nearly disappeared. It seems he took a knife slily from the table at breakfast, when the attendant's back was turned, although he had not previously, whilst here, manifested any disposition to injure himself. A female patient gave birth to a girl, February 13th; the mother was at the time the subject of acute mania, and, I am sorry to say, the symptoms have in no way improved since her accouchment.

The new wards were first tenanted in September, and these have relieved us of the crowded state of the wards, generally, which had existed for several months previously. Owing to the very favourable weather which prevailed whilst the building operations were in progress, there was nothing to prevent the fulfilment of the contract within the specified time, (a rare occurrence,) and therefore no delay in the reception of patients took place. There are two spacious day-rooms on the ground-floor, the larger one capable of containing 30, and the other 22 patients. Over these, two dormitories with 11 beds each, 600 cubic feet per patient; and one with 18, 630 cubic feet per patient, and the necessary attendants' rooms. On the same floor is a water-closet, a sink with hot and cold water laid on, also a linen room, and one for brooms and pails, &c. On the ground floor are 15 single rooms; each having a space of 800 cubic feet, and one attendant's bed-room in a corridor 120 feet in

length, which is divided by two glazed partitions with a fire-place in each compartment, two bath-rooms, with a dressing-room between them, a scullery, broom and pail closet, water-closets, and a small drinking fountain. The arrangements of these wards are excellent, and offer every facility for the management of our various cases.

The escapes have been few in number, and in every instance the patient was soon captured.

During the months of March and December, there were many (including attendants, &c.) on the sick list with influenza and bronchitis. I am thankful to say, we have enjoyed a complete immunity from epidemic and contagious diseases, and with the exception of the above, the amount of ordinary sickness has been trifling. The occupations and amusements have been much as heretofore.

In conclusion, I consider it an act of justice to state, that whatever beneficial results upon which we may congratulate ourselves as regards the cure of the patients, and the general working of the establishment, we are in no small degree indebted for them to the kind and efficient co-operation of my coadjutor, Dr. Taynton, and the other officers.

The Commissioners in Lunacy inspected the Asylum in March last, and made the following Report.

NORFOLK COUNTY ASYLUM,
18th March, 1869.

Upon our visit this day, we have inspected the Asylum in its several departments, including the workshops and offices; and with the exception of one man and two women absent on trial, have seen all the patients.

We have to report the following as the changes in the patients, since the visit of our colleagues, 23rd October last, and their present numbers:—

The vacant beds, at present, are in number, 14 on the male side, and 2 on the female.

To the former may be added 10 beds now occupied by the Norwich and Yarmouth patients, who are in the Asylum only on sufferance.

Several of the female dormitories are overcrowded, an inconvenience which will be effectually remedied upon the completion of the new building for 52 women, which will, it is expected, be ready for occupation in September next.

The ordinary weekly charge is 8s. 6d., that for the Norwich and Yarmouth patients, 14s.

The staff of attendants, who appear to be efficient and kindly in their manner towards the patients, is as follows:—

In each of the six wards on the male side there are two attendants—of the two in No. 1, wherein the patients are for the most part of the working class, one is constantly in the ward, and the other has charge of the patients engaged in gardening husbandry.

On the female side, there are a head attendant, 13 ordinary attendants, viz.—two in each of the six wards, and a third in No. 4, containing about 40 patients, helpless, or requiring special supervision.

There are also two laundry maids, who have under their charge 22 patients.

In each division also there is a night attendant, the results of whose services is very satisfactory, as appears by the fact that the night before our visit, the patients who wet their beds were only four in the male division, and three in the female.

The sanitary condition of the Asylum is good; the patients last registered as under medical treatment, being 9 in the male, and 22 in the female division, several only suffering from influenza.

According to the latest ward returns, 84 male and 126 female patients are usefully employed—of the former, 28 in the gardens and on the farm, and 18 in the workshops; and of the latter, 71 in needlework and knitting, 22 in the laundry, and 7 in the kitchen.

There has not, since the last visit, been more than one instance of seclusion, and that in the case of a violent female epileptic, on one occasion.

We have to report most favourably as upon previous visits, of the personal condition of the patients of both sexes, as to clothing and otherwise, and their demeanour. No one was at all excited, and they presented generally an aspect of comfort and content.

We saw 321 patients (147 men and 174 women) assembled in the hall at dinner, which consisted of excellent beef, potatoes and rice, bread and beer, and was comfortably served. Their demeanour was most orderly.

We found the wards throughout, and the several day-rooms and dormitories, beds and bedding, clean and in most creditable order. Every means are taken, by good furniture, simple decorations, and objects of interest, to render the rooms and galleries cheerful and comfortable in aspect.

Amongst other improvements since the last visit, we have to report the papering or colouring and painting of the walls of female wards, Nos. 5 and 6, and of the large dormitory in the former.

Straw beds are in course of being rapidly disused, and replaced by hair mattresses, two male patients being constantly employed in making the latter.

Arrangements are being made for giving every female patient a fresh bath.

We have been gratified by our visit, and by the evidence afforded of the active management of the Asylum, by Dr. Hills, and of his kind and judicious treatment of the patients, in which he is efficiently assisted by Dr. Taynton.
