Medical Superintendent's Annual Report

FOR THE YEAR 1862.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

It is now a year since I had the pleasure of presenting my first Annual Report; and, as I had then held the office of Superintendent but two months, I was unable to give an account of the preceding ten, founded on my own observation. On this occasion I am personally responsible for every item of the Report. The usual statistical tables are annexed. A hundred and one patients—44 men and 57 women—were admitted during the past year. On the 31st December, 1862, there were 361 inmates in this Asylum, of whom 161 were men and 200 women.

The number of residents averaged 366 per diem throughout the year.

The admissions in the past year were fewer than in the three previous years, and equalled exactly those of 1857.

It is a subject of regret that, of the cases admitted, so large a proportion, either from age or the nature of their disorder, offer little if any prospect of recovery; and this increase of incurable patients must, of course, diminish the number of dismissals, and tend gradually to a stagnation of the institution. At the present moment there are but 7 men and 15 women whose cases present any reasonable prospect of restoration; and, of the 361 patients now in the Asylum, there are 86 whose ages vary between 60 and 80! This accumulation of chronic and hopeless cases occurs, more or less, in every Asylum, but especially in those which (like our own) are of long standing; and it is evident that it must abridge the usefulness of such Institutions materially.

An inquest was held on J. C., who had sustained an extensive fracture of the skull in a homicidal attack from a fellow-patient, who inflicted the injury with an iron spittoon. J. C. was a helpless paralytic, subject to fits, and, nevertheless, strange to say, recovered from the local injury. He died from exhaustion consequent on epilepsy, and a verdict was given in accordance with these facts.

In January of last year the Asylum was visited with small-pox, which, fortunately, attacked only a few of the inmates; it broke out on the male side and extended to the female wing; only two men and three women were affected, and one of each sex died; with the foregoing exceptions the deaths, which show a decrease on the rate of mortality, have arisen, in most cases, from the ordinary forms of disease met with in these institutions. In May last 40 patients, belonging to the City of Norwich, were removed to the Infirmary Asylum.

There is an abundant supply of amusements, occupations, and periodicals for the patients. A brass band has been formed by the attendants, and the proficiency they have attained, in a short time, is highly creditable to them: they perform at our fortnightly winter entertainments in the dining hall; during the summer, in the airing grounds; and at all other times when required. These agreeable diversions are highly appreciated by the patients.

Two detached buildings are now completed, one for each side of the establishment; these were designed as hospitals for infectious cases, and the need of such buildings was keenly felt at the late outbreak of small-pox. When not required for this particular purpose, they will prove extremely useful as a means of isolating our more noisy and refractory patients. These fireproof wards cost £750, which is a very reasonable sum for the accommodation of 20 patients, being only £37 10s. per head.

The Commissioners in Lunacy inspected the Asylum in April last, and made the following Report.

“Of the patients who were discharged 65 were recovered.

“Most of the deaths were from ordinary causes; but during the months of January and

“February last five cases of small-pox occurred, which in two instances terminated fatally. At

“the present time the Asylum may be considered in a very healthy state, the invalids being nearly

“all old feeble cases. We only found three men and two women in bed, in the Infirmary, and

“there were also two men in bed in their own rooms.

“ We have made the usual inquiries respecting the attendance of the patients at chapel, and
 “ with reference to the numbers who are occupied.

“ From the record kept by the Chaplain, it would appear that the general average number of
 “ patients present in chapel on Sundays and week days is somewhat larger than during the past
 “ year. The last Report for the 25th of March was as follows:—

“ The Sacrament of the Lord’s Supper is also administered four times a-year, and about 30 or 35
 “ patients communicate.

“ A daily summary is kept of the reports made to the Superintendent by the Ward Attendants,
 “ which affords much valuable information as to the general routine of the patients’ lives.
 “ Amongst other things it appears that about 80 men and 130 women are regularly and usefully
 “ employed.

“ The reports of wet and dirty cases for the last few nights give an average of eight men and
 “ five women.

“ The use of mechanical restraint is extremely rare, but since our last visit two patients have
 “ been subjected to it. In one case for surgical reasons, and in the other on account of great
 “ violence and suicidal propensities. We were much pleased with the general state of the
 “ patients at the time of our visit. They were, almost without exception, quiet and orderly in
 “ their conduct, and personally in a most satisfactory state. We saw them at dinner in the hall,
 “ where, excepting about fifteen patients of each sex, all the inmates were present; but the utmost
 “ order and decorum prevailed.

“ The dinners were very good and ample, and properly served.

“ The wards were throughout clean and well ventilated, and presented a very cheerful and
 “ comfortable appearance, as they are well furnished, and all of them contain the means for various
 “ occupations and amusements.

“ We learn that balls are held regularly once a fortnight, and that lectures, magic lantern,
 “ and other entertainments are provided. A band is also in course of formation. It is proposed
 “ gradually to carry out the suggestions made on former occasions, as to blinds to the windows,
 “ sun-shades in the airing courts, and the planting of trees. Many of the baths have been
 “ improved, but some of the bath-rooms are deficient in ventilation, and require attention. Wool
 “ and hair are gradually superseding the straw used for bedding. There are now in the house 175
 “ men and 198 women, and one woman is on leave, thus leaving 15 vacant beds on the male side
 “ and five on the female side. The patients belonging to the City of Norwich are now 41 in
 “ number. The contract existing between the County and City is for 45 patients terminable at a

"month's notice. We noticed a small number of patients who were approaching convalescence, but the Asylum contains a large proportion of chronic cases. We have much pleasure in again bearing testimony to the excellent condition and management of this Asylum, which, under the management of Dr. Hills, has evidently been improved in many respects, and is now in a state of great efficiency. The medical case books, which are kept by Mr. Bacon, the Assistant Medical Officer, are very creditable to his skill and assiduity.
