Medical Superintendent's Annual Report

FOR THE YEAR 1864.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

As Medical Superintendent of this Asylum it is once more my duty as well as my pleasure, to draw up the usual Annual Report. These Reports dealing as they do with statistics and results, rather than with details, must of necessity have a certain sameness and dryness about them, which render them very uninteresting to all persons unconnected with such Establishments.

The general impression appears to be, that Insanity is incurable, as the disease frequently relapses. The malady almost invariably arises from debility; now as many of the patients, on being discharged, return to hard work, still harder fare, and the anxieties attending the support of their families; can it be wondered at, that all these debilitating influences acting upon a nervous system so recently out of tune, should cause a relapse? I consider that,

cæteris paribus, Insanity is not more likely to recur than other diseases: in other words, it obeys the same laws as they do in the matters of causes—predisposing and exciting, prevention, cure, relapses, and the like; so that, just as a person who having from exposure to damp and cold, induced an attack of Bronchitis, or Rheumatic Fever, may after recovery, renew these diseases by a second exposure, so may an insane man, on his recovery and discharge, induce a fresh attack of Insanity by exposure to its causes—whatever these may have been—and become again an inmate of an Asylum; but (most unreasonably and unfairly) whereas a general Hospital would get the credit of curing the bronchitic or rheumatic patient twice, the Lunatic Asylum would have to bear the opprobrium of being powerless to cure at all! as though, forsooth, Insanity, of all diseases, was the only one to be cured outright and for ever! How illogical and absurd to suppose that God's laws should not hold good for Insanity as well as other diseases!

From all this it will be at once evident that our re-admissions are very frequently, as in general hospitals, equivalent to new cases, and by no means to be set down as proofs of imperfection in the treatment of Insanity—as blots and stigmas upon our Asylums! Nevertheless, it must be admitted that, as in hospitals, so in Lunatic Asylums, we prefer six fresh cases to the same case six times over, and in both establishments the frequent change of patients—like the constant renewal of blood discs in animal bodies, or like free trade in nations—is their very life and soul, by conferring the greatest amount of health and happiness upon the greatest possible number.

By the majority of the public, an Asylum is regarded merely as a place of custody and security for those who are incapable of taking care of themselves, or who have been proved to be dangerous to themselves or others; this is not perhaps to be wondered at, since before the lunatic can be admitted into an Asylum, it has to be certified that he is dangerous, or unable to discriminate between right and wrong. Considered however in its proper light, an Asylum is an Hospital for the treatment of mental disease, but adapted to

meet the varied and special requirements of individual patients. I regret to say there is generally great difficulty in obtaining from those who accompany the patient, satisfactory information as to the duration and cause of the attack; and it is no less paradoxical than true, that the patient's nearest relatives are oftentimes the very persons who withhold important facts relating to hereditary predisposition, suicidal tendency and the like.

The average daily number of patients in the house was 380; on the 1st of January of this year there were 383, and out of these only 19 men and 23 women offered the slightest prospect of recovery! The admissions have been 8 in excess over last year, and, as usual, of these there were many worn down by age and long-standing cerebral disease; the *re*-admissions during the year have been more numerous, being 26 as compared with 16 the preceding year.

There were three idiots admitted; these unfortunates are decidedly unfit objects for County Asylums, their association with insane adults is more or less pernicious to them. I hope to see the day when each County will deem it expedient to provide itself with an Asylum for its pauper idiots.

It will be seen on referring to the table, that the recoveries during the past year were 48.21 instead of 45.19 as in the previous twelve months. We have many chronic lunatics, and their demeanour too frequently demonstrates the necessity of asylum superintendence; the number of such who could be removed to Unions is small. The greater number of the deaths are the result either of disease contracted before admission, from which the patient soon sinks, or are attributable to a breaking up of the constitutional powers caused by senility, but more frequently to a general atrophy of the brain and nervous system. An inquest was held in March last on a female patient, who committed suicide by hanging; she had been recently admitted, and, from the history furnished by her sister who accompanied her, as well as the total absence of suicidal tendency, I saw no reason for adopting any preventive measures; this is the only death from suicide that has occurred in this Institution for seven

years: the constant apprehension of such accidents in a certain class of patients, by no means small, renders their care a matter of great anxiety. On referring to the obituary for the last twenty years, I find the deaths from suicide has averaged one in seven years. The sanitary condition of the Asylum has been, on the whole good, and I have again the pleasure to report that there has been no disease of an epidemic character. The employment of the patients has been carried on much as heretofore—about 77 men and 112 women being, on an average, usefully occupied in various ways, as will be seen by reference to the table which is an extract from the daily employment book. The statistical tables will be found as an appendix to this report.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The Commissioners in Lunacy inspected the Asylum in April last, and made the following report.

"Norfolk County Asylum, 22nd April, 1864.

"In the course of our official visit this day, we have seen every patient "now resident, and inspected every part of the Asylum. The general "condition of the Establishment and its inmates was highly satisfactory. "The wards were all in the best order, and furnished with comfort and neat"ness, and the patients were, without exception, free from excitement. No "one was secluded, and it appears from the register that since our last visit "cases of seclusion have been very rare—Restraint is never employed.

"Every care seems to be taken to provide occupations and amusements "for the patients, all the clothes and shoes are made on the premises, and, "by the labour of the men, a sufficient supply of vegetables is raised for the "use of the Establishment. The land, however, is insufficient to afford "constant employment to the full number of patients who might be "beneficially and profitably occupied in spade labour. We are glad to learn "that the Committee of Visitors are prepared to rent more land, whenever "an opportunity may occur for so doing.

"The arrangements for the performance of Divine Service are the same "as usual. The Chapel has recently been painted and improved in "appearance. The result of night attendance on the patients continues to "be highly satisfactory, and we find, from the returns which are made daily, "that, on an average, only three beds on the male and two on the female "division are wetted. The proportion of straw beds is still large, but a "quantity of horse-hair has been purchased, and new mattresses are being "made as fast as the resources of the Establishment will allow. The staff "of attendants and nurses is sufficient, and they appear to be kind and "judicious in their treatment of the patients. Dr. Hills is entrusted by "the Committee with full powers for the engagement and discharge of all "servants and attendants—an arrangement which has evidently worked "very satisfactorily.

"We saw the patients at Dinner, which was served in the Wards, owing "to the Hall being under repair. The food, consisting of meat pies, was "very good, and evidently quite satisfactory to the patients. It should be "observed that solid dinners, including meat, are given every day, by reason "of which very little "extra diet" is necessary. The present weekly charge "for county patients is 7s. 6d. Although there are many old and feeble "cases, the general health of the inmates is good—and we found but few "patients in bed. The mortality, since our last visit, in May, 1863, has

"been somewhat above the average, but many of the patients who died were very aged persons. Within the above period 24 men and 26 women died, 48 men and 51 women were admitted, and 23 men and 24 women were discharged. The numbers now in the house are,—males 170, females 202. There are, besides, 1 male and 1 female patient absent on probation, leaving 40 vacancies on the male and 28 on the female division.

"We are glad to report that the Asylum continues to be in a most "satisfactory and creditable state."
