Medical Superintendent's Annual Report.

FOR THE YEAR, 1866.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

I beg to submit the usual Annual Report of this Asylum, accompanied by statistical tables, which are now in conformity with those recommended by the Medico Psychological Association. It is only by the adoption of a uniform system in all the Asylums that statistical data can be made available for future deductions. One subject well worthy of our study, is that of relapses of Insanity, and their relative frequency, as compared with those of more strictly corporeal maladies; another, the topography of Insanity or the connexion between certain counties, or districts, and particular causes and forms of the disease. On the 31st of December, 1866, there were in the Asylum, 168 males, 204 females, being 3 less of the former, and 7 of the latter, and shewing a diminution of

10 in the Total, as compared with the corresponding period of 1865. The admissions during the year have been 43 males, 66 females, Total 109. During the months of July, August and September, the number of female patients was higher than it had ever reached, viz. 226.

The discharges during the year were 21 males, 53 females, Total 74. The recoveries have been unusually numerous, viz. 56.93 per cent. of those admitted! This surpasses any previous year, and is a fresh demonstration of the importance and advantage of early treatment, and of the folly of delay in obtaining admission for patients in the early stage of Insanity, whereby their chance of recovery is materially lessened, whilst that of their becoming Chronic lunatics, permanent residents, and lasting burdens on the Union, is correspondingly increased; since in the Asylum the mental faculties become blunted through disease and the want of that salutary exercise and excitement which occupation, wages, and self-maintenance afford. The chronic inmate finds himself well fed and clothed, without any effort of his own, and surrounded by all the conditions favourable to a prolonged existence, he becomes almost dead to the outer world, loses all interest in, and compassion for, his relatives, and sinks to the lowest scale of the animal kingdom.

Six patients were discharged relieved, and transferred to the care of relatives who were in a position to afford them proper attention. The deaths have been 45, viz. 25 males, and 20 females. I am pleased to be able to record such a low rate of mortality, it being only 11.83 per cent. of the average number resident. We have enjoyed a singular immunity from ordinary sickness during the year, which in this respect will contrast favourably with the previous one; the explanation of this gratifying fact may possibly be found in another, viz. the extraordinary rain-fall of 1866, for it is now admitted that those years are *cæteris paribus* the most healthy, in which the rain-fall is at its maximum. The mean daily number resident during 1866, was 174 males, 215 females, Total 389. We have had no case in which an inquest was

necessary. No important accident has occurred during the year, only one of fractured rib, and another of both bones of the forearm in an Idiot boy. There have been very few escapes, and considering the liberty which all more or less enjoy, and the facilities which exist, the only wonder is, that such occurrences are not more frequent! vigilance on the part of those entrusted with the patients is our greatest safeguard. I am anxiously looking forward to the time when we shall possess more land, a great desideratum, because, amongst our inmates are many agricultural labourers, a large proportion of whom could then be profitably employed. I am happy to state that, during the year, there have been very few changes in our staff, and, considering the very trying duties that fall to the lot of the attendants, it is highly gratifying to be able to say they deserve the confidence that is placed in them. I am pleased to add, I have always received the cordial co-operation of the officers, which has, of course, materially lightened my personal labours.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The Commissioners in Lunacy inspected the Asylum in May last, and made the following report.

"NORFOLK COUNTY ASYLUM,

25th May, 1866.

"The patients on the books of this Asylum are now 391 in number. Of these 174 are men, and 217 are women. We have this day examined them all, except 1 man and 2 women, who are away on probation, and we have

“to report very favourably of their general condition and management. They
 “were remarkably free from excitement, and presented a cheerful and con-
 “tented aspect, no complaints were made to us.

“We have made the usual statutory inquiries, and have received satisfac-
 “tory replies. The visitation by the Committee is regular and frequent,
 “and the Institution is evidently under careful and judicious management.
 “The staff of attendants appears to be adequate, and both males and females
 “are of a respectable class. The entire control of all servants in the Asylum
 “is most properly left with Dr. Hills. No instrumental restraint is employed
 “here, and the instances of seclusion since the last visit only amount to 13.

“The report which we have received as to the occupations and amusements
 “of the inmates is generally the same as on former occasions. The average
 “number of patients usefully employed last week was 89 of the male, and 109
 “of the female sex.

“All the clothing and shoes are made in the asylum, with the assistance of
 “only two paid tailors and one shoemaker; seven patients working at the
 “former, and five at the latter trade; the majority of whom were taught these
 “trades since their admission.

“All the vegetables including potatoes are grown on the land. With regard
 “to the performance of Divine Service, we have no change to report, the
 “average numbers attending on Sunday in the chapel being 108 Men, and 161
 “Women. We saw the patients dining in the Hall and were pleased to observe
 “their orderly demeanor, and healthy appearance.

“We found the various Wards clean and cheerful, and throughout, well pro-
 “vided with means for occupation and entertainment. Several of the rooms
 “have recently been newly papered, &c.

"The beds were very clean, and the attention given to the patients during the night has reduced the number of wet and dirty beds to a minimum.

"Since the visit of our colleagues on the 20th of March last year, 126 patients have been admitted, 62 have been discharged, of whom, 56 were recovered, and 60 have died ; of these, 28 were men, and 32 were women.

"The general health is good. Ten men and twenty-three women are registered as being under medical treatment, and we noticed in the infirmaries, some old and feeble cases. Many patients are still sent here in very weak bodily health, from the various workhouses, but Dr Hills reports some little improvement in this respect, and it is believed that cases of Insanity are sent somewhat earlier than formerly.

"In conclusion, we have again to report very favourably of the general management of this Asylum.
