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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF  
MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1865.

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The Committee must give the first place in their Report for the year 1865 to the expression of the regret with which they announce the death of the late Medical Superintendent, Dr. Wing. He had been at the head of this Asylum for nearly six years, and had ministered to the afflictions of its inmates with great kindness, and with a medical treatment which the large amount of recoveries fully proves to have been most successful. The failure of his health had deprived the Asylum of his services from November, 1864, to September, 1865, when he retired. He died at Hardingstone, on the 17th day of December.

During part of that time the care of the house devolved upon Dr. Williams, the House Surgeon, until the month of July, when, owing to his untiring and unsparing exertions, which were so greatly increased by the breaking out of small-pox among the patients, his health, also, was so much impaired as to make it necessary for him to resign his post. That resignation, and the cause of it, the Committee can never cease to regret.

Upon his retiring the charge of the house fell upon Mr. Snook, who had been acting for some time as Assistant House Surgeon, and with his care, skill and kindness, the welfare of the patients, and the conduct of the house, was attended to, to the entire satisfaction of the Committee.

Feeling, however, that the responsibility of so large a number of patients was greater than ought to be thrown upon one man, however able, the Committee applied to Dr. Francis and Dr. Webster, who kindly undertook to visit the Asylum daily, and every day one of the Physicians devoted two or three hours to the medical care of the patients.

The post of Medical Superintendent has been filled by the election of Mr. Bayley, late Medical Superintendent of the Shrewsbury County Asylum, and that of House Surgeon by Mr. Hingston, who had been House Surgeon to the Yorkshire North and East Ridings Asylum. Mr. Bayley entered on his duties in December, 1865; Mr. Hingston in January, 1866.

As a full statement of the Accounts is given in the Tables attached to the Report, it is unnecessary for the Committee to say more than that they show a satisfactory financial condition.

The real surplus has been much reduced in figures by the large outlay that has been made for increased accommodation for the

patients. A new building has been completed for 50 men, and will soon be occupied, and afford the means of great improvement in classification, particularly among the private patients.

The profits of the year were further reduced by the building of a temporary hospital for small-pox cases, to the amount of £210. This hospital was built and made fit for the occupation of patients in the short space of four days, and it is but just to the Secretary to say that this rapid execution of the work was due to his design and superintendence. All those afflicted with the disease were at once removed to the building, which happily had the effect of preventing the breaking out of any fresh cases. The cost of this hospital, and the new building for 50 men, and other work done, amounts to £2,293, which has been paid out of the annual income.

The subject of an establishment of a school for the care of idiot children in connection with this Asylum has had much consideration from the Committee this year, and much information has been obtained.

The purchase of additional land on the western boundary along the Billing-road has also been considered, but no agreement has at present been come to for that purpose.

As it was found to be very difficult, indeed hardly possible, so to arrange the apartments of the Superintendent in the house as to give them the privacy and comfort necessary for Mr. Bayley's family, the Committee offered him the cottage, which, with additions and alterations, it is believed will satisfy all requirements. An investigation into the financial returns of the cottage, or ladies' house, showed that the views with which it had been set apart for a first-class ladies' house upon high payments had been entirely disappointed.

The dining-room lately used by Dr. Wing has been added to the rooms occupied by the gentlemen in the Asylum. The drawing-room is given to the House Surgeon for his room and office, and the sleeping-rooms on the first floor have been fitted up for the reception of the ladies who lately occupied the cottage.

We cannot conclude this Report without expressing the deep obligation which the Committee are under to Mr. Terry and Mr. Mash for their valuable and gratuitous exertions during the continuance of the small-pox. Also, as regards the conduct of the officers of the Institution ; it has been to them, and to all of us, a year of severe trial and difficulty, and we have the satisfaction to state that in every department the utmost attention has been paid, and the greatest exertions made, to overcome difficulties, and to minister to the care and comfort of the patients. The attendants and servants during the year have been more than usually diligent and well conducted in the discharge of their responsible duties.

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There is no Medical Report for the year 1865, as the present Medical Superintendent did not enter upon his duties until December.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

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MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

During the course of the past year, both of the medical officers, with whom I was first associated, have yielded to the pressure of sickness, and relinquished their posts. Dr. Wing has since died. I ask your permission to record that both Dr. Wing and Dr. Williams were much loved by the patients, and were deeply regretted.

In the early part of the year the outbreak of small-pox added greatly to my anxieties. As the patients were not allowed to meet, even in chapel, I offered to give an extra service in the wards, and so long as the epidemic continued I had three services every Sunday.

The Sunday and daily services have been regularly performed, I hope I may say, with benefit to the patients.

To the practising of singing for the services of the chapel, we have given Thursday afternoon throughout the year. I have attended personally to give instruction, and great progress has been made, but we have been continually checked, and are now quite brought to a stand-still, by the old and worn-out organ. As, however, I brought this matter under your notice last year, I do not dwell upon it now.

The school has been conducted in accordance with your desire. Experience has proved that it is dangerous to overtask the brains of our recovering patients, so that I cannot boast of much result in this department. I can, however, state with pleasure, that your wishes have been my law, and that I have continued, and do still continue, this school, but under circumstances of great discouragement.

The circulation of books and periodicals has occupied much of my time. It may be that I attach too much importance to this means of consolation, but I have been so impressed with the necessity of keeping the wards well supplied, that I have done my utmost to accomplish this purpose. You will, I rejoice to say, find a minute made by the Commissioners of Lunacy, expressing their satisfaction with the result. Of course there is great wear and tear, and I shall almost immediately ask you for another grant of money to buy books.

I have daily and regularly visited the wards, reading with, praying with, and consoling the sick in their separate rooms; also reading to the patients assembled in the day rooms of those wards which are quiet.

I have given lectures, and sung to the patients, as well as taken my part, whenever called upon, in the out-door amusements. More than usual of this employment has fallen to my lot during

the past year, owing to the illness of those who were accustomed to arrange the recreations.

Generally, I hope I may say with truth, but with a deep consciousness of my shortcomings, that I have not been neglectful of my afflicted charge. Many of those who, in God's providence, have been restored to their right minds, and have returned to their homes, have been immensely aided by the cheering influence of religion ; and to this fact they themselves, if asked, will, I am sure, bear willing testimony.

Many are the difficulties against which an Asylum chaplain must always struggle. It is hard to induce those whom the world calls sane to bow before the throne of God in the day of their trial ; how much harder to instil such lessons when ministering to a mind diseased ! I pray you, therefore, to continue to extend towards me that assistance and forbearance which I have always hitherto received at your hands.

## APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION.

Prior to sending a Patient into the Lunatic Asylm, it is very desirable that a communication should be made to the Medical Superintendent, who will furnish the Applicant with the Forms required under the Acts of Parliament.

Patients chargeable to Parishes in the County of Northampton are admissible on the production of proper Forms, provided there be room in the House, which should be previously ascertained.

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## TERMS OF ADMISSION.

The Terms for Board, Lodging, Washing, Medical Advice, Medicines and all other necessaries, Wine and Clothing excepted, are from £1. 1s. to £3. 3s. per week, according to the accommodation desired, and must be paid quarterly in advance. In special cases, requiring extraordinary attendance and accommodation, terms higher than the above may be proposed. All arrangements are subject to the approval of the Committee, at their next meeting; or the Committee may, in instances where they think proper, reduce the above rates.

For any further particulars, apply, either personally or by letter, to the Medical Superintendent.

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As the Friends of Patients may sometimes find it difficult to procure a proper person to conduct them to the Asylum, an experienced attendant will, on application, be provided.

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
