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

THE REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

FOR THE YEAR 1868.

Another year's Report of the Committee of Management will confidently assure the Directors and the public of the continued good conduct and success of our Lunatic Hospital.

Attention is invited to the Report of the Medical Superintendent, where many particulars and statistics are given of the numbers treated, of the cures, and average rate of deaths, and

general healthiness of the house.

A statement of a trial of separate and systematic treatment of Idiot Children will command much attention. This system it is intended to carry out as soon as room can be obtained, by new buildings and arrangements. In order to obtain this room for the better classification of patients, lunatic and idiot, and for the increasing number of County Patients, considerable additions are proposed to be made by raising a third story on the two-storied parts of the building. These additions will probably be spread over two or three years, and are to give, ultimately, 200 new beds and four day rooms, at an estimated cost of, say £3,000.

A sum of £2,623. 13s. 5d. has been laid out during the last year in new buildings and alterations, the principal one being the House of the Superintendent, which has been occupied since August last.

The average number of Pauper Patients daily employed on the

Farm, and in Workshops and Laundries, has been 152 Men out of 180.
155 Women out of 180.

The change of Officers which has occurred during the past year, and the long-continued illness of the Secretary, has thrown a great increase of work and responsibility on the Superintendent, and the Committee desire to acknowledge Mr. Bayley's most able, willing, and successful exertions to keep all departments of the Hospital in order and efficiency.

The Chaplain, in his Report to the Committee of Management, stated that, during the whole of the time he had officiated in the Chapel, the good behaviour and attention of the individuals forming the congregation had been fully equal to what he had ever witnessed in any Parochial Church. That their great attention to the service had frequently been manifested by the appropriate remarks made to him on the sermon, and that he was much gratified in being able to say that the permission to attend the Sunday and daily Services in the Chapel was regarded by very many, perhaps by most, of the patients as a valuable privilege, of which they were anxious to avail themselves; for time after time much dissatisfaction had been expressed to him by several of the patients when it had been necessary to refuse their going.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I beg leave to submit to you the Annual Report of

the Medical Superintendent.

On January 1st, 1868, there were in the Asylum 224 males and 225 females, making, with 1 male and 2 females absent on trial, a total of 452. Of these, 38 males and 51 females were Private, and

187 males and 176 females were County Patients.

During the past year 57 males and 53 females, total 110, have been admitted; of these, 18 males and 4 females were Private, and 39 males and 49 females were County Patients. Sixty-one have been discharged; of these, 5 males and 6 females were Private, and 25 males and 25 females County Patients. One male and 2 female Private, and 25 male and 20 female County Patients have died. The number of Patients who have been under treatment during the year amounts to 282 males and 280 females, total 562.

The average number resident has been 447. There were remaining in the Asylum on January 1st, 1869, 226 males and 227 females, total 453, an increase of 1 as compared with the corre-

sponding period last year.

The total number of admissions during the year (although less by upwards of 30 than in 1867) is quite up to the average of the preceding years; the number of applications for admission of Female Private Patients has been remarkably small, while the number of the same class admitted on the Male side has been unusually large. The total number of Private Patients admitted has, therefore, been about the same as in former years. The average number of the Private Class resident, 88, has been higher than in the two preceding years.

Of the 61 discharges 46 had recovered, 12 were sufficiently well to return to their friends, and 3 had not improved; of these latter one had been admitted on an informal certificate, and was discharged to be re-admitted, and the other two were transferred to

other Asylums.

There is nothing connected with the death-rate of the past year calling for special notice; the chief causes of death have, as usual, been diseases of the brain, phthisis, and old age. I am again fortunate in being able to report that there has been no death from suicide, and that no accidents of a serious character have occurred.

Three inquests have been held. In the first case M. L., a Female County Patient, was in a dying state when admitted on March 9th, and died a short time after. From the evidence given at the inquest it appeared that the woman had been a patient in the Infirmary, and was removed to the Hardingstone Union, from whence (having been certified to be insane) she was brought here; a post mortem examination made by Dr. Barr revealed extensive disease of the lungs, and a verdict of death from natural causes was The second case was that of an epileptic boy, H. C., who was found dead in his bed, having turned over on to his face when in a fit; a verdict of death from epilepsy was returned. In the third case a Female County Patient, J. L., died suddenly shortly after going to bed. She had been suffering from an attack of acute mania, but seemed to be recovering; a post mortem examination proved that apoplexy was the cause of death, and a verdict to that effect was recorded.

Reference to the Weekly Medical Report shows that 11 male and 46 female patients have been secluded during the year for periods varying from half an hour to 21 days. This, as compared with the former records of this Asylum, appears to be a very large number, and requires some explanation. It used, I am told, to be customary only to return those as secluded who had been placed in their rooms for occasional violence or temporary excitement. All other cases, including recent admissions, patients suffering from acute mania, epilepsy with violence, &c., were returned as "sick and in bed," although they were locked in their rooms; now it is a rule, strictly carried out, that if a patient is placed in a single room, with the door locked, whatever may be the cause, whether sickness, violence, or excitement, even if the time does not exceed a few minutes, a verbal report must be immediately made to one of the Medical Officers, and the case is entered as one of seclusion. In many of these cases the lock of the door is turned merely to keep other patients out of the room who would

annoy and irritate the sick or feeble. It was found necessary on one occasion to tie the arms of a lady to the side of her bed; she had injured herself, and would not allow the surgical appliances to remain on; but this is the only case of restraint that has occurred.

Three females and five males have escaped. The women were none of them away more than a few hours. In the case of the men two were absent the night, one for three days, one seven days, and the fifth was not brought back, having been secreted by his friends until after the time allowed by law for his recapture.

The general health of the patients during the year has been good. One idiot child sickened with scarlet fever in the autumn, and the Assistant Medical Officer also suffered from the disease,

but fortunately it did not spread through the house.

The average number of patients employed has been—males 152, out of 226 or less; females 155. The men were occupied chiefly as farm and garden labourers, tailors, shoemakers, upholsterers, carpenters, masons, painters, smiths, &c. The women were principally employed in the laundry, kitchen, and at needlework, &c.

The attendance at Chapel has been large, the building being

generally filled.

Much has also been done in the School, especially on the female side, where several young girls have learned to read and write, and many adult patients, whose education was very imperfect on admission, have improved before leaving the Asylum.

Weekly Dance every Thursday. Average attendance-Males,

35; Females, 55.

In June last, with the sanction of the Committee of Management and the Commissioners in Lunacy, and with the approval of the Relatives of the Patients, a party, consisting of 11 Gentlemen and 12 Ladies, with six Attendants, under the supervision of the Assistant Medical Officer and Matron, spent a month at Lowestoft, where a house had been previously taken for them. The trip appears to have been much enjoyed by the Patients, and nothing of a disagreeable character, such as that which happened on a

former visit to the Welsh coast, occurred to mar the pleasure of the

holiday.

Good progress has been made in the additions and improvements which were sanctioned at the commencement of the year. Among others, I may mention a three-story building projecting from the centre tower on the male side, containing, on the basement, a general bath-room for county patients; on the ground floor a boot-room and a bath for recently admitted cases; on the second floor a bath-room for private patients, and a scullery adjoining the private patients dining-room; and on the third floor a dormitory for nine beds, and also a wide stone staircase reaching to the third story. On the female side an ironing-room and a large drying-closet have been built adjoining the laundry.

The stone staircase on the female side of the front building has been removed and re-built nearer to the centre of the House. The kitchen has been much altered, and entirely re-arranged, the steam boilers and the scullery being quite separated from the cooking kitchen, which is now light and airy, and free from the clouds of steam and disagreeable smells which used to be so much

complained of.

It may be interesting to those Directors who are endeavouring to establish a School for Idiots in connection with this Institution to know the result of the endeavours which have been made to improve the condition of those idiot children who are now in the Asylum.

Until the beginning of the past year it had been the custom to place idiot children in the lunatic wards amongst the other patients, and to treat them as ordinary lunatics. Having heard a great deal about what had been done at Earlswood and other Institutions of a similar character, I could not help feeling that some attempt ought to be made to improve the mental condition of the children placed under our care, and with this view I selected seven, three girls and four boys, whose ages ranged between 4 and 11, and placed them in a large room, which was fitted up as a nursery, under the charge of a nurse, whom I chose for the purpose, having noticed her kindness and attention to the children beforehand. To assist the nurse I selected two patients, a young imbecile, but good natured girl, and an old woman who had taken to one of the children when first admitted. The result of the experiment will be best explained by giving a slight history of some of the cases from the time of admission until now.

1. R. I., a male, aged four years, son of labourer, stated to have been an idiot from birth, but gradually getting worse. His mother states that she can do nothing with him; is obliged to watch him day and night; that he breaks anything that comes in his way; puts his hands in the fire; she is both obliged to tie his hands and to tie him in bed. On admission he was found to be in a very dirty state, and emaciated; his habits were dirty; he was unruly and noisy; he could not feed himself, but eat his food greedily; he appeared to understand what was said to him, but could not speak. He is now clean, and has improved in health and condition; his habits are clean; he is obedient, docile, and quiet; he sleeps in a bed by the side of the nurse; sits up to the table and feeds himself with a

spoon; he is still unable to speak, but understands all that is said

to him, and is easily taught to do anything.

2. F. F., male, aged 11 years, son of a labourer. On admission he was in feeble health, and in poor condition, but appeared to have been well attended to; he could not speak, and did not appear to understand what was said to him, but sat constantly in a corner with his legs crossed like a tailor, biting his hands and uttering a short shrill cry; he eat his food greedily, seizing it with both hands, and cramming his mouth full; his habits were dirty, and he was destructive, tearing his bed-clothes, &c. He is now in good health; takes his food sitting at the table, and feeding himself with a spoon; is not dirty in his habits, and can speak a few words; does not sit about biting his hands; is generally employed unpicking dresses, which he does most carefully, taking out each stitch separately without tearing the dresses. He scrubs out the pantry every morning, doing it well and properly, lays the cloth for meals, sets the plates and mugs, and makes himself generally useful.

3. G. H. W., aged 5 years, son of a labourer, idiot from birth, subject to epileptic fits. When admitted he was in a filthy state, covered with vermin, and his clothes were in rags; he was very feeble and emaciated; the lower bowel was protruding, forming a tumour as large as a man's fist. He could not speak, did not appear to understand what was said to him, and was almost always crying. Now he is a fine, strong boy, healthy looking, has much improved in his habits, sits up to the dinner table with the other children, and is fed with a spoon; is still unable to speak, but understands a great deal that is said to him; the condition of the bowel has been cured, but his case cannot be considered hopeful, as he still suffers severely from epileptic fits.

In all the other cases there is improvement, especially in the

health, bodily condition, and habits of the children.

The changes in the staff, caused by the resignation of the Assistant Medical Officer (Mr. Hingston) and of the Chaplain (Rev. S. C. Haines), the long and serious illness of the Secretary and Steward, the alterations and additions going on in sevaral parts of the building, have all tended to increase the responsibility of my position, and have added much to my ordinary duties, but it has been a great relief to me to feel, during this time, that I had to assist me a staff of Officers and Servants in whom I could place confidence, and who performed their duties in a most satisfactory manner.

In concluding this Report, I would beg leave thankfully to acknowledge the kindness and consideration which I have at all times received from the Committee of Management.

Per Gallon.

Tea—1 oz. of tea, 3 oz. of sugar, and $\frac{1}{2}$ pint new milk. Coffee—3 oz. of coffee, 5 oz. sugar, and $\frac{3}{4}$ pint of new milk.

Per Pound.

- Meat pie—2 oz. uncooked meat, 12 oz. uncooked potatoes, 5 oz. flour, with dripping.
- Irish stew—2 oz. meat, 10 oz. potatoes, seasoned with pepper, salt, and onions. The liquor of the previous day's boiled meat is added to the Irish stew.

EXTRAS FOR INDUSTRIOUS PATIENTS.

Female Patients employed in the Laundry, the workers on the Farm, Artizans, Ward and Household Helpers, have four ounces of bread, one ounce of cheese, and a pint of beer extra, daily.

Tobacco and Snuff are also allowed to Industrious Patients.

Wine, Porter, and Extra Diet are allowed to the Sick at the discretion of the Medical Superintendent.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.

Weekly Allowance per Patient.

Males.—6 lbs. uncooked meat, 7 lbs. uncooked vegetables, 7 lbs. bread, 12 oz. cheese, $10\frac{1}{2}$ pints of beer, 8 oz. butter, 2 oz. tea, 8 oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ pint new milk, pudding four times a week, fish, poultry, and fruit when in season; besides extra diet if required.

ATTENDANTS .- Same allowance, except fish and poultry, with the

addition of 3½ pints of beer.

Females.—4½ lbs. uncooked meat, 7 lbs. uncooked vegetables, 5¼ lbs. bread, 12 oz. cheese, 7 pints of beer, 8 oz. butter, 2 oz. tea (or 1 oz. tea and 4 oz. coffee) 8 oz. sugar, 1½ pint new milk; pudding four times a week, fish, poultry, and fruit when in season; besides extra diet if required.

NURSES .- Same allowance, except fish and poultry.

RULES FOR THE ADMISSION, VISITING,

AND

DISCHARGE OF PATIENTS.

Applications for the Admission of Patients, or for information regarding the various rates of payment at which Patients are received, must be addressed to the Resident Medical Superintendent, from whom may be obtained printed forms of the papers necessary to be completed and signed before the Patient can be received into the Hospital, and all other information required as to the means of conveying the Patients.

The papers above-mentioned are as follow:

- 1st. An order for the admission of the Patient to the Hospital, signed by one of the Patient's relatives or friends.
- 2nd. Certificates to the effect that the Patient is of unsound mind, signed by two qualified medical practitioners, who shall have separately visited, and personally examined, the Patient.
- 3rd. An obligation for the regular payment of the Patient's board and expenses, signed (unless otherwise specially agreed) by a responsible person, who shall also bind himself, in case any cause arise to render residence in the Hospital objectionable, to remove the Patient within one calendar month after notice to that effect shall have been given by the Committee of Management, and, in case of death, to remove the body, or defray the expenses of the funeral.

These papers being duly filled up, the Patient will be received into the Hospital.

The terms of admission vary from £2. 2s. to £4. 4s. per week, according to the circumstances of the case.

These terms may be reduced after the first Quarter, if the friends of the Patient prove, to the satisfaction of the Committee of Management, that they are not in a position to afford so much.

The terms include board, lodging, washing, medical advice, medicines, and all other necessaries; clothing, and wines and spirits only excepted. Terms to include the latter items may be proposed.

One quarter's payment is made at the time of admission, and the payments are afterwards made quarterly and in advance. The Committee do not bind themselves to make any return of payment on account of the first quarter.

The friends of Patients are invited to satisfy themselves of the condition of their relatives, and the treatment they receive, by making frequent visits to the Institution.

Patients may be visited on any day, except Sunday, between the hours of Ten and Twelve, or Two and Four.

If the friends, or those who are security for the board, wish to remove a Patient, they shall give five days' notice in writing to the Medical Superintendent.

With every Patient a supply of suitable clothing must be brought to the Hospital, together with an Inventory of the same, and of any other property left with the Patient; and when a Patient's clothes are worn out or destroyed, they must be renewed as often as necessary by the person responsible for the Patient's board on notice to that effect being given, and should such notice not be attended to, the Medical Superintendent may order the clothes necessary for the Patient, the expense of which shall be charged to the next quarter's account.

The utmost attention and care are exercised in the classification of the Patients, according to their habits and different degrees of mental aberration. Ample means of amusement and occupation are provided, and every method resorted to for the amelioration of the condition of the inmates. The utmost liberty, consistent with safety, is permitted, and carriage exercise provided daily for those requiring it.

Divine service is performed twice every Sunday in the Chapel, and prayers are read each morning by the Chaplain, who devotes the whole of his time to his duties at the Hospital.

A Library is provided for the use of the patients, containing publications of a cheerful and instructive character.

The Institution is pleasantly situated in a healthy locality, within a short distance of the Town of Northampton.
