MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

The termination of the year 1856 did not maintain the hope expressed at the beginning of it; that the time had arrived when a more equal balance might be maintained between the admissions of Patients and their discharges. The number of Insane Inmates of the Asylum again increased. The admissions which were 102 in 1855 were 119 in 1856. The discharges, from all causes, which had been 98 were in 1856 no more than 91. Leaving an apparent increase of 28 persons. They were not all however resident in the Asylum at the same time. The highest number resident on any day in the year showed

an increase of 24 persons over any former period. The increase on the average of those daily resident was 18.

Of the 119 Patients received, so large a proportion as one third—41 persons—had been in this or other Asylums previously, being 15 above the average of five years.

The number of persons who had been both discharged and re-admitted at this Asylum within 12 months was not increased.

The increased number of Patients sent to this Asylum by the Visitors of other County Asylums, is an evidence of the pressure of numbers in those Asylums. The number chargeable to Parishes in other Counties who are resident here, is as large as the number sent home to us; the migration of servants, and artizans or labourers, must be nearly equal to all Counties in proportion to their populations. The removals to their own Counties becomes expensive, especially as they generally on recovery return to the Counties from which sent.

It has happened within the year that a Female Patient was discharged whose Parish, the settlement being gained by marriage,—was at a great distance from her husband's residence or her own friends. She refused to return with the Officer who came for her, and accepted of casual assistance to go to her husband.

The health of the Asylum was unusually good in the earlier months; the mortality on the year was as low as 7½ per cent. of the whole number resident. The discharges on recovery, being equal to 40 per cent. on the number admitted, maintained the usual average.

Of three Coroner's Inquests, two were held on the bodies of Patients who had died of apoplexy, the third was on a Female Patient who had committed suicide by hanging. She had by some unknown means possessed herself of a cord, which had been in use as a sling by which the workmen throw their basket of tools over their shoulders. It is not known how she ever had access to the means of getting such a weapon. The number of workmen employed has been great in all parts of the Asylum, while the alterations have been in progress. The suicide was committed early in the afternoon.

Attempts at escape have been not less frequent. The activity and determination of a young sailor who is now in the Asylum, affords an example and has been an incitement. He makes his attempt while walking round the grounds in company with his attendant, depending on his agility in the race, and aptness to take advantage of an accident for the success of his effort. In such a race the man who takes the first advantage with an equal, is likely to maintain it. The system of responsibility of the Attendant and non-restraint of the Patient is much shaken on the occurrence of such trials.

The conduct of the Patients generally has been of increased orderliness, begetting more trust from the Attendants. The number of seclusions has been much less then in former years, which I attribute to the good condition of health of the Patients in the Asylum, and to the condition of the incoming Patients, as well as to the temper of the

Attendants. It would be unjust to them not to mention the high praise they have received from competent judges.

All the accommodation intended to be given by the new Buildings and Works is not yet perfect. Additional space was, however, afforded from the commencement of the year. On the Female side of the Asylum it was much needed; and, subsequently to the occupation of the new Wards, it has been already noticed, that the bedroom accommodation is small for the large number of women. On the Male side of the Asylum, the opening of the new Infirmary Ward, enabled me to commence an innovation which excited the special attention of the Committee of Visitors; not simply as a check on what was uncustomary or untried; but to receive expressions of anxiety for its success, and warm approbation of the effort. It was in the adoption of a system of Female Nursing for the sick Male Patients. The Infirmaries of this Asylum are more roomy than is, I believe, usual. They receive all the incoming Patients, and generally retain for the whole term of residence all those who are likely to recover, or to need continued hospital treatment; they, also, receive all the sick and failing from other wards. They consist of a Paralytic Infirmary, a Simple Infirmary, a Convalescent Ward, and at right angles to these a Probation or Admission Infirmary. Female Nurses take charge of the line of building constituting, on the first floor, the three former wards; the fourth is in charge of Male Attendants, it is occupied by the patients whose characters are, by recency of admission, unknown; and by Patients, whose conduct and violence in sickness, require that they should be placed in it. As the Female Nurses gain confidence they extend a willing assistance to the inmates of that ward.

There is now engaged a staff of six Female Nurses, of whom one is in rotation absent, for her own house duties, one day in each week. A similar rotation of absence is allowed on Sundays. They are mostly married women who reside in the neighbourhood. None but Male Attendants sleep in the Male Wards; the night-duties are performed by men; and the Male Attendants take the ordinary duties of the bath and the razor. The Head-Male Attendant has especial charge of the

Infirmaries and the most recently admitted Patients. His presence in the Infirmaries contributes to the maintenance of prompt submission on the part of all the Patients; but it has been seldom requisite that he should interfere. The system has been eight months at work. As yet it progresses with a growing satisfaction; and is a success. It has not been productive of an increase of expense. The general management of the Asylum has not varied from the system of forbearance, which has been efficient in former years.

It appears to gain an increasing confidence, and willingness, on the part of Patients to bear and forbear towards each other. When, therefore, it is reported, as has again been the case of a very large County Asylum, that the non-restraint system has been unequal to the management of all its Patients; the success of the system of forbearance here becomes an object of congratulatory report. The visitors have seen, from time to time, instances of violent and unruly dispositions of Patients; they have also known of great persistence in threatening violence; and, in some degree, of the anxieties which have occasionally

ruled the house for a period. The greatest difficulties are of unfrequent occurrence, we can have no foresight of the form or occasion of their recurrence; it is enough therefore to report their continued non-existence, and confidence in the forbearing habit of all parties in the Asylum.

The alterations which have been in progress throughout the year, are now so far advanced that the contractors have little on their hands. Much, however, remains to be done, which will need the consideration of the Visitors. Contractors for the buildings are not expected to leave their work in a finished state for the peculiar requirements of an Asylum. The sufficiency of the Kitchen and Laundry apparatus, and the completion of the more extensive airing Courts will call for their attention. The condition of the Locks, and other objects of repairs will also be brought to their notice.




