TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

GENTLEMEN

On the first of January of last year, the Asylum contained 510 Lunatic Inmates; of whom 228 were Men and 282 Women. On the 31st of December, the Asylum contained the same number of 510 Inmates, namely 232 Men, and 278 Women.

The Visitors had however, in the interval,

* RULE 25—[of the General Rules of the Asylum.] The Superintendent shall submit to the Committee of Visitors, at their first meeting after the Epiphany Quarter Sessions annually, a Report in writing, of the general condition of the Asylum, and the number and character of the Patients; distinguishing the numbers who have been received and discharged as cured; the number of re-admissions; the number employed, and in what manner; the deaths which have occurred in the preceding year, and also the total number of discharges, cures, and deaths since the opening of the Institution, and specifying the sexes in each statement; with such other facts as the Superintendent may think desirable, or which the Visitors may have suggested.

availed themselves of an opportunity of transferring to the Asylum at Powick 14 additional Female Patients.—The increase therefore, during the year, of the number of Patients, was 14 ; namely 4 Men and 10 Women. The daily average number of Patients in the Asylum in the year 1867, was 232 Men, and 275 Women (total 507). In the previous year, (1866), the average was 221 Men, and 262 Women (total 483).

The number of Patients received in 1867, (including those who were re-admitted, and the Patients sent from the Criminal Asylum on the expiration of the terms for which they had been sentenced),—was 77 Males, and 84 Females, (total 161); and against this there has been a decrease, by Discharges and Deaths, of 73 Male, and 74 Female Patients ; (total 147).

The number of Patients belonging to the Littlemore Asylum, who are now in other

County Asylums, is 119.—The total number therefore, under the charge of the Littlemore Visitors, is now 629;—whereas that number was, in the course of the last year, 776; and of these the number likely to be discharged upon recovery, does not exceed 50. The Patients whose recovery is probable, are those who were admitted shortly after being attacked; and if it prove that 35 of the Patients in the Asylum on the last day of 1867 are discharged as recovered, by the end of 1868, it will be a favorable result.

There appears to be but little prospect of the current number of Patients being less than at present. And the especial call, at this time, is for the accommodation of Male Patients now crowding the Asylum; and their number being soon to be increased by the return of the Patients who were

temporarily transferred to the Buckinghamshire Asylum in 1859.

The condition of the Asylum throughout the year 1867 was good as regards the health and tranquility of the Patients. And the mortality was not great. It is necessary however, to discriminate between the Patients who have been temporarily transferred to other Asylums; the condition of Patients in the Littlemore Asylum; and the state of those Patients who were brought into the Asylum in the course of the year. Now of the 75 Littlemore Patients who were in the Asylums for the Counties of Dorset and Buckingham, all are reported as being in a satisfactory condition. And of the 46 Female Patients who were in the Asylum for the County of Worcester, two died; whilst the remainder are satisfactorily reported of.

It may be observed that the Patients sent to other Asylums, though selected fairly, were principally taken from the more chronic class.

The number of Patients discharged last year, was as large as in former years.—It contained however, a larger proportion of Patients who had been long in the Asylum.—The number of re-admissions has been consequently increased a little by the return of Patients who could not be satisfactorily retained in their home districts. Of 27 Patients who were received (having been in the Asylum previously), 5 Men and 4 Women (total 9), had received their discharges within a year of the date of their return.

The accidents which have occurred in the Asylum to Patients in the year, are of a severe form as regards four Patients. W. C., (a Male Patient) repeated an habitual injury, breaking his arm by falling in an Epileptic Fit. M. A. G., (a Female Patient) similarly broke her leg. Both these Patients (though very difficult to manage, in con-

sequence of their being frequently subject to fits), recovered from their injuries.

G. R. and M. C. (two aged and decrepid Patients), injured themselves by falling, and accelerated their decease by the consequences. On these two cases Inquests were held. They were the only Inquests held in the year. M. C. aged 73, (received 21st February 1867), was restless; wandering to go to Church; heard herself called by imaginary voices; and was failing in health. On the 15th of August she fell, on getting out of bed. The bone was broken in the right Hip joint. After ten days she died; and the Coroner acquitted all parties of blame. G. R., aged 77, (received 1st June 1867), was asthmatic and bronchitic; also restless and anxious. On the day following his admission he got out of bed, attempting to watch an object; when he fell and fractured

the bone in the left Hip joint. And in 48 hours, he died. Upon the Inquest the Coroner exculpated every one connected with the case.

The circumstance which most affected the Inmates of the Asylum during the year, was the illness and resignation of the Rev. E. W. R. Pulling, who had been Chaplain of the Asylum during the whole period of their remembrance of the Institution. His strict attention, punctuality, and unremitting kindness, had endeared him to the many persons in the Asylum who were peculiarly sensitive to the gratification of meeting a cheerful Friend. And the Patients (to manifest their gratitude), originated, and the Attendants effected the presentation to Mr. Pulling of a Memorial of their feelings.

On the occasion of my presenting this, my last annual Report, the Visitors will, I am sure, allow me to thank them for the kindness and consideration I have uniformly received at their hands. I am fully sensible that any success which I may have achieved in the management of the Asylum, has depended on the support and kindness of the late and present Chairman, and Vice-Chairman, and of the successive Visitors who have constituted the Committee for so many years. No individual Member of that Committee can feel more strongly than I feel the value of their united approval, or of the confidence they have been wont to repose in their Officers.

There is also due from me a hearty acknowledgment of the ready attention I have always received from those with whom I have had to co-operate; and of the kind

spirit of forbearance which has been displayed by the Attendants and others in the execution of the onerous duties which devolve upon them.
