TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

GENTLEMEN

On the first of January 1868,
 the Asylum contained 510 Patients ; (232

* RULE 25.—[of the General Rules of the Asylum]. The Superintendent shall submit to the Committee of Visitors, at their first meeting after the Epiphany Quarter Sessions annually, a Report in writing, of the general condition of the Asylum, and the number and character of the Patients; distinguishing the numbers who have been received and discharged as cured; the number of re-admissions; the number employed, and in what manner; the deaths which have occurred in the preceding year, and also the total number of discharges, cures, and deaths since the opening of the Institution, and specifying the sexes in each statement; with such other facts as the Superintendent may think desirable, or which the Visitors may have suggested.

Males, 278 Females). The admissions during the year, 148; (of whom 31 were re-admissions); namely 57 Males, 91 Females. The discharges, on recovery, 55; (20 Males, 35 Females). The deaths 47; (17 Males, 30 Females), being under 8 per cent. The total number of Patients under care during the year was 658. There remained in the Asylum, December 31st, 213 Males, 277 Females, Total 490. Of the Admissions, more than one third of the Patients had been Insane a month previously to their removal to the Asylum, and many were advanced in years, (the oldest 85); and in a hopeless condition of mind and body, (32 Paralysed). The chief causes of death were Paralysis, Phthisis, and Senile Decay. One death occurred, in the year, at Powick; and one at Charminster. In March the Visitors made arrangements for 20 additional Beds for Females at Charminster, and 30 for Males at Fisherton House, Salisbury. The removals took place in April.

The average number daily resident has been 220 Males, 271 Females, Total 491. The increase of the year is 33, (11 Males, 22 Females), owing to decrease in Discharges and Deaths. Two Inquests were held during the year upon Epileptics found dead,—one on the morning of the 2nd of June, the other on the morning of the 18th of October. The Jury returned a Verdict in both instances that “The deceased died from Asphyxia, having turned on their face in a fit of Epilepsy.” One female took advantage of a foggy morning to escape, while going to the

Laundry. She was convalescent, and I learned that she arrived safely at home the same day. The usual time was allowed before she was entered "Discharged."

The general health of the Patients has been good, no Epidemic of any kind having occurred.

Seclusions refer to 3 Males and 4 Females, and are, with the exception of 1 Male, for short periods. No accidents of a serious character have occurred. Bruises by falls during Epileptic seizures have not been frequent.

The retirement of MR. WILLIAM LEY from the Office of SUPERINTENDENT, which he held since the opening of the Asylum in 1846,—has been severely felt throughout the Asylum, involving, as it did, the loss of a kind and sympathising Friend, as well as a judicious Adviser.

The drainage and utilization of Sewage is still a question of great moment, (especially in the valley of the Thames). It is due to Mr. LEY to record, that his engineering skill, and advanced ideas upon this subject, have rendered the Sewage of the Asylum applicable to all parts of the extensive garden, and converted a barren, hungry soil, into a very fertile garden, without the Sewage being, at any time of the year, a nuisance.

The Rev. H. M. S. Walters, the Chaplain of the Asylum, (who retired in June), has been succeeded by the Reverend SAMUEL PARIS HILL, and he has shewn his interest in the spiritual and moral welfare of the Insane in a way to give general satisfaction.

Mr. WILLIAM JOSEPH MARSH came into residence in July, as Assistant Medical Officer, and it is due to remark that he is diligent and regular in the performance of his duties.

Great satisfaction has been given by the addition of Currants to the suet pudding, and Potatoes to the meat pies and puddings. The addition of three new vegetable Boilers, and the enlargement of the Scullery, will, when completed, greatly facilitate the working of the culinary department.

The introduction of Gas, for lighting the Asylum, has been looked to with excitement and delight. Mr. Stephenson, whose system of Ovens in preference to Retorts has been adopted, has performed his work within the specified time; and comparatively little inconvenience has been experienced during the process. The comfort and increased cheerfulness of the Wards, since the completion of the works, are the universal theme.

Occupation of the Patients is steadily and perseveringly encouraged. Amusements are given once a week; certain additions have been made to the Library; and the Periodicals are circulated through every Ward and changed every week.

The necessity of increased accommodation for Patients must again be brought to the attention of the Visitors. Mr. Ley, in his Report for 1866, wrote, "This Asylum, when exceptionably full, is considered to receive 220 Males and 280 Female Patients"; so that, at the present rate of increase, the Asylum will be "exceptionably full" in four months hence.

The important duties incident to the Steward's and Housekeeper's departments continue to be satisfactorily performed. And great credit is due to the head Attendants, and to those under them, for the cheerful manner in which they have performed their duties and for the discretion and forbearance shewn by them in trying emergencies.

The usual Statistical Tables required of the Medical Superintendent, are appended; as are also the Tables prepared by the Clerk and Steward.

In conclusion I have to thank the Visitors for their kind consideration and support throughout the past year.
