TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

GENTLEMEN,

The review of the year 1863, within the walls of the Asylum, does not invite much notice. The pressure for the accommodation of Patients was felt in it, as in former years. In this year however, it was not that the Patients, brought to it from the Unions to which they were chargeable, could not be received. It was that the rapid increase of Buckinghamshire Patients in the Asylum at Stone occasioned the

* RULE 25—[of the General Rules of the Asylum.] The Superintendent shall submit to the Committee of Visitors, at their first meeting after the Oxfordshire Epiphany Quarter Sessions annually, a Report in writing, of the general condition of the Asylum, and the number and character of the Patients; distinguishing the numbers who have been received and discharged as cured; the number of re-admissions; the number employed, and in what manner; the deaths which have occurred in the preceding year, and also the total number of discharges, cures, and deaths since the opening of the Institution, and specifying the sexes in each statement; with such other facts as the Superintendent may think desirable, or which the Visitors may have suggested.

return of all the Female Patients, who were chargeable to Parishes of Unions within the Counties of Oxford and Berks, and had been sent there by the Committee of Visitors of this Asylum. Notice was also given for the removal of some of the Male Patients, with an intimation that the ability to retain the remainder was uncertain.

The Patients who were in the Bethnal House Asylum on the first of January remained there on the thirty-first of December. They had been all visited, and seen by Members of the Committee of Visitors, as well as by myself. The Superintendent of that Asylum could not receive the Female Patients who were about to be removed from Stone.

The arrangement subsequently made for the transfer of thirty Female Patients, to the Asylum for the County and City of Worcester at Powick, temporarily, was not carried into effect within the year 1863; or until the sixth day of the ensuing January.*

Although of the total number in the Asylum in 1863 there was an increase of Males 5, Females 8, (total 13) over the total number in the Asylum in 1862; the balance of numbers Dec. 31st 1863 showed an increase of 8 Females in the year and a decrease of 5 Males, being a total increase of 3 in 1863.

The Visitors who compare these Returns with those of the Commissioners in Lunacy are likely to find a discrepancy as regards the total numbers of the admissions into this Asylum, and of the Discharges, the difference being that the Returns of the Commissioners relate to the numbers in the several Asylums in England. The Returns which I make to the Visitors relate to the Patients, chargeable to Unions in these Counties, who have been received and remain in their care. The Patients at Stone and Bethnal House are of the number chargeable in these Counties, and are charged to the Visitors of the Littlemore Asylum.

Of the re-admissions in 1863;—a Total of 9 Patients, 4 Males and 5 Females had been

absent less than 12 months; and 15 Patients, 8 Males and 7 Females had been absent for longer periods. The removals from other Asylums were of 5 Males and 6 Females, (total 11) and 2 Males and 2 Females, (total 4) had been previously discharged from other Asylums.

Three Criminal Lunatics have been sent here by orders of the Secretary of State.

The Discharges, 84, have been more numerous than in former years. They include 5 Female Patients who were sent to the Asylums for the Counties to which they were chargeable, and a Male Criminal who is absent by escape; who ranks as discharged by length of absence, but is liable to be received again, as the Order of the Secretary of State continues in force until he has himself discharged it. The discharges of J. H. and W. B., who escaped, are also included. W. B. was afterwards sent back to the Asylum with a fresh order for his admission.

The Mortality, the (total number of Deaths—
57 being little more than 8 per cent of the

whole number of Patients under charge in the year,) is not excessive. The proportion—40—which fell among the Male Patients is attributable to the accumulation of Paralytic and Epileptic Patients. It is the largest number of Patients of one sex who have died in the Asylum in any year; and it usually happens that the death rate is higher among the men than among the women. The Coroner has held Inquests on four Patients, all men. On G. C. died apparently from his head being thrown off his bed, in a depending position, during a fit of Epilepsy. On T. M. died apparently by his turning on his face in a Fit. On W. E. who died of Fever, aggravated by Fracture of the ribs. And on W. I. who had, previously to his admission and while suffering under fever, committed an act tending to suicide; but which, it is believed, would not have occasioned his death, had he not had Ulceration of the throat of a more serious character than the wound he inflicted.

The injuries occurring to Patients in the Asylum have been few, and not of such importance

as to need mentioning. There were as many as three Patients admitted within six weeks, each of whom was noticeable for an incised wound across the throat. In each case it had happened that the wound was inflicted before the Patient was brought to the Asylum. One Patient J. A. had long suffered from disease of the elbow joint. It became necessary to remove the arm. Mr. Hester, the consulting Surgeon of the Asylum, performed the operation, and the Patient has done well subsequently.

I might lengthen my report, and say much on the subject of the pressure felt in the Asylum for the want of office accommodation, as well as of the wants in the wards, but the Visitors would feel that my doing so would be ill judged when they have already expressed an opinion on that subject. I will only add that the number of Patients employed in the cultivation of the garden has been greater than in former years; that there is a greater extent of land in cultivation; and the complaints of the Gardener of the want of Store room for his roots,

and seeds are not diminished. The Visitors will be subject to many complaints of the want of accommodation, and when the opportunity offers that complaint will probably be made with effect.

The usual Annual Account of the Clerk of the Asylum accompanies this Report.
