TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

GENTLEMEN

At the close of the year 1863 an arrangement was made with the Visitors of the Asylum for the County of WORCESTER (at POWICK), for the reception of 30 Female Patients from Littlemore. The Asylum had been recently enlarged, and would afford this extra accommodation probably for at least three years. The removal of the Patients was effected early in January 1864. The Journey by Rail to

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\* RULE 25—[of the General Rules of the Asylum.] The Superintendent shall submit to the Committee of Visitors, at their first meeting after the Oxfordshire Epiphany quarter Sessions annually, a Report in writing, of the general condition of the Asylum, and the number and character of the Patients; distinguishing the numbers who have been received and discharged as cured; the number of re-admissions; the number employed, and in what manner; the deaths which have occurred in the preceding year, and also the total number of discharges, cures, and deaths since the opening of the Institution, and specifying the sexes in each statement; with such other facts as the Superintendent may think desirable, or which the Visitors may have suggested.



Worcester and by Carriage to POWICK was much enjoyed ; and the Party were hospitably received on their arrival. The several Attendants were much pleased with what they saw of that Asylum, and left their Patients with a satisfactory feeling as regarded the care and comfort that awaited them.

The relief afforded to the crowded state of the Female Wards of the LITTLEMORE Asylum has been fully sufficient throughout the past year. Although the number of Female Patients received into the Asylum in the year has been in excess of the usual number, (it having been exceeded in one year only), there have been, at no part of 1864, less than 13 beds available for the use of additional incoming Female Patients, if they had been needed. The average number of Female Patients in the Asylum in 1864, was 259. It had amounted in 1863 to 275.

The average number of Male Patients resident in the Asylum in the year 1863, had been 212 ; in 1864 it was 219 ; the number for whom



accommodation is calculated being 220. The Wards were considered to be full during the whole year; but, in November, five of the Patients, (out of fifteen who had continued at STONE), were sent back to this Asylum.

Negotiations have been opened with the Visitors of the Asylum for the County of DORSET,—(at CHARMINSTER), on the recommendation of certain Visitors of the Littlemore Committee who had carefully inspected the plans and arrangement, of that recently built and newly fitted Asylum; and who had expressed their approval of it. The Dorsetshire Asylum consists partly of a new Building to be appropriated to the use of Pauper Patients, and partly of an old Building repaired and fitted up for the use of poor Patients,—not strictly Paupers. Both Asylums are under the care and management of the Visitors and Superintendent of the County Asylum. Accommodation for 25 Male and 25 Female Pauper Lunatics, has been offered to the Committee of the Littlemore Asylum at a moderate rate of



charge,—and the Visitors of the Dorset Asylum ask that the arrangements proposed should not be delayed. They are also willing to receive from Oxfordshire and Berkshire, Patients who are not absolutely Paupers, at a reasonable rate of charge, upon security being given for payment of the cost of maintenance.

The number of Patients chargeable to the Visitors of the Littlemore Asylum who are now in other Asylums, is as follows :—

At STONE 10, and at BETHNAL HOUSE 6 Males; total 16. At POWICK 30, and at BETHNAL HOUSE 23 Females; total 53. (combined total 69.)

The admissions into the Littlemore Asylum in 1864 were 72 Males, and 79 Females; total 151. Of these Patients 2 Men and 4 Women had been discharged within twelve months of their re-admission; 8 Men and 16 Women had been in the Asylum at more distant periods; 8 Men and 5 Women had been discharged from other Asylums; 3 Women were removed from



other Asylums, being chargeable here; 4 Men and 1 Woman, (Criminals), were sent by order of the Secretary of State. Of these 4 Criminal Male Patients, 3 had resisted the Authorities, and the orders of the Gaols from which they were sent; (one a Soldier, by violence and personal conflict; and the other two by refusal of Food); the fourth Man and the Woman threaten more active failure of health than either of the others, although they had, by their behaviour, gained a previous character of Insanity. Three of the Criminal Patients who had been Inmates of the Littlemore Asylum were removed to BROADMOOR, the Government Asylum for Criminal Lunatics. There are now at Littlemore six Male and four Female Criminal Patients.

The discharges from the Asylum during the year have consisted of 28 Males and 36 Females on their recovery, (total 64); and of 4 Males and 5 Females who were either relieved, or to the care of their Friends. The Visitors have, throughout the year, manifested anxiety that



Patients should not be detained in this Asylum whose Friends could find them an independent or proper support elsewhere. The propriety of Patients being allowed to be taken care of in the Union Work-houses of the District to which they are chargeable, (after being sufficiently recovered), has been acted on by the Visitors.

It has not been made known that any Union House has been approved by the Visiting Commissioners in Lunacy, as being made fit for the reception of Chronic Lunatics, according to the conditions which the Commissioners have declared to be indispensable.

The health of the Patients collectively has, during the year, been ordinarily good; yet the mortality has been as great as in any former year. 35 Men and 35 Women (70 Patients) died in the Asylum in the year; and 4 of the Patients who had been sent to Powick, also died. The mortality fell on the Chronic Patients mostly. The number of Patients who



were received in a dangerous state of illness was not greater than usually occurs.

The notice of the death of every Patient in the Asylum has been given to the CORONER, according to the requirements of a recent Act of Parliament. He has consequently held Inquests on the Bodies of three Male Patients, who died under Epilepsy ; and, on one Male Patient, who, being very much exhausted by Paralysis and Epilepsy, died while at Breakfast. The death was so rapid that it was scarcely apparent whether Apoplexy stopped the passage of his Food ; or whether a Cough stopping the passage of food caused Asphyxia.

A Female Patient, (E. U.) had been received into the Asylum after a recent confinement, and having puerperal Fever. She was in a very exhausted condition, and died in six days after her admission. The Notices, which were then usual, were sent severally to the Friends of the Patient, to the Coroner, and to others officially. The Friends of the Patient, acting on the



notice, immediately sent for and removed the Body of the Deceased. The Coroner courteously complained of this, and contended that the Bodies of Patients, dying in the Asylum ought not to be removed before time were allowed to him to inquire as to the circumstances of the death of the Patient. I considered, however, that, except under very exceptional circumstances, I could not refuse to deliver the Body of a deceased Patient to the Friends who had received the notice of death ; and I referred the question to the Committee of Visitors. The Visitors consequently made an order that, to allow time to the Coroner to institute enquiries and decide as to the holding an Inquest ; the removal of the Body should not be permitted prior to the third day after the death of a Patient. This order does not interfere with the original Rule of the Asylum, that the Body shall be buried on the fourth day from the decease, if not previously sent for. It has always been the wish of the Visitors that the Bodies of deceased Patients should, whenever practicable be removed to the Parishes from



which they have been sent to the Asylum. And complaints have been recently renewed of the great increase of interments in the Littlemore Parish Church-yard, consequent on the increased number of Inmates and Deaths at the Asylum. Of the 70 Patients who died in the Asylum in in 1864, 50 were buried in the Littlemore Church Yard; 20 only, being removed by their Friends.

A Female Patient, (P. W.) was received into the Asylum on the 7th of January. She had been living in service; had been fetched home by her Friends in consequence of the great change which was observed in her; and was sent to the Asylum on the Certificate of the Medical Man who was called in to see her. He certified of her incoherent conversation, her distressed looks, and hesitation in her speech, Nothing was known of how long she had been in that condition, or of its cause. She became distinctly worse soon after her admission into the Asylum, and was supposed to have had a Fit which impaired the use of one side. On



the morning of the 5th day after admission she, (having been in the mean time in bed and treated for her febrile condition with cough), was examined more minutely as regarded the little use of the left Leg. It was immediately evident that there was fracture within the Hip Joint of the neck of the Thigh Bone. The imperfect use of the left Shoulder had been reported by the Nurse ; but she denied it and threw off her bed clothes with it. It subsequently appeared to be partially dislocated forwards, and was easily reducible and as easily dislocated. On being asked how the injury to the Hip Joint occurred, she denied any injury and said that she had had Rheumatics in it for some time. An inflammatory condition of the left Lung was developing itself. The absence of all previous history, and the occurrence of such a serious condition in the Asylum, made me feel that the allowing the case to be hidden in the secrecy of a Lunatic Asylum was inconsistent with my position. I therefore summoned the consulting Officers of the Institution to see the case ; and the Friends of



the Patient to see her and meet the Visitors at their ensuing Meeting. The Visitors appointed a Committee, (including the Magistrate who ordered the admission of the Patient), to enquire into the circumstances of the case. That Committee reported, on the 18th February, as follows :—

The Committee appointed to enquire into the case of P. W. beg to report that they examined Mr. Ley the Superintendent, Mr. Sankey the Clinical Assistant, Mary White the Head Ward Attendant, Charlotte Hollowell the second senior Attendant, and Harriet Ward the Attendant of the Ward in which P. W. was placed, and are of opinion that there is not the slightest blame to be attached to any person connected with the Asylum: and that every proper attention and care have been given to the case. The Committee are not able to determine whether the Injuries she had received occurred previous to or after her admission to the Asylum, but

they are strongly of opinion that the Injuries both to the Hip and Shoulder, had occurred previously, and that from her extreme restlessness they were again injured after her admission. The Committee have also examined E. V., the Son-in-Law of P. W., in whose house she had stayed nine days before her admission to the Asylum, and did not observe in her any inability to walk. From his evidence it appears that she was very infirm, and, on three occasions, was known to fall suddenly and without apparent cause.

The Committee have had the advantage of the assistance in their enquiry of the Rev. R. L. B., the Clergyman of the Parish to which P. W. belonged.

This Patient died on the 19th of March, after being ten weeks in the Asylum.

The following notes of the *post mortem* examination are entered in the Case Book. Present—Dr. Tuckwell, Mr. E. L. Hussey, Mr. Ley, Mr. Sankey. “The Lungs appeared to be extensively Emphysematous. The Ribs uninjured. The right Lung had consolidation by the gravitation of Blood from Bed-lying, was impervious to air, and sank in water. The left Lung similarly affected,—a former Inflammation appeared to be subsiding. The Membranes of the Brain were slightly thickened. The Ventricles distended with Fluid: blue blood predominated. The left Shoulder had sub-coracoid dislocation. The Muscles atrophied by long inaction. The Head of the Humerus had formed for itself an artificial socket; and the surrounding parts had adapted themselves to the changed condition. The anterior edge of the glenoid cavity was absorbed, and the natural, and artificial sockets were continuous.

“The left Hip Joint was examined. The



“Muscles were fatty; a Fracture had existed, dividing the Trochanters and Head of the Femur into three or more parts. These parts were united by ligamentous union, admitting of slight motion. There had been no bringing together of the fractured portions of Bone, into their natural position (probably impossible to have been done) and the Femur was much shortened and disfigured, This injury appeared to have been of more recent date than the dislocation of the Shoulder.”

On reporting this case to the CORONER he replied that, as a Committee of Magistrates had already made an enquiry into the circumstances of the case, and there was no additional evidence of how, or when the injuries were received, and as those injuries appeared to have been incurred at some place not within his District; and, as the cause of death appeared to be Paralysis, and Disease of the Lungs, he was not called upon to hold an Inquest.

A Female Patient, M. P., aged 74, fell in



the front Airing Court, apparently from stepping on an uneven surface. She had fractured the neck of her Thigh Bone within the Hip Joint. The accident occurred on the 28th of July; and it was immediately attended to. Considering the age of the Patient; and that she had been for some time wasting, and changing from robustness to the decrepitude of age, her treatment was directed to the maintenance of her general health rather than to the restoring a perfect use of the Limb. She never suffered pain; and, after a few days, was daily moved into the open air. Her progress was most comfortable. So much so, that in the early part of November she felt the confidence to rest on her foot, whilst walking with the support of two Nurses; and, before Christmas, she had the confidence to walk a distance of 20 yards without any assistance.

The other accidents which occurred in the year, were fractures of the arm to one Male, and one Female Patient. The Man fell in a Fit of Epilepsy and broke his arm in the

Fit. The recurrence of Fits, and the repeated injury to the unsound bone, became sources of much difficulty.

The Total number of Patients under the charge of the Visitors in the year 1864, was 698; being one Male Patient less, and eleven Female Patients more, than in 1863.

I append the TABLES which usually accompany this REPORT, and have added one which shews the number of Patients who have been received from the several Bodies of the Asylum Union.

The Accounts of the Clerk of the Asylum also accompany this REPORT.
