

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

GENTLEMEN

The number of Patients received into this Asylum in the year 1866 was in excess of any former year since the period of the first removal of Lunatics from other Asylums to it.

67 Male, and 89 Female Patients, (total 156) were received in the year. The highest previous number had been in the

year 1857; when 70 Male, and 83 Female, (total 153) Patients were received. In each case the excess was in the number of Females received.

Of the Patients received in 1866, the re-admissions were of 9 Men, and 13 Women, (total 22); of whom 3 Men and 3 Women had received their discharge from the Asylum within twelve months from the date of their being returned.

The Discharges on Recovery or Relief consisted of 21 Men, and 32 Women; and of one Male Patient, who was much improved and probably would have been discharged at the next Meeting of the Visitors had he not effected his escape. The total number of Persons discharged, was 56.

The health and condition of the Patients throughout the year, was good. Of 726 Patients under charge of the Visitors in the

twelve months, 27 Men and 26 Women died in this Asylum, and 2 Women in the Asylum at Powick—(being a total of 55 Persons).

In the Spring of the year, the Visitors, to relieve the fulness of the Male Wards, effected an arrangement with the Visitors of the Dorsetshire Asylum; and eight Male Patients were sent, in April, in addition to the number previously sent to that Asylum. The relief was sufficient for the time. The subsequent increase in the number resident in the Littlemore Asylum has however,

placed the Visitors in the repeated difficulty of finding additional accommodation for Patients of both sexes.

This Asylum, when exceptionably full, is considered to receive 220 Male and 280 Female Patients. The numbers in the Asylum on the 31st of December 1866, were 228 Males and 282 Females.

As regards the accommodation for Female Patients, there is a probability of 15 additional Patients being sent to the Asylum for the County of Worcester; the Contract with the Visitors of that Asylum (which is now expiring), being proposed for renewal for the reception of 45 instead of 30 Female Patients. The difficulty of finding room in other Asylums for Men, has been greater.—The increase in the number of Pauper Lunatics in other Counties has occasioned crowding in almost all of them; and the Metropolitan Licensed Houses are now full with their

superabundant Patients. That condition is likely to be relieved, at no distant period, by the opening of Asylums which are nearly complete. In the meantime I have needed to repeat an expedient to which I resorted while the Buildings of the Littlemore Asylum were not yet ready to receive the Patients who were otherwise without the Asylum accommodation intended for them; namely, crowding, with additional precautions.—At that former period no inconvenience resulted to the health of the Patients, although complaints did occur of difficulties in the way of cleaning, and in the maintenance of the usual order of the Establishment. The period for which this crowding existed, was of limited duration; and, during the interval, the progress of the additional Buildings and the furnishing of them, were within the direct cognisance of the Visitors.

The proposed new Asylum for the County of Berks is as yet far from being in an

advanced position; and the period at which it will afford its relief to Littlemore, is more distant.—The advance of the arrangements for providing the Berkshire Asylum, is however, so positive,—that the certainty of it receiving a large number of the Patients, now at Littlemore, may be calculated on as a known resource in prospect.

The resort to temporary expedients appears more justifiable as the promise of permanent relief becomes more defined. The utmost resource however, of the Littlemore Asylum, by crowding the Patients in it, will not provide the accommodation needed for the incoming Patients if they should be received at the same rate as heretofore; and it must be regarded as an unwilling, if necessary, resource. The competing demands of other Asylums will probably maintain as great a pressure for room, elsewhere than in their own Wards, as has ordinarily existed for

some years. It has perhaps never been more severely felt than at present.

The increase in the number of Patients under the charge of the Visitors of this Asylum in 1866, was from 570 on the first of January to 615 on the thirty-first of December; being of 16 Men and of 29 Women, (Total 45). The number of Patients received in the year being large, it happened that the number received in October and the latter months of the year, was especially large. It exists therefore, without the diminution which a few months longer residence of the Patients will probably effect. The increase in the number of Patients resident at Littlemore at the end of each year (over what it had been at its beginning) has varied with each year. For example,—In the year 1850 the increase was of 40 Patients.

Although the number of Male Patients has decreased in one year, and the number of Females in two years,—it has not happened that the total number of Patients has decreased in any year.

The average rate of increase has been that of 18 annually.

The Asylum having received Patients for 20 years, I may give this short summary.

The Coroner of the District, (Mr. Brunner), twice held an Inquest on Patients who had died in the Asylum within the past year;—but no remark is needed upon either case.

A Female Patient (E.T.) had, while living with her family, wandered and lost her way. She was of unsound mind, and nothing is known of her wandering. She was found sitting by the side of a stream (which was much swollen by melted snow), after many hours absence. The right ankle was broken; and, under the influence of exposure, fatigue, wet, and chill, the ankle inflamed, and a slough was formed. The Bones of the Ankle Joint became exposed; and the Patient's mind sympathised with her condition of body, and it was thought necessary to send her to the Asylum. Amputation of the Leg was performed by the consulting Surgeon (Mr. E. L. Hussey), under the influence of Chloroform,—It transpired, (while the effects of Chloroform were partially suspended), that the Patient saw and knew that the Leg was being taken off; yet that, from her Paralytic condition, she felt nothing either of the operation, or any of the subsequent dressings. She was

received into the Asylum on the 19th of January, and had the operation performed on the 26th of the same month. The disposition to sloughing was manifested by the extent of bed sore which followed the operation; and which has only recently healed. The sensation of the limb is imperfect.

Accidents occurred in the Wards from falls and other ordinary causes, with little injury that calls for notice. The only case worthy of observation here, is that of H. S. She was allowed to be much in bed on account of general Rheumatic weakness, and disease of the heart, with swelling of the extremities to an extent that had called for little notice. Objection was made by the Medical Officer to her giving way to increasing inactivity;—which resulted in an examination of the cause. Deformity of the left knee joint was apparent. She described that she put her leg out of bed, some time previously; that it twisted round from its own weight; that

it did not hurt her; that she tried to get it straight, but could help herself, and did not wish to be interfered with. The injury was luxation of the Tibia backwards. An attempt was made, with the aid of Mr. Hussey, but without effect,—to replace the displaced Bone.

The occupation of the Patients has been steadily maintained in the usual course throughout the year. The Season,—in itself favorable to Garden produce,—was not so favorable to the system followed in the Gardens of the Asylum. The Crops were all good; but the abundance of rain, and the diminished heat of the Season, were unfavorable to the full use of the water supplied from the House. It was however, all used on the Land. None of it was turned off to the Brook to flow away. The requisite improvement manifested is that additional Piping should be used to convey the water without waste to greater distances; so that

no part of the ground should be so sodden as that is on the lower level, and in parts beyond the present Piping. There is also risk of damage to a small quantity of Land by accumulation of water in a wet Season. It appeared certain in employing the water for the sake of using it, that the Crop to which it was applied did not improve in proportion to the supply of water given.

I cannot close this Report without referring to that, which has been a most important feature of the year to myself personally.—I refer to the complimentary allusions made to me by the Visitors in their Reports to the Quarter Sessions in January and December 1866.—The Visitors were on each of those occasions pleased to appreciate my humble

services at a higher standard than I can possibly think they have ever merited; and they did me the favor to encourage my extended retention of Office as being for the public convenience pending the contemplated alteration in the constitution of the Asylum.—I am grateful to the Visitors for their kindness and forbearance towards one who is conscious that his inefficiency has, from causes beyond his control, been, from time to time, but too apparent. I feel, strongly, that the Committee should have unfettered authority over the Office I have so long held; and that, although I still hold that Office, I do so with the understanding that the Visitors will proceed to supersede me at any such short notice as they may be pleased to prescribe.

I have performed the duties of the Superintendent for the past year with the aid of MR. SANKEY, whose twelve years' service, and willingness, have given him an

efficiency which no Stranger to the place could command. And it is due to that Gentleman to report to you that his attentions have always been received with satisfaction.
