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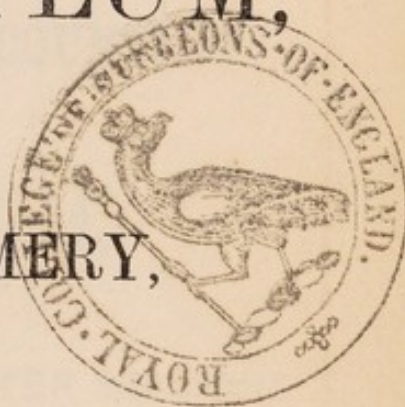

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THE VISITORS REPORT

That the number of Patients at present in the Asylum is greater than it was constructed to contain, and it must be the first care of the Committee to be appointed by the Court to make arrangements for the future.

That Dr. Oliver the Superintendent, and Mr. Bayley the Assistant Medical Officer, and Mrs. Oliver the Matron, continue to give satisfaction to the Committee of Visitors. The Attendants and Nurses have also conducted themselves well, there having been no dismissal for misconduct.

That the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 31st of January, 1862, and entered a minute in the Visitor's Book, which minute will be printed with this Report. The large Baths have been converted into single Baths, and the Day Room in Ward 5, has been enlarged in accordance with the suggestions of the Commissioners. Since their visit the Laundry has been completed. The washing is reported to be very laborious for Women; whether it can be lightened by the introduction of male labour (with the sanction of the Superintendent) sufficiently to render steam power unnecessary, will have to be considered by the Visitors.

That by "the Lunacy Acts Amendment Act" of last Sessions, it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for the Visitors of any Asylum" "and the Guardians of any Parish or Union within the District" "for which the Asylum has been provided if they shall see fit" "to make arrangements, subject to the approval of the Commissioners, and the President of the Poor Law Board, for" "the reception and care of a limited number of chronic Lunatics" "in the Workhouse of the Parish or Union to be selected by" "the Superintendent of the Asylum, and certified by him to" "be fit and proper so to be removed."

That the Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of Unions in the Counties of Salop and Montgomery, were invited to meet the Visitors on the 9th day of December, and confer with them as to carrying out the provisions of this Act. No definite opinion was expressed by the Meeting, but the Visitors think that in the larger Unions a limited number of chronic Patients might be accommodated in the Workhouses or elsewhere to the relief of the Lunatic Asylum.

REPORT of the COMMISSIONERS in LUNACY.

SALOP COUNTY ASYLUM,

31st JANUARY, 1862.

Since this Asylum was visited on the 23rd of January, 1861, 118 Patients have been admitted, 91 have been discharged, and 33 have died. Of those discharged, all but 8 had recovered. These deaths were without exception, from ordinary causes.

There are now 363 Patients (171 Males and 192 Females in the Asylum. They were unusually quiet at our visit to-day. One Patient in each division was secluded; but with this exception, we saw no one excited or troublesome. Upon the whole the personal appearance of the inmates of both divisions, but particularly that of the Women was satisfactory.

There has been no restraint since the last visit. The instances of seclusion have been most numerous among the Women, the average being about 6 in the week, while 4 has been about the average among the Men. The health of the Patients generally appears to be good. There are 16 Women and 10 Men under treatment from bodily disorders; but the only serious cases are those of senile decay. Five were in bed in the Female division as we passed through the Wards; and in the Male division one.

The Night-watch continues to be attended by excellent results. Last night's return showed three wet beds on each side, and no dirty bed on either, but it appeared that on the Men's side 23 dirty Patients, and on the Women's 28 had been kept clean by this careful provision.

The Patients usefully and regularly employed are in number 187. Of these in the Female division, 63 do knitting and needle-work, 12 are engaged in the Laundry, and 28 in the Kitchen and other domestic offices. In the Male division there are 34 employed in Ward work and picking Coir, 10 in the Shops, and 40 on the Farm. The Farm operations of last year returned a profit of £227. from the 20 acres now under cultivation; and we were glad to observe that very good farm buildings had been erected since the last visit on the land recently acquired. On the other hand, the want which has been sometime felt for the erection of a larger and better Carpenter's Shop, with a proper work yard attached, has not yet been attended to.

The Bedding generally was in fair condition, and the Sleeping Rooms and the associated dormitories were in good order. The Ventilation in these dormitories we find to have been lately much improved by the substitution of Windows of a better construction.

for those formerly in use. Additional means for personal washing have also been introduced, though not to the extent which we think desirable; and blinds have been supplied generally to the windows on the south side of the old building, though valances have not yet been placed as suggested.

We saw the Corridors and Day Rooms at a disadvantage in consequence of the whitewashing and cleaning now in progress. But some improvements have been made. The conversion into Day Rooms in both divisions of the Associated Dormitories adjoining the Dining Rooms common to Wards 5 and 6, has been a very great advantage to the Patients; and it would much increase the lightness and cheerfulness of the Day Room in Ward 5, if the room next to it now used but not required as a Nurses sleeping room were thrown into it by knocking down the intervening wall. A beginning has been made towards the introduction of more Wardrobes, comfortable Chairs, and Domestic Furniture; but in this respect a great deal still remains to be done. Cushions have not yet been provided for the fixed seats. The upper portions of the walls in these Day Rooms and Corridors should be papered. The supply of Books is still very defective; but we understand that order has been given for placing a bagatelle board in No. 8 Ward, in each division.

The sleeping rooms in the old No. 4 basement Ward, on both sides of this Asylum, ought to be done away with altogether. They are not susceptible of improvement; and their continued occupation cannot but be injurious to the Patients in every respect, bodily and mental. It may be doubtful whether or not the space could be appropriated to workshops, or in other useful ways; but it admits of no doubt that the utter absence in them of comfort, light, and proper ventilation, renders them entirely unfit for the purposes to which they are at present applied.

The arrangements for bathing are in the same state as at the last visit, and the large baths as objectionable on the score of decency and comfort, in which 6 Patients are placed at the same time, continue to be used in both divisions. We beg very strongly to urge upon the Committee, as absolutely essential, the immediate completion of the plan assimilating the old to the New building in this respect, by placing separate baths in each Ward.

We report with much satisfaction that a large and commodious Laundry and Washhouse are in course of construction, and will shortly be ready for use; and referring to other matters brought under notice in the last entry, we have to state that the experiment of rendering more efficient the present mode of warming the Asylum by means of the circulation of steam, is still under trial; that the

quantity of meat allowed in the dietary has been increased; that the Case Book is now kept up with greater regularity; and that a Harmonium has been purchased that much increases the efficiency of the Chapel Service, at which nearly 200 Patients attended last Sunday.

The amusements and Out-door exercise of the Patients appear to be fairly provided for. On the Tuesday and Friday Evenings there is music and occasional dancing; and on Mondays and Thursdays Dr. Oliver reads to the Patients. Of the books hitherto selected for those readings, the Doctor informs us Goldsmith's *Vicar of Wakefield* seemed to please his audiences most. An experiment of Private Theatricals was tried at Christmas; so successfully, that it is proposed to repeat it

In conclusion we have to observe, that, in accordance with certain new "Directions" lately issued by the Committee, greater powers have been entrusted to the Medical Superintendent during the intervals been the Committee Meetings, and, in recording our sense of the general efficiency of Doctor and Mrs. Oliver's managements, and of the success of their exertions for the comfort and proper treatment of the Patients, we must add our conviction, that, in proportion as all due authority is freely given to the Medical Superintendent, will completeness and regularity of administration be maintained throughout the Asylum.
