ON the first of January, 1856, the number of Patients in the Asylum was 315 (viz: 149 Males and 166 Females.) In the course of the year exactly 100 Patients (viz: 52 Men and* 48 Women) were admitted; 37 (viz: 17 Men and 20 Women) were discharged Recovered; 18 (viz: 9 Men and 9 Women) were discharged Relieved; 3 (viz: 1 Man and 2 Women were discharged not improved; and 33 (viz: 19 Men and 14 Women) died.—The number of Patients remaining in the Asylum on the 31st December, 1856, was consequently 324 (viz: 155 Men and 169 Women)—an increase on the number of those remaining at the end of the previous year of 9 (viz: of 6 Men and 3 Women.)

The daily average number of Patients resident during the year was 320 (viz: 154 Men and 166 Women.)

Among the admissions in the course of the year are enumerated the cases of 19 individuals, viz: 11 Males and 8 Females, who had previously been under treatment in this Institution, and, having been discharged, were re-admitted after periods of absence varying as below:—

^{*} Mere were both admitted for the first time, and re-admitted within the year, excepting one Woman. This circumstance reduces the number of Females received to 47 individuals, and the aggregate number of individuals of both Sexes admitted during the year 1856 from 100 to 99.

Comparing the number of Recoveries with the average number of Patients resident during the year, the proportion is found to be 11.5625 per cent. or 11.04 &c., Men, and 12.03 &c., Women.

It will be seen, by a glance at the annexed table, [A], that this proportion of cases discharged Recovered is very much below the general annual average of the 12 years which have elapsed since the Asylum was opened. That general average, as deduced from the same Table, being 19.81 per cent. upon both Sexes; or 16.55 per cent. on the Men, and 23.33 per cent. on the Women.

With respect to the Mortality during the past year, the general per centage of deaths on the average number of Patients of both Sexes was 10.5; that of the Men being 12.3, and that of the Women 8.7.—This per centage of Deaths is slightly below the aggregate average proportion of the entire 12 years; which amounts to 13.56 Men, and 7.95 Women; or a total per centage of 10.73, on the average number of Patients resident during that period.*

As bearing upon this point it may not here be out of place to mention the proportion which the cases supposed to be curable bear to those which are supposed to be incurable. The subjoined Table, [C), extending over three consecutive years, will afford a ready view of the comparison here referred to.

In any point of view this statement will doubtless be considered a very serious one. That the prospect of recovery should be so limited, and that there should be a necessity for maintaining in some degree of comfort, through all the stages of a more or less lingering process of inevitable decay, so large a proportion as 80 per cent. of the inmates of a public Institution of this nature, must needs be not less disheartening to the friends from whom they are thus separated, than unsatisfactory to those who have to bear the However much the accumulation burden of their maintenance. of this dead weight on the financial resources of the district is to be regretted, it is not very difficult to be accounted for. A considerable proportion of the individuals included in the list of those who are deemed Incurable, is the residue of the old cases which were admitted within the first few years after the Institution was opened. Several still continue to be received in a condition which admits of little or no hope of their recovery, either on account of their having been too long detained in situations where efficient means for their treatment are not available, or from their constitutional strength being so shattered by the causes of their Malady as almost to preclude the possibility of much improvement.

In those cases where the Mental Malady is complicated with Epilepsy, the greatest amount of relief that can be looked for would never justify the exposure of a Patient to the rubs and difficulties of ordinary life, notwithstanding that, in some instances, the apparent soundness of the intellect in the intervals of the fits, combined with the wish to maintain such Patients at a cheaper rate than they can be provided for in an Asylum, may induce some few persons to entertain a contrary belief.

Paralytic cases in like manner, but even still more emphati-

cally, require the same kind of protection from all causes of irritation and annoyance.

These classes, therefore, must always be considered as forming a portion of that stock of incurable cases which can only be diminished by death.

The necessity for prompt attention to the first manifestations of mental derangement has become proverbial; and the Medical Superintendent is only induced to repeat the hackneyed observation from having occasion to remark how frequently the advice it contains is still neglected. A reference to the Annual Returns of Recoveries in any Asylum will invariably show that, with rare exceptions, it is in the early stages of the Malady alone that a complete restoration to reason and health can be expected from any kind of treatment; and to the disregard of this consideration, which is alike detrimental to the interests of the public and to the personal welfare of the insane, a large share of the burden here spoken of is undoubtedly attributable.

A common mistake on the part of Medical Practitioner's respecting the immediate cause of mental derangement, not unfrequently tends to lengthen, and sometimes even to perpetuate the Malady; and the adoption of a Practice well adapted to subdue Phrenitis, is but too often seen to result in prolonged anxiety and eventual disappointment.

Although this is not an occasion for expatiating upon the various forms and modifications of mental alienation, and on the modes of treatment most suitable for each, the repetition in this place of observations formerly made respecting their common ground of relation to each other, and the general principle to be kept in view in dealing with them, will not be irrelevant, and may possibly be useful.

"The phenomena of Insanity are invariably associated with a low degree of vital power. Everything which it exhibits from the earliest stage of its "incubation" to its complete developement in each and all of its diversified forms, tends, more or less, to establish the truth of this principle. Its causes, of whatever kind and character, are all referable either to inherent organic debility, or to the operation of some intolerable strain upon the powers of life,—to some sudden shock, or continued har assing anxiety, some wearing or exhausting habit, combined, in a large majority of instances, with an insufficiency of the means of physical support."

This last conclusion is amply confirmed by a comparison of the Returns made by the Commissioners in Lunacy in their tenth annual Report to the Lord Chancellor (1856). Although not more than 6 per cent. of the entire population of England and Wales belong to the Pauper Class, yet, of the individuals whom it was found necessary to separate from society and to place under treatment in Asylums, &c., 77.99. &c. per cent. were chargable to public rates; whilst no more than 21.59. &c., per cent. were maintainable on independent resources,

The class so overwhelmingly out-numbered being thus shown to furnish by far the larger proportion of sufferers, and the comparative exemption from the Malady which prevails among the millions who are better provided for, are facts which justify the inference that physical privation and discomfort, with their usual moral accompaniments, are the main sources of Insanity.

This proposition may possibly be more distinctly intelligible if expressed numerically; and a careful examination of Returns made both by the Poor Law Commissioners and the Commissioners in Lunacy, will show that Insanity prevails among the poor, in comparison with the frequency of its occurence in that class of the community who are able to maintain themselves under the Malady, and in proportion to their respective numbers, in the ratio of somewhere about 60 of the former class to 1 of the latter.

In a comparative statement of this kind allowance should be made on account of those independent Patients who are singly maintained in seclusion, but not officially returned, and whose numbers, added to the 4,563 private cases recorded by the Commissioners, will necessarily increase the aggregate of those insane persons who are not burdensome to the Public.

On the other hand, it must be borne in mind that a considerable number of Pauper Lunatics are not placed under treatment in Asylums, but are still either kept in Workhouses or are "farmed out" in private dwellings; and it may be a question as to how many the number of these may amount to in the way of a set-off against that portion of the more affluent class who are accommodated in private families.

At all events a general and complete contrast, if it were practicable, would so effectually demonstrate the comparative immunity of the rich, as to leave no doubt respecting the accuracy

of the observation which imputes to physical privation and discomfort, with their usual moral accessaries, the chief agency in the production of Insanity.

Some explanation may possibly be required as to the exact meaning here attached to the words Poor and Rich. A large majority of the Patients in County Asylums do not actually receive Parish relief before the accession of the Malady renders it necessary to place them in seclusion. In such cases the Insanity may consequently be termed the cause of the Pauperism; and with respect to this—the lowest stage of poverty—the remark is perfectly correct; but poverty is a relative term, and among that large portion of the community who may be described as living "from hand to mouth," but whose means of subsistence, however straitened, are still independent, there can be no doubt that positive hardship, both in the way of cheerless homes and clouded prospects, is constantly oper ating to deteriorate the energies of the system, and is thus more or less effectually paving the way to the eventual developement of Insanity.

It is true that, in the Annual Reports of Lunatic Asylums, poverty is not specified as a constant cause of Insanity; but it ought not to be forgotten that in a large majority of instances where the Malady is attributed to other more immediately obvious, although often but secondary, causes, the organic powers of the system have been suffered to decline. The want of adequate support, and the impracticability of occasionally slackening, or suspending for a sufficent length of time, the labour by which that support can alone be obtained without submitting to apply for parochial assistance; the unceasing strain upon the feelings, in many cases, as much as upon the energies of an under-fed and over-worked man; the anxiety shared in but not diminished by those whose livelihood,—if the word can be properly used in such a case—is dependent upon his ability to maintain the struggle; the occurrence of sickness, or of some disabling accident, suddenly cuts off the means of an independent subsistence; and a family thus acquires the right to be maintained at the expense of the Public. It is in the struggle here referred to that the mischief is mainly done. From Workhouses, and from the class of ordinary out-door Paupers, comparatively few are removed to Lunatic Asylums. With them "the worst has come to the worst." anxiety is at an end, because the last embers of independent feeling and of hope have been previously extinguished; and

although their little may have actually been made less, the certainty of some provision is often probably found to be well worth the difference.

Other causes, besides absolute Poverty, no doubt conduce to the development of mental derangement; but in whatever way they act, there are the strongest reasons for believing that they all tend to impair the energy of the nutritive functions, and more particularly in that part of the system upon the due nourishment of which the healthy state of the intellect and the feelings is more immediately dependent.

The foregoing observations being merely intended to afford a general impression as to the nature of the circumstances under which disorder of the intellectual operations usually occurs, it is not thought advisable to allude here to the nature of those cases which have become complicated by organic mischief and by special symptoms which denote the existence of the Malady in its incurable stage. But, in whatever condition they may be, the great thing to be kept in view in the treatment of insane persons is to provide in every reasonable way for the maintenance of their general comfort. A sufficiency not only of nutritious Food and of suitable Clothing, Bedding, &c., with well ventilated and comfortable apartments; but equally convenient means of employment both out of Doors and in the House and Workshops. The acquisition of fourteen acres of Land, on the East side of the original Ground, belonging to this Asylum must materially contribute to the improvement of the means previously available for the purpose of occupation. The reestablishment of a Main Sewer, and the consequent security against injury from imperfect drainage, are such obvious advantages as merely require to be mentioned.

The new Chapel, which was opened in the early part of the Summer, has been found to be well adapted to its purpose.

The exercising Grounds, which are being laid out on the South Front of the New Wings, will afford very great advantages to that portion of the Patients who are least fit to be associated with the more intelligent and orderly classes.

In many other ways the arrangements of the Institution have been greatly improved during the last year. The opening of

the New Wings has given ample room for the domestic accommodation of many Patients who were previously not well provided for in this respect, and has led to a great change for the better in their general condition.

The subjoined tabular statements will show the amount of work done by the Patients in the year 1856.
