THE
ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF
VISITING JUSTICES OF THE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM
STAFFORD,
PRESENTED TO THE
COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS 1st JANUARY, 1877.

The Visiting Justices of Stafford County Lunatic Asylum present the 58th Annual Report to the Court. During the past year 251 Lunatics have been admitted, of whom 137 were males and 114 females: 95 have been discharged recovered, of whom 45 were males and 50 females: 5 males and 8 females have been discharged to the custody of their friends relieved: 21 males and 10 females have been transferred to Burntwood Asylum, 2 males and 1 female have been transferred to other Asylums, 56 males and 25 females have died, 1 male and 1 female have escaped, and 1 male patient was discharged, the Superintendent being unable to detect any signs of Insanity, leaving in the Asylum 543, viz.: 268 males and 275 females.

The average of the recoveries on the admissions has been at the rate of 38 per cent., and the average of deaths on the total number under treatment at 10 per cent.

The recoveries show 5 per cent. more than the

previous year, and the average of deaths a decrease of 3 per cent.

The average of deaths is still considered high, but this is accounted for by the large number of acute cases admitted, 47 patients having died within 12 months of admission.

There are now 1061 Lunatics belonging to the County in the Asylums, viz.: 543 at Stafford, 493 at Burntwood, and 25 at Worcester, showing an increase of 36 during the year.

There are now vacancies at the Stafford Asylum for 11 males and 1 female: at the Burntwood Asylum for 47 females. The patients at the Worcester Asylum are paid for at the rate of 14s. per head per week, whilst the charge for the past year in the County Asylums was 9s. 4d.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum in December, when they reported favourably of the general condition of the Asylum. They recommend the addition of wards on each side of the Asylum for epileptic patients, so that a more continuous supervision might be obtained during the night.

The main portion of the building is in good and substantial condition; the roof of the male Infirmary has been raised, and the floor re-laid with pitch-pine; the boilers are now in good working order.

Your Committee consider that all the tile plaster and stone floors should be taken up and re-laid with pitch-pine, and have decided to apply a sum of £100 a quarter until these improvements are effected.

During the past year a second engine has been erected: the centre building, the Committee room, the

kitchen and offices, and several of the wards have been papered and painted: other wards on the male side also require painting and papering, and this your Committee purpose to do during the present year.

In consideration of the long and efficient services of the Clerk to the Asylum, the Committee have agreed to increase his salary by the sum of £50 per annum.

Your Committee have much pleasure in again recording its sense of the able management of the Superintendent, and the good conduct of the Officers and Servants.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Stafford County Asylum,

December 13th and 14th, 1876.

We have officially inspected this Asylum, and seen every patient now resident—viz., 272 of each sex. We have a very good report to make of their personal condition and their general conduct. There were hardly any exceptions to the quiet and orderly conduct of the inmates of both divisions. Two of the men who had suffered from epileptic attacks during this morning were locked in single rooms; but there were no women in seclusion, nor was anyone restrained.

Although the mortality was very large during the past year, the sanitary condition of the Asylum is not at this time unsatisfactory, and only one man and four women were in bed; but there is the usual large proportion of old paralytic and feeble cases, and a reference to the Register of Admissions shows how great a number of the patients are received in weak general health or suffering from fatal brain diseases. These facts in a great measure account for the high death-rate which has again been considerably above the average of County Asylums—viz., at the rate of

fifteen per cent., calculated to the average daily numbers resident. Another element affecting the mortality is the large number of acute cases which have been admitted, amounting altogether to 283—161 of the male and 122 of the female sex.

The only inquest held was upon the body of a male epileptic, who was found dead by the Night Attendant; but in this case death was thought not to be due to suffocation, but to the epileptic seizure.

It appears that post mortem examinations have only been made in seven instances, the reason being the want of a proper autopsy room. The number of deaths attributed to "Exhaustion after Mania and Melancholia" is unusually large, and it is probable that had post mortem examinations been more generally made other definite causes would have been found to exist. In these circum-

stances we strongly recommend that suitable rooms for making these examinations be provided without delay.

We were present in the Hall during the dinner yesterday: the food was good and abundant, and the 190 men who were assembled all behaved in a most orderly manner. With regard to matters of statutory enquiry, we learn about 262 patients of both sexes attend Divine Service on Sunday, but there are now no week-day services.

There are associated entertainments once a fortnight, at which upwards of 200 patients are present. On three days in the week about 80 female patients are taken for exercise beyond their airing courts. Exclusive of the men who work on the land, sixty others are taken for walks beyond the estate. The Schools are continued as before. A return of the numbers employed shows that of the men 60 work on the land, 32 at various trades, and 106 assist in the wards, wash-houses, and general offices. Of the women, there are 40 regularly at work in the wash-houses, 80 do needlework, 10 are engaged in the kitchen, and 46 are ward cleaners and general workers.

The condition of the Asylum Buildings is good, and the wards were clean and well ventilated, the bedding also was in excellent condition. A good many alterations and improvements have been completed or commenced since our last visit fourteen months ago. A new foul-linen laundry has been constructed on the female side. The single rooms in No. 5 female gallery have been neatly painted and papered, and on the same side No. 1 gallery, and the day rooms of Nos. 2, 3, and 5 have been painted and decorated. The conversion of the old foul-linen

drying closet into a general bath-room has been commenced. In the male division the roof of the infirmary gallery has been raised three feet, and the floor re-laid with wood. In No. 3 gallery also the tile floor has been replaced by wood for the greater part of its length, and we are very glad to hear that the Committee of Visitors have determined to substitute wood floors for the stone tiles and stucco throughout the Asylum, and a sum of £100 a quarter has been granted for the purpose. A grant of £100 has also been given for the painting and papering of rooms and galleries where most needed, and work of this kind is in progress.

A second Engine has lately been provided. With the present numbers it is considered that there are 5 vacant beds on the male and 4 on the female side, and we understand that a few more women will be removed to Burntwood ere long. With one exception all the inmates belong to Staffordshire Unions, Parishes and County, the present weekly charge for them is 9s. 4d. There are 25 men belonging to the County who are kept at the Worcester Asylum at a weekly cost of 14s. Since the last visit 167 patients have been discharged, of whom 114 are reported as having recovered, and 31 transferred to Burntwood Asylum.

There is no record of any instance of mechanical restraint, but seclusion has been resorted to in the cases of 10 men and 19 women: with the former on 15 and the latter on 49 occasions. Many of these patients are epileptics, of which class there are now 42 of the male and 52 of the female sex in the Asylum.

As yet no arrangements have been made for their continuous supervision during the night, because of

structural difficulties in the way of such a plan, but they are now visited every hour instead of every two hours. We are of opinion however that a suitable epileptic ward might be erected on each side, in situations which we have pointed out to Mr. Pater, and we beg to recommend the matter to the early consideration of the Committee of Visitors. The new buildings intended for diseases of an infectious character have been delayed by the failure of the Contractor, and the walls are only just above the ground.

It will be seen from the above report that good progress continues to be made in the improvement of this Asylum.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

County Asylum, Stafford,
December 31st, 1876.

My Lords and Gentlemen :

I have the honour to place before you the Medical Superintendent's Report for the year 1876.

On the 1st of January, 1876, there were 518 patients in the Asylum: during the year 251 have been admitted; 81 have died; and 145 have been discharged; leaving in the house on the 31st December 543. Of those discharged 95 have been cured. While the average Asylum death-rate is 7·86 per cent. on the aggregate number under treatment during the year, and the rate of cure 34·03 per cent. on the admissions: the death and cure rates in this Asylum are 10·53 and 37·84 respectively. These high rates are both mainly dependent upon the same causes, viz., the large number of new cases admitted, and the transfer to other Asylums of the chronic and less quickly fatal cases. 82 out of the 95 cures, and more than half the mortality, occurred in persons of less than one year's residence in the Asylum. The type of brain disease as it shows itself in this county is severe, as compared with that which obtains in most other counties, especially in those which are chiefly agricultural. General paralysis, an inevitably fatal malady, is very rife, and one quarter of the lunatics now in the two Asylums are incurable epileptics. 41

of the admissions, or one-fifth of the whole number of cases of which the causation could be ascertained were due in part or entirely to drink.

The increase in the number of patients has been 36, or one below the average of the last twenty years. As there is but little probability of the new wards being finished during the coming year, it will probably be necessary, at the expiration in October next of the present contract with Worcester, to make an agreement with the Committee of that or some other Asylum for the reception of a larger number of males.

During the year the average number of patients of suicidal tendencies has been a hundred. There have been several attempts at self destruction; that none have been successful is creditable to the care of the attendants. One man slipped on the polished oak floor of his ward and dislocated his elbow, the only injury of any importance that has occurred. This freedom from accident, is to be attributed to the practice of secluding violent patients and especially dangerous epileptics. The new Foul-Laundry proves to be of much service, and the conversion of the old one into a General Bath-room now being carried out promises to be a great improvement.

The general routine of the Asylum remains unaltered.

To my Colleague Mr. Turner, to the officers and attendants, my best thanks are due for the assistance they have rendered me in the execution of my duties.
