ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITING JUSTICES OF THE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM, STAFFORD,

FOR THE YEAR 1886, PRESENTED TO THE COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.

During the year 266 lunatics have been admitted, of whom 134 were males and 132 females; 89 have been discharged recovered, of whom 39 were males and 50 females; 10 males and 10 females have been discharged relieved to the custody of their friends; 1 male and 1 female have been transferred to the Burntwood Asylum; 3 females have been transferred to other Asylums; 66 males and 50 females have died; 4 males and 1 female were discharged as not being insane, the Medical Officers not being able to certify to their insanity. There remains on the books 776—viz., 447 males and 329 females.

The average recoveries on the admissions has been 33 per cent., and the average deaths on the total number under treatment 11 per cent. The recoveries show a decrease of 9 per cent., and the deaths an increase of 2 per cent. on the previous year.

There are now 1317 lunatics belonging to the County—viz., 765 at Stafford and 552 at Burntwood, showing an increase of 14 during the year.

There are at Stafford Asylum 11 patients for whom 14s. per week is charged. There being plenty of room, and friends being willing to pay that amount, patients can be admitted.

The whole of the locks on the bedroom doors have been made to open with an ordinary handle from the outside at night. The change of the heating apparatus from hot air to hot water has been nearly completed. Several day-rooms and galleries have been painted and decorated during the year.

In consequence of the continued low price of provisions, your Committee lowered the charge for maintenance in June last from 8s. 9d. to 8s. 6d., and have again reduced the same to 8s. 2d.

During the year your Committee have continued to give their time and attention to the supervision of the Asylum, and at their visits have found the duties carried on with order and regularity; and they have much pleasure in recording their sense of the able management of the Superintendent and the good conduct of the officers and servants.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

County Lunatic Asylum, Stafford, March 24th, 1886.

We have this day concluded the inspection of this Asylum, and find there are on the books the names of 741 patients, 431 being males; five of these are termed private patients, but only two are really above the pauper class, the other three being criminal patients. Since the last visit, 44 men and 56 women have been admitted, 18 men and 34 women have been discharged recovered, and five men and six women relieved or not improved, one man and two women were sent away, having shown no signs of insanity since their admission. The deaths have been 21 in the male and 25 in the female division.

Two of the deaths formed the subject of enquiry before the Coroner. In one the verdict was "Apoplexy," in the other "Suffocation in an epileptic fit." In this latter case, correspondence ensued between our Office and the Superintendent as to whether the blame of the patient being overlooked rested with the day-nurse just coming on duty or the night-nurse just leaving duty, and we trust that the arrangements which have been made will prevent this divided responsibility for the future.

We regret to find that autopsy verified the causes assigned for the 46 deaths in 22 instances only, This is much below the average per-centage of post-mortems made in County Asylums, and we hope it will be found possible to make these examinations in nearly every case of death.

The death-rate has been high, being 12.6 for the past year, calculated upon the average number resident. Chronic lung disease was the most frequent cause, and from this 17 patients died. General paralysis accounts for 11, and two women died of diarrhœa.

Four males and three females were in bed when we were in the wards yesterday; and 40 males and 32 females were registered last week as under medical treatment. Eleven men have been secluded on various occasions for a total of 1154 hours; but we are told that out of this two men were secluded at their own wish for 764 hours. Fourteen women have been similarly treated for 116½ hours. Eight men have been restrained on nine occasions for 48 hours, 40 hours of this being wet-packing, and eight hours dry-packing. One man had his hands sewn to his sides for 36 hours for surgical reasons. Eight women have been also restrained, 16 times in all and for a total of 94 hours, the means used being either wet or dry-packing.

The patients actively suicidal are returned to us as 60 males and 56 females, the epileptics 86 and 80, and the general paralytics 16 and two respectively.

The staff of attendants by day, exclusive of the head in each division, are 34 males and 27 females, and three of each sex are on duty by night. The staff in many of the wards consists of two only, so that the ward must often be left with only one attendant therein; and for the very large number of actively suicidal patients, who are never allowed out of sight, the staff in these special wards is not too strong. The meals for the attendants are taken in their respective wards, except in one or two places where a small room is provided for the purpose. Out of the 31 female attendants, no less than 10 have lived here less than six months, and 22 have seen less than two years' service. We hope every effort will be made to induce good attendants to apply for service

here, and having obtained such, to retain them. We think a room for meals for the attendants, which, comfortably furnished and provided with suitable means of amusements, would be a boon to the attendants and much appreciated by them when their day's work is done. We had not many complaints of the attendants made to us by patients, and those made were not substantiated.

We gave to every patient on the books (except one man who was away on leave) opportunity to speak with us, and we told all who asked for discharge to apply to the Committee. Many on that said they were prevented speaking with them, or did not see them during their visits. We think that this must be a mistake on the patients' part; but if any have been prevented by attendants from making known their grievance to the Committee, we trust steps will be taken to alter this for the future. Much comfort is often given to even a very insane patient by being allowed to give expression to his fancies.

The dinner supplied was good, water bottles have been placed on the dining tables; and we think the time has arrived when the forks might be renewed and of a different pattern, whilst the knives might well be less rusty.

The beds and bedding were in very good order; but we suggested that some means be devised to prevent the epileptic beds becoming such dust receptacles as they are now.

We do not like the plan of patients sitting up at night with the nurses, more especially when the only method of testing the attendants' vigilance is by an electric apparatus only requiring some individual to press a button at stated intervals.

In the epileptic dormitory there are 80 beds on either side, with only one exit from the dormitory. It is true that the stairs are fire proof, but if a fire takes place in one of the rooms below, the stairs become simply a smoke shaft, and the removal of the patients is rendered impossible thereby.

At the last visit it was suggested that the single rooms should be made to open with an ordinary handle from the outside at night, which door could be locked, if needed, for seclusion by day, and one room has been thus made to open. We hope this alteration will be speedily carried out throughout the house. We counted the keys a charge nurse in the wards has to carry, and find she has 14, with two others also the Asylum property which she need not wear, and with this number of keys it will not be remarkable that there are certain doors which even the Medical Superintendent could not open.

The wards were in most places in proper order, but we still consider means of amusement scantily provided, and the books supplied partaking too largely of a religious nature.

At Church the average congregation consists of 250 males and 180 females. Service is only held once on Sunday alternately in the morning and evening. No daily service is performed here, and on no day in the week is there Divine service in the Chapel. We think an alteration in this matter is needed. We are aware that the Chaplain here also officiates at the Workhouse and Coton Hill, but something ought, in our opinion, to be done to give more frequent opportunities of religious exercise to those desiring it.

The weekly gatherings bring together about 200 men and 180 women. The entertainments take place in the dining-hall, which has been redecorated &c. since the last visit.

Nearly 300 men and about 200 women are usefully employed. A place for picking hair out of doors, under a shed, would, in fine weather give employment to many demented patients, and render the upholsterers' shop less unhealthy. At present the windows there are made to open, but no means exists of opening them.

Besides the deaths already mentioned as occurring from diarrhoea, other deaths took place from this disease combined with others; but Mr. Pater thinks he has discovered the origin of the disorder, and applied a remedy.

The plan of the drains is now in the Committee Room, and from it we see that no water-closet drain runs under the rooms occupied by patients, but there are a few under the corridors which we were told were so laid as to be considered safe.

We hope shades will be erected in the female epileptic airing courts.

We see that the work now in progress is making roads, paths, &c. We hope that planting trees, making flower beds, &c., in the airing courts will not be overlooked.

The W.C.'s. to which attention was called in the last entry are receiving attention.

We regret to find that the blocked-up windows in the single rooms still remain unaltered. In those rooms where they are unblocked the improvement is so marked that we trust the work will receive early attention.

Amongst other matters calling for notice, we think the guards round the gas fires are too weak. The infirmary wards need a bath on wheels, able to be taken to the bedside. In the day-room for epileptics, some of the benches have mattresses on them, rendering the seats high and dangerous, and we saw, in our opinion, an undue proportion of black eyes and cut faces. The attic dormitory by the central staircase, having a door leading to the Medical Superintendent's apartments has not a master key placed ready in case of need, as is done at all other alternative exits. In many places there should have been greater neatness and cleanliness displayed with regard to domestic details, and the windows of the annex

were in a very dirty state. In this building the baths are being dismantled, and the patients are to be taken for baths to the main building. We cannot express too strongly our disapprobation of this when consideration is given to the recent severe weather we have had; it must be evident that the removal of patients, just after having a warm bath, to this building, could not be unattended with danger. But this annex is intended for an infectious hospital in case of necessity, and if it were needed for this purpose the baths would be at once required to be replaced.

We greatly dislike seeing towels hung up over the partitions of the W.C.'s to-day, and hope this practice will be prohibited. In No. 1 female side the W.C. is still dark and unsuitable, and in No. 2 on the same side the lavatory arrangements are defective.

We were surprised to learn, on asking for the autopsy book, that no record of the result of the post mortem examinations is kept for reference here, and we advise that this book be kept forthwith.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER.

County Asylum, Stafford,

March 1st, 1887.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I deeply regret that, owing to the serious illness of Mr. Pater, the duty has devolved on me of submitting to you the Medical Officer's Annual Report of the Asylum for the year 1886.

On the 1st January, 1886, there were in the Asylum 433 males and 312 females—total, 745. On the 31st December of the same year there were 447 males and 329 females—total, 776, showing an increase during the year of 31—males 14 and females 17 respectively.

There have been 266 admissions, of which 134 were male and 132 female, 18 and 35 of whom had either been in this or some other Asylum previously. There has been an increase of ten in the male admissions, and a decrease of three in the female. The total number treated during the year was 1011. In five of the admissions no signs indicative of insanity could be discovered by the medical officers, and they were accordingly discharged not insane. In a few cases the same person was in the Asylum more than once during the twelve months.

The discharges were 54 of men and 65 of women—total, 119: of whom 39 men and 50 women—total 89—had recovered. The non-recovered, relieved, or those discharged to care of friends, numbered in all 30,—15 of either sex. The average recoveries on the admissions has been 33 per cent., and these show a decrease of 9 per cent. on the previous year.

The deaths numbered 116 (66 males, 50 females), being an increase of 22 as compared with 1885, and

giving an average of 11 per cent. on the total number under treatment, and an increase of 2 per cent. on the previous year. They have all been due to natural causes; but it is a remarkable fact, as instancing the very indifferent bodily health in which many of the patients are when admitted, that no less than 18 died under one month's residence and 15 under three. As was the case last year, general paralysis, phthisis, and epilepsy were the causes of the greatest number of deaths, no less than 47 being attributable to those diseases. Post-mortem examinations were made in 59 cases,—the largest number we have ever had. Every endeavour is made to obtain the sanction of the patients' friends to such an examination, for verification of the cause of death by autopsy is always interesting and valuable, but there seems to be in very many instances great objections to such an examination.

There was one death the subject of a Coroner's inquest. The patient was a female and an epileptic, and the evidence went to show that she died from suffocation in a fit, which was the substance of the verdict.

During the year the portions of land left in disorder by the Contractor have been levelled, and to some extent have been made for agricultural purposes, the coating of gravel having been buried under the lower-lying course of earth, to which, by the gifts of our neighbours, many hundred tons have been added. Various paths and large beds have been made in the airing courts, and have been planted with shrubs.

Many of the walls in the grounds, some of them formerly being outside walls, but which under the changed circumstances, were unnecessarily high, have been reduced to a few feet in height, helping to give a brighter aspect to things.

The old verandah in Male No. 1 Court, the effect of which was to make the ward dark, is now being put up

in the new female airing court as a summer-house, at a cost of only £30. This change will be most useful when completed. It is a question whether the covering of the pump in No. 1 Male Court could not be made similarly useful in the new male airing court.

The reflooring of wards 7 on both sides of the house, and 1 on the male side, by wood instead of by stone and tiles, is now complete and is a most satisfactory and necessary work.

The locking of the house which in the course of years, and the introduction of various keys, had become very complicated and a source of danger in the case of fire, has been rearranged, and one common system now prevails throughout the whole Asylum. All the bedroom doors open with a handle from the outside, thus avoiding the noise which unlocking a door necessarily makes, and enabling the night attendants to perform their duties without disturbing the patients.

The walk round the boundary, about a mile and a half in length, has been finished, except for the two small bridges required, and the materials for them are in the stores. These will be shortly completed.

The heating of the wards and galleries by hot water instead of hot air, which was always unsatisfactory, was considered and decided upon by the Committee in the autumn, and the contract given to Messrs. Rudge & Griffith, of Stafford, who began the work in September and had the whole in working order by the beginning of the year. Considering the very severe winter we have had, this important alteration has not been made too soon, and the comfort has been experienced by the whole household. In galleries and dormitories where it was often difficult to get the temperature up to 40° or 45° it can now be raised to 60°, or even higher. Unfortunately, the heating of the epileptic and suicidal wards is not so satisfactory. The temperature in these frequently does

not rise above 45°, notwithstanding, good fires are kept up. It will probably be a question for the Committee to consider whether something more should not be done to ensure greater comfort to the patients who occupy this part of the house.

Unfortunately in connection with the fixing of this heating apparatus, a serious accident happened to one of the patients. The coils of pipe after having been put together outside were brought into the galleries and placed in the positions which they were to occupy, simply resting against the wall without being at once fixed. A poor woman, who was melancholic, restless, and unsettled and could not be kept in any one place for any length of time, pulled one of these coils over, which fell and caused a compound fracture of her leg immediately above the ankle. On account of her mental condition great difficulty was experienced in treating the fracture, the result being no proper union took place, the ankle joint became disorganized and amputation of the foot had ultimately to be performed. She had a very slow recovery from this operation, but is now rapidly regaining both her bodily and mental health, and we hope shortly to get her a useful artificial limb.

Hydrants have been laid down to the sanitary block and fitted up inside the same as in the old building. The whole Asylum is now thus well guarded against the spread of any fire, if such should at any time unfortunately break out.

The lavatories and urinals in male wards 1, 2, and 3, have been altered and done up. Some of the wards in the older portions of the building are being, or have been, repainted.

A new range of pig-styes has been built, the old ones having been on the point of falling to pieces. This latter work, and indeed all the work done, has been by patients under the paid supervision generally of one man.

There have been three escapes, two of whom were retaken within 24 hours of leaving the Asylum, and the third within two days.

The amusements of the patients have not been forgotten. There has been the usual weekly dance in the hall during the winter, and on the lawn in the summer. At Christmas there were two stage performances given by members of the staff, which were much appreciated, and also two fancy dress balls. A considerable number of the attendants, nurses, and patients, were dressed in fancy costume. Cricket matches with local clubs took place almost every Saturday afternoon, and were witnessed with evident interest by many patients. The Stafford Athletic Club kindly gave an entertainment, and other varied amusements were arranged from time to time. The harvest thanksgiving and sports were held in August. By kind permission of the Earl of Harrowby the annual pic-nic was in Sandon Park. The patients, about 200 in number, were conveyed in breaks, and the day being fine, all seemed to enjoy the change of scene as well as the drive.

Besides visiting the wards as before, the Chaplain now holds a second service every week in the chapel. These services are attended, on an average, by more than 400 patients. There is also a weekly service for the Roman Catholic patients.

Mr. Pater desires me to record his thanks to the Officers and Staff generally for the assistance which they have rendered him in carrying on the work of the Asylum.
