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

### ANNUAL REPORT

OF

### THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS,

1870.

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To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the City of London in General Quarter Sessions assembled, by adjournment, on Saturday, the 28th day of January, 1871.

THE COMMITTEE Report that at the beginning of the year 1870, there were 266 Patients in the Asylum; that during the year other Patients were received, making a total of 317; of this number 5 males and 10 females were discharged recovered, and 8 males and 10 females not improved (including 8 patients of the imbecile class removed to Leavesden Asylum, in compliance with the provisions of the Metropolitan Poor Act 1867), 11 males and 8 females died, leaving in the Asylum at the end of the year 124 males and 141 females, making a total of 265 Patients.

The Committee have much pleasure in stating that in consequence of the opening of the Metropolitan District Asylums, at Leavesden and Caterham, the pressure for admission has abated, and the necessity for enlarging the Asylum has thus been avoided.

The general health of the Patients has been good, no disease of an infectious or contagious nature having prevailed.

The raising of the External Wall of the Asylum has proved of great practical benefit; not only has greater privacy been obtained, but additional security afforded, which precludes any apprehension of escape, without at all interfering with the free action of light and air.

The vacancy which occurred in the office of Assistant Medical Officer by the resignation of Mr. Robert Hullah, upon his obtaining an appointment at the Asylum for Idiots, at Earlswood, has been filled up by the election of Mr. J. F. Weatherhead, who manifests great attention in the discharge of his duties.

The Committee desire to record their deep regret that their Chairman, Mr. Alderman Wilson, should have been obliged, through serious illness, to resign the Chair he had so ably filled for many years past, and at the same time to express their sincere hope that his restoration to health may not be far distant, and that they may again have the advantage of his advice and experience.

The then Lord Mayor (Mr. Alderman Besley), was unanimously elected to the Chair vacated by the resignation of Mr. Alderman Wilson.

For details respecting the management of the Asylum, the

treatment of the Patients, reference is again made to the entry of the Commissioners in Lunacy in the Visitors' Book, on the 27th June last, to the Report of the Medical Superintendent, and to the several accounts and tables appended.

The Committee, in conclusion, have much pleasure in acknowledging the efficient manner in which the Medical Superintendent and the officials generally have performed their various duties during the past year.

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# Copy of Entry made by THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY in the Visiting Book of the Asylum.

CITY OF LONDON ASYLUM, 27th June, 1870.

We have this day officially visited the Asylum, inspected its several wards, offices, workshops, and premises, and, with the exception of one male patient who was out for the day unattended, and two female patients absent on trial, have seen all the inmates.

The following tabular statement shows the changes in the patients since the visit of our colleagues, 8th June, 1869, and their present numbers:—

The female division is full. In the male division there are only 15 vacant beds.

The land belonging to the Asylum (including the Cemetery) comprises 33 acres, of which 10 are under cultivation.

The weekly charge for maintenance is, as heretofore, 14s.

The sanitary state of the Asylum is satisfactory. The patients last registered as under medical treatment were 6 in the male division, and 8 in the female.

There has not, since the last visit, been in the Asylum any disorder of an epidemic character. The deaths during that period have been all from ordinary causes, excepting in the case of a man who died from fracture of the skull caused by a blow inflicted by another patient, under circumstances fully reported to our Board.

According to the Medical Journal the patients placed in seclusion since the last visit have been 3 on the male side, and 8 on the female, the former altogether on 4, and the latter on 16 occasions.

Divine service in the Chapel is attended on Sundays by about 110 patients in the morning, and 90 in the evening, and on week days by about 30 patients of each sex.

The present staff of Attendants, who appear to be kind and efficient, is as follows:—

There are in each division a Head and a Night Attendant, and the Ward Attendants are 12 on the male side, and 13 on the female. There are also 4 female servants.

We have to report most favourably of the state of the several corridors, day rooms and dormitories, beds and bedding, which we found very clean and comfortable in aspect. Curtains and vallances of a bright colour have been recently introduced with good effect.

We noticed with satisfaction much furniture of a domestic kind and decorations of a simple character.

The rough brickwork of the upper parts of the walls generally requires to be papered or coloured.

We again strongly recommend, as an essential improvement, the lowering the windows of the male workshops; also the better lighting and ventilation of the store-rooms, now very defective in those respects.

The male patients at the time of our visit were, with two exceptions, free from excitement.

Several of the women, a large number of whom are of a very bad class, were noisy and disorderly.

The clothing of the patients of both sexes is of a good quality, and their personal condition generally was satisfactory.

We saw 160 patients assembled in the General Hall at

dinner, which consisted of boiled beef, potatoes and greens, bread and beer. The dinner was comfortably served, and the demeanour of the patients, who were distributed in parties of 10 to each table, was most orderly.

On the occasions of dramatic entertainments the tables placed together form the stage, and a proscenium, &c., have recently been constructed by the Head Attendant.

The supply of amusing publications and the arrangements for recreation and exercise continue to be ample.

Mr. Weatherhead is at present *locum tenens* as Assistant Medical Officer in the place of Mr. Hullah, who has retired upon his appointment as one of the medical officers of the Earlswood Idiot Asylum.

In reference to our statutory enquiries on the subject of the visitation and management of the Asylum, we have satisfied ourselves that the requirements of the Act are fully carried out by the Committee of Visitors.

The creditable condition of the Institution and its inmates sufficiently prove the zeal and efficiency evinced by Dr. Jepson in the discharge of his responsible duties as Superintendent.

### REPORT

OF

# THE RESIDENT PHYSICIAN AND MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The Medical Superintendent has the honour to submit to the Committee of Visitors his Fifth Annual Report.

On the 31st December, 1869, the numbers in the Asylum were 124 males, 142 females. Total 266.

The numbers in the Asylum this Day, December 31st, 1870, are: males 124, females 141. Total 265.

Precisely the same number of patients have been admitted this year as were received in 1869, viz., 51, the proportions only varying slightly; thus 24 males were admitted against 26 last year, and 27 females against 25 during the corresponding period. Of these 1 male and 3 females were readmitted, having relapsed after recovery, and 7 males and 1 female were chronic cases, and received under orders of transfer from other Asylums.

Of those discharged, 5 males and 10 females were recovered, and 8 males and 10 females not improved, 8 of the latter having been removed to the Asylum for Imbeciles at Leavesden.

The deaths have amounted to 19 against 23 last year; of these 11 were male, and 8 female. The cause of death in no instance demands special notice.

The mean average of residents during the year has been 122 males, 143 females. Mean total 265.

In the early and middle portions of the year admission was refused to many females, but since accommodation has been provided by the removals to Leavesden, previously mentioned, the number of acute cases requiring treatment appears to have diminished, and the amount of space has hitherto been amply sufficient, though there are now but three empty beds in the female division.

The health of the Inmates throughout the year has been remarkably good, and, with one slight exception, no illness of an epidemic character has visited the Institution. In the instance alluded to, occurring on the 17th of May, large numbers of patients and attendants in both divisions were suddenly attacked with a form of Choleraic Diarrhea, accompanied by severe pain and vomiting; the attack in most cases subsided almost as rapidly as it had appeared, and yielded to a moderate administration of stimulants only. That the illness was not caused by any poisonous germ taken in the food was evidenced by the fact that one of the gardeners employed about the grounds was also affected, as well as some of the people living in cottages adjacent to the Asylum. On the following day a few more cases presented themselves, and the disease then finally disappeared.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 27th of June, and expressed their satisfaction at the condition of the Patients and the Institution generally; a copy of their report is appended.

In August the whole of the Patients employed in the Laundry went, with their attendants, in covered vans, to Rosherville Gardens; they returned home in the evening greatly delighted with the treat afforded them.

The Summer and Winter Entertainments have been carried out as in previous years, the Weekly Dances being an invariable source of enjoyment, while the Theatrical Representations have been much facilitated by the erection of a moveable Proscenium, with Scenery and other "Properties," the greater part of the work being due to the skill and energy of the Head Attendant (Alfred Brown), who has likewise rendered very efficient service as Band Master.

On the 9th of December a Commission of Inquiry was held by Samuel Warren, Esq., Q.C., Master in Chancery, touching the mental condition of one of the Patients who had, through the decease of her father, become possessed of considerable property; he found that she was incapable of managing herself or her affairs, and she will shortly be removed to a Private Establishment where she may enjoy luxuries proportionate to her altered circumstances.

The Chapel Services have been conducted as hitherto, and the average attendance of Patients has been on—

In May last Mr. Hullah resigned his appointment as Assistant Medical Officer, on being elected to a similar position in the Asylum for Idiots at Earlswood; he has been succeeded by Mr. J. F. Weatherhead, who had very satisfactorily

performed the duties of the office during Mr. Hullah's temporary absence.

In conclusion, the Medical Superintendent desires to acknowledge the cordial assistance afforded him by all the Officers of the Institution during the year which has passed, and to express his appreciation of the efficient service rendered generally by the attendants and domestic servants.
