THE

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITING JUSTICES OF THE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM STAFFORD,

PRESENTED TO THE

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS 3rd JANUARY, 1876.

The Committee of Visiting Justices of the Stafford County Lunatic Asylum present the 57th Annual Report to the Court. During the past year 245 Lunatics have been admitted, of whom 129 were males and 116 females: 81 have been discharged—recovered, of whom 33 were males and 48 females: 7 males and 11 females have been discharged to the custody of their friends—relieved: 34 males and 23 females have been transferred to other Asylums, and 59 males and 45 females have died: one male escaped, but has since been admitted into the Burntwood Asylum, leaving in the Asylum 518, viz.—262 males and 256 females.

The admissions shew a slight falling off during the past year as compared with the previous one.

The average of the recoveries on the admissions have been at the rate of 32 per cent., and the average of deaths, on the total number under treatment, at 13 per cent.

The average of recoveries shews a decrease of 2 per cent. This is accounted for by the large number of chronic cases at the commencement of the year, only 48 out of 524 were likely to recover, and many of these have not realized the expectation.

The average of deaths is considerably higher, and may be accounted for from two causes, viz.—first, the severe weather of the past Spring, a great number of the very old, infirm, and paralyzed cases not having sufficient vital power left to resist such severity; and secondly, from the large number of cases brought in the last state of disease.

There are 1,025 Lunatics belonging to the County in the Asylums, viz.—518 at Stafford, 478 at Burntwood, and 29 at Worcester; there being vacancies on the 1st instant at Stafford for 17 males and 20 females, and at Burntwood for 11 males and 43 females. The patients at Worcester are paid for at the rate of 14s. per head per week, whilst the charge for the past year in the County Asylums was 9s. 4½d.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum in October last, when they reported, "We can speak favourably of the state of the clothing and general personal cleanliness of the patients, and that the Asylum is in good and efficient working order."

The whole of the outside of the Building and some of the internal has been painted during the past year, but the County Surveyor reports more inside painting and papering is required, which your Committee intend shall be carried out in the Spring.

The main portions of the Buildings are in good and substantial condition, except the roof of the Male Infirmary: the County Surveyor's attention having been called to it, he reported the best thing to be done would be to raise it, and it may be found necessary to put an asphalte roof, the same as was done to the Female Infirmary roof in 1870; also the joist under a tile floor in one of the wards has given way, and it is intended to substitute pitch-pine boards for tiles.

Your Committee has much pleasure in again recording its sense of the able management of the Superintendent and the good conduct of the officers and servants.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Stafford County Asylum, 15th October, 1875.

The following returns relate to the changes which have taken place among the patients since the last visit on the 26th October, 1874:—viz.,

The mortality, it will be observed, has been considerably above the average, but there have been no special circumstances to account for it beyond the unusual severity of the weather during the past Spring, which proved fatal to many general paralytics and aged persons. Amongst the registered causes of death, we find 27 attributed to general paralysis and 17 to old age and senile decay.

Generally the deaths were from causes ordinary in Asylums, but inquests were held on the bodies of three male and two female patients. In the two latter cases it was found that death had been caused by suffocation during epilepsy. One of the men, having been admitted with a cut throat, died from the injury on the following day. The second was suffocated from choking by food during dinner, and the third was found to have broken ribs upon his admission; but these injuries do not seem to have been the actual cause of death. In no case was any blame cast upon the Asylum management. Post-mortem examinations have been held in very few instances, the alleged reason being the small size of the dead-house. The general health at the present time is not unfavourable; and there were to-day only five patients in bed owing to bodily infirmity, whilst but two males and seven females are under medical treatment; but the large proportion of epileptics and general paralytics, formerly noticed, still continues, there being now resident 95 of the former and 35 of the latter.

The conduct of the patients, as we passed through the wards, was most orderly, and, except two or three women in the basement, there was no noise or confusion anywhere. We can also speak favourably of the state of the clothing and general personal cleanliness of the patients.

We found one man in seclusion; and, judging from the medical journal, it appears since the last visit 18 men and 15 women have been so treated. With the exception of three of the men and three of the women, in whose cases the instances of seclusion were numerous, it was rarely employed. In the case of one man, who was specially noticed at the last visit, it appears that he was

secluded for four hours daily up to the 16th April, after that for one hour daily until the 23rd of July, since when he has not been in seclusion at all.

We have nothing new to report as to the occupation and recreation of the patients; 201 men and 165 women are stated to be regularly occupied, and 247 of both sexes attend Chapel on Sundays. There is only one service on Sunday and no week-day prayers, but the Chaplain visits the wards twice a week. A School, averaging about 20 scholars, is still held in the Female Ward.

In compliance with a suggestion made in the last entry, two additional Attendants have been engaged for night service and the result has been a reduction of three-fifths in the nightly number of wet and dirty beds. We should be glad, considering the large number of epileptic and suicidal patients here, if some special arrangement could be made for their safety during the night by setting apart wards for their use.

A good deal of painting and decoration has been done. and additional carpets and articles of furniture have been These improvements have for the most part supplied. been limited to the female side as yet, but similar additions will be made in the men's ward, where it is also proposed to re-lay the floor of No. 3 Ward and substitute pitchpine boards for the tiles now used. A similar change in the Basement Wards in both divisions is, we believe, in contemplation and should, we think, be carried out as soon as possible. Mr. Pater also proposes applying to the Committee for powers to convert the present Dryingroom for foul beds and linen on the female side, into a general Bath-room for that division, a plan of which we entirely approve; the Drying-room in question having from its position been often offensive, and a general Bathroom being much needed. It is to be hoped that a suitable position will be found for a similar addition on the men's side.

The present weekly charge for patients is 9s. 4d., and the number of patients on the books is 524, of whom 258 are males and 266 females, leaving 19 vacant beds on the male and 10 on the female side.

In conclusion we have to report our opinion that the Asylum is in good and efficient working order, and the numerous improvements which have been been effected are creditable to the Medical Superintendent.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

County Asylum, Stafford, December 31st, 1875.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to place before you my Annual Report for the year 1875. During that period 129 male and 116 female patients have been admitted, making a total of 245. 81 patients have recovered, being 32 per cent. on the admissions. The deaths have been 104, or an average of 13 per cent. on the total number under treatment. This large mortality was mainly due to the severe weather of the earlier part of the year, and to the large number then in the house suffering from general paralysis, of the insane there having been 19 deaths from that disease alone during the first quarter. prevalence of this fatal form of insanity amongst the patients brought here accounts in a great measure for the comparatively low average of recoveries. inquests have been held during the year: one on a man admitted with broken ribs: one on a woman who died suffocated in an epileptic fit, and one on a man who choked whilst being fed with minced meat. The verdict in each case exonerated the Asylum officials from all blame. With the exception of a leg broken by the

patient falling, the above are the only serious accidents to record. The work formerly done by two paid upholsterers continues to be efficiently performed by patients under the supervision of the ordinary attendants, and with an annual saving in wages of £127.

The old hospital ward not being fitted for infirm cases has been converted into a ward for patients working in the Laundry and Kitchen, to which offices it is closely adjacent. By this arrangement it has been found practicable to reduce the number of servants by two, four Laundry-maid attendants now doing the work formerly done by three nurses and three laundry-women and at a decreased cost of £80 per annum. The new Infirmary is in the main building. These changes were carried out in the earlier part of the year, and experience proves them to work satisfactorily. The appointment of a second male and a second female night watch has considerably improved the faulty habits of many patients, and there has been a corresponding economy in the wear and destruction of clothes and bedding.

The new boilers are at work, but it is not at present possible to estimate the difference in the consumption of coal. The new Larder and Stores are approaching completion. The wooden joists supporting the tiled floor of one of the galleries having become decayed in consequence of the water used in washing the floor finding its way through the interstices of the tiles, it has been determined to re-floor the ward with wood. The new Female Foul Laundry and the conversion of the old one into a general Bath-room has not yet been commenced, but the necessary grant has been made by Quarter Sessions. The additional Engine may be expected to be in working order in a few weeks.

Much has been done by the Asylum Staff of Artizans, assisted by patients, towards giving the wards and dormitories that cheerful and comfortable appearance, so useful an accessory to treatment in a house devoted to the insane.

In conclusion I have to thank the officers and attendants for the valuable assistance I have received from them in the execution of my duties.
