



# REPORT

OF

# THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

### SURREY LUNATIC ASYLUM,

FOR THE YEAR 1851,

PRESENTED TO THE

COURT OF QUARTER SESSION,

HELD AT REIGATE, APRIL 6th, 1852.

THE Committee of Visitors, in presenting their Tenth Annual Report, beg to state, that at the commencement of their proceedings for the year they had much pleasure in reducing the weekly charge for the maintenance of patients from 8s. to 7s. 6d., and, at the termination of the year, they had every reason to believe that a further reduction might be made early in 1852.\*

\* 1n January, 1852, the weekly charge was reduced from 7s. 6d. to 7s.

The number of patients in the Asylum on the 1st January, 1851, was 782; and during the year, 359 additional patients were admitted, making a total of 1141. Of these, 53 males and 63 females were discharged cured; 25 males and 27 females were discharged uncured, and placed under the care of their friends, or removed to asylums in other counties, in which the parishes to which they respectively belonged were situated; and 59 males and 61 females died; leaving in the Asylum, at the close of the year, 853 patients; of whom, 374 were males, and 479 females. Of these, 66 were chargeable to the County, and 22 to parishes not in the County.

It will be observed that the number of patients in the Asylum at the close of the year was much greater than at its commencement, being, indeed, the largest number of inmates ever reported to the Court; but there was at that time accommodation for about fifty more patients, and it is still trusted that the expectations expressed in former Reports, as to the sufficiency of the Asylum for the requirements of the County, will not be disappointed. The number discharged cured was also greater than ever previously reported. Of these, 64 were presented, on leaving the Asylum, with donations from the Benevolent Fund, varying generally from ten to forty shillings; but in two cases, which appeared to require the special consideration of the Committee, the respective sums of five pounds and six pounds were granted.

The average number attending Chapel was 405; and an average of 487 was in constant employment on the Farm, or in the Garden, or within the walls of the Establishment.

The number of deaths was considerable, and must necessarily remain so, so long as parish officers continue, as some have done, to send patients to the Asylum in the last stages of bodily infirmity, and of whose recovery no hope whatever can reasonably be entertained—several of such cases have died very shortly after their arrival, and their removal to the Asylum must have occasioned them much suffering. As patients in this state generally require, as we are informed, no care or attention which cannot be afforded them in any well-regulated union infirmary, the Committee of Visitors trust that the Guardians of the several Unions in the County will direct their officers to send, in future, no patient whose life is known to the medical attendant of the union to be near its close, and whose mental condition is not such as to render him unfit for continuance in the workhouse; and Magistrates and Officiating Clergymen, to whom application may be made to sign "Orders for the Reception of Patients" into the Asylum, are solicited to co-operate with the Committee of Visitors in terminating so objectionable a practice.

Coroners' inquests were held in eight cases, mostly of sudden death.—The Verdicts of the Jury were —

In three cases	"Natural Death—Disease of the heart."

No blame attached in any instance to any of the officers or servants of the Establishment.

The Committee refer with much satisfaction to the tables appended, relating to the extent of restraint and seclusion resorted to in the Asylum during the year. From them it will be seen that mechanical restraint was not resorted to in any single instance, and the amount of seclusion was very much less than ever previously reported; notwithstanding which, the Committee bear willing testimony to the great increase of tranquillity and order, and cheerfulness and industry that was apparent during the year throughout the Institution.

Much attention was devoted during the year to the general improvement of the Establishment. Four of the wards, that were indifferently lighted, and very imperfectly warmed and ventilated, were made, by the removal of a few single rooms, and the introduction of open fire-places, not inferior to any other part of the Asylum. Alterations were made in various apartments for the purpose of improving the ventilation. No fewer than eighty-seven enamelled iron basins were fixed in different parts of the building, and each provided with a suitable supply of water, with the view of increasing the means of personal cleanliness for the patients, for which no provision had been made proportionate with the great increase that had taken place in the number of inmates. Numerous additional store-closets and cupboards were made and fixed. The original Visitors' rooms, which were at all times too small, were appropriated to other purposes; and the long galleries of communication between the old and the new buildings were provided with benches, stoves, &c. and set apart for the use of patients' friends, for which they are well adapted, being both spacious and accessible. The means for making gas were greatly increased. A large cow-house, built of wood, and in a very decayed state, was converted into a substantial brick building; and various other important improvements were made, in addition to the ordinary repairs of the Asylum. Notwithstanding which, the amount obtained from the Treasurer of the County, for works of this kind, was nearly £500 less than in the preceding year.

It will be in the remembrance of the Court

that the Committee of Visitors, on two former occasions, adverted to the inadequate supply of water to the Asylum: but that before the

of water to the Asylum; but that before the completion of the year 1850 they flattered themselves the evil had been remedied by the introduction of more powerful pumps, placed at a greater depth than those previously used. These hopes, however, proved delusive. The yield of the well, during the last summer, was less than ever, and the adoption of immediate measures for securing a sufficient supply became indispensable. After much serious consideration, as to the best means by which this might be effected, the Committee determined on accepting an offer made to them by the Lambeth Water-Works Company, to supply daily, not less than 40,000 gallons of pure water, taken from the Thames at Thames Ditton; and to deliver the same into the highest cisterns of the Asylum, at the cost of £180 per annum. The Committee also directed tenders to be obtained for the laying of large pipes from the mains of the Company at Garrett to the Asylum, the cost of which was estimated at about £250; and at the close of the year they had every reason to believe that the whole arrangement would be completed, and the water

laid on early in the following February.— It is to be observed, that the whole of the annual payment for this supply of water must not be regarded as a permanent addition to the expenditure of the Establishment, as the expense of raising water by steam power, and superintending and renewing the machinery, which has hitherto been considerable, will, in future, be greatly diminished, if not altogether avoided.

The Committee had the satisfaction, during the year, to diminish both the weekly charge for maintenance, and the amount of claims on the County for repairs; whilst, at the same time, they increased considerably the comfort and convenience of the patients. They dare not flatter themselves that any further reduction in the weekly charge can be made, consistently with a continuance of that effective supervision and liberal treatment which it has been their aim to extend, under the judicious advice of their medical officers, to their deeply afflicted charge; they trust, however, when some other repairs and improvements, which are indispensable, have been completed, a further reduction may be made in the claims on

the County Treasurer; and they assure the Magistrates, and the Guardians of the several Unions in the County, that no exertions shall be wanting on their part to secure at all times the effective administration of the Asylum, with every proper regard to economy.

GENTLEMEN,

In compliance with your Regulations we have the honor to present to you the following statement of the medical statistics of the Asylum for the year 1851.

At the date of the last Report there were 782 patients in the Asylum; since which, 359 have been admitted, and 288 have been discharged, or died, leaving 853 at the close of the year.

The total number of patients in the Asylum, during the year, was 1141; the highest number at any time was 853, the lowest was 782; and the average number under treatment, during the whole period, was 834.

The number of cures, it is gratifying to observe, exceeds that of any former year, and the per centage (upwards of 10 per cent,) is nearly the same as last year.

The per centage of deaths is considerable, being  $10\frac{1}{2}$ . Of the 120 deaths, 38 occurred in patients received during the year—many soon after admission, and in the last stage of bodily disease.

It gives your medical officers great pleasure to report the recovery of more than ten patients, in whom mental disorder had existed so long, that there appeared but little probability of a favourable termination. In the case of one of the females, the disorder had existed upwards of twenty years. With a little assistance from the Benevolent Fund this poor woman is now able to support herself by making shawls.

Another female, who had been twelve years insane, on her discharge succeeded to a little property—she now conducts herself with great propriety and respectability.

A young male patient sent to the Asylum, stated to have been imbecile from birth, gradually acquired strength of mind, and learned the trade of shoemaking before he was discharged. B

In the Male Department, occupation in the farm, garden, and workshops-and in the Female Department, needlework of various kinds, and household work, together with instruction and amusements suited to the different sexes, continue to be extensively employed, and to exert great influence in restoring the patients to health of body and of mind, and in rendering the Asylum cheerful and comfortable. The feelings expressed by many of the recovered patients, who occasionally visit their acquaintances (still inmates of the Asylum), and those concerned in the management, evince, in a striking manner, that they fully appreciate the unvarying kindness and sympathy they experienced during their own abode in it, and which they remember with gratitude.

Summerstown Parsonage, Wandsworth, February, 1852.

### GENTLEMEN,

I am happy in being able to present the same cheering report as heretofore of the tendency of the Chaplain's offices to soothe and comfort the minds of the insane. I scarcely know where that effect is more visibly marked than among a considerable number of the inmates of your County Asylum, in various stages of their disorder, who seem to find much pleasure in attending the Services of the Chapel, and to be greatly gratified by any notice the Chaplain takes of them in private intercourse. The cordial support he invariably receives from the Medical B 2 Gentlemen is not only a matter of thankful acknowledgment, but of much encouragement. Indeed, in no part of my own ministerial labours do I meet with more co-operation and confidence, which makes my office here truly a labour of love.

I have to report the very satisfactory result of the experiment you permitted me to make, of admitting some of the Patients to the Holy Communion, under the guidance of the Medical Officers, with the proviso, that the Patients spontaneously desired that privilege. With these necessary precautions, the number of communicants at any given time has been small, since the poor in this country are known to have been neglectful of that ordinance. We have not seen cause to regret the permission, but very much the reverse.

I think, perhaps, you might like me to specify an instance from each side of the Institution.—A very old man died not long since, after a sojourn of many years in this Asylum; whatever were his delusions, I considered him to be a most pious Christian—it was no small pleasure to me to see him repeatedly drawing near to the table of the Lord, and taking the Holy Sacrament, to his evident comfort.— Again, a female Patient, who expressed much desire to be a partaker thereof, with the Surgeon's full approval as well as my own, enjoyed that privilege on two occasions before her decease; and was remarked to have thenceforth conquered greatly the irritability which so often attends derangement.


I have selected these two cases, because, if it had not been for your kind assent to my request, they would not have enjoyed that blessed means of grace before they departed hence and were no more seen.



The following observations will explain the medical terms used in *Tables Nos.* 12 § 13.

The phenomena of insanity may be comprehended under three heads, those of Unreasonable Conduct, Incoherent Discourse, and Erroneous Ideas or Delusions. These have been again divided into two classes, one including the symptoms of a deranged, the other those of a weak mind, constituting the Lunacy and Idiocy of legal writers.

Derangement of mind may be either general, affecting the different manifestations of mind, including attention, memory, imagination, judgment, and the affections and propensities; or it may be partial, affecting only some of them. The term Mania is applied to general insanity, and that of Monomania to partial insanity.

Weakness of mind may, in like manner, be general, or it may be partial; it may also be congenital, that is, from infancy. It is, when general, termed Idiocy, and the term Imbecility has been applied to slighter degrees of weakness of mind when congenital.

Weakness of mind, however, is not always from birth; it frequently occurs after the full possession of the mental faculties, and then the term Dementia or Fatuity is employed to distinguish this state, which is analagous to Idiocy; and the term Incipient Dementia is used to mark the lesser degree of weak mind analagous to Imbecillity, and modified by the previous circumstances of the patient. This last-mentioned stage in its various stages is very common in Asylums, where we often find the original character of the mental disorder more or less blended with weakness of memory, and incoherence of ideas. It also usually accompanies palsy and epilepsy, and is frequently the state of mind in old age.

In most cases of Mania the ideas are erroneous. Occasionally the unreasonable conduct of the insane person is not attended with this feature, but appears to be the effect of strong propensities overcoming the power of reason and of will. The term Mania, without Delirum, has been applied to this variety, which is not of frequent occurrence.
