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

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REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

SURREY LUNATIC ASYLUM,

FOR THE YEAR 1852,

PRESENTED TO THE

COURT OF QUARTER SESSION,

HELD AT REIGATE, APRIL 5th, 1853.

The Committee of Visitors in presenting the Eleventh Annual Report of their proceedings in the Asylum, have much pleasure in stating that the weekly charge of 7s. for the maintenance of each patient during the past year has not only been sufficient, but there is reason to believe it may with propriety be continued during a part, if not the whole, of the year 1853, notwithstanding that the contract prices of provisions and stores are considerably advanced.

There were in the Asylum on the 1st of January last 853 patients; and during the year 360 additional patients were admitted, making a total of 1213. Of these, 64 males and 112 females were discharged cured; 28 males and 24 females were restored to their friends under the provisions of the statute, or were placed in asylums in other counties, in which the parishes to which they respectively belonged were situated; and 57 males and 44 females died; leaving in the Asylum, on the 31st December last, 884 patients; of whom, 396 were males, and 488 females.

The applications for the admission of patients during the past year continued undiminished notwithstanding the great number previously received; and it is considered necessary, for the general information of the County, to repeat here, part of the Quarterly Report of the Committee presented at the last Epiphany Sessions on this subject.

[&]quot;The Committee regret to report that their expectations as to the sufficiency of the Asylum for the requirements of the County have not been realized. In 1846 it became

"necessary to enlarge the Establishment, in consequence of there being no fewer than 289 pauper lunatics in the County for whom admission into the Asylum was required, but for whom there was no room in the Building. The Court then directed that provision should be made for 500 additional patients, and this was completed about the close of the year 1848; since which the admissions and discharges have been as follows:—

"Of the total number of patients in the "Asylum on the 31st December, 1852, 396 "were males, being the extreme number of patients of this sex the Asylum is capable of accommodating; and during the preceding three weeks 8 male patients were refused admission in consequence of there being no "room for them.

"The Asylum is sufficiently large to contain 502 female patients, and there were this "number in the Building a few months since, and further admissions were then required; the Committee therefore proceeded to erect two additional dormitories* and two attendants' rooms at an estimated expenditure of about £700 (to be taken from the balance in the hands of the Committee), and these are now nearly completed, whereby provision is made for 32 additional female patients.

"By similar arrangements in the department for male patients, accommodation can be made for about 40 additional males, but as it will be necessary to provide for these a separate day-room, bath-room, washing-place, water-closet, and a number of single sleeping-rooms (much required for male patients), the cost of the whole will be so considerable as to render it necessary that the Committee should have the direct authority of the Court for the extension before it be commenced.

^{*} The intention of the Committee was to erect a store-room, a dormitory, and two attendant's rooms, whereby a large dormitory, now used as a store-room, might be appropriated to its original purpose; but the Resident Medical Officer for female patients has thought it best to use the two new rooms as dormitories, and continue the store-room in its present use.

"The expense of an enlargement of this kind, including furniture and outfit, is estimated at £1500; and there are works at the "Farm buildings of the Asylum which have for some time been required to be executed, but which have been postponed from time to time; other works requiring more immediate attention. These works can, however, be no longer delayed with propriety, and the expense of them is estimated at £500. Under these circumstances the Committee request the Court to permit them to undertake these several works, provided they can be com pleted for a sum not exceeding £2000."

The Court fully approving the recommendation of the Committee, directed the works to be executed, and appropriated for that purpose £2000 out of the funds obtained by the sale of the prisons at Brixton, Guildford, and Kingston.

The enlargement of the Asylum to the extent proposed will consequently be commenced immediately, and it is satisfactory to know that its completion will be effected without any addition to the debt of the County.

The number of patients discharged "well" during the year greatly exceeds the number similarly discharged in any preceding year. Of these, 67 were presented with donations of from ten to twenty shillings each from the Benevolent Fund.

The average number of patients attending Chapel was 416; and an average of 535 were daily employed in various trades, in labour on the Farm, or in the Garden, or at needle-work, or in the various domestic works of the Establishment.

The number of deaths, although considerable, was not so great as in the preceding year. Many of them occurred in cases recently sent to the Asylum in the last stages of bodily infirmity, and when, as reported last year, recovery was hopeless; the only attention and treatment requisite being such as could be afforded in the sick ward of any well-regulated workhouse.

Coroners' Inquests were held in 4 cases of sudden death. The verdicts of the Jury were as follows:

In one case, "Asphyxia—Choked by a piece of Beef." In one case, "Natural Death—from an Epileptic Fit."

In one case, "Natural Death—from a Fit of Apoplexy."

In one case, "Deceased caused her death by Hanging,
being of unsound mind at the time.

We the Jury, consider there had been
every precaution taken on the part of
the officials to prevent such an occurrence."

There are appended to this Report, as usual, the Reports of the Medical Officers, the Accounts, and other Statistics of the Asylum, but in consequence of the resignation of the Chaplaincy of the Institution by the Rev. R. F. Chambers, and the circumstance of his successor, the Rev. John Bridger, not having been appointed until after the close of the year, a Report from this officer has on this occasion been dispensed with.

The Committee refer with much pleasure to the Tables respecting Restraint and Seclusion, from which it appears that during the year (as was the case in the preceding year) restraint by mechanical means was not resorted to in any instance, and the amount of restraint by seclusion was much diminished. A result so satisfactory reflects great credit on all the officers and attendants of the Establishment, as it can only be obtained by the exercise of constant vigilance and kindness on their part.

In their last Annual Report the Committee were enabled to state that their demands on the County for the repairs of the Asylum were nearly £500 less than in the preceding year. During the past year a further diminution of not less than £267 was effected under this head of expenditure, whilst no reasonable expense was spared to promote the comfort of the patients, and secure for the Asylum a continuance of the general commendation it has received from its commencement, with a few specimens of which, as entered in the Visitors' Book of the Asylum, the Committee on this occasion will close their Report.

EXTRACTS FROM THE VISITORS' BOOK.

Surrey County Asylum.

1852—July 3. There are 873 patients in this Asylum, of whom 376 are males and 497 are females.

Since the last visit of the Commissioners, on the 25th February, 1851, 471 patients have been admitted, 401 have been discharged, and 156 have died; the principal causes of death being Paralysis, Exhaustion after Mania, Epilepsy, and Decay of Nature.

It appears by the Register that 35 patients are at present under medical treatment, and that no one is subjected to mechanical restraint. There appears by the Register to have been a few patients secluded at different times, but the instances are very rare.

We learn that about 555 patients (205 males and 350 females) are employed in various ways; and that about 420 patients of both sexes attend Chapel, where the Church Service is read every Sunday. There are also daily prayers read to about 300 patients.

The Asylum is clean and in good condition, and the patients generally tranquil. We notice with pleasure that a considerable number of settees and easy chairs have been procured for the sick and infirm patients, and that recesses with windows have been formed (by removing two single rooms in each case) in several of the wards. These appear to us to be a great improvement, and add much to the

cheerfulness and good ventilation of the wards where they are introduced. An open fireplace which has been added (opposite to each recess) increases the comfort of these arrangements.

We are glad to observe that the strong iron gates in the staircases have been removed; that bowls have been purchased for the use of the patients; and that some canary birds and a pigeon-house (with pigeons) are about to be introduced.

We are informed that five single rooms are about to be fitted up for the use of suicidal patients, and we beg to suggest that the attention of the Engineer should at the same time be directed to the other bed-rooms, with the view of removing all projections and other means by which patients may by possibility injure themselves.

On reference to the printed Report we find that an accurate account of the time spent in seclusion by the patients during the year 1851 has been kept, and that only 16 males and 5 females have been secluded at different times, generally for a few hours, and seldom for more than 1 day each. There has been no instance of mechanical restraint on either side of the Asylum throughout the year.

The dresses of the patients appeared to us to be clean, neat, and comfortable, and the Asylum altogether to be in a very satisfactory state.

1852—July 22. 1852—July 30. Being at present occupied in visiting the different Lunatic Asylums of England and France, for the purpose of observing all improvements in the treatment of the Insane (on the part of the Government of the Mauritius), I feel it a duty, at the same time that I record my gratitude to the Medical Officers for the great attention I have received from them, to state, that in no Asylum that I have visited have I found the results of judicious and effective management more forcibly exemplified than in this Asylum. I have been through the wards, both during the day and night, with the Medical Officers, and must say that in no other Asylum have I seen the patients so tranquil.

I have been particularly struck by the neat and comfortable appearance of the female attendants, and by the admirable order and cleanliness maintained in their wards.

1852—August 24. The Guardians of Saint Olave's Union have visited this Asylum with the same satisfaction which they have felt on former occasions. The general state and

THE MEDICAL OFFICERS

OF THE

SURREY COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM,

1st January, 1853.

GENTLEMEN,

Another year having elapsed, it is our duty to lay before you a statistical statement of the Medical department of the Asylum for the past year.

At the date of our last Report there were 853 patients in the Asylum; since which, 360 have been admitted, and 329 have been discharged, or died; leaving at the close of the year 884.

The total number of patients in the Asylum, during the year, was 1213; the highest number at any time was 895, the lowest was 853;

and the average number under treatment, during the whole period, was 868.

The number of recoveries is greater, and that of deaths is less, than in the preceding year, being nearly 14½ per cent of the former, and little more than 8 per cent of the latter. Seeing that this Asylum, unlike the hospitals of Bethlem and St. Luke's, is obliged to receive every description of patients—paralytic, epi-

leptic, idiotic, and dying, this result is very gratifying.

There are two varieties of disorder admitted into the Asylum, of which the prospect of recovery is so small that they are excluded from the hospitals above mentioned.

Of these almost hopeless cases we have the satisfaction to Report, that during the last year several cases of insanity, combined with symptoms of general paralysis, and several cases combined with epilepsy, have been restored to reason and to their friends. The happy result of recovery, where insanity existed long, noticed in former Reports, continues to

encourage perseverance in curative means in such cases, for in 6 male patients and in 16 female patients insanity had existed several years before a cure was effected.

It is a fact to be recorded, that during the past year a very large number of the patients admitted have been disposed to suicide. In other county asylums a similar unusual tendency has been observed. As this has not been associated with poverty, or any other especial cause, it is possible that some morbific atmospheric influence has existed peculiarly depressing to the nervous system.

The following observations will explain the medical terms used in *Tables Nos.* 12 & 13.

The phenomena of Insanity may be comprehended under three heads, those of Unreasonable Conduct, Incoherent Discourse, and Erroneous Ideas or Delusions. These have been again divided into two classes, one including the symptoms of a deranged, the other those of a weak mind, constituting the Lunacy and Idiocy of legal writers.

Derangement of mind may be either general, affecting the different manifestations of mind, including attention, memory, imagination, judgment, and the affections and propensities; or it may be partial, affecting only some of them. The term Mania is applied to general insanity, and that of Monomania to partial insanity.

Weakness of mind may, in like manner, be general, or it may be partial; it may also be congenital, that is, from infancy. It is, when general, termed Idiocy, and the term Imbecility has been applied to slighter degrees of weakness of mind when congenital.

Weakness of mind, however, is not always from birth; it frequently occurs after the full possession of the mental faculties, and then the term Dementia or Fatuity is employed to distinguish this state, which is analagous to Idiocy; and the term Incipient Dementia is used to mark the lesser degree of weak mind analagous to imbecility, and modified by the previous circumstances of the patient. This last-mentioned state in its various stages is very common in Asylums, where we often find the original character of the mental disorder more or less blended with weakness of memory, and incoherence of ideas. It also usually accompanies palsy and epilepsy, and is frequently the state of mind in old age.

In most cases of Mania the ideas are erroneous. Occasionally the unreasonable conduct of the insane person is not attended with this feature, but appears to be the effect of strong propensities overcoming the power of reason and of will. The term Mania, without Delirium, has been applied to this variety, which is not of frequent occurrence.
