SESSION

The Committee on Visitors, appointed by the Board of Commissioners of the General Land Office, in pursuance of an act of Congress, approved March 3, 1879, and continued by subsequent acts, has the honor to submit herewith its report for the year 1880, in connection with the session of the Board of Commissioners, held at Washington, D. C., from the 1st to the 15th of December, 1880.

The Board of Commissioners, at its session of the 1st of December, 1880, adopted the following resolution: "Resolved, That the Committee on Visitors be and they are authorized to report to the Board at its next session, the result of their investigations and inquiries into the manner in which the land offices are conducted, and the efficiency of the system of land sales, and to make such recommendations as they may deem proper for the improvement of the same."

The Committee, in pursuance of the above resolution, has held several public hearings, and has received many suggestions from the public, and has also conducted extensive inquiries into the manner in which the land offices are conducted, and the efficiency of the system of land sales, and has the honor to submit herewith its report thereon.

HELD AT REIGATE on the 9th day of APRIL, 1861.

THE Committee of Visitors in presenting their Nineteenth Annual Report have to state that at the commencement of the year 1860 there were 938 Patients in the Asylum, and that during the year 233 additional Patients were

admitted, making a total of 1,171; of these, 47 males and 26 females were discharged cured; 17 males and 20 females were discharged uncured, and 85 males and 34 females died; leaving in the Asylum at the close of the year 942 patients, of whom 436 were males and 506 females.

Of those discharged cured, 39 were presented with gratuities from the Benevolent Fund, varying from five to forty shillings each.

Of the deaths, 4 occurred under circumstances requiring Coroner's inquests. The particulars of these cases will be found in the annexed Report of the Chief Resident Physician.

The average number attending chapel was 385, and an average of 427 was in daily employment.

At the close of 1859 the Architect of the Committee was placed in communication with the Commissioners in Lunacy, and, acting on

suggestions made by them, he prepared new plans for the enlargement of the Asylum, which were laid before the General Court of Quarter Sessions, held at Reigate on the 3rd of April, 1860, and were approved; and it was ordered, that on their receiving the further approval of the Secretary of State as required by the Statute the 16th and 17th Vic. cap. 97, they should be carried out.

This further approval was not obtained.

It was withheld on the ground that the Secretary of State objected to any enlargement of the building upon the existing site; but he informed the Committee, that subject to the purchase and hiring of the land as proposed in 1858 being sanctioned by the Justices at Quarter Session and completed, he would approve of the plans for the additional Buildings as last submitted and amended in accordance with the recommendations of the Commissioners in Lunacy; the Land to be hired to be used solely for the occupation of the Patients, and not for building purposes.

In consequence of this information, the Committee at the General Court of Quarter Session, held at Kingston on the 16th October, 1860, again recommended that the Land referred to should be purchased and rented; but the Court declined to comply with the recommendation, and appointed a Committee of Justices with full powers to inquire into, and report upon the site for a new Lunatic Asylum, and to make further provision for the pauper Lunatics of the County.

During the year Dr. Moore, the junior Assistant Medical Officer resigned, and Mr. William Orange, a Surgeon with testimonials of a high order, was appointed his successor.

The Buildings of the Asylum, and the whole of its Machinery, Furniture, and Fittings, have been kept in good repair; but the Committee are sorry to report that the new Well, although taken down to the depth, it is believed of more than 100 feet below that of any other well in the neighbourhood, does not afford the supply of water that was expected, and is required.

It is now intended, under the advice of the Engineer superintending the work, to perforate many of the bore pipes, by which means it is believed that the supply of water will be greatly increased.

The charge for the maintenance of the Patients has during the year been nine shillings per week, being one shilling per week more than during the preceding year; this increased charge is to be attributed in some respect to the continued high price of provisions, but chiefly to the circumstance, that in consequence of the insufficiency of the Asylum, the Patients sent for admission are with few exceptions those which require much more than ordinary care, and thereby render indispensable the services of an additional number of Attendants, as well as increase the general expenditure of the Establishment in many other respects: this deficiency of accommodation has also led to the retention of insane persons in Union Houses to a greater extent than would otherwise have been the case; but in some Unions the Guardians, regarding the retention of cases supposed

to be harmless as unobjectionable, have prepared Wards in the Union Houses for their accommodation, and not only decline to send such cases to the Asylum, but in some instances have requested that cases now in the Asylum, which they consider to be of this class, should be discharged. The Committee have, however, ascertained that some of these cases cannot be considered as harmless, and they have not felt themselves at liberty to discharge the remainder, whose harmlessness is less questionable, without the consent required by 77th Section of the Statute the 16th and 17th Vic. cap. 97, which has not been obtained.

Of Dr. Meyer, the Chief Resident Physician, and the other Officers of the Asylum, the Committee have much pleasure in speaking in terms of high commendation; of the conduct of the Servants of the Asylum, who have been any considerable time in the service of the County, the Committee have also to speak in terms of approbation, and it is trusted that those who have been only recently engaged, will be found on greater experience to be worthy of the con-

fidence the Committee are desirous of placing in them.

For information respecting the numerous and important improvements which have been made in the management of the Asylum and the treatment of the Patients during the past year, as well as respecting the Receipts and Expenditure of the Committee, and the Statistics of the Asylum during the same period, reference is made to the Reports of the Chief Resident Physician and the Chaplain, the Accounts, and the numerous Statistical Tables which are appended as usual.

Of the 16 cases above described, 7 were cases of General Paralysis.

The Establishment has been free from epidemic disease. The statistics of a large Me-

tropolitan Asylum are affected by so many circumstances, that their value can hardly at any time be great.

Bethlem Hospital receives many curable cases which would naturally otherwise find their way to the County Asylum.

Cases discharged from Bethlem as incurable, or, from the same reason, refused admission there, are occasionally received here.

In the absence of accommodation for all the Pauper Lunatics having claims upon the County of Surrey, many patients are in the first instance forwarded to a Private Asylum. After a more or less lengthened interval, the cases remaining under treatment are transferred to the County Asylum, such transfers naturally comprise a large proportion of chronic incurable cases. A further result of the absence of the accommodation above-mentioned is, that from many Parishes the worst cases only are sent to the County Asylum. The Patients generally taken from the poor of the densely populated

districts of the great Metropolis are of the worst description. Of the Admissions during the past year, 66 males and 36 females were considered as possibly curable; 91 males and 38 females as probably incurable. Of those admitted, 21 males and 5 females have died within the year. In some instances parishes are, from motives of economy, desirous of retaining in their own hands paupers of unsound mind, supposed to be quiet and harmless, and they wish to remove such patients, from time to time, from the Asylum. The adoption of such a plan must lead to great changes in the working of this Establishment; an increasing demand for paid labour in the wards, as well as in the kitchen, the laundries, the garden, and on the farm, would of necessity arise. Expensive alterations in the building itself would become necessary. At this time the accumulation of helpless and feeble patients is making itself felt; there is a considerably increased consumption of the extra articles of diet required to meet the wants of such cases. Wards, but recently easy of management, are now crowded with patients requiring constant

attention ; in other words, an increased number of attendants.

Four Inquests have been held in the Asylum during the year, all upon male patients ; in three instances death was caused by the passage of food into the trachea and bronchial tubes. In one instance the man died suddenly from diseased heart. An Inquest was also held upon the body of a patient at the request of his friends and neighbours, after removal from the Asylum. A verdict of "Natural death from diseased brain" was returned.

In November, 1859, an additional Night Attendant was appointed for each division of the Asylum ; since that arrangement no death from suffocation has occurred.

A Head Attendant has been appointed. Such a step must necessarily be unpopular with the body of the Attendants ; nevertheless, on no occasion has any complaint been made of the manner in which this officer performs his duties. I have every reason to be satisfied

with him; his presence early and late can hardly fail to have beneficial results.

A straw house has been erected for the male division, and straw beds have been introduced upon the principle that a sweet and clean bed tick, stuffed with fresh straw, both renewed daily, is more wholesome and more comfortable for the use of dirty patients than hair or coir mattresses dried daily and renewed at intervals.

Two roomy sheds, with seats, have been erected in the male airing court.

Boarded floors have been laid down in the single rooms in Nos. 2 and 3 Wards in the female division; some addition has been made to the furniture in the wards.

The clothing of the male patients has been improved, specially by the more general use of cotton drawers and Guernseys during the winter months. A small addition has been made to the house diet. The weekly allowance of meat is now 2 lbs. 11 oz. for the males, and

2 lbs. 8 oz. for females. In order to facilitate the more strictly professional work, copies of the register are kept on loose sheets in each ward. On these sheets entries are made in the presence of the patients, more or less often, as the nature of the case may require. When the case is closed, these entries are copied into the register. This plan was adopted early in 1859, and has been found to work satisfactorily.

Three male patients succeeded in escaping from the Asylum. Neither of them were retaken within the 14 days allowed by Act of Parliament. One of them was re-admitted, and has been since discharged recovered.

On the resignation of Dr. Moore, Mr. Orange was appointed Junior Assistant Medical Officer. I have found in him an able assistant and an agreeable colleague.

The increasing number of lunatics in this and other counties has given rise to a question of no small importance—the best size for a public lunatic asylum.

Large asylums have been very generally condemned, and strong opinions have been expressed that no asylum ought to contain more than 400 or 500 patients, principally on the ground that one man cannot himself superintend more than that number.

The magistrates of a county having to provide accommodation for a large number—say 1,500 lunatics—may adopt one of two plans. They may build three asylums, each to contain 500 patients, each asylum having its medical superintendent and assistant medical officer, its steward, office, and staff of mechanics; probably also its own committee of visitors, with their clerk. Or they may erect suitable buildings for 1,500 lunatics on one site, though not in one block. They may place the whole establishment under the general direction of one officer, who would be responsible for the efficiency of those serving under him; who would be a competent judge of the manner in which the work was done by those entrusted with subdivisions of the asylum, himself giving an uniform character to the whole.

As the duties of the superintendent would be those of general management and inspection only, and as it would be necessary to give the assistant medical officers liberal salaries and allowances, no saving would probably be effected in the expense of the medical staff; not so in other important items. One office only would be required; one bakery, one gaswork, one brewery, one foreman of works, one bailiff. Less land would meet the wants of 1,500 patients located on the same site than would be required for the erection of three separate asylums for the accommodation of the same number of insane.

I would not wish to be considered as advocating the cause of very large asylums, but rather the erection of several moderate-sized asylums on one site, with certain officers and buildings in common; thus combining economy with efficiency.

Dr. Biggs has continued to afford me his valuable aid as Senior Assistant Medical Officer. From Mr. Bridgland and the officers generally

I have received every assistance in the performance of my duties as Superintendent.

I acknowledge gratefully the support I have received at the hands of the Committee of Visitors—a support I shall always endeavour to merit.
