

REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

SURREY LUNATIC ASYLUM,

FOR THE YEAR 1853,

PRESENTED TO THE

COURT OF QUARTER SESSION,

HELD AT REIGATE, APRIL 4th, 1854.

THE Committee of Visitors, in presenting their Twelfth Annual Report, regret that they are no longer able to maintain the patients, as during the last two years, at the weekly charge of 7s. each. The contract prices of provisions and stores advanced considerably at Christmas, 1852, and a further advance took place at Midsummer, 1853; but the Committee, trusting that these advances would be of a temporary character, were induced to prefer submitting to a diminution to some extent of the funds at their disposal for current expenses, rather than increase the cost of patients to the parishes. At Christmas, 1853, the part of these funds so expended amounted to £1,408. 1s. 5d., which was much more than could be conveniently spared, and a further extensive advance in the prices of most articles of consumption having then occurred, an increase in the amount of weekly charge for the maintenance of the patients became indispensible.*

There were in the Asylum on the 1st of January 1853—884 patients; and during the year 329 more were admitted, making a total of 1213. Of these, 65 males and 104 females were discharged cured; 26 males and 30 females were removed uncured; and 65 males and 52 females died; leaving in the Establishment, at the close of the year, 871 patients; of whom, 376 were males, and 495 females.

Of the patients discharged well, 67 were presented with donations from the Benevolent Fund varying from ten to forty shillings each. The distribution of this bounty affords to the Committee much satisfaction; and whilst it is always most gratefully received by the patients, it is trusted that, by diminishing the difficulties so frequently attendant on the recovery,

of the means of maintaining themselves, it prevents, in many, the recurrence of that distressing malady with which they have so recently been afflicted. In order, also, that the uncured patients may participate, grants are often made from this fund in furtherance of their amusement; and in some instances the expenses incurred in permitting patients to visit their friends, in the company of attendants, are provided.

On this subject Dr. Diamond, one of the Resident Medical Officers, reports as follows :--" I also beg to call the attention of the Com-"mittee to the extremely trivial circumstances "which induce the Workhouse authorities to " return patients here. It frequently happens " that an inmate who is a little troublesome in " the Workhouse is threatened to be sent back " to the Asylum. This not only irritates the " persons, but they, knowing themselves to be "more comfortable here than in the Union "House, by their own conduct favour their "own removal. They are often returned to " us as sane in their minds as at the time of " their discharge. They conform to our Rules, " and give us no trouble whatever. This also " takes place, frequently, when there is a wish " to transfer a patient from the charge of a " Parish to that of the County."

Admitted in the same period 1319 Males; 1391 Females; Total 2710.

Hence it is clear that the average number of cures amongst the females is greater than amongst the males, and that the reverse is the case with regard to deaths.

Of the number of deaths during the year,

three occurred under circumstances requiring Coroners' Inquests. The verdicts in each case are stated at length in the accompanying Report of the Medical Officers; and it is satisfactory to find that they impute neither neglect nor blame to any one.

Under the superintendence of Mr. Snape, one of the Resident Medical Officers, music has been extensively introduced into the Asylum, and a band has been formed amongst the attendants and patients with much success. He reports that, "the effect of music on "those suffering from mental disease is marked "and very beneficial; it soothes and tranquil-"lizes the excited, and gives much satisfaction " and enjoyment to all."

This band is in full requisition on the occurrence of those periodical entertainments which have always been permitted and encouraged amongst the patients, and which are on all occasions anticipated with pleasure, and attended with the happiest results.

The year being the jubilee of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Managers of that Institution kindly offered to the Asylum a donation of Bibles as a part of their jubilee proceedings. The Committee were of opinion that they ought not to trespass to any considerable extent on the bounty of the Managers of that Society, but still feeling unwilling to decline for the patients all participation in their generosity on such an occasion, consented to receive a small supply; and accordingly thirty Bibles, and sixty Testaments and Psalms in various types, and a German Bible, were sent and gratefully accepted.

An interesting Report from the Rev. J. Bridger, the Chaplain of the Asylum, is annexed. He was elected on the 1st January, 1853, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of his predecessor, and shortly afterwards he received the licence of the Bishop of the Diocese for the appointment as required by statute. His testimonials were of the highest order, and the Committee have much reason to be pleased with the efficient manner in which he performs his sacred duties.

The Committee have been much occupied during the year in making the alterations in

the Asylum, ordered by the Sessions in January 1853, and fully described in the last Annual Report. They have, also, upon the recommendation of the Resident Medical Officers, and with their concurrence, decided on the means by which a much larger amount of occupation may be provided for the patients. Their chief inducement for these proceedings was the advantage the patients would derive from them as remedial measures, it being universally admitted that judicious employment tends materially to the recovery of the insane. A second inducement was the consideration that the economical working of the Asylum would be greatly promoted thereby. In furtherance of these objects, a field, previously under the plough, has been put under spade husbandry, and the whole of the land in the occupation of the Committee, not in grass, is now cultivated by the patients. An extensive range of workshops, approved and ordered to be provided by the Sessions in June last, are about to be commenced. When they are completed, all the clothing of the patients will be made in the Establishment, whereas at present much is obtained ready-made by contract, there being no accommodation for

the manufacture of this portion of it in the Asylum.

The usual elaborate Tables are appended. From them it will be seen that the amount of seclusion resorted to in the Asylum is less than on any former occasion; and, as in more than one preceding year, mechanical restraint has not been resorted to in any instance.

During the year, the Statute, the 16 & 17 VIC., c. 97, entitled "An Act to consolidate "and amend the Laws for the Provision and "Regulation of Lunatic Asylums for Counties "and Boroughs, and for the Maintenance and "Care of Pauper Lunatics in England," came into operation, repealing the statute under which the Asylum had previously been conducted.

By this statute the Committee are required to lay before the Justices in every county, at the Court of General Quarter Session holden next after the 20th December in every year, (which, in this county, will always be the Epiphany Sessions, commencing on some occasions before the close of the year,) a report, in writing, of the state and condition of the Asylum, and as to its sufficiency for the proper accommodation of the number of Lunatics for whom it may be requisite to provide accommodation, and as to the management of such Asylum, and the conduct of the officers and servants thereof, with such observations in relation to any matter connected with such Asylum as the Committee may see fit. It is obvious the Committee could not have prepared by that Sessions a Report of their general proceedings in the Asylum during the preceding year; neither would there be time to have prepared those Annual Accounts and those numerous Tables furnished by the Medical Officers, which they are led to believe are of great value as medical statistics. Under these circumstances, the Committee directed the attention of the Resident Medical Officers, in whom, as well as in the other officers of the Institution, they continue to have confidence, to the requirements of the statute, and obtained from them separate Reports which, containing much important information, as well as all that appeared to be required, they presented to the Sessions in January last, as a compliance with the statute; and they append them to this

Report, under the impression that they will be read with much interest by all the magistrates and guardians of the poor in the county.

EXTRACTS from the REPORT of the COMMITTEE, presented to the Court of Quarter Session in January, 1854:-

S.C.L. Asylum, Male Department, December 24th, 1853.

GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with your instructions, I beg respectfully to submit the following Report as to the state and condition of the Male Department of the Asylum during the past year.

Two cases of sudden death have occurred, and Coroners' Inquests have been held. In one case, the verdict of the jury was, "Suicide, by thrusting a piece of glove into the throat, producing suffocation—he being insane." In the other case, "Natural death—sudden exhaustion upon excitement after an attack of delirium tremens." The general health of the patients has been remarkably good throughout the year. Diarrhœa has prevailed to a slight extent during the last two or three months, but, with this exception, the Asylum has not been visited by any sickness of an epidemic or contagious character.

I think it right here to mention the alterations and im-

provements made in the Asylum by the erection of a new ward, capable of containing 37 patients; this addition provides accommodation for 7 in single sleeping-rooms, of which we were previously very deficient, and 30 in associated dormitories, besides having a separate day-room, bath-room, store-room, and 2 attendants'-rooms, and water-closets attached. To effect these arrangements, 1 single room and a three-bedded dormitory have been appropriated for other purposes-the former as a passage of communication between the two buildings, and the latter as a bath-room for No. 1 ward. When completed, which is nearly the case, this ward, in point of convenience and comfort, will be all that can be desired. By these arrangements, it is hoped there will be sufficient accommodation on the male side for the requirements of the county for some time to come. During the progress of these works, it was found necessary to decline admitting any fresh cases, in consequence of the exposed and damp state of a number of single sleeping-rooms. Another reason for declining to receive any fresh patients was, the necessity which existed for providing for the reception of any patients who might be attacked with cholera; and, in order to carry out this arrangement, it was determined by the Committee to reserve 10 vacancies.

In conclusion, I beg to observe that the conduct of the officers and servants has, on the whole, been highly satisfactory, and the patients, in respect to cheerfulness, care, and general management, all that could be desired.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

Surrey County Asylum, (Female Department.)

GENTLEMEN,

On the 31st of December last there were in the Asylum 488 female patients; during the year, 188 have been admitted; 104 have been discharged, cured; 29 have been removed by their friends or respective parishes; and 50 have died: leaving in the Asylum this day (Dec. 23rd), 493 female patients under care and treatment.

The Asylum is, at present, capable of affording accommodation to all the female patients for whom admission is required; and if the ratio of increase in the number be not greater in future than during the past year, it will be sufficient for the purposes of the county for some time to come ; the number at this time being only five more than at the close of 1852, and 14 more than at the close of 1851. I fear, however, a disposition exists to send here a great number of quite hopeless cases, neither dangerous to themselves or others. Such cases, I think the parishes should retain in their own workhouses, as they are perfectly harmless, and require merely the attention of an ordinary nurse. The admission of such cases, when there is ample accommodation in the Asylum, is unobjectionable; but it is very desirable that such admissions should be so limited as never to prevent the admission of curable cases, suffering from acute mania, and consequently requiring that full prompt medical relief so readily afforded in establishments of this kind, but so difficult to be obtained elsewhere.

I would beg also to draw the attention of the Committee to the exceedingly trivial grounds upon which some patients, once discharged, are returned again : the improved certificate requiring the facts upon which the patient is believed to be insane, I hope will act very beneficially in this respect.

The Asylum has been remarkably healthy throughout the

year. Diarrhœa has existed to some extent, but no fatal case has occurred. Of the deaths, one-half (25) were from paralysis, apoplexy, or epilepsy—diseases especially attendant upon insanity; 10 were from old age or general debility; leaving but 15 from all other causes. An inquest was held in one case, when a verdict was returned of "Natural death from apoplexy."

The new ward for females was opened at the commencement of the year. It has been appropriated to those patients who work in the laundry *only*. It is well suited to the purpose, and has acted very beneficially in inducing patients to work and behave well, in order that they may be there placed. No patient has been under any mechanical restraint during the year; one patient only has been secluded on one occasion, for a period of eight hours; nor has there been any substitution by, what has been called, manual detention, or otherwise. The patients having been maintained in a general state of tranquillity, the cures resulting therefrom, as well as from our general system of treatment, have amounted to the large number of 216 females in the past two years.

These facts alone, I think, say all that you can desire on the "Management of the Asylum," "The conduct of the officers and servants," and "Care of the patients therein;" because such a result could only take place in a properly constructed Asylum, properly managed, with constant vigilance and attention on the part of both officers and servants. I may, however, be excused, I hope, in adding, that from the very judicious way in which our Chaplain addresses the patients, and devotes his attention to those only who can appreciate or receive benefit from his advice, much general comfort has ensued.

GENTLEMEN,

The following is a Statistical Statement of the Medical Department of the Asylum for the year 1853:—

At the date of our last Report there were 396 male patients, and 488 female patients together 884. Since then, there have been admitted 136 males, and 193 females—together 329; and 342 have been discharged, or died, leaving, at the close of the year, 871.

The total number of patients in the Asylum, during the year, was 1,213; the highest number at any time was 911, the lowest was 864; and the average number under treatment, during the whole period, was 887.

REPORT

OF

THE REV. JOHN BRIDGER,

CHAPLAIN

OF THE

SURREY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

LOWER TOOTING, 30TH DEC., 1853.

GENTLEMEN,

Since my appointment to the office of Chaplain to your Asylum, in January last, I have had much pleasure in the fulfilment of the duties which have devolved upon me.

It is gratifying to me to inform you that the Sunday Afternoon Service, in the Chapel, is well attended, and that the order and attention of the inmates of the Asylum, during Divine Service, is remarkable and highly satisfactory.

After the Litany, on Wednesday Morning, I address the congregation from some part of one of the Gospels, and some appear to derive much profit from their attendance on the services of the Church. On Thursday, after the Morning Prayers, I visit the Infirmary Ward in the Female part of the Building, when I read and explain the Scriptures to those patients thought capable, by the resident Medical Officer, of deriving instruction therefrom; and in this duty I have ever experienced peculiar satisfaction. On one other day in the week I visit the Male side of the Building and go through the wards, stopping for some time in the Infirmary Ward to read the Scriptures to those assembled in the day-room, and to visit such sick as are considered in a state to attend to my instructions. My visits appear to give the inmates of the Asylum, on the Male side, generally, pleasure; and I feel much gratification in my walk through the wards, in conversing with those who desire to speak with me, and are in the habit of attending the Chapel.

There are, Gentlemen, as you may suppose, very few who are considered in a fit state to receive the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: but I have, with the concurrence of the Medical Gentleman on the Male side, admitted one additional patient during the past year to receive it, who had not previously been allowed to come to the Lord's Table. I have to acknowledge, with thankfulness, the kindness of both the Medical Officers, in affording me every facility for the discharge of my duties; and I have the pleasure to add, that I have met invariably with civil attention from the Male and Female Attendants in your Asylum.





The following observations will explain the medical terms used in *Tables Nos.* 12 & 13.

The phenomena of insanity may be comprehended under three heads, those of Unreasonable Conduct, Incoherent Discourse, and Erroneous Ideas or Delusions. These have been again divided into two classes, one including the symptoms of a deranged, the other those of a weak mind, constituting the Lunacy and Idiocy of legal writers.

Derangement of mind may be either general, affecting the different manifestations of mind, including attention, memory, imagination, judgment, and the affections and propensities; or it may be partial, affecting only some of them. The term Mania is applied to general insanity, and that of Monomania to partial insanity.

Weakness of mind may, in like manner, be general, or it may be partial; it may also be congenital, that is, from infancy. It is, when general, termed Idiocy, and the term Imbecility has been applied to slighter degrees of weakness of mind when congenital.

Weakness of mind, however, is not always from birth; it frequently occurs after the full possession of the mental faculties, and then the term Dementia or Fatuity is employed to distinguish this state, which is analagous to Idiocy; and the term Incipient Dementia is used to mark the lesser degree of weak mind analagous to Imbecility, and modified by the previous circumstances of the patient. This last-mentioned state in its various stages is very common in Asylums, where we often find the original character of the mental disorder more or less blended with weakness of memory, and incoherence of ideas. It also usually accompanies palsy and epilepsy, and is frequently the state of mind in old age.

In most cases of Mania the ideas are erroneous. Occasionally the unreasonable conduct of the insane person is not attended with this feature, but appears to be the effect of strong propensities overcoming the power of reason and of will. The term Mania, without Delirium, has been applied to this variety, which is not of frequent occurrence.
