HELD AT REIGATE, on TUESDAY, the 7th day of April, 1868.

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THE Committee in presenting their Twenty-sixth Annual Report have to state that at the commencement of the year 1867 there were 915 patients in the Asylum, and that during the year 207 additional patients were admitted, making a total of 1,122. Of these 14 males

and 14 females were discharged cured, 85 males and 52 females were discharged uncured, and 24 males and 23 females died, leaving in the Asylum at the close of the year 910 patients, of whom 411 were males, and 499 females.

Of those discharged cured, 8 were presented with gratuities from the Benevolent Fund. Of those discharged uncured, 79 males and 51 females were transferred to the new County Asylum at Brookwood, near Woking, 2 males and 1 female were removed to Fisherton House Asylum, Salisbury, 3 males were removed by Parishes, and 1 male by his friends.

Of the deaths three occurred under circumstances requiring Coroner's Inquests. These cases were carefully considered by the Committee at the time, and the particulars of each will be found in the annexed Report of the Chief Physician and Medical Superintendent, from which it will also be observed with satisfaction that the rate of mortality in the Asylum was lower in this than in any previous year.

The average number attending Chapel was 358, and an average of 431 was in daily employment.

The charge for the maintenance of each patient was *ten shillings* per week throughout the year, which was found to be barely sufficient.

The Asylum at Brookwood having been opened for the admission of patients, it became necessary to decide on the Unions for whose patients it should be available, and at a Meeting of the Joint Committees of the two Asylums, the following arrangement was made, and afterwards approved by the Court of Quarter Session, viz. :

That there should be sent to the Asylum at Brookwood—

And that there should be sent to the Asylum at Wandsworth all the other patients chargeable to the various Unions and Parishes in the County.

Of the total number of patients in the Asylum there are, at least, 300 for whom single bedrooms are occasionally necessary, whilst there are only 160 of these rooms in the Asylum. The inconvenience that results from this deficiency is very great, and there are few dormitories in which the patients are not almost nightly disturbed by some noisy patient. The Committee hoped that relief would be obtained by the opening of the new Asylum near Woking, but hitherto they have been disappointed, as a great majority of the patients admitted in place of those removed to the

new Asylum require single rooms, the less excited patients being now, in many instances, retained in Union Houses, or in buildings provided by the Guardians for the purpose. The Act of 1867, with reference to the relief of the poor of the Metropolis, will also, it is believed, limit the admission of patients in a great measure to the classes for which single rooms are indispensable. The Committee, however, in their present uncertainty as to what will be the full effect of the new Asylum when in complete operation, and of the Asylums to be erected under the new Act referred to, are not prepared to recommend the Court to authorize a large expenditure in the preparation of single rooms, but as by various alterations in the present buildings, which can be made at little expense, 14 single rooms can be provided, the possession of which will afford much relief, the work will be proceeded with forthwith.

The brickwork of the Well was reported some time since to be defective, and likely to become in a short time dangerous. To ascertain the extent to which the defect extended it became necessary to have all the water pumped

out of the Well, which could only be done by fixing additional pumps, or by placing the existing pumps at a lower level; and as the latter arrangement would give the Asylum the command at all times of a larger supply of water than the present, it was adopted, and the work has already been completed.

The repair of the defective brickwork has been placed in the hands of an hydraulic engineer of eminence, and it is known that much of the present brickwork will have to be replaced with new brickwork of greater thickness.

Several alterations have been made in the Farm Buildings, and in the fencing of the property, which it is believed will add greatly to the convenience, and diminish to some extent the expenditure of the establishment.

The balance of money placed in a joint stock bank on deposit, as stated in the last Annual Report has been received, with interest to the date of payment.

The Committee have much regret in recording the loss they have sustained by

the death of two of their colleagues, Captain MACDOUGALL and AMBROSE BOYSON, Esq., who had been Visitors for many years, and had always manifested a deep interest in the Asylum, and in its judicious and effective management.

For further information respecting the state and condition of the Asylum, reference is made to the annexed Reports and Tables, which have been prepared with much care, and the Committee have great pleasure in stating that the indefatigable and successful exertions of Dr. BIGGS, and those acting with and under him in the supervision of the Asylum, fully entitle him and them to a continuance of that entire confidence on the part of the Visitors, which has been recorded in their favor on former occasions.

The total number treated has been 1,122.

The average number resident has been 910.

The admissions of patients (including 20 re-admitted, only two of whom were discharged within the year) have been 86 more than those of last year.

The recoveries (not including removals, nor cases discharged relieved) are 13.5 per cent. on the admissions.

The mortality has been 4.1 per cent. on the total number treated, and 5.1 per cent. on the mean population. This is the lowest rate of mortality in the annals of the Asylum.

The average age at death was  $56\frac{1}{4}$  years; last year the average was 44.4 years.

Inquests have been held on three male patients. In two cases the cause of death was Inflammation of the Bowels, induced by Rupture of Intestine. One man died in consequence of falling upon some bread which he was carrying; the other was thrown down and

fallen upon by a patient. The verdict in each instance was "Accidental Death."

The Inquest in the third case was upon a criminal patient, and the verdict was "Natural Death."

An Inquest was also held in November upon a workman in the employ of Mr. JACKSON, the Contractor for repairs of the well. The deceased fell from a platform in the well, a distance of 180 feet, and was instantly killed. The verdict was "Accidental Death."

Of the 207 patients admitted, 15 have been discharged recovered, 1 relieved, and 6 unrelieved, and 8 have died. 111 were admitted in a feeble state of health. 81 were transferred from other Asylums, and are, almost without exception, hopeless cases. These circumstances explain the small percentage of recoveries.

Five patients have been sent here from the State Asylum at Broadmoor, under the Act of Parliament, passed on the 12th of April, 1867, to amend the Law relating to Criminal

Lunatics, which provides that a Criminal Lunatic may be removed to a County Asylum on expiration of his sentence, and shall thenceforth be deemed to be a Pauper Lunatic.

Two male patients escaped: one was brought by the police from Kingston, after an absence of two and a half hours; the other, who had gone to his friends in the Westminster Road, was brought back the same evening by an Attendant who was sent in pursuit.

There has been no death from Suicide.

Thirty-nine patients (or 3.5 per cent. of the total number treated) have required temporary seclusion, some of them on several occasions. Almost all the instances in the Male Division, and those for the longest periods in the Female Division, have been rendered necessary by the excitement accompanying epileptic attacks.

The average daily number under Medical Treatment for disease has been 17 males and 14 females. There are this day under medical



treatment 17 males and 16 females, of whom 8 males and 4 females are confined to their beds.

There are 25 cases of General Paralysis in the Male Division, and two cases in the Female Division.

There are 145 Epileptics (91 males and 54 females.)

There has been no Epidemic disease.

The average number of patients regularly employed has been 431.

The average attendance at Chapel has been 358.

Eight patients, on being discharged, were presented with gratuities from the Benevolent Fund, in sums varying from ten shillings to two pounds ten shillings each.

In June, the new Surrey Asylum at Brookwood, near Woking, was opened. 130 patients,

chargeable to the Chertsey, Dorking, Farnham, Guildford, Hambledon, and Windsor Unions, and to the County, have been transferred to it from this Asylum. 80 female patients now resident here, and chargeable to the County, will be sent to Brookwood as soon as arrangements can be made for their reception.

The Reading Classes and Amusements of the Patients have been continued. Dr. GRABHAM and Mr. JACKSON have given Chemical and Electrical Entertainments. Mr. JACKSON has also given Lectures and Readings. The Female Attendants have acted a Christmas piece.

In the summer a great number of patients were allowed to have their tea upon the lawn once a week; the Band, which is now very efficient, played during the afternoon and evening, and the patients were amused by games and dancing.

The Wards have been decorated with flower-boxes and baskets, fern cases and framed pictures, entirely the work of attendants and patients.

The general Conduct of the Attendants has been satisfactory ; but it was necessary to report three individuals for misconduct, and they were discharged.

There has been no change amongst the Officers, from whom I continue to receive hearty and efficient assistance. I wish to acknowledge the able services of Mr. GALLAGHER (the Chief Clerk in the Steward's office) in the preparation of the Tables appended to this Report.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you my Seventh Annual Report.

It is with much pleasure that I am permitted to state that the religious condition of the inmates of the Asylum continues most satisfactory.

The various duties of a Minister of the Gospel carried on amongst the patients are duly valued and appreciated by them.

Although the labours of one year bear a great similarity to those of another, so that it is difficult to present much variety of incident in a periodical Report, yet sufficient evidence is afforded to your Chaplain that his work is not in vain.

Another year's experience has strengthened my former convictions that the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, can, through God's blessing, be brought home to the hearts and consciences of the insane, and that they derive much comfort and consolation from the same.

I have, therefore, to express my thankfulness that the various means used for the spiritual good of the patients result in their present and future happiness.

I have to report that the Daily Morning Service in the Chapel has been regularly attended by the patients, and that many of them show an increasing love for thus commencing the day.

The Full Service in the Chapel on each Wednesday evening has been conducted throughout the year as usual, and also the Morning and Afternoon Services on every Sunday.

The congregations on these occasions have joined heartily in the worship and praise of God, and they have listened attentively to His Word read and preached.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been duly administered in the Chapel and in the Infirmary upon the appointed Sundays.

The Service held on Thursday mornings in the Infirmary is much valued by the sick and other patients who attend it. My general visits to the inmates throughout the wards of the Asylum, and especially to those who are ill, appear to afford them pleasure and comfort.

The Reading Classes have been well attended, and they are still greatly appreciated.

The Library Books have been much sought after and read. The newspapers, periodicals, and tracts have been judiciously circulated, and are much prized.

The patients have been more desirous than they were wont to be of possessing a Bible, Prayer Book, and Hymn Book for their own use. To those who can take care of books I have given them, as also to several who have been discharged from the Asylum cured.

The grant of money you have lately kindly made to purchase more books and tracts will be of much service.

I would beg to refer to the account of two patients as illustrative of others recorded in my Journal, and which give encouragement to my work amongst them.

A male patient before his last illness was very excitable, and even dangerous; although he gladly availed himself of books from the Library, yet I saw little hope of his manifesting

any care for his soul. During his illness, however, he became perfectly docile, and talked most rationally upon the truths of the Gospel, from which he evidently derived comfort. He eagerly read the Bible, and he was very grateful for a New Testament of large type that I gave to him. He appeared also to value the tracts and books supplied to him. From his own declaration I am bound to believe that he was trusting to the atonement of Christ for his soul's salvation. His death came upon him suddenly. It is encouraging to think that he was prepared for the change, and more especially so, when from his mental disease some months previous, no one could expect to receive any assurance of the kind.

As another example I would allude to the exemplary conduct of a female patient who some months since underwent a painful and dangerous surgical operation. Her Christian patience and faithful trust in her God and Saviour were most marked. She told me that unless she had enjoyed the consolations of religion she could not have borne up under her



affliction, and that she was most thankful that she had not left the care of her soul till the time of her pain and sickness; but that she could then feel that she was safe in God's hands. She was a regular communicant, and very grateful for my ministrations. I am happy to state that she has been discharged from the Asylum cured. She has returned to her own home full of thankfulness to the medical officers, and to all connected with the Asylum.

I desire to acknowledge the friendly assistance at all times afforded to me in my work by Dr. BIGGS and his brother medical officers, as also by Mr. BRIDGLAND and the Matrons.

For the kind interest you have ever been pleased to show in my duties I would beg to tender my sincere thanks. I hope always to enjoy the privilege of your valuable aid to further the efforts of myself and others in promoting the welfare of all connected with

the Asylum; and trusting that our united endeavours for this end may receive the Divine Blessing,

## R E P O R T

DEAR SIR,

In accordance with your request we have the pleasure to report for the information of the Committee of Visitors of the Surrey County Lunatic Asylum at Wandsworth, the result of the enquiries made by us respecting the Settlements of Lunatics chargeable to the County during the past year. No fresh case from the Asylum at Wandsworth has been brought to our notice during the year, arising, no doubt, from the circumstances referred to in our previous Reports.

In the case of a Pauper Patient named John Wilson, otherwise Joseph Thomas Wiltshire, confined in the County Asylum at Brookwood, where an order had been made on the County Treasurer, we ascertained the Lunatic's Settlement to be in the parish of St. Marylebone, in the County of Middlesex, and an Order of Adjudication has recently been made on that Parish, and for the repayment to the County Treasurer of the expense of the maintenance of the Lunatic since his admission to the Asylum, and for the payment of fourteen shillings a week for the future maintenance of the Lunatic in that Asylum. With respect to the Criminal Lunatics whose Settlements we have been instructed to inquire into during the past year, we have ascertained the Settlements and obtained Orders of Adjudication in five cases sent from the County Gaol at Newington, and in six cases sent from the House of Correction at Wandsworth. In seven of these last-mentioned cases the Orders were made on Parishes or Unions situate within the County of Surrey, and in the remaining four cases on Parishes or Unions situate in

other Counties. There has been no appeal against any of the Orders of Adjudication we have obtained during the year, but the time limited for appealing in one or two of the more recent cases has not yet expired. The total amount of the expense of the maintenance of the Lunatics, for the payment of which Orders have thus been obtained, is nine pounds three shillings per week.
