OF
THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS
OF THE
SURREY COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM
AT
WANDSWORTH,
FOR THE YEAR 1868,
PRESENTED TO THE
COURT OF QUARTER SESSION,
HELD AT REIGATE, ON TUESDAY, THE 6TH DAY OF APRIL, 1869.

THE Committee, in presenting their Twenty-seventh Annual Report, have to state that at the commencement of the year 1868 there were 910 patients in the Asylum, and that during the year 145 additional patients were admitted, making a total of 1055. Of these, 24 males and 21 females

were discharged cured, 6 males and 32 females were discharged uncured, and 35 males and 23 females died; leaving in the Asylum at the close of the year 914 patients, of whom 415 were males and 499 females.

Of those discharged cured, 10 were presented with gratuities from the Benevolent Fund. Of those discharged uncured, 2 males and 30 females, were transferred to the New County Asylum at Brookwood, near Woking, 1 male was removed to Fisherton House Asylum, Salisbury, 2 males and 1 female were removed by parishes, and 1 male and 1 female by their friends.

In three cases out of the 58 deaths in the Asylum it was considered advisable to hold inquests. The Verdict in each instance was "Natural death."

The average number attending Chapel was 357, and an average of 438 was in daily employment.

The charge for maintenance of patients was the same as in the previous year, viz:—ten shillings a week, an amount not providing a sufficient margin to allow the Committee to make any reduction in the present year.

In our last Annual Report we called attention to the defective state of the brickwork of the Well, and to the measures we had initiated in order to remedy the defect. These have now been carried out, and the shaft has been enlarged to the depth of 195 feet from the surface.

The work having been satisfactorily carried out under the superintendence of an eminent engineer, we hope to reap now the full benefit of the large amount expended on this Well on several occasions since the opening of the Asylum.

The fourteen single rooms referred to in our last Report, are now on the eve of completion—some of them already are, the remainder very shortly will be fit for occupation. The work has been entirely carried out by the Staff and patients in the Asylum, to our thorough satisfaction.

These extra rooms do not enable us to make a corresponding increase in the number of patients in the Asylum, but are most valuable in affording relief to some of the Wards now dangerously over-crowded.

It will be remembered that the fourteen single rooms above mentioned are only one-tenth of what we last year stated we thought necessary

for the due accommodation of the most troublesome class of patients. The subject has therefore again occupied our attention, and at the late Epiphany Quarter Sessions we presented a Report (which was printed and circulated amongst the Magistrates), setting forth the necessity for the immediate provision of additional single rooms, and corresponding day-space. We there showed that owing to the County Asylums being utterly inadequate for the lunatics in the County, many Surrey patients were maintained in distant Asylums at a weekly cost of from 15s. to 18s. a week; that the completion of the Asylum at Brookwood would still leave the County accommodation 177 below the number of lunatics in the County; that that number was increasing at the rate of 100 per annum; and that even the completion of the District Asylum at Caterham would not improbably tend to increase the pressure upon the County Asylums of the class of patients for whose treatment single rooms are indispensable. Acting on these considerations the Court approved the plans we laid before them, and empowered the Committee for Finance and General Purposes to raise by loan the sum of £3,500.

We have now submitted to the Lunacy Commissioners the plans providing for 66 additional

single rooms, a large day-room, (admirably suited for the double purpose of needlework and recreation,) and an enlargement of the Laundry. The work will be commenced as soon as the plans have received the sanction of the Secretary of State.

We are glad to be able to refer again with satisfaction to the able way in which this establishment is superintended by Dr. BIGGS, and to the mode in which the duties of their several departments are performed by the Steward and other officers.

Superannuation allowances have during the past year been granted to the three undermentioned servants on their retirement from the service of the County.

In June last, Dr. GRABHAM, the Senior Assistant Medical Officer, was elected Superintendent of the Idiot Asylum, at Earlswood; his place has been supplied by Mr. JACKSON, who had for five years acted as the Junior Assistant Medical Officer, to which office Mr. WARD has been selected.

We cannot conclude this report without an expression of our deep regret at the irreparable loss we have sustained in the death of our late Chairman, Mr. JOHNSON.

In a report addressed to the Magistrates of the County of Surrey, among whom he was so well known, so highly esteemed, so long and usefully employed, it is needless to enlarge on his merits; but many and various as were the duties he discharged, with an amount of good sense and sound judgment rarely equalled, and an assiduity never surpassed, nowhere will his loss be more sensibly felt than in this Asylum, where his peculiar knowledge of details so fitted him for the office he held, and where his courteous demeanour, his kindness of heart, and his sympathy with the suffering, alike endeared him to those with whom, and those for whom he so zealously laboured.

The total number treated has been 1055.

The average number resident has been 912.

The admissions of Patients (including 11 re-admitted, 3 of whom were discharged within the year) have been 62 less than those of last year; it must, however, be remembered, that during 1867, 130 patients were transferred to the new Asylum at Brookwood, whilst only 32 have been transferred to that Asylum during the present year.

The recoveries (not including removals) are 31·03 per cent. on the admissions.

The mortality has been 5·4 per cent. on the total number treated, and 6·3 per cent. on the mean population.

The average age at death was 50·4 years.

Inquests have been held on three male patients. The causes of death were respectively,
 “ Suffocation during an Epileptic fit.”
 “ Disease of the Heart.”
 “ Ulceration and Perforation of the Intestine.”
 The verdict in each case was “ Natural death.”

There has been no death from suicide.

No patient has escaped.

Of the 145 patients admitted, 22 have been discharged recovered, and 6 have died, 76 were

received in a feeble state of health, and 31 were transferred from other Asylums.

Twenty-nine patients (or 2·7 per cent. of the total number treated) have required temporary seclusion, some of them on several occasions, and generally in consequence of Epileptic attacks.

The average daily number under medical treatment for disease has been 15 males and 11 females. There are this day under medical treatment 18 males and 11 females, of whom 11 males and 5 females are confined to their beds.

There are 20 cases of General Paralysis in the Male Division, and 2 cases in the Female Division.

There are 138 Epileptics (82 males and 56 females).

There has been no Epidemic disease.

On the 2nd of January, a patient, admitted in an advanced stage of pregnancy, was delivered of a child, which was removed to a Workhouse within a fortnight of its birth, in consequence of the violence of the mother.

On the 25th of February, I operated for Strangulated Hernia upon a female patient, aged 75 years, who, notwithstanding her constant maniacal raving and violence, made a good recovery.

The sanitary condition of the Asylum has been good, and the mortality is not beyond the average of the last 8 years, (under $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on the mean population.)

The crowded condition of the Wards and Dormitories, however, continues, and the demands for the admission of patients increase in frequency and urgency. There are at the present time in other County Asylums, in Licensed houses, and in Workhouses, 735 lunatics chargeable to the Unions or Parishes of Surrey, and for 313 of these patients admission into the Surrey County Asylums is now demanded. I have recently submitted plans for your consideration; their adoption would, I believe at a comparatively moderate cost, remedy the deficiencies of the present building to a considerable extent, and would, moreover, enable you to admit 55 additional patients of violent character.

The average number of patients regularly employed has been 438.

The average attendance at Chapel has been 357.

Ten patients, on being discharged, had grants of money from the Benevolent Fund. The sum spent in this way amounted to £11.

Several patients, under special circumstances,

have been permitted to pay short visits to their friends.

The Reading classes and Amusements have been continued. Theatrical performances, Concerts, and other entertainments have been given. Several of them were arranged and conducted by the Attendants.

On the 1st of July, DR. GRABHAM, the Senior Assistant Medical Officer, having been elected Superintendent of the Asylum for Idiots at Earlswood, left his appointment in this Asylum, and was succeeded by Mr. H. W. JACKSON. Mr. F. H. WARD at the same time commenced duty as Junior Assistant Medical Officer.

These are the only changes which have occurred in the Medical Staff since February, 1863.

The conduct of the Attendants has been satisfactory; many of them are very valuable and experienced servants. There have been only ten resignations throughout the year, and in only two instances has it been necessary to report misconduct.

I desire to acknowledge the very cordial and efficient services of all the Officers.

I cannot conclude this Report without expressing

my sense of the great loss which the Asylum has sustained by the lamented death of JOHN EDWARD JOHNSON, Esq., the late Chairman of the Committee of Visitors.

Mr. JOHNSON'S great powers of administration, his constant desire to promote the good management of the Asylum, together with his unvarying courtesy and kindness, secured to him the respect and esteem of all with whom he was connected.

I respectfully thank the Committee of Visitors for their confidence and support.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of presenting to you my Annual Report.

It is now nearly eight years since I entered upon my duties as Chaplain to your Asylum. The experience of another year again confirms my convictions that the patients derive much benefit from the regular ministrations of religion amongst them.

I have great pleasure in being able to state that I continue to be encouraged in my work, from so many of the inmates of the Asylum showing that they appreciate the means of grace, and derive comfort and consolation from the same.

I have to record that the daily Morning Service in the Chapel has been regularly attended throughout the year by the usual number of patients.

At the full Evening Service in the Chapel on Wednesdays, there has always been an attentive congregation.

At the two Services on each Sunday of the year the Chapel has been well filled by the patients, who have joined heartily in the prayers and praises of the Church, and who also have listened attentively to the reading and preaching of the Word of God.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been administered in the Chapel, and in the Infirmary upon the appointed days. Between twenty and thirty patients have on these occasions partaken of the memorials of Our Saviour's love, with becoming thankfulness and devotion.

The service on Thursday mornings in the Infirmary is still much valued by those who attend it, and especially by the sick and infirm patients who cannot get to the Chapel. The Reading Classes for both male and female patients have been conducted as usual. These evening

gatherings continue to afford the means of instruction and amusement to an increasing number.

My visits throughout the various Wards of the Asylum still seem to give pleasure to the inmates, as they are always glad to see me. The sick are at all times grateful for my ministrations. I have received frequent assurances that many have derived consolation in their affliction, and have had a good hope of eternal life previous to their death.

And here I beg to select two instances, from amongst others, which I have had the privilege of bringing before you in my Journal, as illustrative of the blessings of religion being valued by the inmates of the Asylum.

A female patient died in June last; during her protracted illness she gladly availed herself of my visits. Although she suffered much, she was always ready to unite in prayer, from which she evidently derived comfort. A smile of gratitude and an expression of thankfulness she at all times gave to me, when her appearance might have led to the supposition that she was quite lost to any appreciation of religious truth.

She often said that her only hope was in Jesus Christ her Saviour.

As my ministrations are not confined to the insane, instead of selecting the case of another patient, I will on this occasion allude to the death of a Male Attendant of the Asylum. It is the first death of an attendant that has come immediately under my notice. The circumstances of his illness and subsequent death appear, therefore to call for a passing remark. I bear testimony to the great advantage the poor man had of constant medical care and good nursing throughout his sickness. These he fully appreciated, and often expressed his gratitude for the unremitting kindness and attention of the Medical Officers. He also was very thankful for my visits, and he received much comfort and consolation from the word of God and prayer. About two hours before he expired, he assured me that he was looking and clinging to his Saviour, and that his only hope was in the atonement of Christ.

I have further to report that the Books of the Library are extensively circulated amongst the inmates of the Asylum, and are so much sought after and read, that the grant you have kindly made from the Benevolent Fund, for the

purchase of additional volumes, will be much appreciated.

The daily Newspapers are also very generally read by the patients, and they seem to have a beneficial influence upon their minds by acquainting them with what is going on in the outer world, from which, through their affliction, they have been withdrawn. The weekly and monthly Periodicals are very judiciously and regularly circulated throughout the Wards. I am much indebted to Miss MATTHEWS and to Mr. MITCHELL for their aid in this matter.

I have during the past year continued to distribute religious tracts amongst the patients, who gladly receive them, and I cannot but think that the perusal of them is productive of good.

In performing my various duties I have had, as usual, the kind assistance of Dr. BIGGS and the other Medical Officers, as also that of Mr. BRIDGLAND and the Matrons.

As the Institution is about to lose the services of Miss BIGGIN, I trust that I may be allowed to record my sense of the efficient, kind and considerate way she has discharged her duties. I feel

assured that the officers, nurses, and patients unite with me in wishing her a long period of health, rest and happiness, after her many years of faithful work amongst the inmates of the Surrey County Asylum.

It is also my privilege to acknowledge the kind interest you have at all times shewn in my labours, and I trust always to be permitted to enjoy your confidence and support.

With the earnest prayer that God's blessing may rest upon our united efforts to promote the temporal and spiritual welfare of all connected with the Asylum,

GENTLEMEN,

The Clerks to the Boards of Guardians of the several Unions and Parishes have made their Annual Returns to the Committee of Visitors, as required by the 64th section of the Act 16 & 17 Vict. cap. 97, and I have made an Abstract thereof, which is hereto annexed, from which it appears that on the 1st January, 1869, there were 2,224 Pauper Patients chargeable to the several Unions

and Parishes in the County of Surrey. At the same period there were in the two County Asylums 134 Vagrant Lunatics chargeable to the County Funds, and 20 Pauper Patients chargeable to Parishes in other Counties, making a grand total 2,378; which may be described as follows, viz.—
