REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

Presented at the Hilary Sessions, 1859.

The Committee of Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum have the satisfaction to commence their Report by announcing a further reduction in the charge for maintenance of the patients.

The present number of patients in the Asylum is 343-viz., 146 males, and 197 females.

The reduction, at 7d. each per week, will amount to $\pounds 520$ 4s. 4d. for the year.

The Court will bear in mind that a similar reduction was made last year.

The charge for each patient in the ensuing year will be 7s. 7d. per week, with 3s. per week extra for the borough patients of Salisbury and Devizes, for whose special accommodation the additional building just completed has been erected. The "First Cost" Account shews a small balance due to the Treasurer, who has paid £723 13s. 5d. towards the cost of the new building, without calling upon the county for any further aid, and the Committee have the satisfaction of adding that the whole cost will be defrayed from the balance of profit arising from the extra maintenance fund.

The Principal and Interest Account records the payment of £2000 of the Original Debt; and notice has been given to the parties concerned that another £1000 will be paid in April next.

This Account exhibits a balance in the Treasurer's hands of $\pounds 801$ 13s. 5d., which, however, will be rather more than absorbed in meeting the payments for interest due to April next.

The Special Rate and Repairs Account declares the liquidation of the balance due to the Treasurer under that head, and shows also the payment of the charges for ordinary repairs and improvements throughout the year, leaving a balance in the Treasurer's hands of £566 11s. 11d.

The Court will see that the financial affairs of the Asylum are in a healthy state, and encouraging in prospect.

The Committee, in recording this, are not unmindful of their obligations to the Treasurer.

The number of patients in the Asylum on the 1st of January, 1858, was 333-viz., 144 males, and 189 females.

The number of patients on the last day of the past year was 343—viz., 146 males, and 197 females.

The increasing disproportion between the sexes proving that the additional accommodation in the female wards, just completed, was not recommended before it was wanted.

Mr. Wyatt calculated upon providing for 30 patients; but Dr. Thurnam believes that there will be accommodation for 35; and the Committee of Visitors trust that the requirements of the county, according to the present amount of its population, are now amply provided for.

The same care and ability of management which have heretofore characterised this Asylum, as one amongst the best conducted institutions in the kingdom, are in active and steady operation; and the general demeanour of the patients, the variety of their occupations, and the humane attention given to promote their comfort and supply amusements, are sufficient proofs that the Medical Superintendent and all those engaged under his direction, are doing their respective duties, and anxiously striving to sustain the character that they have earned for the Asylum. The Chaplain's reports show that Divine Service is daily performed in the Chapel, and regularly attended by a large proportion of the patients.

The details of all financial matters, minutely subdivided for the sake of affording the fullest information, and the general statistics of the Asylum, will be given in the Report which the Medical Superintendent has in preparation, and which will be in the hands of the Magistrates before the Lent Sessions.

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EIGHTH

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The Medical Superintendent submits to the Eighth Committee of Visitors his Eighth Annual Report, as Annual Report. follows:

During the twelvemonths which have now expired the number of patients admitted and discharged has not varied materially from the two preceding years. There were in the Asylum at the beginning of the year 333 patients—viz., 144 males, and 189 females. There have been 94 admissions—viz., 45 men, and 49 women. Of this number 21 were re-admissions. The average number for the year has been 332.5—viz., 142.4 males, and 190.1 females. There are now in the Institution 343 patients—viz., 146 men, and 197 women.

Forty-eight patients have been discharged recovered; the proportion being above the average. One and male has been discharged relieved. Several have been allowed to go out "on trial," and, in a large proportion

Numbers and Admissions. of cases, this probationary measure has been beneficial; whilst in others the patients have had to be brought back before the expiration of their trial.

" Criminal Lunatics." There are now under care 7 criminal lunatics viz., 6 males and 1 female. Of this number one man, formerly an inmate of the Asylum, was admitted in June last. He had been indicted at the Spring Assizes "for sending a threatening letter," but acquitted on the ground of insanity. One patient of this class, with the necessary order from the Secretary of State, was discharged as recovered, in August last. There was great danger of this man again committing himself as a Misdemeanant, from his intemperate habits; of a recurrence to which the Superintendent regretted to receive notice within two days of his discharge. He promised to seek work as a hop-picker, but what has since become of him is not known.

General Health. The general health of the inmates has on the whole been good, though during the early part of the year more illness than usual prevailed, and many deaths occurred. Of the total number—viz. 34,—one-half took place previous to the 14th of March. Boils and Furuncular inflammation have continued to prevail, but there has been no fatal case of Carbuncle as in preceding years.

Deaths and rate of Mortality. The mortality has been nearly equal for the two sexes, there having been 18 deaths of men, and 16 of women ;—the annual mortality being at the rate of 10.2 per cent.

The causes of death present no particular subject Causes of for remark. As usual, they are found principally Death. among diseases of the brain and lungs. Of the whole number of fatal cases three were of apoplexy, three epilepsy, three general paralysis, seven, at least, inflammation of the lungs, and two pulmonary consumption. Inquests were held in two cases. The Inquests. first was a man aged 61, who fell down suddenly collapsed, and died instantly. The verdict of the Jury was "rupture of a blood vessel near the heart," and on post mortem examination there was found extensive disease of the heart, with considerable effusion of blood into the pleura, though on the closest inspection the source of hæmorrhage could not be discovered. The second was a child of nine years old, somewhat imbecile, whose death resulted from her clothes catching fire during the momentary absence of the attendant. The child died on the following day, and the verdict was, " accidentally burnt." The Committee of Visitors and Commissioners in Lunacy both investigated this case, and, by the former, the following minute was recorded :--- "No blame can be attached to any one, nor is the system of having open fires impugned in consequence of this accident, that might have happened in any public or private establishment."

Escapes-Casualties.

The escape of three patients has been recorded; but in two of the cases a recapture was effected within four hours. In the third instance, the man succeeded in reaching Salisbury, whence he was returned to the Asylum at the end of eight days, not the worse, but somewhat better for the change. There have been two cases of fracture. One middle-aged woman, whilst at a tea party on the grounds, ran away from her attendant and, though immediately followed, succeeded in throwing herself down a steep bank, by which her thigh was fractured. Another woman, advanced in years, having a propensity to walk about the dormitory at night, to the annoyance of the other patients, either in consequence of falling over her bedstead, or in a scuffle with those who went to her assistance, broke her arm. In both these cases recovery has been remarkably complete : a satisfactory result which the Superintendent, in great measure, attributes to the pains taken in the details of the treatment, by his assistant, Mr. Symes. Such accidents must occasionally be expected with the greater amount of freedom accorded to the insane at the present day.

Employment, Recreations, &c. No material change has been made in the employments or recreations of the patients. It is indeed to be regretted that so large a number in this Asylum, particularly of the men, are so incapable of being interested in the amusements provided for them. But this is not the case with all, as will be seen from the following characteristic description of one of the open-air tea parties, during the last summer, from the pen of a well-known inmate, who takes an unflagging interest in all these celebrations. It is given in his own words :-

"The patients of the Wilts County Asylum held their tea party last Tuesday, on the grounds of that Asylum. The male patients, at 3 o'clock, marched from the court, colours flying, and the band playing 'Cheer, boys, cheer,' to the grounds, where the band left the men and went to meet the women, and played them down, to the enlivening tune of 'Over the water to Charlie.' All in their places, the band sang, in first-rate style, two verses of the Old Hundredth psalm, when there was a plentiful supply of cake and tea. Tea over, the band sang ' Praise God from whom all blessings flow,' the patients joining, and could you have heard them you would have said, surely the dark age is past away, and 'good-will towards man' is come. The band then played some very pretty polkas and other pieces, and the cricketers began to play, and the dance commenced. The amusements were kept up with good spirit till the sun went down in all his glory, and the moon arose in the plenitude of her power. A balloon was then let off, and they marched from the ground, the band playing, to the front of the house, when they all sang 'God Save the Queen,' and gave three hearty cheers for the Queen, the Doctor, and all belonging to the Asylum. Thus ended the tea party of the patients of the Wilts County Asylum."

The addition to the Asylum, long required by the Addition to gradual and progressive increase in the number of the the Asylum. female patients, has this year been carried into effect. Two or three plans for this extension were, at the beginning of the year, under the consideration of the Committee of Visitors, the Commissioners in Lunacy withholding their sanction from that first proposed. Ultimately a plan was adopted, meeting the views of all parties interested, which the Medical Superintendent believes will prove well adapted to the object desired. A wing of two stories has been added at the southwestern end of the original building, affording com-

fortable accommodation for about thirty-five female patients, or rather more than the whole number sent to the Asylum from the two non-contributing boroughs of Devizes and Salisbury.

Description of the Building.

The building is in the most inexpensive style possible, consistent with stability. It is not, like the original structure, fire proof, nor warmed or ventilated by any special apparatus, nor does it contain any extensive corridor for exercise. On the other hand, care has been taken to derive all the warmth possible from the open fires; the fire-places being provided with air-chambers having the means of discharge into the adjoining rooms and passages. There is also a simple means of ventilation in the roof. The building comprises one large day-room and three dormitories of equal size -viz., 25 by 18 feet-each to contain at least ten beds, two nurses' rooms, four single rooms for patients (two of these obtained in the site of the old staircase), a scullery, all needful closets and lavatories, and a commodious staircase. The day-room on the groundfloor and one of the dormitories on the upper, are entered from the corridors of the adjacent wards, from which they are separated by strong deal doors, glazed. There is a distinct entrance with a porch, leading into the contiguous airing-court. Unusual care has been taken in the construction of the basement, by the use of asphalte and by ventilation, to insure the dryness and durability of the works. The rooms are characterized by great cheerfulness and bid fair to be extremely comfortable, and well adapted to the wants of the patients. Their use may be entered on in a few weeks.

The whole cost of the new building-including Cost per fittings, but not furniture-will not much exceed £1,300, or at the rate of about £37 per head. This is perhaps as low a rate as that at which any similar extension of an asylum has yet been made. The addition to the Devon Asylum, about a year since, for the much higher number of one hundred patients, cost £3,850, " or at the rate of £38 10s. per patient," which, by the Commissioners in Lunacy, in their Twelfth Report, is specially commended for the judicious economy of the design.

The supplementary pump with a capstan, to be Additional worked by the patients or by a horse, as referred to in Works and Improvethe last Report, was only fixed just in time to save the ments. establishment from serious inconvenience, in consequence of a sudden injury occurring to the original pump. The test applied to the new pump, by the work thus prematurely thrown upon it, proved an advantage, as it enabled the contractors to correct some defects in its construction which were thus elicited. The Committee have had their attention directed to the great inconvenience and expense connected with the incrustation of the boilers of the engine, with calcareous deposit, from the very hard water of the district, with which they are supplied. After due inquiry and deliberation, the Committee have decided to collect all the rainwater from the roofs-only part of which has been hitherto preserved-in a large tank, to be constructed for that purpose, in the female area; which water will be used for the supply of the boilers. These works will shortly be commenced under the superintendence of the County Surveyor.

Officers, Attendants, & Servants. At the beginning of 1858, Mr. John Hawkes resigned the office of Medical Assistant, which he had filled during a period of twelve months. He was succeeded, in March last, by Mr. J. P. Symes. The Medical Superintendent is happy to acknowledge the assistance he derives in the discharge of his duties from Mr. Symes, as well as from the other resident officers. There is no material change to report among the attendants and servants, who have, with little exception, conducted themselves satisfactorily.

Weekly Charge. The Superintendent is pleased to find that the Committee of Visitors have such a balance in hand as to feel justified in lowering the weekly charge for patients from 8s. 2d. to 7s. 7d. The ratepayers of the various parishes will now be able to appreciate the advantage derived by them from the erection of the County Asylum, by which the weekly charge for the maintenance of the lunatics of the county has already been so considerably reduced, and by which they (the ratepayers) may be said to participate, in the profits of their management

Conclusion. In conclusion, the Medical Superintendent has only to express his obligation to the Committee of Visitors, for the kind support and confidence which they have continued to accord to him.

REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

"WILTS COUNTY ASYLUM, 24th July, 1858, (Saturday).

"Since the date of our last visit, which was made on the 28th of September, 1857, 82 patients have been admitted, 44 have been discharged, and 35 have died. The causes of death do not appear to call for special remark, except the case of a female child, who died from the effects of a burn.

"The particulars of the case are very fully set forth in the Case Book, and the verdict of the Coroner's Jury was 'Accidentally Burnt.' No blame appears to be attributable to the attendants.

"Of the patients who were discharged all, except two, are reported to have been recovered.

"The Asylum now contains 330 patients, of whom 143 are males, and 187 are females. On the men's side, there is still room; but the sleeping accommodation in

the female wards is somewhat overcrowded; and in the dormitories the beds are very close together. It seems to us that if one of the wards was used exclusively for sleeping and beds placed in the gallery, this crowding would be avoided, and there would still be ample room in the wide galleries of the other wards, for the dayaccommodation of the removed patients. This plan would also have the advantage of bringing together a greater number of attendants, who seem to us to be too few for the proper supervision and improvement of the patients. We are inclined to believe that it is owing to this paucity of attendants that no newspapers or books are left out for the use of the inmates, and that it has been found difficult to introduce into some of the wards, those articles of ordinary domestic furniture and objects of interest and amusement which are now usually found in asylums. With additional attendants, the patients who are now placed in the back or refractory wards, might all be taken out for extended walks round the property. At present many of them never leave the airing courts.

"We regret to observe, by an entry in this book, that the Committee of Visitors do not agree with us in the suggestion we have made as to the establishment of night nurses. We have only to state, as the result of our experience, that where it has been fairly tried the result has been most satisfactory, and the habits of the patients very greatly improved.

"The supply of combs is very scanty, and there are no hair-brushes in any of the female wards, and but few for the men. "We found all the wards well ventilated, and the bedding remarkably clean. The clothing also was clean and good.

"Except one woman, who was much excited and secluded in a separate room, the patients were generally quiet. There has been no instance of instrumental restraint since our last visit. Seclusion is employed rarely with the men, but more frequently with the female patients. One woman appears to be often secluded. She is the same whom we found in seclusion to-day.


"The means of occupation and amusement are the same as have before been reported, and the average attendance at the Chapel is about 60 men, and nearly 100 women.

"The new wing on the women's side will be roofed very shortly: the walls are completed and the rafters fixed.

"The general condition of the Asylum continues to be good, and the patients are evidently kindly treated.




