The receipts and payments during the year are as follows :--

MAINTENANCE ACCOUNT.

The practical result of the year's working at 9s. 4d. per head has been to accumulate a sum of £1,155 0s. 9d. in excess of the expenditure, which added to £132 0s. 8d. in hand, makes a total of £1,287 1s. 5d. Under these circumstances, and considering the present price of provisions, the Committee feel themselves warranted in recommending that the rate of payment per week for county patients be reduced to 8s. 9d., from the expiration of the last quarter—the 21st of December.

PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ACCOUNT.

The rates levied have been as usual £3,555 3s. 3d.; £2,500 of the principal has been paid off, and £1,448 3s. 10d. has been paid for interest on the debt; the amount remaining due is £29,500. There is £1,087 3s. 11d. in the Treasurer's hands—out of which however there will be £371 5s. to be paid for interest previous to the April Sessions, until which time nothing further is payable for rates; the payment of which will leave a probable balance of £715 18s. 11d. available for the reduction of the principal.

SPECIAL RATE AND REPAIRS ACCOUNT.

The expenditure on this account has been £145 16s. leaving £430 0s. 5d. in the Treasurer's hands.

FIRST COST ACCOUNT.

The receipts during the year have been £266 9s. 7d. from patients not chargeable to the county, which, added to the balance of £14 18s. 6d., makes a total of £281 8s. 1d. £46 15s. 11d. has been expended in new buildings, and £106 8s. 7d. for furniture; also £38 13s. 6d. for sundry payments—making a total of £191 18s.; leaving a balance of £89 10s. 1d. in the hands of the Treasurer.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Morning prayer has been daily said in the Asylum Chapel, and other stated services, of which the Chaplain will speak in his Report, have been duly performed.

CONDITION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE HOUSE.

The Commissioners in Lunacy continue to speak favourably of the management of the Asylum, and the state of the wards.

Their suggestions have received the attention of the Committee of Visitors, who are happy to be able to confirm the opinion expressed in their Report, as to the general condition and management of the whole establishment.

The medical statistics, and details of the management of the Asylum, will appear as heretofore in the Report of the Medical Superintendent. A minute and detailed account of the whole expenditure of the establishment will be given by the Clerk and Steward in his Report.

These documents will be added to this Report, which will be ready for publication, and in the hands of every Magistrate before the Lent Sessions.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The Medical Superintendent herewith submits his Eighteenth Report, as follows :---

Eighteenth Annual Report.

During the year there have been admitted 112 cases, of which 24 were re-admissions. The total numbers under treatment have been 216 of men, and 312 of women; total 528-being 11 less than in the preceding year. Owing, however, to the accumulation of hopeless cases, these figures do not represent the state of the wards with respect to the numbers occupying them. The average number under treatment during the year has been 435; shewing an increase of 14 cases as compared with the the average of 421 (421.2) for 1867. The number under care at the commencement of the year was 416. There are now 443 under treatment; shewing the very considerable augmentation of 27 patients. This increase of numbers is almost exclusively on the male side of the house; the consequence being that the additional ward, provided only two years since for men, is now full. There is, indeed, at the present moment, scarcely any spare accommodation for patients of this sex. It is hardly probable that the mortality among men will be at so low a rate during the ensuing year as during that now ended; and thus

Average Numbers. some diminution of their numbers, from this cause, is to be anticipated.

Discharges and Recoveries. Owing to the very unfavourable character of the cases admitted, the recoveries, amounting to 36, have not been so numerous as usual: the proportion being 32.1 per cent. calculated on the admissions, as compared with the mean average rate of recovery of about 43 per cent. in the 17 years. Nothing can be inferred from such a fluctuation in the number of recoveries for a single year; excepting that the cases admitted, during the last two years at least, have been of a much more hopeless description than usual.

" Criminal Lunatics."

There is only one, so called, " Criminal Lunatic" in the Asylum-namely, the man admitted in 1863, whose case is referred to in last year's report, and who can only be discharged by order of the Secretary of State. This patient is in feeble health, and is not likely to survive another year. No patient of this class has been admitted during 1868. Three men confined as "Criminal Lunatics"-one in the State Asylum at Broadmoor, and two in private establishments-have, however, been transferred to the County Asylum, under a provision in the Act 30 Vict., c. 12, the terms of imprisonment to which they had been sentenced having expired. The patient from Broadmoor is a man of violent tendencies, whose continued confinement in a special Asylum was much to have been desired.

General Health. The general health of the patients has, on the whole, been good ; and no epidemic or other severe disease has prevailed amongst them. It was observed that during and after the almost unprecedented heat of the summer, there was less diarrhœa in this Establishment than in ordinary seasons. The deaths, 45 in number (18 of men and 27 of women), are below the average; and give a mean mortality for the year of 10.5 per cent. One unusual feature is that of the mortality for the two sexes being very nearly equal, and indeed higher for the women than the men; whereas usually there is a preponderance of mortality of 50 per cent. on the side of the men. The mean annual mortality for the 17.35 years, since the opening of the Asylum, has been at the rate of 11.8 per cent.

A remarkable circumstance is the very large proportion of deaths among the aged. As many as 16, or one-third of the whole number, had completed the term of "three score and ten years;" ten of these being more than seventy-five, and three eighty, years of age and upwards. As usual, the diseases proving fatal consisted in a large proportion—first, of those of the brain and nervous system; and secondly, of those of the lungs and heart. The cases not to be classed under the one or the other of these heads are, as Table 18 will shew, a mere fraction of the whole.

One death from an accidental cause was the subject of investigation by a Coroner's jury. This Causes of

was the case of a feeble man (81 years of age), whose death was occasioned by a dislocation of the right shoulder-joint, with fracture of the coracoid, occurring two days before his death. The accident took place during the night, probably in making efforts to get out of bed. He had been visited several times by the Night Attendant, by whom nothing unusual was observed; nor, as he expressed no uneasiness whatever, was the injury detected, until he had been up and dressed more than an hour. The verdict of the jury was "Accidental Death."-It is singular that another case of dislocation of the shoulder has since occurred. This was in an epileptic patient, who, under a sudden access of his disorder while fastening his shoe, fell down on the face before assistance could be rendered. In this instance, the dislocation of the head of the humerus was into the The dislocation was speedily reduced, and axilla. the man is going on well.

Escapes.

The escapes have been few in number; those of two men only having been reported. The first succeeded in reaching the house of his brother-in-law at Trowbridge, whence he was brought back on the fourth day. The other secreted himself during the night in the woods near the Asylum; but, being heard of in the morning, was followed to the Marlborough Downs, where he was captured by an attendant sent after him with the Superintendent's dog-cart. Neither of these patients sustained any injury, except that the despondency of the former has since increased. One of the female inmates, admitted in August of the past year, gave birth to a male child on the 29th of October; the infant died on the 1st of November. The mother, who was suffering from general paralysis, remains in the Asylum.

No material improvements or additions to the buildings have been carried out during the year. A small additional coal-house has been provided for the engine. A sewing-machine has been purchased for the tailoring department, and proves very useful. An accident having occurred to the water-wheel, by which the main-shaft was broken, the process of sewage-irrigation was stopped for a few days. The injury however was promptly and substantially repaired, and the work was soon again in full operation. The boiler of the warming apparatus on the women's side of the house, which had been in use ever since the opening of the Asylum, being worn out, has been replaced by a waggon-shaped one of much larger size, and in every way more suited for its purpose ;---a considerable saving of fuel will, it is expected, be the result. A similar replacement will probably be required on the male side of the house, during the ensuing year.

The staff of officers remains the same as for several years past; and the Medical Superintendent has the satisfaction of believing that the administration of the Establishment in its various departments continues to be efficiently conducted. The changes amongst the attendants have not been quite so frequent as sometimes; and for the most part their duties have

been performed to the satisfaction of the Medical Superintendent. In one instance, however, it became his duty to report to the Committee of Visitors the misconduct of an out-door attendant who, on more than one occasion, as appeared, had struck one of the patients with a cane. As, however, the attendant was a servant of several years standing, and as his character for forbearance had not previously been impeached, it was decided to impress upon him the liability to punishment, under the Act of Parliament, which he had incurred, and accepting his acknowledgment of error, not to proceed further against him on this occasion.

Weekly Charge. A considerable saving on the Maintenance account having been effected during the last eighteen months, it is satisfactory to find that the Committee feel justified in reducing the weekly charge at the rate of one penny *per diem*, viz., from 9s. 4d. to 8s. 9d. per week.

Conclusion.

In concluding this Report, the Medical Superintendent must repeat the expression of his obligation to the Committee of Visitors for their continued support and aid in the discharge of the duties of his office.

OF THE

Should it seem desirable that a service with sermon should be given during the week, in addition to the daily prayers, it will afford me sincere satisfaction to attend to such recommendation.

I may perhaps also be permitted to add, that if at any time it should appear expedient and be found practicable to increase the amusements of the patients by music, readings, or any thing of the like kind, tending to give instruction, pleasure, or in any way promote their well-being, I shall always be happy for I have the honor to be, Gentlemen,

REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

"WILTS COUNTY ASYLUM, 14th May, 1868.

"In the interval since our colleagues' visit a year ago, the following changes have taken place, viz. :---

"Of the patients discharged all except four were reported to be recovered.

"Except in three cases the deaths were from ordinary causes, many of the patients being aged persons.

"In the three cases above alluded to inquests were held, and the verdicts of the juries in each instance exonerated the Attendants and Officers of the Asylum from blame. In the first case it appears from entries in the case-book that the patient, who was epileptic, slept in a single room, that he was seen by an Attendant at two o'clock in the morning, and on the Attendant visiting him two hours afterwards he was found quite dead. The second case was a suicide by hanging. The patient was well known to be suicidal; but he contrived to elude the vigilance of the attendants, and hanged himself to a tree. The third patient died from "pneumonia, abscess, and fracture of the ribs and sternum;" but the jury were of opinion that the injuries which caused death occurred before the deceased entered the Asylum. It does not appear, however, that any further enquiries were instituted for the purpose of ascertaining how and where the injuries were actually received.

"The numbers in the house to-day are 173 males and 259 females, and there are 2 men and 3 women away on trial. The new ward in the female division is partly occupied only, and there is still room for 15 additional patients on the men's side.

"We inspected all the wards, and found them clean and in proper order. The bedding also was well attended to. The straw-beds now number 30 in both divisions; and the total number of beds wetted or soiled last night were 17 in the male and 15 in the female division, being about an average.

"The patients were generally very quiet and orderly. The women were particularly well dressed; some of the men were not quite so neat as we could have wished. It should, however, be stated that there are now in the Asylum an unusually large number of imbecile and paralytic cases of the most helpless class. Two women were locked in their rooms; but no man was in seclusion. We have examined the register of seclusion, and find that in the 12 months since the last visit 4 men have been secluded on 10 occasions, and 15 women on 70 occasions—these instances being principally confined to two cases, one woman having been secluded 30 times and another 20 times.

"Allowing for the very feeble condition of many of the inmates, the sanitary state of the Asylum is satisfactory. Last week 19 men and 24 women were under medical treatment.

"With respect to employment, we find that 74 men and 123 women are regularly occupied in various ways.

"The chapel attendance is the same as before reported; and there has been no change in the arrangements for the performance of Divine Service.

"The staff of Attendants consists of 12 in the men's, and 14 in the women's wards. As regards the latter, we think a further increase is desirable. There are no head-attendants. The practice of taking patients beyond their airing courts is now very generally carried out; but we regret to find that of the 12 men who occupy No. 4, or what is called the refractory ward, only one ever passes beyond its precincts. As to the strict classification of impulsive cases in these wards we have already on several occasions expressed our opinion, and we still believe that by abolishing the refractory wards altogether, and distributing their inmates amongst the other patients, the best results would follow.

"We have to speak in the highest terms of the cleanliness and order which we noticed throughout. The baths and water-closets were exceedingly well kept, "We have made all the statutory enquiries, and signed and examined the books.

"We regret to find that Dr. Thurnam is absent on account of ill-health. In the course of our inspection we received every assistance from Mr. Symes, who is intimately acquainted with all the cases.
