# COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th Section of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

1.—The Committee of Visitors present to the Councils of the County and City their Report for the year ending the 31st December, 1899.

2.—No changes in the Medical Staff have occurred during the past year, and we are glad to be able to report that the Medical Superintendent, Mr. G. M. P. Braine-Hartnell and the several Gentlemen who assist him in the discharge of his duties continue to do so to our satisfaction.

3.—The only change in the House Staff calling for observation is the appointment of the Rev. Father Feeny in the place of the Rev. Father Dolan as Roman Catholic Chaplain. Both the Rev. S. Morgans (the Protestant Chaplain) and Father Feeny discharge their duties zealously and efficiently, and we feel sure their efforts to ameliorate the condition of the unfortunate persons to whom they minister are appreciated by those patients who are in a mental condition to do so as they are also by the Attendants and others who have the benefit of their respective services. Copies of the reports of both Mr. Morgans and Father Feeny are appended. The conduct of the Officers and Attendants has on the whole been satisfactory. During the year two Superannuation allowances have dropped, viz., that made to Martha Snape, who died on the 3rd February, 1899, and that to Mr. George Jenkins, a former Clerk to the Asylum, who expired after a long and painful illness on the 7th October, 1899.

4.—We have held the usual Monthly Meetings, and one Special Meeting; the House Committee had met from time to time as required by the Rules. The several Sub-Committees have also met as necessity arose.

5.—Deputations from Boards of Guardians from the several Unions in the County and from the City have visited the Asylum during the year, seeing the Patients is the Asylum coming from their respective Unions. The reports made by these deputations testify to the satisfactory way in which the Patients are treated, both by the Medical Officers and Attendants.

6.—We have again been able to make a slight reduction in the rate of maintenance, viz., from 7s.  $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per head per week to 7s. 7d., and this without diminishing in any degree the comforts and well-being of the Patients.

found in the Appendix (Schedule III.). We consider that it testifies to the satisfactory manner in which the affairs of the Asylum are carried out by your Committee and their Officers.

8.—The new Buildings and Extensions, the completion of which we reported in our last Report, provides the better and further accommodation for Patients which was necessary. The total cost of these buildings has already been reported to the Councils, and are rapidly filling up in numbers.

9.—We had to supplement the Works connected with the Water Supply by the erection of a concrete wall to prevent subsidences of the bank between Carey's Brook and the Reservoir. This has produced the desired effect, and we consider the Water Supply to the Asylum is now as good and secure as it is possible to make it.

10.—The Accounts of the Asylum for the year ending the 31st March, 1899, were audited by Mr. W. D. Easterby, the Auditor of the Local Government Board, in the month of August last, and his report thereon was received in the month of September last.

11.—In consequence of a Resolution passed by the Vestry of the Parish of Powick, which was communicated to us, as to the intended enlargement of the Parish Churchyard, which it was stated was rendered necessary by the interment in the Churchyard of a large number of Patients dying in the Asylum, and whose bodies were not taken elsewhere for burial, we have had under our consideration the provision of a burial ground upou land belonging to the Asylum, and have selected a fitting spot for this purpose; we shall shortly lay before the Councils the Plans which we propose, and ask their approval thereof in preference to negotiations for interment in the Parish Churchyard, to the expense of which of course the Committee would otherwise have to contribute. 12.—The following Table shows the number of Patients in the Asylum at the last Meeting of the House Committee in each of the following years:

The Total of 1894 includes 60 Patients—30 male and 30 female—received under contract from the County of Stafford. That for 1895 includes 15 male and 30 female Patients from the same County, then still remaining at Powick, but subsequently removed, the whole of the accommodation of our Asylum now being needed for our own Patients.

# CHAPLAIN'S REPORT, 1899.

COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM,

Worcester, December 31st, 1899.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN,

It is my privilege to present to you my Annual Report as Chaplain of your Asylum for the year ending to-day.

At the beginning of the year I examined the stock of Hymn Books, Prayer Books, and Bibles, removed those that were found defective, and supplied the Wards with the following numbers of new books: 89 Prayer Books, 124 Hymn Books, and 16 Bibles.

The Library has undergone a slight re-arrangement and improvement. A few volumes have been condemned as utterly worthless, and 68 new ones purchased to fill up the spaces. These latter are modern and interesting books. A list of them has been left in each Ward so that both Patients and Attendants may know what literature is available. This plan has created an increased desire for reading, and consequently as many as 365 volumes have been issued during the year. In addition to this, there has been much mutual exchange of books amongst those living in the same Ward.

The Services have been duly performed each week-day morning and twice every Sunday, and special Services have been held on Good Friday and Christmas Day. Short Services have also been held alternately in the Centre and Annexe Hospitals for those who have not been able to attend Chapel. During the year I have celebrated the Holy Communion for the patients every month, the average number of Communicants being 36.

I have visited the Wards twice a week, and occasionally the other Departments of your Asylum where the Patients may be employed. The sick and dying needing spiritual advice and attention I have visited more frequently.

In my last Report I pointed out the fact that none of the Staff received the Holy Communion, and expressed my willingness to hold special Services for them if a sufficient number were found desiring to attend. The result of my inquiries was so encouraging that, after a preparatory address on the subject, I felt justified in holding the first special Service at Eastertide. The Holy Communion has since been celebrated nine times at 7 a.m., and there are at the present time 54 Communicants on the Staff. This increased number will necessitate still more frequent Celebrations in the coming year.

I am much indebted to the Bishop of Coventry for his ready response to my expressed wish to administer the ordinance of Confirmation to the Attendants in the Asylum Chapel on December 21st. Having learnt that a considerable number of them had not been confirmed, I felt it my duty to urge upon them the necessity of becoming recipients of this holy rite, and as soon as a convenient day was fixed upon, classes for preparation were immediately formed. Fifteen Attendants and two male Patients were presented. Their demeanour was reverential and devout throughout. The Bishop gave a very practical Address, and much that he said should dwell in the memories of those confirmed as a support in every-day difficulties.

Among the Candidates were two who had lately received the Sacrament of Baptism, one a male attendant, 38 years of age, the other a male patient, 43 years of age. All the newlyconfirmed, with two exceptions, have since partaken of the Holy Communion.

The Choir attended the Service, and helped to make it bright and hearty. For this, as well as their efforts on all occasions, I should like to express my sincere thanks to them. I should also like to express my gratitude to the Superintendent for the interest which he has taken in my work, and more especially for the arrangements which he has made to secure the regular attendance of the Staff at the Services and the Confirmation Classes.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you my report for the greater part of the year just closing. I have tried as far as possible to co-operate with the Committee in holding Sunday Service punctually at the hour appointed, and I am pleased to state that there has been no Sunday without Service.

I have found, generally speaking, that the patients have given a reverent attention during the Services, and this, I trust, will be more marked when, as the Superintendent kind'y promised, he is able to supply those who can read with Prayer-Books. A quarterly week-day Mass has been said in the Chapel, and Holy Communion administered during the past year. I have on several occasions visited the Wards on receiving notice of any sickness, and in case of death have attended the funerals at Powick. I may here express my grateful thanks for the Committee's recent increase of my salary, so graciously granted. I wish, in conclusion, to testify to the unvarying kindness and courtesy of the Medical Superintendent, the Officers, and Staff of the Asylum I have met with during my term of ministration.

# **REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.**

# WORCESTER COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM. February 21, 1899.

Since this Asylum was visited on the 18th of July last, 129 Patients have been admitted; forty-two have been discharged or removed, of whom thirty-three were considered to have recovered and 55 have died.

There are to-day on the books the names of 1,127 Patients, of whom 492 are males and 635 females: of the males 18 and of the women 34 are of the private class. Three males and eight females are out on trial, thus leaving resident in the Asylum 489 men and 627 women.

There is estimated vacant accommodation for 40 men, but on the female side the Asylum is over-full by 10 Patients; but judging by the overcrowding we found in the dormitories, especially on the female side, we should have expected to find less vacant accommodation for males and more than ten beds in excess of the accommodation for women. Our colleagues at their lat: visit referred to this topic; and suggested the consideration by the Council of early steps towards an adequate provision of accommodation for the insane paupers of the County. We are glad to be able to report that, acting upon this suggestion, the County Council and Asylum Committee have decided upon the erection of another Asylum in the northern part of the County, and are in search of a suitable site.

We found the Patients generally quiet and orderly during our visit; only one Patient complained of rough usage at the hands of an Attendant, but this was manifestly the outcome of a delusion; while the appeals for discharges, considering the numbers in the Asylum, were not numerous. We saw the dinners yesterday in some of the Wards. The fare, Irish stew with bread, was well liked, while the behaviour at the meal was decidedly good. The condition of the patients as regards dress and neatness gave indication of proper attention to these matters on the part of the Staff. The dress of the women was sufficiently varied, but the men are nearly all dressed in white suits. We regret to be unable to report that anything has been done towards setting apart a small day room for the idiot children, of whom there are seventeen in the Asylum, and who continue to be associated with the adult insane. We hope that the plans of the new Asylum will include separate accommodation for this class.

The day rooms were in good order, but are still lacking in good supply of books. There has been no extension of the staining and dry rubbing of floors, and many of the single room doors remain unfitted with outside handles.

The female hospital Ward in the Annexe is about to be redecorated, when we hope the opportunity will be taken to plaster the rough walls, so essential to the well-being of the Patients. Among other improvements not to be lost sight of are the introduction of the fire hose into the Wards and of a fire call communicating direct with a central Call station.

We gave a fire alarm yesterday, and within two minutes of the steam whistle being sounded the brigade was assembled; the hose attached to the external hydrants, and the water in play.

The dormitories and bedding were in good order.

There was a good deal of steam in the laundry wash-house, pointing to the desirability of fixing a Blackman's fan there: while the provision of a calendar would add to the resources of the laundry, where the four mangles at present in use are barely sufficient to meet the requirements of this department.

The deaths, which numbered fifty-five, were followed in forty-one instances, or in the proportion of 74.5 per cent., by post-mortem examination. In eleven cases, or 21 per cent., they were due to phthisis; in eight cases to general paralysis; two were attributed to colitis, and one to typhoid fever, the origin of which could not be traced. In no instance was a Coroner's Inquest deemed necessary; while bed-sores were existing in the bodies of two Patients only.

The Asylum is at present free from zymotic disease, but since the last visit there have been fourteen cases of colitis among the patients, and one case in a nurse; and one male patient contracted typhoid fever, and one woman chicken-pox. We found only eighteen patients confined to bed, chiefly for debility and chronic ailments.

There have been seven serious but non-fatal casualties. A woman fractured a collar bone and a male patient his right forearm, in each case by a fall in a fit; a male slipped and dislocated his left shoulder; a woman slipped in the laundry and sustained a fracture of the arm in the fall; two other women sustained fractures of bones by being pushed down by fellowpatients, while in the last case a male had a rib fractured in a struggle with an attendant, whom he murderously attacked. We understand that Mr. Braine-Hartnell made a full enquiry at the time, and reported the matter to the Committee; but there is no record of the occurrence in the Case Book in the notes of the case.

There is no record of the employment of mechanical restrain<sup>†</sup>. Seclusion has been used in the case of 29 patients on 86 occasions for a total of 305 hours.

In 1898 the percentage of recoveries on admissions, exclusive of transfers and re-certifications, was 29.68, that of deaths on the average number resident 9.07. Among the patients 209, or 18 per cent. are afflicted with epilepsy; eighteen, or 1.5 per cent., with general paralysis, and 28, or 2 per cent., are actively suicidal.

Constant night supervision continues to be provided for all the epileptics and suicidal cases. Last night 34, or 3 per cent., of the patients were reported as having wetted their beds.

The Sunday services in the Chapel are usually attended by 634, or 56 per cent., of the patients; the associated entertain-

ments by 53 per cent.; 61 per cent. walk out weekly or oftener beyond the Asylum grounds; 26 per cent. go out daily beyond the airing courts, to which 10 per cent. not physically incapacitated are altogether confined.

The returns of useful employment give 307 males and 467 females as so engaged, or in the proportion of sixty-two and seventy respectively.

Exclusive of head attendants, artizans, and laundry maids, the staff of attendants for day duty consists of 45 men and 49 nurses, being in the proportion of one to every eleven male and one to every thirteen female patients. This does not represent a strong staff, but we understand that two more nurses are to be appointed. For night duty there are seven men and nine nurses.

Of the total number of attendants, as many as 22 per cent. have been here less than one year; but 37 per cent. can count over five years' service.

Two attendants were dismissed last year for misconduct not directly affecting the patients.

The only change in the Medical Staff has been the recent appointment of Dr. Veitch as Assistant Medical Officer in succession to Mr. Pulford, who has taken up an appointment at St. Luke's Hospital.

We are glad to record that advantage is taken of the means provided by the Committee for the prosecution of pathological work.

With the exception of the case above mentioned, we find the Case Books, so far as we have examined them, are fully noted.

### THE FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

### OF THE

# MEDICAL OFFICER & SUPERINTENDENT.

### To the Committee of Visitors of the Worcester County and City Asylum.

### MR. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit to your consideration the Annual Report on the condition and management of your Asylum for the year ending December 31st, 1899. The usual statistical tables are also presented, giving information as to the Admissions, Discharges, and Deaths of the patients during the year 1899, and from August 1852. The Financial Statement for the year ending March 31st, 1900, is also attached. The changes that occurred among the patients were as follows:

These figures show an increase of 16 patients at the end of the year.

The average number resident was 500 males, 637 females, total 1,137.

ADMISSIONS.—Two hundred and twenty-five patients were admitted during the year. This is the highest number from the County and City since the opening of the Asylum.

The following table shows the state of their bodily health on admission:

Twenty-five of those admitted have been discharged "Recovered." Sixteen have died.

One male and one female were admitted with recent cut throats.

DISCHARGES.—Eighty-six patients were discharged "Recovered," being at the rate of 40.56 per cent. on the number admitted, excluding transfers from other Asylums. One male patient having exhibited no sign of insanity was discharged "not insane." A male patient was ordered to be discharged by the Commissioners in Lunacy, under Sect. 65, Subs. 2 (a). His admission was illegal as he had been accepted by the Union to which he was chargeable without an order of adjudication, therefore his transfer orders should have been signed by Visitors of this Asylum, and not by Visitors of the Asylum from which he was transferred.

DEATHS.—The death-rate calculated on the average number resident was 8 per cent. The following is a short summary of the causes of death. A full account is given in Table V.

Post-mortem examinations were made in 76 out of 91 deaths.

BIRTHS.—N.T., married woman, admitted in a pregnant condition, was confined of a son. The mother still remains a patient. Can anyone wonder at the increase of insanity when people like the above "marry and are given in marriage?" The mother, father, and brother of the patient are or have been insane, and here is this infant with such a bad "family history" growing up, and will in all probability end by marrying.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—The Private Patients were two less at the end of the year. Eleven were admitted; 6 died; 10 were discharged; 6 transferred from Pauper to Private, and 3 from Private to Pauper Class.

INQUESTS.—One inquest was held during the year. This was on a male patient, who was at the post-mortem examination found to have three fractured ribs on the left side. No cause could be assigned. The jury returned the following verdict, "That the said D. P. died from fatty degeneration of the heart and senile decay, accelerated by shock from fractured ribs, and the jury expressed their opinion that no blame attached to the Staff of the Asylum."

ACCIDENTS.—There have been several cases of fractured bones, all of which were, as they happened, reported to your Committee. One accident demands special notice. A male patient who was on the high road to recovery was during the night seized with a sudden suicidal impulse. He smashed the window, and precipitated himself to the ground. He sustained compound comminuted fractures of both legs. His left leg has since been amputated. At present he is progressing satisfactorily.

ESCAPES.—Two male patients effected their escape. One was recaptured in two and a half hours. The other evaded recapture, and at the end of the statutory period was removed from the list of the patients.

HEALTH.—Two patients, male, were attacked with Scarlet Fever. Two days after admission the first case developed a rash and all the signs of Scarlet Fever. The other case occurred in the same Ward a few days later. Both were removed to the Infectious Hospital, and made a good recovery. A female patient was attacked with Typhoid Fever. She did well. The cause could not be traced. There was one case of Erysipelas. Colitis has caused the death of 1 male and 5 female patients. Phthisis accounts for 23 per cent. of the deaths. This percentage is excessive, and demands serious attention. The overcrowded state of the wards is no doubt responsible in a great measure, but not entirely, for this high mortality. In the light of our present knowledge we require separate wards in which patients showing signs of Phthisis can be isolated and treated in accordance with the latest ideas on the subject. I would suggest that in the New County Asylum provision be made for such cases. This course would commend itself to all interested in the treatment of the insane, and would, I am sure, meet with the approval of the Commissioners in Lunacy.

STAFF .- The following changes have taken place among the Medical Staff. Dr. Pulford resigned to take up a more responsible post at St. Luke's Hospital. Mr. Wilkinson was promoted to be Second Assistant Medical Officer, and Dr. Veitch was The Rev. T. B. appointed Third Assistant Medical Officer. Feeny has been appointed Roman Catholic Chaplain in the place of the Rev. J. G. Dolan, resigned. Mr. Bubb, my Deputy, and my other colleagues, have on all occasions loyally and cordially assisted me in the management of the Asylum. Mrs. M. Snape, a pensioner of your Committee, died in February. Death also removed another pensioner in the person of Mr. G. Jenkins, who for many years served your Committee well and faithfully, as Clerk of the Asylum. A male attendant was dismissed and prosecuted for striking a patient with a stick. He was fined 40s. With this exception the conduct of the Nurses and Attendants has been satisfactory. COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.—Two members of the Board of the Commissioners in Lunacy made their annual visit on February 20th and 21st. They left a favourable report.

GENERAL MATTERS.—The average weekly cost per patient for the year was 7s.  $9\frac{7}{8}d$ . This is 2d. more than last year. The increase in price of coal and the great reduction in the profit on the Farm will account for the difference.

In April, 1899, your Committee reduced the charge for maintenance to the Guardians from 7s.  $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. to 7s. 7d., at which it now stands.

The Fire Insurances have been thoroughly revised by your Committee, and new policies taken out. The different items have been grouped together, and the whole matter is now in a satisfactory condition. Mr. Hadley, the Asylum Clerk, has been appointed Agent for the Asylum, and the Commission is thus saved to the Ratepayers.

A concrete retaining wall was found necessary to support the bank of the brook next the Reservoir. This was done under the direction of Mr. E. B. Marten, C.E.

Owing to the Churchyard at Powick being nearly full, and to the Churchwardens being unable to obtain more land for the purpose of extending the same, your Committee have decided to set apart about three-quarters of an acre of land on the Asylum Estate for the purposes of a Cemetery. The matter is at present in process, and awaits the assent of the various authorities.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum: Their reports were satisfactory: Bromsgrove, Droitwich, Dudley, Kidderminster, King's Norton, Martley, Pershore, Shipston-on-Stour, Solihull, Stourbridge, Tewkesbury, Upton-on-Severn, Worcester. This is an improvement on last year's numbers. We should, however, be glad to see all the Unions sending a deputation to visit the patients and Asylum.

Our thanks are due to the Editors of the following papers: "Berrow's Worcester Journal," "The Herald," "The Chronicle," for free copies for the use of the patients. In conclusion, I beg to tender my hearty thanks to your Committee for the kind consideration and help I have received during the past year.

#### Conditions under which Private Patients are admitted into the Asylum.

I. The charge for Patients coming from, or having a settlement in, some Union in the County or City of Worcester is 15s. a week, payable quarterly in advance.

II. The charge for maintenance covers all ordinary expenses, but in cases of prolonged bodily disease an additional weekly charge may be made to cover the cost of special medicines and stimulants.

III. In the event of the death or discharge of any Private Patient before the maintenance moneys, paid in advance, have been exhausted by effluxion of time, the balance will be refunded to the person who made the last payment in respect of such patient.

IV. The Patients may wear their own clothes, but will have the sam accommodation in all respects as the other Patients.

V. Application for the admission of a Patient on the private class must be made in the first instance to the Medical Officer at the Asylum, who will supply all the various blank forms for the order and medical certificates.
