SIXTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM,

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th Section of the Lunacy Act 1890.

- The following is our Report on the management of the Asylum for the year ended 31st March, 1918.
- 2.—In the month of September last Mr. Coventry resigned the Chairmanship of the Committee, a step which he felt necessary owing to advancing years. Mr. C. Pelham Lane was elected Chairman in his place, and Mr. G. E. Wilson Vice-Chairman. At the beginning of March, 1918, Mr. G. W. Grosvenor and Mr. G. Hadley resigned from the Committee, and the County Council thereupon appointed Viscount Deerhurst and Mr. J. D. Harward in their places.
- 3.—Dr. Fenton, our 1st Assistant Medical Officer, left in June last to join the R.A.M.C. His place at the Asylum will be open to him on his return. Dr. Braine-Hartnell continues to discharge the duties of Medical Superintendent with the assistance of Dr. Romer and Dr. Measures (locum tenens).
- 4.—The usual Monthly Meetings and 4 Special Meetings of the Committee of Visitors and the bi-monthly Meetings of the House Committee have been held. The following is a Table of the attendances:—

The Engineering and Agricultural Sub-Committees have also met as occasion required.

- 5.—A Commissioner of the Board of Control visited the Asylum on the 22nd November, 1917. We append a copy of his Report.
- 6.—The Accounts of the Asylum up to the 31st March, 1917, have been audited by the Auditor of the Local Government Board; but we understand that the issue of Reports on the Accounts has been suspended during the continuance of the War.
- 7.—We fixed the rate of maintenance as from the 1st July, 1917, at 14/- per Patient per week. Subsequently we applied to your respective Councils to sanction a further increase of the rate as from 1st April, 1918, to 15/2 per Patient, which sanction has been given. The rate for out-County Patients not under Contract has been increased to 15/9 as from 1st April, 1918. The rate for Private Patients at present in the Asylum to be 16/-, and for future Private Patients 21/-.

- 8.—We have renewed the Contract with the Birmingham Asylums Committee for maintenance of a number of their Patients at Powick Asylum for 3 years from 1st March, 1918, at an increased charge of 15/9 per head per week. We have also agreed to renew the Contract with Hereford Asylum for 12 months as from 1st June, 1918, at the like charge of 15/9.
- 9.—We are about to undertake the repair of Asylum Lane, which has become very dilapidated owing to the traffic of heavy motor vehicles delivering coal, &c.
- 10.—Deputations from the various Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum from time to time and expressed their satisfaction with the manner in which the Asylum is carried on.
- 11.--The following Table shows the number of Patients in the Asylum at the last Meeting of the House Committee in each of the following years:—

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM, POWICK,

WORCESTER.

April 1st, 1918.

To the Committee of Visitors.

Mr. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Third Annual Report as Chaplain. There is little to record beyond the usual duties. The visiting of the Wards is daily carried on, and special attention and time devoted to ministering to the sick and dying. There is I am glad to observe a very cordial welcome given by the Patients at all times, and one trusts that through the visiting much comfort and help is derived.

The Services in Chapel are evidently much appreciated, and there is always a reverent spirit. A very warm debt of gratitude is owing to the Choir for their willing and helpful services; also to our Choir Master for his painstaking labours.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been administered to the Patients once a month with an average attendance of 40, and for the Staff twice a month with an average attendance of 25. On several occasions it has been very gratifying to be able to administer the Sacrament privately to members of the Staff, and Patients when they have been prevented through illness from attending the Chapel.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Service was held on Sunday, October 21st, when the sermon was preached by the Rev. W. H. Neales, Vicar of S. Clement's, Worcester.

During the past year there have been 226 interments in the Cemetery.

The number of books issued from the Library has been 976. The kind gift of a Bi-Unial Lantern by one of your Committee (G. E. Wilson, Esq.) has been most acceptable and found useful.

In conclusion, I take the opportunity of thanking the Superintendent, Officers and Staff generally for all their sympathy and help in my work.

The sick have been visited, and the last Sacraments administered when there was danger of death.

Each week the Patients have been visited and helped as far as possible.

In conclusion I desire to thank the Superintendent, the Medical Staff and all the other officials of the Asylum for their unfailing courtesy and kindness to myself personally, and for their kindly assistance in the discharge of my duties.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CONTROL.

Worcester Asylum, Powick.

November 23rd, 1917.

During my visit of inspection to this Asylum yesterday I found all the Wards and Dormitories maintained in excellent order, the former well supplied with plants, cages of birds, pictures and other objects of interest, and the bedding in the latter, clean and of good quality. Ward No. 1 on the Female side is temporarily closed, the work of laying down a new pitch-pine floor having just been completed. In order to provide accommodation for the large increase of Patients caused by the reception of cases from Birmingham and Northampton, many additional beds have been required. The overcrowding has been to a large extent minimised by converting into combined day-room and dormitory three of the existing dormitories and one of the day-rooms on the Male side, and two of the dormitories on the Female side, a certain number of beds being made up on the floor at night.

The following changes have occurred since my colleague's visit in May of last year:—

It will be seen that the total of discharges and deaths has exceeded the gains by admission by 169, and that the mortality, especially of males, has been exceptionally high. The average number daily resident during this period is 1,263, or 568 Males, 695 Females, so that the death-rate amounts to 23.7 per cent., or Males 28.5 per cent., Females 19.7 per cent.

The numbers now on the statutory books are 506 Males and 653 Females, or 1,159 in all. Of them 33 are Private

patients, including 5 "Serivce" Patients, and 3 "Criminal." The out-County Patients number 325, who are thus distributed:—

The maintenance charge per head per week is now 14/for home Patients, and also for out-County Patients, except
that for Montgomery cases, which is 14/7. Private Patients
are received for 15/- with two exceptions, one paying 12/- and
the other 21/-.

Two male and three female Patients are out on trial, so that there are resident to-day, 504 males, and 650 females, all of whom I have seen. Four male children are lodged in Female Ward 12. I gave to every Patient the opportunity of speaking to me, of which several availed themselves. The only complaints I received dealt with the question of detention, and, in a few cases only, on the insufficiency of food. No doubt this latter grievance is mainly due to the restriction of the bread ration, which is adequately made up by potatoes and other substitutes, and the meal I saw served in the Wards vesterday was ample and evidently appreciated. It consisted of corned beef with potatoes and carrots. The Patients were in a satisfactory condition, as regards dress and general appearance, and except in F. 2 Ward, where there was some noisy excitement, their behaviour was quiet and orderly. Forty-eight of the males and 38 of the females were confined to bed, but only a small proportion of these were seriously ill. Two beds are at present occupied night and day on the excellent verandah off F. 12 (Infirmary) Ward. There is no such verandah on the Male side. The large proportion of cases of tubercular disease, as evidenced by the number of deaths from Phthisis, suggests the advisability of utilising this provision for open-air treatment to its fullest extent.

The proportion of epileptics to the total number in residence is 12.5 per cent., and of the actively suicidal, 2.2 per cent. The majority of the former are lodged in 4 or 5 Wards on each side, but there is hardly one Ward without a few Patients of this class.

Although the provision of papers and other literature is fairly good, it does not appear to be adequate to the needs of the increased number of Patients. I could not help being struck with this deficiency, especially on the Male side in the combined day-room and dormitories, where most of the inmates were entirely unoccupied.

During the period under review the chief causes of death have been from Heart Disease and Phthisis, the former contributing 32·4 per cent., and the latter 30·1 per cent. of the deaths from all causes. Nine patients, all males, have died from General Paralysis, i.e. little more than 3 per cent., and the deaths attributed to Senile Decay amounted to 9·7 per cent.

There have been two inquests; one was in the case of a male Patient who died of Senile Decay, and who sustained an accidental fracture of his thigh nearly 9 months before, the Jury finding that this injury did not contribute to his death. The other was a female Patient who committed suicide by strangulation, under circumstances which were fully reported to our Board at the time. The verdict stated that she "had not previously shown any suicidal tendency, and that there was no evidence of neglect on the part of the Staff."

The only Zymotic diseases that have occurred have been solitary sporadic cases of Measles, Enteric and Scarlet Fever, and 17 cases of Dysentry, which also attacked one of the Attendants. There have been no cases of this disorder since July.

The serious non-fatal casualties reported during the last 18 months comprise 13 cases of fracture of bones, 2 of dislocation and 1 of ruptured ligament; one of the fractures was spontaneous, being due to Cancer. All the other cases were due to falls, either caused accidentally, or by being pushed down by fellow Patients. Every effort is being made to comply with the food restrictions laid down by the Food Controller. No flour is consumed, except in bread, which is composed of standard flour and potato—the latter in the proportion of 1/14th. From a return made to me I find that the weekly ration of bread served in the Male Centre is 5lbs. 11ozs., in the Male Annexe 4lbs. 13 ozs., and in both Female Centre and Annexe 3lbs. 13ozs. The meat ration for Male Staff is 2lbs. 3ozs., for Female Staff 1lb. 12ozs. For male Patients from 1lb. 12ozs. (Annexe) to 2lbs. 2ozs. (Centre), for female Patients, 1lb. 5ozs. (Annexe) to 1lb. 11ozs. (Centre). The sugar is, for Staff, 8ozs., for Patients, 5½ to 6ozs.

There has been no employment of mechanical restraint, and 44 Patients have been secluded on 135 occasions for a total of 321 hours.

Much difficulty has been experienced in obtaining the employment of an adequate Staff, especially as regards the Nurses. At the time of my visit the proportion of Male Attendants on duty to Patients was 1-13, and of Nurses 1-19.

Dr. Braine-Hartnell has now the assistance of only two Medical colleagues, one of whom is temporarily engaged, and at present there is also a locum tenens for the Assistant Medical Officer, who is absent on a short holiday.

I ought not to close this Report without referring to the fact that Dr. and Mrs. Braine-Hartnell have, with the sanction of the Committee, placed their residence at the disposal of the Military Authorities for use as an Auxiliary Hospital. It must be gratifying to them to know the extent to which their patriotic action is appreciated, and provision found for the accommodation of 30 wounded soldiers within their house.

THE SIXTH-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Medical Officer and Superintendent.

Mr. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Report for the year ending March 31st, 1918. The Statistical Tables are for the year ending December 31st, 1917. The Financial Statement prepared by the Clerk is appended.

The changes that occurred among the Patients were as follows:-

These numbers show a decrease of 121 males, 91 females, total 212.

The average number under treatment was 548 males, 674 females, total 1,222.

The total number under treatment was 642 males, 774 females, total 1,416.

Admissions.—One hundred and seventeen Patients, 54 males and 63 females, were admitted during the year. Of these, 44 males and 56 females were Direct Admissions. Ten males and 7 females were transferred from other Asylums.

DISCHARGES.—Nineteen males and 33 females, total 52, have been discharged during the year.

Fifteen males and 27 females were discharged "recovered," being at the rate of 34·1 per cent. for the males and 48·2 for the females, total 42 per cent. of total "recoveries" on Direct Admissions.

DEATHS.—One hundred and fifty-six males and 121 females, total 277, died during the year, being at the rate of 28.5 per cent. for the males and 18 per cent. for the females, total 22.7 per cent. on the daily average number.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—On January 1st, 1917, there were 22 in residence, 9 males and 13 females. On December 31st, 1917, there were 29, 18 males and 11 females. The increase of male Patients is due to "Service" Patients.

The Criminal Patients remaining at the end of the year were 2 males and 2 females, an increase of 2.

Accidents.—The following accidents occurred during the year:—Two of the thigh, one of the leg, one of the collar bone, one of the shoulder blade, two of the arm, one of a rib, and two dislocated shoulders. All caused accidentally or by the violence of other Patients.

Escapes.—Four Patients escaped. They were all recaptured in a few hours.

Suicide.—One female Patient, who had not evinced any tendency to suicide, hanged herself by means of a roller towel in the lavatory of her Ward. An inquest was held and the Jury returned the following verdict: "That the said A.G. strangled herself with a roller towel in the lavatory of Ward I whilst insane, and that she had not previously shewn any suicidal tendency, and that there was no evidence of neglect on the part of the Staff."

HEALTH.—There were 19 cases of Colitis, 16 males, including 1 Attendant, and 3 females. Two cases of Scarlet Fever, one in a Nurse, one in a female Patient. Two cases of Erysipelas.

INQUESTS.—Three Inquests were held during the year, one on a male Patient who fractured his thigh in February and died in October. The other in the case of a woman, who was found at the post mortem examination to have a fractured rib. In each case a verdict was returned in accordance with the Medical evidence and no blame attributed to the Staff. The third case was on the woman who committed suicide.

STAFF.—In June, Dr. Fenton, Senior Assistant Medical Officer and Deputy Superintendent, left to join the R.A.M.C. The Medical work has been carried on with the assistance of Dr. Romer and "Locums." Mr. Hadley, Stores Clerk, and the Superintendent's Clerk have "joined up." Several of the Nurses and Attendants have been away owing to serious illness. Hearty thanks are due to the Heads of Departments and the Staff generally for the way in which they have faced all the worries and anxieties during a time of stress, which tends to get more strenuous each day.

BOARD OF CONTROL.—On November 22nd, 1917, Dr. S. Coupland, a Commissioner of the Board of Control, visited the Asylum. His Report will be found in Schedule III.

General Matters.—The average cost per head per week for the year ending March 31st, 1918, was 12/104.

On April 1st the charge per head per week was raised to 12/10, and on July 1st to 14/-.

The Agricultural Sub-Committee have authorised the ploughing up of 55 acres of grass land, which has been done.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum:—Birmingham, Droitwich, Dudley, Pershore, Worcester.

The balance in favour of the Farm Account for the year was £1,639 3s. 3d.

In conclusion, I beg to thank your Committee for their help, advice and encouragement for which I am most grateful.


