FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF

THE COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM,

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th Section of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

1.—The Committee of Visitors of the County and City of Worcester Lunatic Asylum beg to lay before the Councils of the County and City their Report for the year ending the 31st December last.

2.—In our last Report we referred to the fact that Dr. Cooke, our then Medical Superintendent, was about to vacate that office on his appointment as one of the Commissioners in Lunacy. We advertised for a successor, and after giving the fullest consideration to the applications from the several candidates for the post, we appointed, in Dr. Cooke's stead, Mr. G. M. P. Braine-Hartnell, who, for some years had acted as Deputy Medical Superintendent under Dr. Cooke. We are glad to say that Mr. Braine-Hartnell's appointment has proved quite satisfactory, and he has discharged the very responsible duties which devolve upon him to our entire satisfaction. Mr. Bubb, the Second Assistant Medical Officer, succeeded Mr. Braine-Hartnell as

Deputy Medical Superintendent, Mr. Pulford being at the time promoted to the position hitherto filled by Mr. Bubb, and Mr. H. B. Wilkinson was appointed Third Assistant in Mr. Pulford's place. Further changes were made in the Medical Staff towards the close of the year, Mr. Pulford resigning his appointment on receiving one at St. Luke's Hospital, and on Mr. Wilkinson's promotion to the post of Second Assistant Medical Officer, Dr. J. Ogilvie Veitch was selected for that of Third Assistant. We are glad to be able to say that all these gentlemen have discharged their duties to our satisfaction, and we hope that there may be no occasion to make any further changes for some time to come.

- 3.—The Reverend Alfred Bond, for many years our Chaplain, resigned his office after a service of 25 years in the month of May last, and with the approval of the County and City Councils a superannuation allowance of £165 17s. 4d. was granted to him. The Reverend S. Morgans was appointed in Mr. Bond's stead, and we find him most zealous and efficient in the discharge of his duties. Copies of the Reports of Mr. Bond up to the date of his resignation and of Mr. Morgans since his appointment are appended. No other changes in the officers have occurred during the year. The necessary increase in the House Staff on the completion of the New Buildings has been made, and we are glad to be able to state that the conduct of the Officers and Attendants generally has been satisfactory. Two superannuation allowances to former artizans employed in the Asylum have dropped during the year, namely those made to John Roberts and Michael Goodwin.
- 4.—We have held the usual Monthly and 3 Special Meetings during the year. The House Committee have met from time to time as required by the Rules, while the several Sub-Committees have also met as necessity occasioned. During the year we lost the services of one of the City Members of our Body, Mr. Alderman Herbert Caldicott, who, during the many years he was on the Committee, never ceased to take an active interest in the affairs of the Asylum and the interests of the Patients.

5.—Deputations from Boards of Guardians in the County and City have visited the Asylum during the year and seen the Patients belonging to their respective Unions. The reports made by these Deputations to their Unions express their approval of the manner in which the Patients in the Asylum are treated alike by the Medical Officers and Attendants.

6.—We have been able to reduce the rate of maintenance from 8s. 2d., at which it had remained for some years past, to 7s. 10½d. per head per week, and that without any diminution in the comforts which we are able to give to the Patients.

7.—Two of the Commissioners of Lunacy visited the Asylum in the month of July last, when the Asylum, with the additional accommodation which had then been provided, was thoroughly inspected by them. A copy of their Report will be found in the Appendix (Schedule II.) The subject of further accommodation referred to by the Commissioners in their Report is a matter now under the consideration of a Special Committee, which has been

appointed by the County Council, and we need not further remark upon it, though we regret that the increase of Lunacy, which is not confined to either this County or City, should seem to necessitate an increase in the large accommodation which the County and City of Worcester have already been called upon to provide.

- 8.—The new Buildings and Extensions have been completed, and are now occupied, and have enabled us to secure better and more extended accommodation for our Patients. The total cost of the new Buildings, furnishing and fitting thereof, has not yet been ascertained, but will be reported to the Councils so soon as the accounts can be made up.
- 9.—The works for providing a better and more efficient Water Supply to the Asylum have been carried out under the supervision of Mr. E. B. Marten, C.E., and they have so far afforded, and we believe will continue to render us the advantages we contemplated to derive therefrom. We are indebted both to the Earl of Coventry and the Earl Beauchamp for the facilities their Lordships gave us for carrying out these works.
- 10.—The Accounts of the Asylum for the year ending the 31st March last were audited by Mr. W. D. Easterby, the Auditor of the Local Government Board, in the month of August last, and his report thereon was received by your Committee in the following month. We have carried out certain suggestions which Mr. Easterby made with reference to dealing with the Asylum Farm Accounts.
- 11.—The Workman's Compensation Act, 1897, has engaged the attention of your Committee, and we have been in communication with the Visiting Committees of other Asylums as to the action they proposed to adopt in effecting assurances against the legal liabilities which, under that Act, we might be under to workmen and others employed at the Asylum. Pending further information on the subject, we decided not to take any action in this respect at present. So far no case has occurred at the Asylum under which the provisions of that Act could have been called into operation.

12.—The following Table shows the number of Patients in the Asylum at the last meeting of the House Committee in each of the following years, 23 being the increase in the present year since issuing the last Report:—

The totals of 1893 and 1894 include the 60 Patients, 30 Male and 30 Female, received under Contract from the County of Stafford. That for 1895 includes 15 Male and 30 Female Patients from the same County, then still remaining at Powick, but since removed, as the whole of the accommodation of our Asylum was needed for our own Patients.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

(REV. ALFRED BOND).

REPORT FOR COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

At the end of my Chaplaincy of twenty-five years and eleven months I think it right to enter in my Journal a few statements for my successor to affix to his Annual Report at the close of the year.

I am anxious, first of all, to express my sincere thanks for the great consideration you and preceding Committees have always extended to me, and particularly for the final grace in granting me the full pension allowed under the existing scheme; and if I have not had all I have desired in past years, I have remembered that next to the welfare of the patients you have had to safeguard the interests of the public, whose servants we are.

For all past kindnesses I thank with much feeling the Medical Officers, my other colleagues, and all the Staff, amongst whom I have lived as one of a large happy family. They, and, so far as mental power availed, the patients themselves have made my work indeed a labour of love and sincere pleasure and happiness; and I trust that when weighed in the Divine balance my efforts for their welfare will not be found altogether wanting.

If I may suggest anything for the future, I should say that, though I have visited the Wards three times a week, now, under the extension of the Asylum, two through the Wards and one through the Laundry and Workshops would be a better arrangement.

Within the last two months I have completed the stock of Hymn Books, Bibles, and Prayer Books in the Wards at present occupied, and I have left a small but insufficient stock for my successor to supply to the New Wards when opened.

Within the last few days I have myself carefully looked over the Library, of which 157 volumes have been in use so far this year. I have condemned as useless through mutilation, &c., a considerable number, and I recommend, what I have some time contemplated asking the Committee, the purchase of modern light, but well-selected, literature to fill up the blank numbers. I have ticked off all volumes that are actually in the Library, and have put them in consecutive order. The following four are wanting which may yet turn up: 132, 553, 1030, 1080.

I have discharged the ordinary duties of my office as hitherto directed, and this year have been absent only when my recent appointment elsewhere absolutely called me away, except for 2 or 3 added days in town.

I have administered Holy Communion in the Chapel four times so far this year, and I hope the new arrangement may be found a blessing under my successor.

I shall leave to him to report all averages at the end of the year. Wishing him all usefulness and happiness in his work,

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

(REV. S. MORGANS).

COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM,
WORCESTER, DEC. 31st, 1898.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN,

I respectfully beg to submit to you my report as Chaplain of your Asylum for the year ending to-day.

The duties of Chaplain have been discharged by me during the last seven months only. To succeed one who so ably discharged them for many years is no light matter. I trust, however, that my efforts may be in some degree beneficial to those committed to my charge.

The Services have been duly performed each week-day and twice every Sunday. I have also held Services of a short and simple character for those who have been unable to attend Chapel. The demeanour of both Staff and Patients during Divine Service has been attentive and reverent.

The Holy Communion has been celebrated on the second Sunday in each month. The average number of Communicants is 42. I have every reason to hope that those who communicate do so in a proper spirit. The Staff at present have no opportunity of receiving the Holy Communion. If arrangements can be made, and a desire to attend expressed by a sufficient number, I shall be pleased to hold a special Service for that purpose.

I have visited all the Wards twice a week, and occasionally the Laundry, Shops, and other places, where the Patients may be employed in work.

The Library contains nearly 900 volumes. These are regularly issued and greatly appreciated. Some of the books, however, are very old and uninteresting, and several are defective. I would respectfully suggest that a few modern books be purchased. To meet the requirements of several Wards, an additional supply of Bibles, Hymn, and Prayer Books is also needed.

I should like to express my thanks to those who form the Choir, and who so cheerfully help to make the Chapel Services bright and hearty.

I would also venture to record my appreciation of the kindness and courtesy extended to me by the Medical Superintendent, the Officers, and the Staff of your Asylum during the period that I have been amongst them.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Worcester County Lunatic Asylum, July 18th, 1898.

Having completed our annual inspection of this Asylum, we can report that it is maintained generally in very good order. The Wards, both Day Rooms and Dormitories, are clean and bright; and very fairly supplied with plants and objects of interest, but we must again press for a more liberal supply of books, to be kept in bookcases open to the Patients. And here we must express the hope that the Committee will see their way to having the rough walls of the main building plastered, a work that may be carried out by degrees as the Wards require renewed decoration. The result, both as regards appearance and improved sanitation, would amply repay the outlay upon it. We found, as usual, the bedding everywhere in excellent order.

The additional Dormitories for females at the Annexe are ready for occupation, but the furniture supplied by the Contractor has had in great measure to be returned as being inferior to sample, so that only two Dormitories are vet occupied. We trust that the opening of these Dormitories will be followed by a reduction of beds in the many now overcrowded rooms in the old building; and we recommend that all Dormitories be accurately measured, so that there may be allowed to each bed in associated Dormitories the minimum floor space of fifty feet. We again recommend the plan of staining and varnishing floors, and keeping them clean by dry rubbing instead of scouring. Also the fitting of outside handles to single room doors. The Nurses' Block is also finished, but, for the reason given above, the rooms are not yet furnished. It contains two small Sitting Rooms, but a good sized Recreation Room is still a desideratum.

We find to-day on the books 1,095 Patients, 475 being males and 620 females. Five are out on trial, leaving 1,090 in the Asylum. There are on the books eight more Patients than at the last visit. There are none boarded out. Forty-eight are of the private class, and one is out-county. The estimated accommodation of the Asylum, according to the minima of day and sleeping space sanctioned by our Board, being as at the last visit, sufficient for 1,060 Patients, there is now an overplus of 35 patients; and, this being so, it is evident that before long the County will have serious difficulty in providing adequately for its pauper insane, and in these circumstances it behoves the Council to consider in time how that difficulty shall be met and avoided. Our Board would, we think, deprecate any further extension of this Asylum, the administrative departments of which are already too small for the present number of Patients, and would probably recommend the erection of a second Asylum.

Since the visit paid on November 13th, 1897, 137 Patients have been admitted; 56 discharged or removed, of whom 46 had recovered, and 73 have died. The percentage of recoveries upon the number of admissions in 1897 was 32·30; and that of deaths on the average number of Patients in residence was 7.

The 73 deaths, in 82 per cent. of which post mortem examinations were made, were all the result of natural causes, but 20.5 per cent. were due to Phthisis, and 33 per cent. to Pneumonia. One death resulted from Erysipelas, of which there have been two cases, and one from Dysentery, of which two cases also have occurred. One case of Scarlet Fever, which recovered, made up the list of epidemic or zymotic diseases which have appeared in the Asylum. There has not been an Inquest. It is satisfactory to report that in only one of the deaths was a bedsore present; and that none of the 11 men and 19 women whom we saw in bed to-day were so suffering.

There are only 2 casualties to notice, both accidental.

No mechanical restraint has been used since the last visit; but 9 males on 21 occasions, and for 1231 hours;

and 25 females, on 93 occasions, and for 231 hours, have been in seclusion.

There are now among the Patients 208 afflicted with epilepsy, or the large percentage of 19; the paralytics are 11, or only 1 per cent.; and the actively suicidal 27, or 2·5 per cent. The epileptics and suicidal continue to sleep under constant supervision, and the beds or bedding throughout the Asylum reported to have been wetted last night were those of 36 Patients, or 3·3 per cent. of the whole.

The Patients usually attending Chapel on Sunday number 640, or 59 per cent.; and about 164 attend the service in the Infirmaries, and 31 that of the Roman Catholic Church. About 59 per cent. also attend the associated entertainments; 62 per cent. walk weekly or oftener beyond the Asylum Estate; 32 per cent. daily in the grounds outside the Airing Courts; with about 20 per cent., not physically incapacitated, are confined for exercise. The latter proportion might well be reduced.

As regards useful employment, we learn that some 344 men and 454 women engage in it; being the satisfactory proportions of 72 and 73 per cent. of the total numbers of each.

We have given to all the Patients the opportunity of speaking with us. As usual appeals for discharge were numerous; but except a few, manifestly delusional, no complaints of ill-treatment were preferred. We are able to commend very highly the dress of both sexes, and both men and women were neat and tidy. No Patient was wearing a strong dress, but 9 wear them at night.

We find that the present staff of attendants for day duty, exclusive of head attendants, artizans, and laundry-maids, comprises 46 men and 51 women; giving one to 10 Patients in the male, and one to 12 in the female division. For night duty there are 6 men and 8 women. Of the total number of attendants 20 per cent. have not yet completed 12 months' service, but 35 per cent. have more than five years' service. Each attendant who has served two years wears the badge of a star or stripe,

which is accompanied by a bonus of a halfpenny a day; for five years' service another badge is added, and the allowance is a penny halfpenny a day; and for ten years a third badge is given, and the allowance is threepence halfpenny a day. The condition is attached, however, of passing the customary examination of the Psychological Society. Only one attendant was dismissed last year for misconduct.

The Medical Staff has been changed since the last visit by the selection of Dr. Marriott Cooke by the Lord Chancellor to fill a vacancy in our Commission, and the appointment of Dr. Braine-Hartnell, for several years the Senior Assistant Medical Officer, to the post of Superintendent. There are still three Assistant Medical Officers, and we find the medical records properly kept, and minute pathological research continuing to be prosecuted.

We should notice the construction of a reservoir to contain 800,000 gallons of water, which is complete, but not yet filled, pending the erection of a protective fence round it.

The present rate of charge for Home County Patients is 8/2, and for Private Patients 15/- a week.

THE FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL OFFICER & SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Worcester County and City Asylum.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD, AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit to your consideration the Annual Report on the condition and management of your Asylum for the year ending December 31st, 1898.

Appended you will find the usual Statistical Tables, with information as to the admissions, discharges, and deaths of the patients during the last 12 months, and from the opening of the Asylum. The Financial Statement for the year ending March 31st, 1899, prepared by the Asylum Clerk, with his usual care, is also subjoined.

The changes that occurred among the patients were as follows:

These figures show that at the end of the year there were 31 more patients in the Asylum than at the commencement, the increase being 19 on the male and 12 on the female side. The average number resident was 1096: 479 males and 617 females.

Admissions.—206 Patients were admitted during the year. This is about the average of the last 10 years. The following table shows the state of their bodily health on admission:—

The number of those suffering from General Paralysis was 18. Of those admitted during the year 15 have been discharged "recovered." Sixteen have died.

A male patient was admitted with a recent cut throat.

A female patient was found to have a fractured arm on admission.

Discharges.—Fifty-seven patients were discharged "recovered," being at the rate of 29.68 per cent. of the number admitted, excluding transfers from other Asylums. This is the lowest recovery rate since the year 1889.

DEATHS.—The death-rate calculated on the average number resident was 9.67. This is 2.67 more than the percentage last year.

The following is a short summary of the causes of death. A full account is given in Table V.

Post-mortem examinations were made in 84 out of the 106 deaths.

Births.—A.W., married woman, admitted in a pregnant condition, was confined of twins. The patient has since left the Asylum "recovered."

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—These have increased by two during the year. Twelve were admitted, 7 were discharged, 3 died. Fifty-one remained at the end of the year.

INQUESTS.—No inquest has been held during the year.

Accidents.—There have been several casualties, involving fractured bones, all due to accident or done through the instrumentality of fellow patients. These were all, as they occurred, reported to your Committee.

Escapes.—One female patient effected her escape. She was brought back from her friends in Gloucestershire after an absence of three days.

Health.—One female patient contracted Scarlet Fever—the source of infection could not be traced. The same must be said about the case of Typhoid Fever in a male patient, which ended fatally. One patient, a woman, had a slight attack of chicken-pox.

I regret to have to report that Colitis has been present, at intervals, during the year. The treatment of this disease that was found so effective last year did not produce a like good result on this occasion. It is worthy of notice that it has not yet appeared on the female side in the old building. The deaths from this cause numbered 3—2 males and 1 female. One of the Staff was attacked, and made a good recovery.

STAFF.—I am indebted to Mr. Bubb, my Deputy, for much ready assistance, and to him and Dr. Pulford for the great interest they display in the welfare of the place. I have to express my thanks for the assistance I have received from the other Officers. Their help, willingly given, and the benefit of their experience, has at all times been most valuable to me. In April last Mr. H. B. Wilkinson was appointed Third Assistant Medical Officer. He has proved himself a capable officer, and his musical abilities are freely given for the benefit of the patients.

In June last the Rev. A. Bond, who had held the post of Chaplain to your Asylum for a period of upwards of 25 years, resigned. He left with hearty expressions of goodwill from the Staff and Patients.

The Rev. S. Morgans was appointed to succeed him. He has thrown himself into the work with energy.

James Jones, Water Supply Man, died in April last. He had been in the service of your Committee for 14 years. Before his death he had been for some little time incapacitated from work.

The changes among the female Staff have been owing to the usual causes. Several left to get married, some to take up nursing, and many wishing for a change. These latter are a source of trouble to Asylum Medical Officers. If all Superintendents would agree not to take Nurses or Attendants who have been in another Asylum, I think it would be found that "the wish for a change" would soon be a thing of the past.

Three male Attendants were dismissed for breaches of the Asylum Regulations.

The conduct of the Staff has otherwise been most satisfactory.

Commissioners in Lunacy.—Two members of the Board of the Commissioners in Lunacy made their annual visit on July 18th. Their report was a favourable one.

General Matters.—The average weekly cost per Patient for the year was 7s. 7\subseteq d. This is 1\frac{1}{2}d. more than the cost last year, and is accounted for by the increased price of flour and also by the reduced profit on the Farm.

In October last your Committee reduced the charge for maintenance to the Guardians from 8s. 2d. to 7s. 10½d. per week.

The Reservoir mentioned in the last Report has been finished, and has proved of great use. The condition of the water has been improved.

The New Wards have been occupied by female patients. A delay was caused in the opening of the same, owing to the fact that your Committee had to reject some of the furniture which had been supplied.

It may seem incredible just after speaking about the opening of new Wards to say that at the present time the female side is overcrowded. Such is, however, the fact, and I must draw the attention of your Committee to the point. We have, according to the requirements of the Commissioners in Lunacy, space for 617 beds for female patients. There were on December 31st, 1898, 629 female patients. We had, thus, on that date 12 more female patients than our proper number. Looking this fact in the face it is necessary that without any delay the building of a second Asylum should be put in hand, as long before it would be ready for occupation we should have to find room elsewhere for our surplus population.

We regret the loss through death of the late Alderman H. Caldicott. He was a regular attendant at the meetings of your Committee, and took a keen interest in all that concerned the Asylum.

During the year death has removed John Roberts and Michael Goodwin, both pensioners of your Committee.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum, and have reported in satisfactory terms as to the care and treatment of their patients:—Bromsgrove, Dudley, Kidderminster, King's Norton, Martley, Stourbridge, Tewkesbury, West Bromwich, and Worcester. There are twenty-three Unions in the County of Worcester; nine of these have visited their patients. We should be glad to

welcome more Boards of Guardians, and there is no doubt that the visits do good to the patients, and are much appreciated by them.

The Farm shows a profit of £490 1s. Sd. on the year's working. A Dutch Barn has been erected at the Home Farm at a cost of £156. This, in part, accounts for the diminution in the profit, and for the increase in the cost of maintenance.

I have to thank the Editors of the following papers— Berrow's Worcester Journal, The Herald, and The Chronicle for their kindness in sending copies of their papers for the use of the patients.

In conclusion, I have to thank your Committee for your-invariable kindness and consideration during the past year. To you, Mr. Chairman, I am indebted for your ever-ready help, advice and encouragement, which have tended not a little to lessen the cares of the work.

Conditions under which Private Patients are admitted into the Asylum.

- I. The charge for Patients coming from, or having a settlement in, some Union in the County or City of Worcester is 15s. a week, payable quarterly in advance.
- II. The charge for maintenance covers all ordinary expenses, but in cases of prolonged bodily disease an additional weekly charge may be made to cover the cost of special medicines and stimulants.
- III. In the event of the death or discharge of any Private Patient before the maintenance moneys, paid in advance, have been exhausted by effluxion of time, the balance will be refunded to the person who made the last payment in respect of such patient.
- IV. The Patients may wear their own clothes, but will have the same accommodation in all respects as the other Patients.
- V. Application for the admission of a Patient on the private class must be made in the first instance to the Medical Officer at the Asylum, who will supply all the various blank forms for the order and medical certificates.
- VI. The excess charge made for Private Patients beyond the ordinary pauper weekly rate of maintenance is carried to the credit of the Repairs Account.

BREAKFAST.—To make one gallon of coffee. § oz. coffee, § oz. chicory, 4 oz. sugar, 12 oz. milk.

DINNER—Potatoes are weighted when peeled and uncooked. Some patients are allowed half-pint of beer with their dinner.

On Wednesday the sust puriding is served with treacle or sugar, rhubarb or fresh fruits being added when in season.

Salad is given largely when in season Pickled cabbage occasionally.

TEA.—To make one gallon of tea—1 oz. tea, 4 oz. sugar, 12 oz. milk.

Any of the weakly or aged patients who require it, are allowed 2 oz. bread and § pint broth at 9.30 a m.; the broth being composed of—for the pint—1 pint meat liquor, 2 oz. barley, e oz. oatmeal, herbs.

The Diet of the Patients resident in the Wards of the Annexe is varied in the following particulars:—Bread and milk is largely given for Breakfast, and some cheese for Dinner. The amount of meat and bread is somewhat smaller.
